Lamb has first hearing in Ponca

Tracy Lamb, 22, of Concord, was given her first felony hearing in the Ponca County Court Friday morning. Her preliminary hearing, has been scheduled for April 19.

The preliminary hearing April 19 serves two reasons: to determine that a crime has been committed,

and to determine if Lamb committed the crime. According to Dixon Deputy Sheriff Don Taylor, Lamb will be provided with the opportunity to enter a plea April 19 at her preliminary hearing.

Lamb is charged with two felonies from a shooting incident Saturday, March 23 in Concord where Joseph Michael Crawford, 31, of Concord, was allegedly shot by Lamb with a .410 gauge shot-gun. Lamb faces felony charges on first degree assault and the use of a firearm to commit a felony.

ALTHOUGH A \$40,000 bond was set Monday, Lamb is still in the custody of the Dixon County Sher-iff's office.

According to Taylor, Crawford's condition has improved from guarded critical condition to stable but critical condition at St. Luke's Hospital in Sioux City. Taylor said Crawford is still being closely moni-tored and he is still in intensive care.

Taylor added that the investigation in the matter is now complete.

<u>"I'm far from a professional</u> I'm far from it — I'm an amateur," Erlandson says with a sense of hidden pride. "I just hope this carving serves glory to God."

THE PROJECT found its roots three years ago when Erlandson and his wife of 12 years, Lola, moved his father, Warner, who turned 99 on Friday, from his Wakefield home into an apartment. He says while they were moving his father, he came across some old duplicate paintings of daVinci's "Last Supper" and they

intrigued him. The actual process of making the wood carving began two years ago when Ponca lumber yard owner Wes Schram found some pieces of bass wood which he thought would serve Erlandson's cause well. Erlandson says Schram contacted him about the wood and upon receiving it, Erlandson let it dry out for seven months before

Over the course of working on the-project,-Erlandson-says he used a number of different carving tools and small chisels to create detail in

carving into it.

the work. He says the finishing touches were put on within the last six months.

ERLANDSON IS quick to recognize the assistance he received in the project. He says


