### Benefit auction

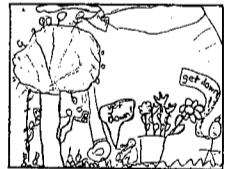

## Speaker challenges Wayne grads: 'say what you think'

"The only acceptance we truly need is self-acceptance, for once we have gained that, the rest should come, and that which does not come will not matter."

Wayne High School Class of 1991 motto

Seventy-one graduates from Wayne High School were challenged to say what they think by Charles Schroeder, vice-president of development for the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Foundation Sunday. That was when the community honored the WHS Class of 1991.

It seemed only fitting for the Class of 1991 to be challenged by the speaker since the graduated group of seniors have proven all year long that they're ready to accept any challenge.

"As you 71 graduates complete this secondary phase of your education today, you're faced with a lot of questions," Schroeder said. "...Clearly by now you have been adequately bombarded with all the commencement cliches that adults have dreamt up across the ages.

"I would like to confront you instead with a question that is so frightening that only the most courageous have dared to address. ...That difficult, that complex, that often repeated question is 'what do you think?'"

"What do you think. What is your opinion. ...You will need to answer this question every day of your life in order to pass those crossroads you will meet in your lifetime. It will determine whether you succeed or fail. It will determine what you do with your life."

JUST LIKE this year's graduating seniors have met many of the challenges they have faced during high school, Schroeder challenged them to continue to meet the challenges they face in life.

"I challenge you to go from here knowing that you have great power," he concluded. "You have a great obligation to use that power judiciously and boldly. I beg you never to shy from the question: 'What do you think.'"

Valedictorian awards were presented by Wayne High School Principal Dr. Donald Zeiss to co-valedictorian winners Jeff Griesch and Martin Rump. The salutatorian award went to Kari Lutt.

### Hekmati files new motion

## Judge finds Wayne State not in error

**WAYNE** - Judge Merritt C. Warren found in favor of the Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges in a lawsuit filed Dec. 27, 1990 by former Wayne State College Assistant Professor Ali Hekmati.

The case stems from a resignation Hekmati delivered to Math and Science Division Head Dr. J.S. Johar of Wayne State College Dec. 11, 1989. According to court dockets, Hekmati then "attempted to withdraw his resignation" by letter to his division head on Aug. 2, 1990 and again on Nov. 8, 1990.

Hekmati officially ended his employment with Wayne State College May 11, 1991 following

the completion of his final one-year contract with the college.

ACCORDING TO the judge's ruling, by waiting until after May, 1990 to attempt to withdraw his resignation Hekmati would have effectively prevented Wayne State from terminating his employment in May, 1991 "because of the impossibility of giving the required 12 months advance notice the collective bargaining agreement called for, if the withdrawal of resignation was effective."

Despite having the ruling against the case, Hekmati and his lawyer, Max G. Dreier of Norfolk, filed a motion for a new trial Monday,

## Memorial Day festivities set for Wayne area

Residents of Wayne and most other communities will pause on Monday, May 27 to honor those who have died in service to their country.

Area Memorial Day activities include graveside services, parades, programs and dinners.

City, county, state and federal offices, along with most businesses, will be closed on Monday.

IN WAYNE, the Memorial Day program will include a parade and graveside service and is jointly arranged by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars and their Auxiliaries.

Other veterans groups participating are the World War I Barracks and Auxiliary and the Disabled American Veterans and Auxiliary.

The parade will begin at 10 a.m. at Third and Pearl Streets., proceed to Main Street, then north to Seventh Street and west to Greenwood Cemetery and the Veterans Memorial Park where a one-half hour program will be held at 10:30 a.m.

Upon arrival at the cemetery (old plot), a prayer will be read. The Wayne High School band will open the program at the Veterans Memorial Park.

The program will include a memorial prayer by the auxiliary chaplain, the Gettysburg Address by Legionnaire Roy Sommerfeld, a reading of "Flanders Field" by Girls Stater Missy Junck, and a reading by Voice of Democracy winner Teresa Prokop, entitled "Preparing for America's Future."

Flowers will be placed upon the graves of departed comrades by auxiliary members and flower girls. There also will be a reading of the roll of honor, a selection by the high school band, a firing squad and taps, and the benediction by the post chaplain.

The Avenue of Flag poles will be put up on Sunday, May 26 at 6 p.m., and flags will be raised on Memorial Day at 6 a.m.

FOLLOWING is a list of area communities and their plans for Memorial Day.

### Allen

Memorial Day services will be conducted Monday at 10:15 a.m. at Eastview Cemetery in Allen and at 11:15 a.m. at the Martinsburg Cemetery in Martinsburg.

The services are sponsored by Floyd Gleason American Legion Post 131 and Auxiliary, Allen, and Gasser Post 5435 Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary, Martinsburg.

The Rev. Eldon Durant, chaplain of American Legion Post 131, will be the speaker and give the invocation and benediction, and the Allen High School band, under the direction of Richard Lacy, will provide special music.

The history of Memorial Day will be read by Renee Plueger, 1990 Girls Stater, and the Gettysburg Address will be given by Paul Brentlinger, the 1990 Boys Stater.

Services also will include roll call of the dead by Dean Chase and taps by Pat Brentlinger and Michelle Isom.

Allen Commander Scott Morgan said services are open to the public.

### Carroll

In Carroll, the Memorial Day schedule will begin with an ice cream social sponsored by the Bethany Cemetery Association on Sunday, May 26 at the Presbyterian Church, rural Carroll, beginning at 6 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Graveside services on Monday are set for 1 p.m. at the Bethany Cemetery southwest of Carroll with the American Legion Ervin Lyons Post 165 in charge.

A 2 p.m. memorial service will be held in the Carroll auditorium. Guest speaker will be Kathy Smith, assistant director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lincoln.

The invocation and benediction will be given by Post Chaplain Ervin Morris, and pianist will be Mrs. Robert Hall.

Retirement of colors will be by American Legion Post 165. The American Legion Auxiliary is in charge of stage decorations.

Following the service in the auditorium, graveside services will be conducted at Elmwood Cemetery in Carroll. Firing will be over the new Veterans Memorial Monument.

Taps at both the program and cemetery will be played by Charles Morris. American Legion Commander is Gordon Davis.

### Concord-Dixon

Concord and Dixon will have a combined program, sponsored by the Concord-Dixon Cemetery Association, on Sunday, May 26 at 2:30 p.m. in the Concord auditorium. The service will include a procession by veterans of all wars.

Speaker will be the Rev. Duane Marburger of Concordia Lutheran Church. The invocation will be given by the Rev. Bob Brenner of the Concord Evangelical Free Church, and the benediction will be given by the Rev. T. J. Fraser, pastor of the Dixon United Methodist Church.

The program also will include flag salutes and the hymn, "God Bless America." Special music will be provided by the United Methodist Church of Dixon, and there will be a musical selection by Bonnie Marburger of Concordia Lutheran Church.

The roster of veterans will be read by Kenneth Kardell, and those attending will sing "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

A procession will follow to the Concord Cemetery where boys and girls will decorate veterans graves.

Pastor Fraser will give the memorial prayer at the cemetery, and taps will be played by Dustin Ankeny and Shane Kardell. Also taking part in services at the cemetery will be a color guard from the Laurel VFW Post.

## Wayne woman takes fifth at national championships

**WAYNE** - Wayne State College junior Gwen Jensen of Wayne placed fifth in the 199th annual National Oratorical Championships held recently in St. Petersburg, Fla. Her speech addressed the problem of global dumping of hazardous waste.

Jensen qualified for the Championships by winning the Nebraska State Oratorical Championship earlier this year in Lincoln.

With 52 students from 36 colleges and universities from throughout the United States in attendance, Jensen became the first student from Nebraska to break into the final round of competition in the last 10 years, according to Ron and Deb Whitt, her speech coaches and assistant professors of speech communications at Wayne State.

Jensen competed in six different events during the course of the school year. She was the state champion in poetry interpretation, dramatic interpretation and oratory. She placed fourth in the state in prose interpretation and informative public address.

## District 5 closes; other county schools fine

With the conclusion of classes this week, one more Wayne County rural school has departed with time.

The District 5 school, located east of Altona, ended an era this week when it closed permanently. It originally opened in 1872.

Despite the school's end, other Wayne County schools seem to be picking up some steam. The District 57 school, four miles south of Wayne, and the District 25 school, nine miles south of Wakefield, appear to be going strong.

Three other Wayne County schools, District 77, 51 and 15, will remain open through the 1991-92 school year. District 77 is located approximately eight miles from Pierce. District 15 is located six miles northwest of Wayne. District

51 is located approximately five miles west of Wayne.

WAYNE COUNTY Superintendent Harry Mills said while District 15 has applied for accreditation, District 77 hasn't. He said he doesn't want to say what the District 77 or District 51 schools will do. He said schools having to affiliate and accredit has stirred some sensitive feelings among rural people.

"District 15 is real determined to stay open," Mills said. "They're determined to get accredited. They'll hang on for a while."

Part of the reason for District 5's demise comes following a bill by the Nebraska legislature in 1990. Since the school served only five students in grades K-8, school officials decided it was time for it to close, according to Mills.

John Murtaugh introduced the recipients of the Master Sports

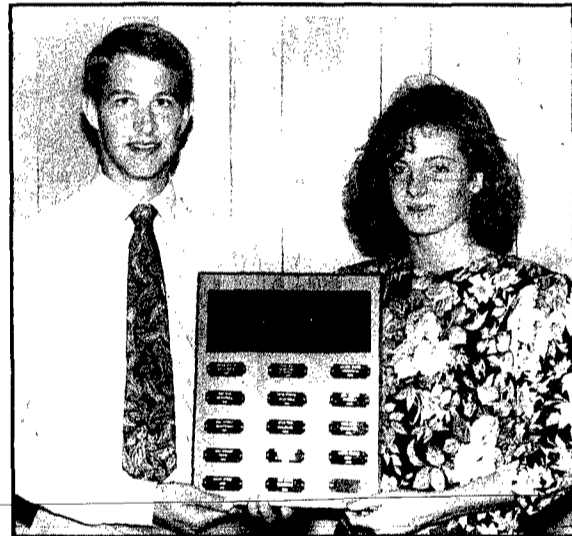

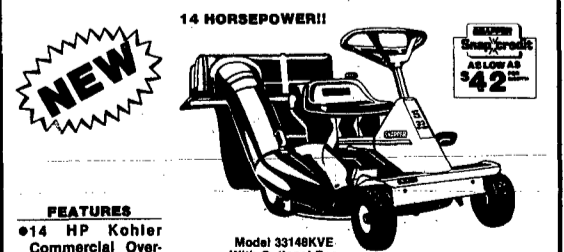

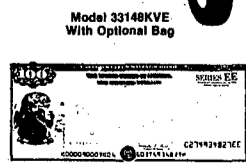

**Area athletes fare well at state track meet**

Thirty-six Wayne Herald area athletes participated in the State Track & Field Meet in Omaha's Burke Stadium last Friday and Saturday and a total of 23 medals were presented to the area representatives including four golds and five silvers and five bronze medals. Seven fourth place medals were handed out and one fifth and one sixth place medal were also given. As far as team standings go the Wayne Blue Devils boys team finished in seventh place with 23 points. Omaha Flanagan and Boys Town led the way with 69 and 52 respectively while Minden finished third with 40 and McCook fourth with 37.5. Elkhorn was fifth with 36 points

and Nebraska City was sixth with 25.5. Rounding out the top ten teams in Class B following seventh place Wayne was Seward with 20, North Platte Saint Pats with 18 and Aurora with 15. The Blue Devils 3200 meter relay team set a new school record in finishing runner-up to Elkhorn. Wayne was clocked at 8:04.96—just 42 hundredths of a second behind the winners. Wayne's previous school record was 8:09. Team members off that relay in order of running included Jim Murphy who handed the baton to his twin brother John who handed the baton to Steve Dinsmore who handed to Kyle Bensen for the fourth and final leg. John Murphy led off the 1600 meter relay team which placed

third in a time of 3:30.11 and he handed off to Chris Fredrickson who handed off to Jim Murphy who then handed off to anchor man Kyle Bensen. Bensen participated in four events at the state meet and placed in every one as he also ran to a fourth place finish in the 400 with a 50.96 time and in the 800 where he finished fourth in a time of 1:59.01—breaking the two minute barrier for the first time this year. Matt Bruggeman placed sixth in the shot put for the Blue Devils with a throw of 54-0.75. Bruggeman recorded that throw in his second attempt of six. The Winside boys tied for seventh with 20 points as two-time gold medal winner Brian Thompson won the shot put with a 54-5.5 effort and the discus with a toss of 156-7. Falls City Sacred Heart defended their Class D Championship with 57 points while Giltner and Wilcox tied for runner-up honors with 38 points each. Beemer placed fourth with 28 points and Table Rock was fifth with 27. Spencer-Naper was sixth with 24. Humphrey St. Francis tied with Winside with 20 points while Taylor Loup County placed ninth with 18. Hayes Center, Bradshaw, McCool Junction, and Callaway all tied for 10th place with 16 points. The Wakefield boys scored 12 points and finished 14th in the team race. Anthony Brown led the Trojans with a runner-up finish in the 300 intermediate hurdles in a personal best time of 39.98. The

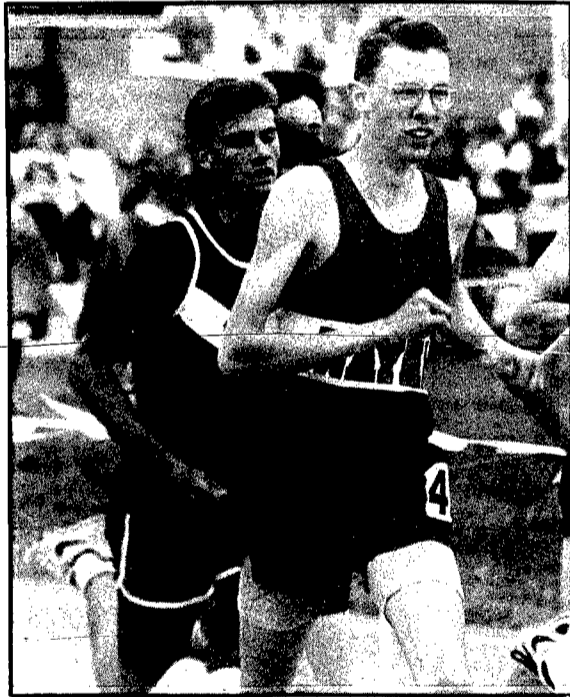

The Winside girls scored six points at the state track meet through the legs of Patty Oberle who placed third in the 3200 meter run with a time of 12:27.41 and the Wayne girls scored two points at the state meet as freshman Tami Schluns used a strong kick during the final 120 meters of the 3200 meter run to place fifth with a school record time of 12:16.84. Coming down the home stretch of that same 3200 meter run Schluns passed three competitors to earn her medal. Laurel and

Allen girls failed to score as did the Allen boys. The Class B girls team race was won by Central City with 54 points while Waverly finished runner-up with 40. Plattsmouth and Valentine finished in the third and fourth slots respectively with 35 and 30 points each while Crete finished fifth with 28. 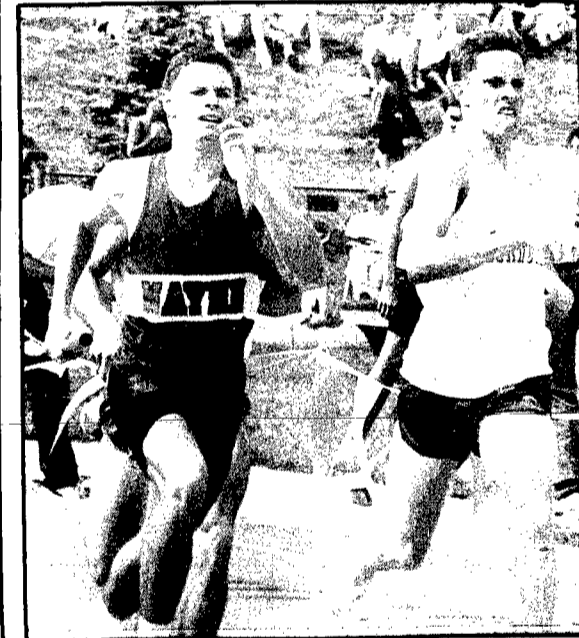

**BROKEN RECORD DEPARTMENT:** If it sounds like a familiar old refrain, no wonder. It seems that for the past decade we've been hearing all sorts of variations on the theme of woe now and woe to come in the funding for various Social Security programs, including Medicare. Each time the alarm is raised, many seniors panic at the thought of being left without resources to meet medical bills. Each time the crisis passes, it leaves seniors with higher "contributions" to the program, and some crucial nips and tucks in services. The most recent alarm call was raised on April 1 — but it wasn't an April Fool joke at all. It was all too serious. This time, the people who watch such things predict that with the rising costs of medical care, and the increasing numbers of older folks in the population, the fund that supports the Medicare program will run out of money in just 15 years. Their suggestion? Increase taxes. That "solution," however, disregards some very important facts. Among the largest number of taxpayers — namely, the middle class, incomes are shrinking; jobs are being terminated; wage earners are being laid off; and living expenses continue to rise. This well from which taxes were perpetually drawn over decades could be running dry. It needs time to replenish itself before any more buckets can be dipped in and hauled up. It seems strange that among western industrialized nations, we seem to be the only one having trouble meeting our obligations to our older citizens or those who need medical care. Something is off kilter, and maybe it's time we worked at finding the cause and correcting it. Perhaps we can start with cutting the high medical costs which may be imposed more out of habit than need. Let's talk about this. Write me c/o King Features Weekly Service, 235 East 45th Street, New York, N.Y. 10017. **ODDS AND ENDS:** It's a good idea to have your furnace and heating equipment cleaned now. Having it done before autumn ensures that you'll start next season with a cleaner system that will be less likely to produce dangerous carbon monoxide incidents or fires... Safe at home? That's not really the case, especially for elderly people. Accidents in the home account for 40 percent of deaths from injuries among people 65 or older. Stairs are the greatest hazard in the home. Accidents on stairways cause injuries each year to more than 750,000 Americans of all ages. The elderly are especially at risk if they have vision problems, a tendency to dizziness, or other impairments. But there are some ways to reduce the risks of stairway falls. The National Institute on Aging recommends illuminating all stairways and putting light switches at both top and bottom, installing handrails on both sides of stairways, tacking down stair carpeting or using nonskid treads, and removing throw rugs, which tend to slide, from near stairways and elsewhere in the home.
