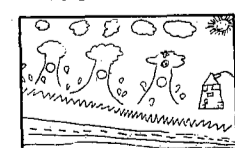
Medals will be awarded to the top five students in each category, with certificates going to the following five.

## Ruling brings protest flood

If all Wayne County businesses that filed protests with the Wayne County Assessors office are compared to telephone and pipeline companies, it's likely they won't have to pay personal property taxes.

Following a ruling Wednesday in Wayne County District Court involving Great Dane Trailers of Nebraska vs. Wayne County Board of Equalization, that scenario might be likely to occur.

Great Dane won its lawsuit against the county and is entitled to a refund of over \$30,000. If the Great Dane ruling sets a standard, Wayne County could wind up in the same tax vortex the state finds itself.

ACCORDING TO Wayne County Assessor Joyce Reeg, 90 businesses or individuals filed property tax protests. She said 10 businesses or individuals protested for value changes and 80 protested that their value should be equal to the lowest assessment in the county, which is zero.

Since Monday, Reeg said she has received the majority of the protests. The deadline for protests was Tuesday.

Businesses protesting the personal property taxes to zero assessments include: Pamida, Cymru Am Byth (Sav-Mor), Jones Intercable, Coastal Mart, First National Omaha Service Center, Regal Realty, Boyle Company, Inc. (Wayne Care Centre), Columbus Federal Land Bank, Great Dane Trailers, Contemporary Industries, Inc. (7-Eleven), Staab, Inc. of Wayne (Pizza Hut) and a number of Wayne County farmers.

Along with those filing protests are two Wayne County commissioners — Jerry Pospishil and Merlin Beiermann. Pospishil and Beiermann also serve on the county board of equalization.

"Right now everyone's protesting everything," Reeg said. "People are protesting to make a point, not because they're trying to get out of being taxed. They're trying to get the legislature to move on this."

SHE SAID THE county has to refund \$71,182 from 1989 prop-

erty tax protests due to the Supreme Court ruling March 1 involving Natural Gas Pipeline Company of America vs. State Board of

Equalization and Trailblazer Pipeline Company vs. State Board of Equalization.

Much of the money the county has to refund supports schools and educational service units. Most, if not all of it, has been spent. Somewhere schools will have to find room in their budgets to make adjustments, Reeg said.

"The biggest problem we face is that lids from LB 1059 create problems for the schools to adjust their budgets to allow for room for refunds," Reeg said.

WHILE 100 protests in Wayne County may not seem like much, it doesn't include large telephone companies, like USWest, which protest on the state level.

For example, USWest's personal property was valued in 1989 at over \$2 million. Today, its value is under \$300,000. The reason its protest differs from other businesses is because USWest files its protest at the state level. Such is the case with other large corporations which have state wide operations.

According to a letter from the Nebraska Association of County Officials, "the first step in the refund procedure is for the county assessor to determine and certify to the county board the amount of refund due to each company from each taxing division in the county." From there, "the total amount is subtracted from the tax actually paid to determine the refund due." After processing through the assessor's office, it goes to the county board for approval.

"Because of this personal property tax dilemma, there will be a tax shift unless the legislature does something," she said. "The tax problem is now in the legislature's hands."

## Court hears guilty pleas involving criminal cases

WAYNE - Plea agreements have been reached in three separate cases before the Wayne County District Court cases.

According to information taken from trial dockets, Chad Young, Wayne, Jerry Heier, Wayne, and Richard Pearson, Tulsa, Okla., all pled guilty to reduced charges as the result of plea agreements.

Young, age unknown, pled guilty to delivery of a controlled substance, a Class III felony. In Young's case, a pre-sentence investigation has been ordered by Judge Merritt C. Warren. Young will appear for sentencing June 5, 1991 at 11 a.m.

Heier, 23, pled guilty to theft by unlawful taking, a Class III felony, following a March 10 theft of money from Quality Foods. In his case, a pre-sentence investigation has been ordered. Heier has been ordered to appear July 3 at 10 a.m. for sentencing.

Pearson, 18, pled guilty to escape, a Class III felony, and sentencing was deferred following a pre-sentence investigation. He has been ordered to appear for sentencing June 5 at 1 p.m.

For each individual, the maximum sentence they could receive is 20 years in prison and a \$25,000 fine or a minimum of one year in prison.

## Conway addresses state tax problem

There's a possibility the state legislature could go back into session unless lawmakers are able to create a band aid solution to the state's property tax problems for 1991 by June 5.

According to State Sen. Gerald Conway, R-Wayne, first impressions make him think the Unicameral won't be called back into special session but that's not to say the possibility doesn't exist. Conway spoke Friday to an audience at the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce quarterly general membership meeting.

The state senator from Wayne said he imagines the matter will ultimately be resolved by making changes to the state's Constitution. If the matter is resolved through the Constitution, it will probably go to public ballot.

FOR 1991, however, Conway thinks the Unicameral will patch up the problem until it can be resolved in 1992.

"My theory of the long haul is that we're going to have to get into the Constitution in order to get back into a proper taxing theme," Conway said. "Our Constitution is restrictive enough, especially now that it's been interpreted by the Supreme Court, that it requires that some changes be made."

"There are some things we want to do and the public wants us to do but the Constitution is restricting us. We need to clean up the definitions of 'personal property' versus real property."

Conway said the temporary fix for 1991 will likely involve adaptations of Gov. Ben Nelson's tax plan.

HE SAID what most likely will happen this year will be that all personal property will be taken off the tax rolls while other fees will be added to make up the difference.

Examples of changes includes taking automobiles off a value schedule and putting them on a

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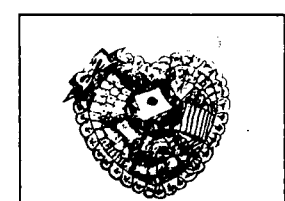

# Pet week May 5-11

WAYNE - With National Pet Week scheduled for May 5-11, the Wayne Veterinary Clinic offers some tips to take care of your dog or cat. The Wayne business will again be holding its pet show for owners to showcase their pets' talents on May 11 at 10 a.m.

According to Veterinarian Dr. Ken Liska, there are a variety of things the Wayne Vet Clinic advises its customers when they ask about the care of pets.

Liska said with summer approaching, the most common question vets hear is whether it's safe to take a pet with the family for summer travels. Liska said while pets can fly it's easier for them if their owners drive. He said if owners must fly with their pets, he advises that owners make sure that they have verification of rabies vaccinations. He also said that owners need to make sure that the cage their pet may be placed in has ample room for them to get up, turn around and lie down.

If traveling by road, Liska said it is best to maintain a regular feeding routine and give the meal at the end of the day when the destination has been met. He said it is also advisable to take along a jug of cold water for the pet to drink.

While having a pet around the house is beneficial to both owner and animal, Liska said it is not a good idea to feed the pet table scraps. He added that it is also important to have regular checkups to insure the pet's health.

flat fee. Conway said taxpayers will most likely see a temporary increase in real estate taxes and businesses will see the removal of the retail collection fee. He said taxpayers will probably see an increase in utility collection fees and a depreciable surcharge.

IF THERE IS any good news coming out of Lincoln, Conway says that most of the changes will have a minimal effect on Wayne and Dixon Counties.

"If we took all the personal property off the tax rolls in Wayne County, it would not be that devastating and it would be even less in Dixon County," he said. "In Dakota County it would have an 11 percent increase of real estate taxes because that's how much they're going to lose on personal property. Luckily we're not so reliant on personal property tax that it would be real devastating."

While the District 17 state senator is quick to admit that he has had trouble keeping pace with the proposals coming fourth, he

said he's tried to keep abreast of the changes by talking to members of the legislature's revenue committee. He said he thinks, one way or another, that a workable solution will be made up.

"I think the legislature will come up with a survivable package like the governor's plan passed by June 5" when the session ends, he said. "There's some difficult legal entanglements in this whole thing and that's one reason I'm optimistic that we can get this done by June 5."

It shall be the duty of each owner, agent, occupant or person in possession, charge or control of any lot, tract or parcel of land in the City of Wayne, Nebraska to cut and remove from such lot, tract or parcel of land together with one-half (1/2) of the streets or alleys abutting thereon, all weeds and other rank growth or vegetation. Such weeds and other rank growth of vegetation shall be cut as close to the ground level as possible and shall be maintained as close to the ground level as possible throughout the period of May 1 to October 15 each year. When the City has effected the removal of such noxious growth or has paid for its removal, the actual cost thereof, shall be charged to the owner, agent, occupant or person in possession, charge or control of such property.

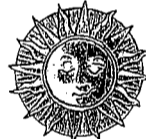
