## **Event excites** local officials

Meena Dalal and Jo Taylor have reason to be excited. They're organizing plans to bring Chautauqua to Wayne in 1992.

The two Wayne State College faculty members will hold an organizational meeting tonight (Monday) at the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce. The meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. It is open to the public.

"This kind of experience is at the heart of the American ideal," Taylor said. "Educating and stimulating the American mind is a key to democracy. Chautauqua fits with that ideal."

Currently, the emphasis is in

with that ideal."

Currently, the emphasis is in community input into the project.

Chautauqua is sponsored by the Nebraska Humanities Council.

CHAUTAUQUA originally began in 1874. It started as a means of providing Sunday school teachers training about theology and bibli-cal history. The format quickly ex-panded into the largest adult education program in America.

Since its inception, Chautauqua has undergone dramatic changes. In 1932 it almost died, but in 1976 it was revived to its current format by Everett Albers, the executive director of the North Dakota Humanities Council.

It is now a nationally heralded public humanities forum which draws upwards of 500 people nightly to a big blue and white tent for evenings of humanities monologue and dialogue.

The theme for the 1992 program is "American Renaissance: The Literature of our Democracy."

DESPITE THEIR optimism for the event, Dalal and Taylor agree that it is still tentative. There is much work to be done before Chautauqua can be staged in

"We really want it to be a collaborative effort as opposed to a Wayne State Gollege effort," Taylor said. "We want community people to be involved since this will be a community event."

## Work pays off, Kirkwood House opens its doors

WAYNE - An event that's taken years in the making is about to come true for Jeannia Bottger and

On Saturday, May 18, the residents and staff of Kirkwood House celebrated their open house. That event marked the beginning of a new facility in Wayne.

Kirkwood House, a residential rehabilitation center, is profession-ally managed by First Step, Inc., a private corporation headed by Bottger and Bressler. Michelle Tullberg and Mary Jo and Wally Curtis are also members of the corporation.

First Step, Inc. purchased the four plex at 514 E. 6th on Nov. 10, 1990. Following renovation work, the center officially opened April

According to Bottger, the facility has the physical space for 12 clients. It's under contract with the department of public institutions to provide services for 10. Currently, seven residents are living at Kirkwood. One more admission is planned May 29.

THE FACILITY is staffed around the clock with an anticipated one to six staffing ratio during awake hours. One full-time person is

First Step, Inc. currently has a staff of 12 in addition to their consulting staff. Consultants include Wayne Pharmacist Will Davis, R.N. Julie Sexton, and Gayle Johannson, registered dietitian. Marta Nelson, from Complete Computer Systems provides computer Systems provides computer and actems, provides computer and ac-

counting expertise.

Bottger, a native of Ainsworth, is a licensed practical nurse. She has 20 years experience as a nursing home administrator. Bressler, an Emerson native, has five years experience in the nursing home setting. Pam Potter, LPN, is the program's clinical and program coordinator. She has 15 years ex-perience in long-term care. Barbara Clements, First Step's book-keeper, has nine years experience. Other current staff include: Lisa

McIntyre, service coordinator; Bethany Dittman, CSM; Jody Obermeyer, CSM; Linda Dierking, Norma Emmons, Amy Morris, Brad Clements and Mike Reis.

THE PROCESS for getting First Step began in 1987 when Bottger and Bressler explored the possibilities of providing services for residential rehabilitation II clients. That process began after President Ronald Reagan's signing of the Omnibus Reconciliation Act.

"One of the things this law did was mandate that nursing homes would not be reimbursed to care for people who did not have a serious medical diagnosis," Bottger

Although the mechanism to meet the law was left up to individual states, it did specify that "the safe and orderly progression of these people into alternative living arrangements would begin by April 1, 1990 and be completed by April 1, 1991." With the goal of providing

separate housing for clients, Bottger said they ran into some roadblocks. The first roadblock they encountered was in Emerson,

residents there opposed the facility with such force, it made their task impossible to accom-plish. First Step then turned its eyes to Wayne and Ainsworth.

shaky start in Wayne, First Step found promise in the community. Since bringing in residents, Bottger said the neighborhood has started to accept them.

"The neighborhood children have come over and bounced a basketball with us," Bottger said. "We haven't felt like anybody in the neighborhood has been alien-

"Actually, people who have schizophrenia are very fragile peo-ple and they're afraid of the com-munity. Rather than the com-munity being afraid of our clients, we're afraid of them."

Although the Omnibus Reconciliation Act targeted Alzheimer patients and the chronic mentally ill, in the end the target group were those who suffer severe or persistent mental illness. It was the mentally ill people, who were living in nursing homes, who are being exposed to the community.


KIRKWOOD HOUSE is licensed by the State of Nebraska Depart-ment of Health to provide residential rehabilitation Il services. The mission of the corporation is to rehabilitate clients who have lived tions so they can function nearly as independently in a residential set-ting. Staff and residents work to-gether to\_achieve goals and ex-

getner to achieve goals and expectations.
"The residents of the house very much enjoy living in Wayne,"
Bottger said.

The final service that First Step, Inc. will provide is a day rehabilitation program. Rehab services will be provided at the job site, located at 110 Main St. It is currently under—renovation—The building which will house the program used to be The Wayne Herald, the Wayne Veterinary Clinic and Dr. George Coblirsch's office. The job site is expected to open sometime

George Goblisch's office. The job-site is expected to open sometime over the summer.

"We hope they will learn some sort of skills that will mainstream them into the work force," she said. "We do not expect them to be a

### **WSC** professor speaks Retired teachers program focuses on Nebraska heritage

Dr. Donald Hickey, professor of history at Wayne State College, presented the program at the May 13 meeting of Wayne Area Retired Teachers

Dr. Hickey was introduced by Roberta Welte, program chairman, and spoke on "Nebraska Heritage: People and Institutions."

Hickey pointed out that Ne-braska has made a number of sig-nificant contributions to the nation's development.

Unique institutions in the state include the Nebraska Unicameral (the only one in the United States), Boys Town (one of the most successful charities in the world), the Nebraska National Forest (the largest of its kind in the country), Arbor Day (the brainchild of ). Sterling Morton), and Big Red Football (one of the cleanest and most successful programs in the country).

DR. HICKEY also named several persons from Nebraska who have achieved national distinction, inachieved national distinction, in-cluding Red Cloud, William F. Cody, John J. Pershing, William Jennings Bryan, J. Sterling Morton, George W. Norris, Willa Cather, John G. Neihardt, Marie Sandoz, Johnny Carson, Dick Cavett and Henry

Hickey's program was made possible by a grant from the Ne-braska Humanities Council, a state affiliate of the National Endow-

ment for the Humanities.




