Residents voice concerns over new business site

Two agenda items related by chance garnered the most attention from the Wayne City Council

Tuesday night.

As the City of Wayne prepares to update its 12-year-old comprehensive plan, residents from the Pine Heights neighborhood registered complaints about the zoning in their neighborhood.

Residents shared concerns with the council since much of Seventh

the council since much of Seventh Street is zoned for businesses. It appears that the property on the northeast corner of Pine Heights Road and Seventh Street will soon be sold for a new Runza restaurant.

SPEAKING ON behalf of the neighborhood, Edith Zahniser said concerns deal with garbage, noise, lights and smells coming from the

proposed restaurant.
"When we attract businesses in Wayne, do we want to give up employee health benefits and creare minimum wage jobs for progress?" she asked the council. "This business really won't benefit the community as far as the money is concerned because the owner won't even be living here."

Zahniser also presented a copy of a netition protesting the progression.

of a petition protesting the pro-posed site, signed by 28 neighbor-hood residents.

OF THE residents who voiced concerns, many said increases in traffic on Seventh Street has created a bottleneck situation on Pine Heights Road, Seventh Street and Dearborn Avenue.

Dearborn Avenue.

Pine Heights residents also complained that there will be unpleasant odors from the garbage, lights reflecting into their living space from passing cars, decreases in property values, noise from vehicles and the drive-through speaker menu, and vermin menu, and vermin.

They, said-they, want, the city, to influence Runza in creating buffer zones. They want the drive-through menu placed so it doesn't face their homes, protecting them somewhat from sounds. They also want to see the nathage container. want to see the garbage container placed in a manner so odors won't

A suggestion made by residents, however, seemed to get the most support from the city council. Residents suggested making Pine Heights Road a one-way street with traffic flowing south.

According to Wayne Attorney Bob Ensz, residents could try to change the zoning for the property along Seventh Street but he said it would likely be a task which would accomplish little.

He said by the time residents voice changes to the planning commission and to the city council, the restaurant would already be in

IN DEALING with the comprehensive plan, the council listened to George Phelps, who directed the planning commission.

Phelps said that the planning commission has decided to go with Hanna:Keelan for the updating of the comprehensive plan. The plan will begin to be updated June 1, following council approval Tuesday. The process is expected to take eight to 12 months.

eight to 12 months.

The plan will entail research on the business districts in Wayne, zoning, land issues, where developments can occur, housing, environmental resources, parks and recreation, and transportation.


A comprehensive plan is a road.

ONE REASON the discussion of the plan required so much discus-sion was because of the cost and work entailed in the update.

Phelps said Hanna: Keelan is charging the city in two sections. For writing the comprehensive plan, it will cost \$16,875 over the period of the next 12 months.



nity to take a hard look at what it's doing well and not so well.

The semester-long study points out that Wayne impresses the student population with its professionalism and pleasant personality. The study also points out that we aren't doing an effective job of bringing our business climate to the students. We need to inform the student population about our competitive pricing.

For this reason, there are a few things we can do. First of all, we can build upon students' positive impressions

This could be done similarly to the Wayne Expo, but it would be closer to the campus, catered for the students. Along with it, we could serve low-cost or free food, to en tice them to attend.

Let's encourage our students that we're here to serve them. Maybe then we can encourage them to check Wayne first.



LINCOLN - The Legislature is in the last month of the current leg-islative session. Intensive and ex-tended debate on several issues has compelled the Speaker of the Legislature to schedule late evening sessions.
STATE BUDGET

A proposed two-year state budget was given first round approval in the Legislature this past

Although, the proposed budget continues most current state pro grams, it does reflect the recent downturn in state revenues. As the budget currently stands, it includes across-the-board cuts in state agency operations of two percent in the first year and three percent in the second.

The budget that was debated this week is thirty million dollars less than what governor Nelson proposed earlier in the session. This may not even be a big enough re-duction if state revenues continue to decline. However, as has been the tendency with past governors, Nelson has indicated that he will not hesitate to use his line-item veto power on the budget if spending does not match ex-pected revenues.

The budget faces two more stages of debate before it is for-warded on to the Governor for his



val. If necessary, this will give nators additional opportuni-make any further changes proposed budget.

Lawmakers have also given first

program. The bill would allow the
state Department of Heath to
provide free or low-cost mammography screenings to low-income women.

Mammograms are X-rays that

can detect tumors which are or

can detect tumors which are or may become breast cancer.

If passed and signed by the governor, LB 256 would permit the Health Department to direct women to certified providers for mammography screenings. The department would give women certificates for the procedure that screeners could redeem for reimbursement. bursement.

The proposal provides that no state generated funds would be used to pay for the screenings. Screening providers would be paid with federal and private funds. The state Health Department has sub-mitted, a creat annication to the mitted a grant application to the federal government for the monies to fund the program.







Eating habits important to steer youth into creating healthy diets, official says

CONCORD - If you practice unhealthy eating habits, most likely they originated at home when you were a child and more often than not, your children will practice the same habits, says Darlene Martin, University of Nebraska nutritionist at the Northeast Research and Extension Center.

tension Center.
According to the American
Academy of Pediatrics, nutrition
habits, whether good or bad, begin at home and are practiced
throughout adulthood. Good or bad habits, unless change occurs, can cycle throughout generations of certain families.

TOO MANY American diets include too many calories and too much fat, cholesterol and sodium, according to the American Dietetic Association. Diets high in

fat and cholesterol may lead to heart disease in later adulthood, especially if your family has a known history of heart disease. "The best time to start cutting

"The best time to start cutting back on fat, saturated fat and cholesterol is when your child begins eating regularly at the table with the rest of the family," Martin says. "This process should not begin before your child has reached the age of two because of special needs required in your child's diet." Martin says children learn by example. If parents practice good nutritional habits, their children will naturally follow, she says. Sweets

naturally follow, she says. Sweets and fatty foods do little harm if they are consumed in moderation and combined with a well balanced

diet.
"Exercise is one of the most effective ways to help balance the

intake of calories," Martin says. "Children should be encouraged to do activities that will help burn calories as much as possible."

SHE SUGGESTS that parents create fun activities that involve active movement, such as tag, rid-ing bicycles, walking or just playing

"Encourage your children to practice good eating habits," she says. "The dividends of good nutri-tion will pay off when your children become adults. Before making any drastic changes in a child's diet or lifestyle, talk to your pediatrician or registered dietician. Additional information is avail-

Rescue Captain Ver Neal Marotz emphasized that response time is critical for use of the machine and EMT's should be notified as soon as an emergency situation arises.





Women on average continue to outlive men, but a new study now suggests one way men can increase longevity: Stay married and live with your wife. The study of men between 45 and 65 found that those who live alone or with someone other than a wife were twice as likely to die within 10 years as those living with their wives. That was the conclusion after evaluating fac-tors such as smoking, drinking, obesity, physical activity, education and income. Reinforcing the conclusion that living with a spouse makes the difference, the researchers reported that men living with their children or others didn't do any better in lon-gevity than men who lived alone. What about women? The study found that lower income was a greater factor in reduced longev for women than living without a spouse. On her 102nd birthday, Mabel Lent, of Peekskill, New York,




