WSC funds may decrease if budget goes unchanged

Wayne State College students share reason for concern if the proposed biennial budget passes, because it could mean increases in tuition but losses in funding.

That's the word from Dr. Donald Mash, president of Wayne State College. According to information provided by the college, Wayne State could be operating with ap-proximately \$350,000 less in each of the coming two years if the 1991-93 biennium budget stays the way it is presently proposed.

More students and fewer dollars has long been a problem the col-lege has faced. Mash expressed that concern at a recent meeting of the State College Board of Trustees. There he said the negative impact of budget cuts would be devastating to rural revitalization efforts.

MASH ALSO rejected the notion of limiting enrollments to deal with budget shortfalls. He said that any effort to deny access to higher education in rural Nebraska would be "counter-productive" and shortsighted."

"Denying access is exactly what we shouldn't do," he said. "If we are concerned with long-term rural development, higher education is our best investment in the future. Our challenge is to involve more of our citizens in higher education, regardless of age."

Mash said he believes that if this happens, students' dollars aren't going toward higher educa-tion, but rather other state pro-

ONE OF THE major problems facing Wayne State, is that of the present four state colleges (Kearney will join the university system this summer), Wayne State offers the most public service and outreach programs of all the state colleges affected by the biennial budget but decreases in funding budget, but decreases in funding could jeopardize those off-campus

Another dilemma the college faces, is that of the three state

colleges included in the 1991-93 colleges included in the 1991-93 budget, WSC has the greatest need for capital improvements. With cuts in state funding, new projects could be jeopardized, especially with the current tax dilemma facing the Nebraska Legislature. The last time Wayne State built a new classroom building was

In addition, Wayne State College has experienced a 26 percent climb in enrollment over the past two years with no additional full-time faculty being added to the paged!

*Due to a 26 percent increase of full-time, equivalent students in the current biennium, and the college's general level of underfunding, a general level of underfunding, a reduction of this proportion would be severe," Mash said. "On top of this, it is likely that the college's enrollment will increase again in the fall of 1991."

The 65 tall bearded iris have been donated by Hummels and DeNaeyers.

All of these perennials are fairly low in maintenance. People wishing to plant low maintenance gardens of their own could use combinations of these plants.

Senator proposes handgun bill

Ashford talks to WSC audience

Legislation which began two years ago appears to be gaining momentum in the Nebraska Unicameral, but that was just part of the message delivered by Ne-braska State Sen. Brad Ashford, R-Omaha, during his Wayne State College visit Wednesday evening.

Ashford, a proponent of a handgun control bill, suggests that the state needs legislation to create a first-time background check for handgun buyers, a two day process conducted by local law en-forcement agencies, and an annual certificate allowing handgun buyers to purchase the weapons

The bill, known as LB 355, does not include background checks for large weapons, like rifles or semi-

automatic weapons, just handguns.
"I am elected to do the best
possible job for Nebraskans," he
said. "Gun control legislation is one of those areas of concern.

THE OMAHA senator said his THE OMAHA senator said his package resembles the proposed Brady bill recently introduced to the U.S. Congress. He said that LB 355. differs from the Brady bill because it calls for a 2-day turnaround for background checks by local law enforcement for approval or denial of applications, rather than a 7-day turn-around by state law enforcement authorities, respectively. quired in the Brady bill.

The Brady bill, handgun control legislation named after former Press Secretary James Brady, wounded and permanently disabled in the 1981 assassination attempt on then-President Ronald Regaran. has received strong Reagan, has received strong opposition from the National Rifle Association (NRA).

*The problem we have in Ne braska is that a background check won't work on the state level because the state patrol keeps no criminal records and it would cost too much to establish a database with that information," he said.

Ashford said if the Nebraska bill passes, and an applicant is denied, there is an appeal can be made through local county court. He said it is written in the bill that appeals will take no longer than 30 days.

THE SENATOR'S legislation found opposition Wednesday night when a group of individuals grilled him on the measure, while stopping short of saying it violates their rights.

"Our intent behind this bill is to take handguns out of the hands of convicted felons and those who have been diagnosed with a men-tal illness," Ashford said. "We are not here to say that it will work because we don't know if it will. We want to provide a defense for those who might be killed each year if the legislation didn't exist."

Ashford also warns that if Nebraska doesn't pass its own hand-gun legislation, the federal gov-ernment's legislation, requiring a 7-day waiting period, would take precedence. With state legislation in place, the 7-day waiting period wouldn't be required in Nebraska.

"Nebraska's bill, if it passes, would be relatively modest compared to other states," Ashford

He cited that in Oregon, a state which has the highest NRA membership. in the nation, the waiting period is 15 days. At the time of the legislation's passage, the NRA endorsed the bill.

"If we can save one life, or two, or three, then this bill is valid," he said. "My intent is to do what is reasonably sound and justified. We just want to create a bump in the road before people purchase a handgun."
