## Residents voice concerns over new business site

Two agenda items related by chance garnered the most attention from the Wayne City Council Tuesday night.

As the City of Wayne prepares to update its 12-year-old comprehensive plan, residents from the Pine Heights neighborhood registered complaints about the zoning in their neighborhood.

Residents shared concerns with the council since much of Seventh Street is zoned for businesses. It appears that the property on the northeast corner of Pine Heights Road and Seventh Street will soon be sold for a new Runza restaurant.

**SPEAKING ON** behalf of the neighborhood, Edith Zahniser said concerns deal with garbage, noise, lights and smells coming from the proposed restaurant.

"When we attract businesses in Wayne, do we want to give up employee health benefits and create minimum wage jobs for progress?" she asked the council. "This business really won't benefit the community as far as the money is concerned because the owner won't even be living here."

Zahniser also presented a copy of a petition protesting the proposed site, signed by 28 neighborhood residents.

**OF THE** residents who voiced concerns, many said increases in traffic on Seventh Street has created a bottleneck situation on Pine Heights Road, Seventh Street and Dearborn Avenue.

Pine Heights residents also complained that there will be unpleasant odors from the garbage, lights reflecting into their living space from passing cars, decreases in property values, noise from vehicles and the drive-through speaker menu, and vermin.

They said they want the city to influence Runza in creating buffer zones. They want the drive-through menu placed so it doesn't face their homes, protecting them somewhat from sounds. They also want to see the garbage container placed in a manner so odors won't be as prevalent.

A suggestion made by residents, however, seemed to get the most support from the city council. Residents suggested making Pine Heights Road a one-way street with traffic flowing south.

According to Wayne Attorney Bob Ensz, residents could try to change the zoning for the property along Seventh Street but he said it would likely be a task which would accomplish little.

He said by the time residents voice changes to the planning commission and to the city council, the restaurant would already be in place.

**IN DEALING** with the comprehensive plan, the council listened to George Phelps, who directed the planning commission.

Phelps said that the planning commission has decided to go with Hanna:Keelan for the updating of the comprehensive plan. The plan will begin to be updated June 1, following council approval Tuesday. The process is expected to take eight to 12 months.

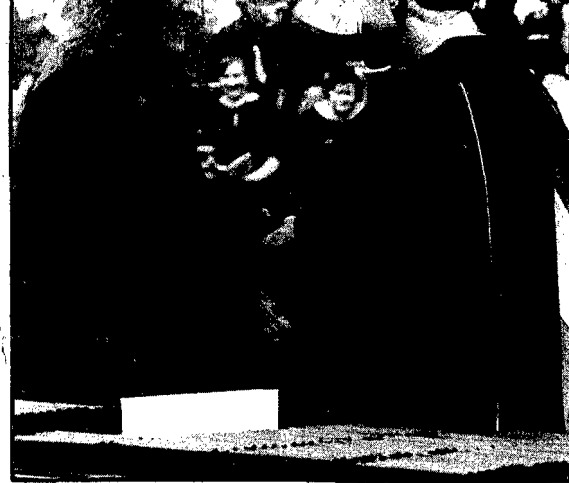
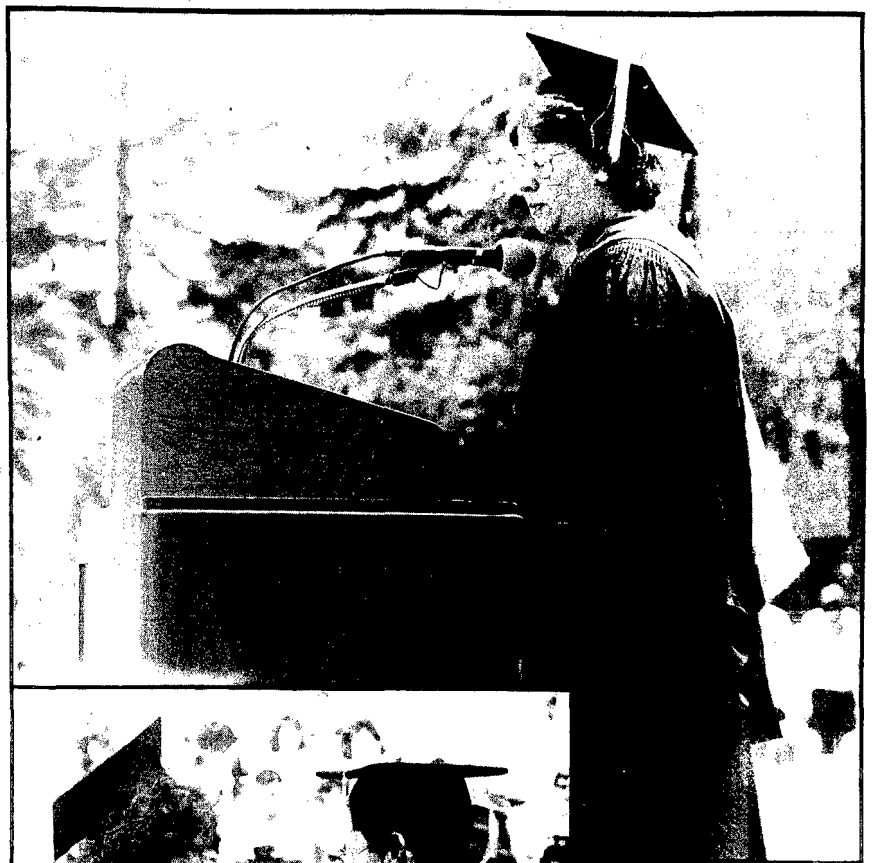
The plan will entail research on the business districts in Wayne, zoning, land issues, where developments can occur, housing, environmental resources, parks and recreation, and transportation.

"A comprehensive plan is a road map to the future," Phelps said to the council.

**ONE REASON** the discussion of the plan required so much discussion was because of the cost and the work entailed in the update.

Phelps said Hanna:Keelan is charging the city in two sections. For writing the comprehensive plan, it will cost \$16,875 over the period of the next 12 months.

**SPEAKER AT** the 1991 commencement exercises will be Charles Schroeder, vice president, development, of the University of Nebraska Foundation.

The foundation is responsible for the coordination of all fund raising activities for the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, including annual funds, publications and major gift solicitations for the 11 colleges in the flagship campus of the University of Nebraska system.

Schroeder will be introduced by Superintendent Francis Haun. The program also will include

## School board faces property tax woes

WAYNE - The property tax dilemma facing the state has hit home.

The Wayne School Board faced the dilemma for the first time Tuesday night as they resolved that immediate payment of property tax refunds "would seriously interfere with their governmental functions."

In a resolution directed to the Wayne County treasurers office, the board agreed to wait two years before making relief payments on the 1989 personal property tax refund.

**ACCORDING** to a memo from Superintendent Dr. F.R. Haun to the school board, the "refund of personal property taxes from the general fund in the amount of \$21,128.47 and from the sinking fund in the amount of \$733.01 would seriously interfere with the districts ability to function."

The board's decision off Haun's recommendation comes following a review of a complex statement from the Wayne County Commissioners apprising the board of the direct impact on revenues of the school district from the 1989 tax year.

The money anticipated to be lost goes to repayment of tax anticipatory notes used to construct the addition to the Wayne elementary school and the general fund money supports the school on a cash flow basis.

**IN ADDITION** to addressing the tax problem, the board focused on a number of other concerns. In other matters, the board:

- Discovered that projected 1991 enrollments will increase the school's population to 943 students.

## ESU 1 OKs contracts with Omaha firm for new facility

The board of directors of Educational Service Unit One (ESU 1) met Tuesday night in Wakefield and voted to contract with the firm of Dana, Larson and Roubal in Omaha to serve as architects for a new facility in Wayne two house the unit's two Wayne programs.

Board members last month gave the go-ahead for construction of the new facility, which will house the Wayne Children's Development Center and the Wayne Learning Center.

The Wayne Children's Development Center is a program for severe and profound youngsters and is presently located in a building leased from Region IV. The Wayne Learning Center, a behaviorally disordered program, is located in a building owned by ESU 1 on the east edge of Wayne.

A site for the new facility has not yet been announced, although

the board would ideally like to locate near Wayne State College and Providence Medical Center since both institutions are utilized by youngsters in the programs.

**BOARD MEMBERS** Tuesday night also voted unanimously to adopt a master contract agreement for the 1991-92 year for the unit's certified employees.

The contract, as approved by the board and ESU Education Association, sets the 1991-92 base salary for certified employees at \$16,900, up from the 1990-91 base salary of \$16,300.

The base salary for school nurses went from \$13,300 to \$13,800.

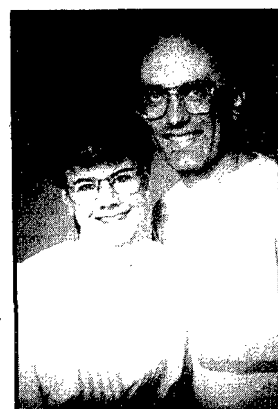

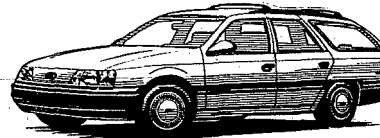

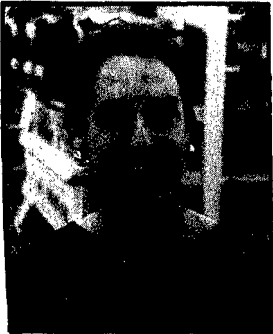

# NEBRASKA TIMELINE

## Cookbook date back to Wilson

Woodrow Wilson was elected President in 1912, the first Democrat to fill the office since Grover Cleveland departed in 1897. With the victory, the Democratic party touted its virtues everywhere; it even found a way to get its message into cookbooks. The President's sister-in-law contributed this recipe to The Economy Administration Cook Book, now in the collections of the Nebraska State Historical Society.

"Democratic Pudding. Go into the garden spot of all the world and choose the finest specimen of man. Shake off the shackles that bind him, probe to the heart to be sure there are no rotten places, for everything about this pudding must be perfect.

"Now surround him with men of his kind—there must be no big eyes, no red noses, no gluttons. Have your pot well cleaned and greased, and be sure it is big enough, for as the pot boils the pudding will swell. Season well with the salt of the earth, the cream of the land, and mustard seed flath

enough for each person. Add plenty of backbone, free from spleen, then set the pot to boiling over a slow, steady fire for four years—or six would be better.

"The fuel must be supplied by the people for North, East, South, and West, well sifted and free from dirt of any kind. As the pot boils the flavor and savor will go out over the whole world; the poor man will grow fat, the tariff will hang his head, and at the end of the four years everybody will be calling for four more years of Democratic Pudding."

Another recipe for "Democratic Salad" called for "Handful of hospitality, heartfelt of good cheer, headful of common sense, mix with the oil of joy, flavor with faith, hope, and charity. Serve liberally at the festive board, the door wide open to all comers."

Despite the appeal of these recipes, by 1920 voters in Nebraska, and the rest of the nation, had decided that two helpings of Democratic dishes were enough for a while.

**DIVOT** — What happens when golfers (like Rick Endicott) slice a shot that hits a moving vehicle.

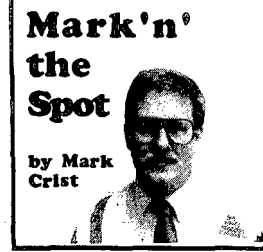
**SLICE** — A smaller portion of a worm burner.

## Final issues draw heavy debate by lawmakers

LINCOLN — The Legislature is in the last month of the current legislative session. Intensive and extended debate on several issues has compelled the Speaker of the Legislature to schedule late evening sessions.

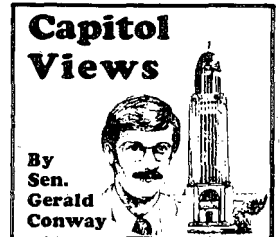
### STATE BUDGET

A proposed two-year state budget was given first round approval in the Legislature this past week.

Although, the proposed budget continues most current state programs, it does reflect the recent downturn in state revenues. As the budget currently stands, it includes across-the-board cuts in state agency operations of two percent in the first year and three percent in the second.

The budget that was debated this week is thirty million dollars less than what governor Nelson proposed earlier in the session. This may not even be a big enough reduction if state revenues continue to decline. However, as has been the tendency with past governors, Nelson has indicated that he will not hesitate to use his line-item veto power on the budget if spending does not match expected revenues.

The budget faces two more stages of debate before it is forwarded on to the Governor for his

approval. If necessary, this will give the senators additional opportunities to make any further changes to the proposed budget.

### STATEWIDE

#### MAMMOGRAPHY PROGRAM

Lawmakers have also given first round approval to a bill that will create a state wide mammography program. The bill would allow the state Department of Health to provide free or low-cost mammography screenings to low-income women.

Mammograms are X-rays that can detect tumors which are or may become breast cancer.

If passed and signed by the governor, LB 256 would permit the Health Department to direct women to certified providers for mammography screenings. The department would give women certificates for the procedure that screeners could redeem for reimbursement.

The proposal provides that no state generated funds would be used to pay for the screenings. Screening providers would be paid with federal and private funds. The state Health Department has submitted a grant application to the federal government for the monies to fund the program.

### REDISTRICTING

The Government, Military, and Veterans' Affairs Committee has moved closer to developing a plan for redistricting congressional and all state constitutional district lines. Public hearings on these bills will be held on May 14th and May 16th. This will allow public input on the proposals.

Wayne will begin state track competition with the 3200 meter

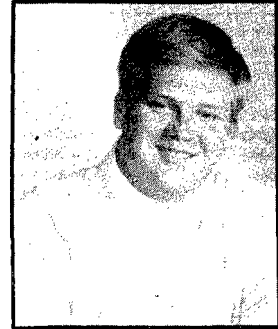

**Eating habits important to steer youth into creating healthy diets, official says**

CONCORD - If you practice unhealthy eating habits, most likely they originated at home when you were a child and more often than not, your children will practice the same habits, says Darlene Martin, University of Nebraska nutritionist at the Northeast Research and Extension Center.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, nutrition habits, whether good or bad, begin at home and are practiced throughout adulthood. Good or bad habits, unless change occurs, can cycle throughout generations of certain families.

TOO MANY American diets include too many calories and too much fat, cholesterol and sodium, according to the American Dietetic Association. Diets high in

fat and cholesterol may lead to heart disease in later adulthood, especially if your family has a known history of heart disease.

"The best time to start cutting back on fat, saturated fat and cholesterol is when your child begins eating regularly at the table with the rest of the family," Martin says. "This process should not begin before your child has reached the age of two because of special needs required in your child's diet."

Martin says children learn by example. If parents practice good nutritional habits, their children will naturally follow, she says. Sweets and fatty foods do little harm if they are consumed in moderation and combined with a well balanced diet.


"Exercise is one of the most effective ways to help balance the

intake of calories," Martin says. "Children should be encouraged to do activities that will help burn calories as much as possible."

SHE SUGGESTS that parents create fun activities that involve active movement, such as tag, riding bicycles, walking or just playing catch.

"Encourage your children to practice good eating habits," she says. "The dividends of good nutrition will pay off when your children become adults. Before making any drastic changes in a child's diet or lifestyle, talk to your pediatrician or registered dietitian."

Additional information is available from home economists in local extension offices or from dietitians.

**EMTs finish studies of defibrillator**

Eleven Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) from the Winside Rescue Squad and one from Carroll recently completed nine hours of instruction in the use of a Life Pack 300 Defibrillator.

Instructors for the course were Dr. Ben Martin and Physician's Assistant Gary West, both of Wayne.

THE WINSIDE Rescue Unit recently received the new portable Physio Control Defibrillator from

funds raised on the sale of pickle cards through the efforts of EMT's Terry Nelson and Jerry Bleich.

The equipment, which cost \$7,000, will be used to "restart" a heart in ventricular defibrillation which could be caused by electrocution, drowning, a heart attack or trauma.

Rescue Captain Ver Neal Marotz emphasized that response time is critical for use of the machine and EMT's should be notified as soon as an emergency situation arises.

THE WINSIDE Rural Fire Board

met in special session on May 8 to discuss the purchase of the defibrillator for the Winside Rescue Squad.

"We decided last year that we were going to help purchase the equipment," said board member Werner Mann, "but we now had to decide how much we would contribute.

"We decided that if our local EMT's felt the defibrillator was vital enough for them to raise funds to pay the entire cost, then the rural fire board should at least pay for one-half.

"We also feel that our EMT's will be qualified to use it because of the support and training offered by area doctors."

Other members of the rural fire board are Dale Krueger, Dan Jaeger, Stan Soden and Norris Hansen.

THE WINSIDE Fire Department is planning an open house on Sunday, June 2 from 2 to 4 p.m. to show the general public the new portable defibrillator and explain its use.

Resolutions 91-7 and 91-8 recognizing additional servicemen that served in the Middle East were signed.

Robert Ensz, County Attorney, presented a Resolution establishing a Deferred Compensation Plan and designating the County Clerk to serve as the Deferred Compensation Plan Administrator for Wayne County. Motion by Nissen and seconded by Pospishil to accept. Roll call vote: Nissen-Aye; Pospishil-Aye; Beiermann-Aye. No Nays.

An Administrative Service Agreement with IDS Life Insurance Company for a deferred compensation plan was approved on motion by Nissen and seconded by Pospishil. Roll call vote: Nissen-Aye; Pospishil-Aye; Beiermann-Aye. No Nays.

Robert Ensz also updated the Board on property tax matters.

Joyce Reeg, County Assessor, certified to the Commissioners the amount of refund due to each company as a result of the values recertified by the State Tax Commissioner. The board will certify these amounts to the County Treasurer at the May 21, 1991 meeting. Immediate notice of these amounts will be provided to affected taxing subdivisions.

Corrections to the Personal Property book presented by Reeg were signed.

Sidney Saunders, Highway Superintendent, met with the Board on the proposed vacation of the East main street road east of Winside. The Commissioners discussed the objections that Don Nelson, District 4 Fire Chief, had raised to the proposed vacation at the public hearing on April 16 and again in a letter delivered to the County Clerk on May 7th. Commissioner Pospishil made the following comments: The Village of Winside is not opposed to the vacation; the present road is so narrow that it is almost impossible to travel in the event of an accident; and since the right of way is only 50 feet wide, there is not enough room to reconstruct the road to modern standards. The board then considered and adopted the following Resolution.

WHEREAS on December 14, 1990, Wayne County, Nebraska, received a petition signed by Mary L. Jensen and more than ten other electors residing within ten miles of the following described road, which petition requests that the following described road be vacated:

A segment of public road in the northeast quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 2, Township 25 North, Range 2 East of the 6th P.M., Wayne County, Nebraska, said segment of public road being further described as that part of East Main Street, Weibels Suburban Lots to Winside, which runs along the south lines of Lots 3 and 4, Weibels Suburban Lots to Winside, and is bounded as follows:

Women on average continue to outlive men, but a new study now suggests one way men can increase longevity: Stay married and live with your wife. The study of men between 45 and 65 found that those who live alone or with someone other than a wife were twice as likely to die within 10 years as those living with their wives. That was the conclusion after evaluating factors such as smoking, drinking, obesity, physical activity, education and income. Reinforcing the conclusion that living with a spouse makes the difference, the researchers reported that men living with their children or others didn't do any better in longevity than men who lived alone. What about women? The study found that lower income was a greater factor in reduced longevity for women than living without a spouse.

On her 102nd birthday, Mabel Lent, of Peckskill, New York, showed visitors a newspaper clipping about her 100th birthday party. 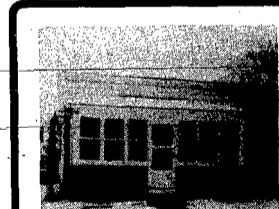

PHONE ALERT: One of the things I've learned to do since writing this column is be alert to any 900 or 540 number which promises to supply certain services to the caller. While the services seem to be "free," the fact is that the calls are not free and can cost a great deal of money. Minimum charge can be \$2 for the first minute and \$1 plus for every minute that follows — and that can mount up very quickly.

An ad in one of our neighborhood papers with a 900 number offered to provide information important to seniors just for the price of a call. The ad listed various topics of interest to seniors. However, all of the information promised in the ad for such things as travel, housing, Medicare, etc., is available free of charge from (1) your local Social Security office; (2) any travel agent; and (3) your local senior citizen center. You can also call local, state, or federal offices which are listed in your phone book.

As you probably know, but like most of us, sometimes forget, there is very little given away free. Almost everything has a price, and often that price is higher than we'd want to pay.

SEEING YOU AS A CONSUMER: For a long time, most companies considered it a waste of time and money to do much market research on the buying habits of older people. It was assumed that if people 60 and over had money, they were rather conservative and wouldn't be buying anything they didn't really need — which left out the impulse and luxury markets. It was also assumed that if this group were living on fixed incomes that, again, would make them modest consumers. The concentration

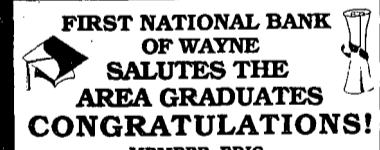
