Some say that names of rape-vietims-should be printed just like any other crime. Sexual assault is not like any other crime. It is a humiliating invasion of body, mind and soul. Rape is by far one

Our society, even in the 1990s, continues to be victim blaming. We still have judges who dismiss charges against perpetrators of brutal rapes, solely because the woman was wearing some thing skimpy and must have deserved what she got. Until our society believes that rape is a crime, until our society stops blaming the victim, a victim is not safe with the press. Generally when a victim is named, her character and past are brought into play. Again, no matter what has happened in the past, it gives no person a right to assault a person in the presen
Rape, whether it is by a stranger or acquaintance, is a crime violence, not a crime of sex. Rape takes away control over what tim's name is taking away what control the victim has left and exposes them to emotional attack by some in the community. Sur
vivors of all ages experience a wide range of emotional, behavioral and physical reactions resulting from sexual abuse. Victims for them. If not having their name in print is part of that healing process, then the name should not be printed.
Probably one of the most important reasons for not regularly reporting rape victim's names is the fact that we see only 10 percent of the rape victims in our country. If names start appearing rape are aware of the scrutiny they will endure through the law enforcement and court proceedings. Having their name plastered victims could endure
