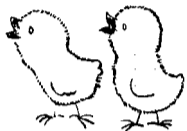

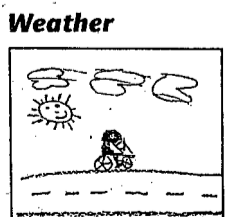


Chicken shirts

Community groups ready for BRAN visit

Plans are in place for Wayne to display its hospitality for this year's Bike Ride Across Nebraska (BRAN) visit in Wayne.
BRAN riders will stop overnight in Wayne Thursday, June 13. Riders will be staying in Wayne State College's Willow Bowl.

According to Gary VanMeter, who will be one of the BRAN riders, the Wayne area has the largest contingencies of all the riders this year behind Lincoln and Omaha. He said 28 riders from the area will be making the 501 mile trek.

THE BRAN ride will begin Sunday, June 9 in Alliance and it will end Saturday, June 15 in Fremont. Along with Wayne, riders will have overnight stays in Gordon, Valentine, Crofton and Butte.

VanMeter said proceeds from the ride are turned into scholarships for each of Nebraska's state colleges and universities. He said the annual event is sponsored by the Omaha Rotary Club.

Locally, a number of service organizations have plans to schedule events to honor the riders during their stay in Wayne.

TWO EVENTS Thursday evening will also be open to the public.

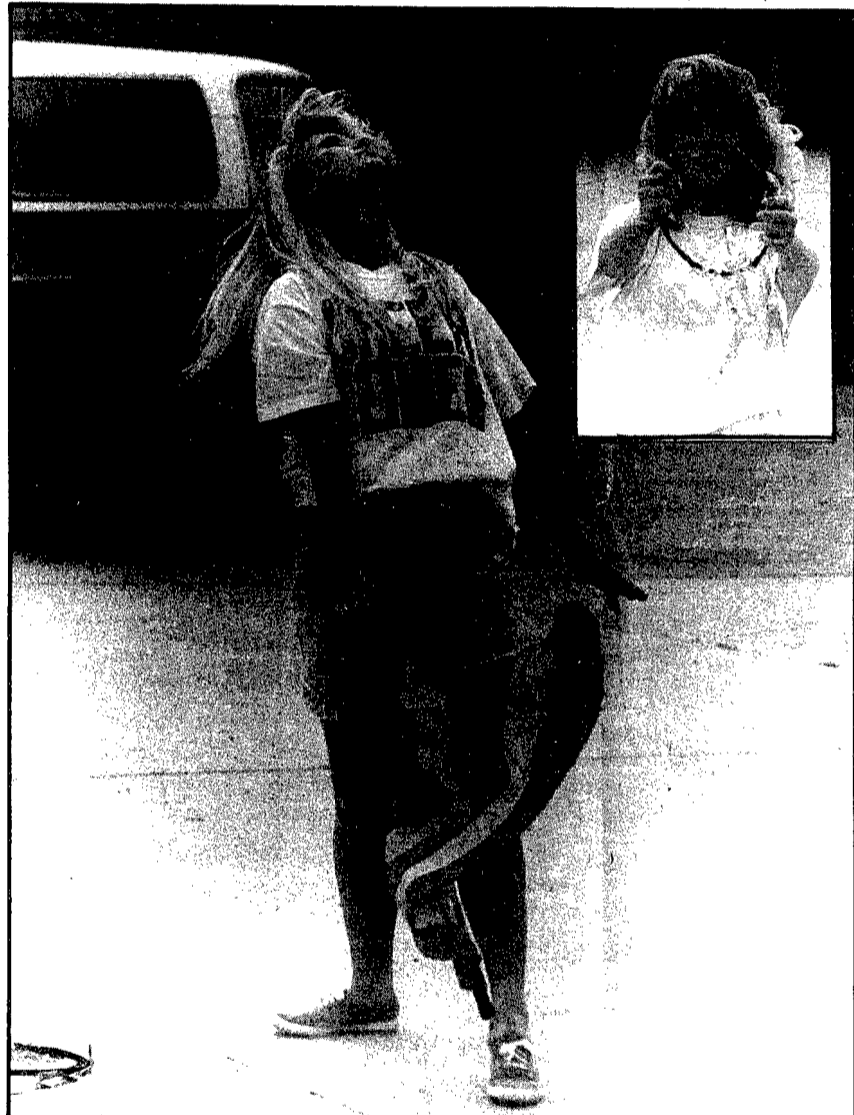

Firm signs contract to do facility work

WAYNE - Residents around the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Facility might be able to sleep a little easier come 30 days from now.

According to Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen, a contract has been signed with Prokop Construction of Wayne to construct a new fence around the exercise area on the southwest corner of the facility. The contract runs for 30 days. It was signed May 28.

The new fence will be 18 feet high with razor wire around its rim. In the past, barbed wire topped the rim.

THE FENCE was necessitated following three breakouts last summer. One breakout occurred when a juvenile climbed the fence, another when the escapee got away from guards while being transferred from the facility to the exercise area and the third occurred when two juveniles escaped when they broke the window to the back door. The last escape was Aug. 16, 1990.

Janssen said one of the reasons it has taken the facility nine months to get the project going is

due to the difficulty in getting supplies. He said the type of supplies needed aren't readily available.

THE WAYNE County Sheriff added that when the youth are outside in the exercise area, they will be supervised by detention center personnel.

Janssen said it will be beneficial to the youth staying in the center when the new fence is finished. He said although the facility is not running anywhere near capacity, he said it is important that youth have access to exercise outdoors.

He said if the new fence does not prevent escapes, youth will no longer have access outside.

'Razor wire isn't the type of thing you run down to the store and buy,' Janssen said. 'It's something we've had to look for.'

He added that when they started to try to enclose the outdoor exercise area last fall, there wasn't enough time for construction crews to work on it before winter came.

ANOTHER PROBLEM is that last year when the facility called for bids none came in. Janssen said one contractor showed some interest in doing the project but said it would be done on a time available basis, so no contract was established.

This spring, however, when the call for bids went out, construction crews had time to work up bids for the project.

Janssen said the new fence doesn't come with any guarantees of keeping juveniles from escaping. He added that the fence is designed to keep people in.

'We're hoping this added construction will help keep them in,' Janssen said. 'We know for a fact that this will keep the kids from escaping the guards during transfer.'

Wayne State gets nod from state lawmakers

WAYNE - Wayne State College will be getting a new business building on campus and a masters of business administration program, under two separate measures passed by the Nebraska legislature.

In a 33-7 override of Gov. Ben Nelson's veto of the cigarette tax bill, the legislature gave initial approval for construction of a \$4 million project for Wayne State.

According to Jeff Beckman, WSC director of college relations, major funding for the building will not be provided by the state until 1993. College officials will be providing a construction time line in the near future.

Beckman added that college officials hope to get the MBA program started in the fall.

'WE ARE pleased with the news,' he said. 'This is a project that will benefit thousands of future business students at Wayne State. It will be a great addition to our northeast Nebraska service region.'

Beckman said he expects that information about the business building will be released in time for the Wednesday, June 12 Wayne Herald. Information about the MBA program will be released at a later date.

The legislature's override of Governor Nelson's veto of the business building brought a total of \$11.2 million for the college and university construction package over state prisons.

Along with the \$4 million for Wayne State, money will be appropriated to the University of Nebraska-Omaha and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

Wakefield group hopes to save town's bowling alley

WAKEFIELD - Wakefield Recreation, Ltd., a group of citizens dedicated to saving the bowling alley, hopes to raise approximately \$70,000 by Saturday, June 15. By Friday, one-third of the money had been raised.

Presently, three team captains are contacting potential investors. Team captains include Myron Olson, Warren Bressler and Alden Johnson. Shares of stock are being sold at \$250 per share. Donations will be accepted.

The Wakefield bowling alley closed Jan. 15, 1991 when the Papillion Bank called a loan against the building. Since that date, the

building has been sold to the Papillion Bank.

ACCORDING TO Olson, Wakefield Recreation, Ltd.'s attorney, Bill Horneber of South Sioux City, believes that two banks will sell the bowling alley to investors. Brentwood Bank of Omaha holds a note against the equipment, valued at \$40,000, and the Papillion Bank holds the building note, worth \$25,000.

Despite the two notes, bowling alley owner Al Fey has not given any indication what will happen if

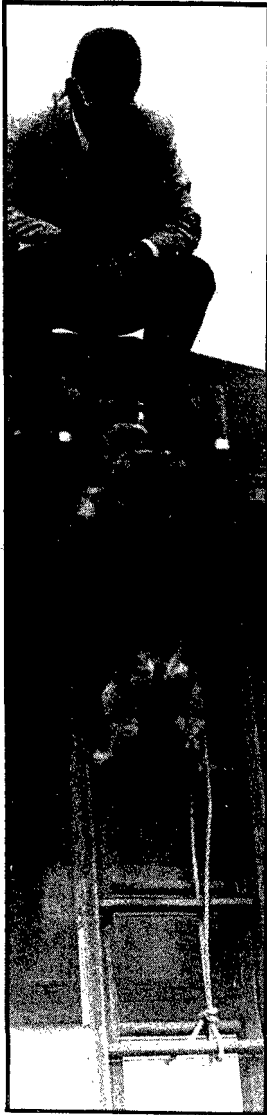

"I didn't believe him," Janke said. "When he showed it to me I was standing across the street talking to Mrs. Prokop when Ali started climbing up the ladder. I couldn't believe it."

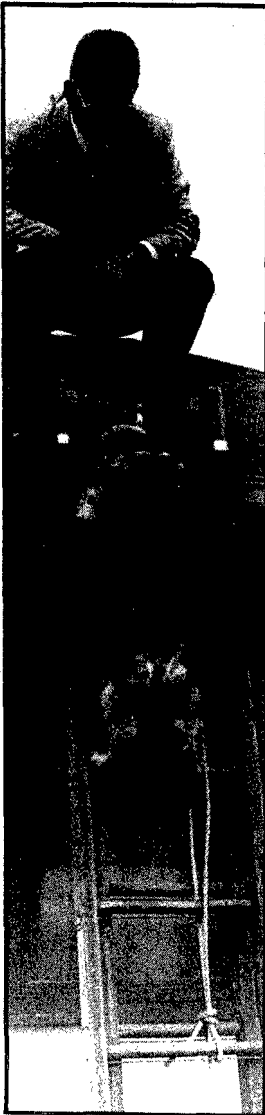

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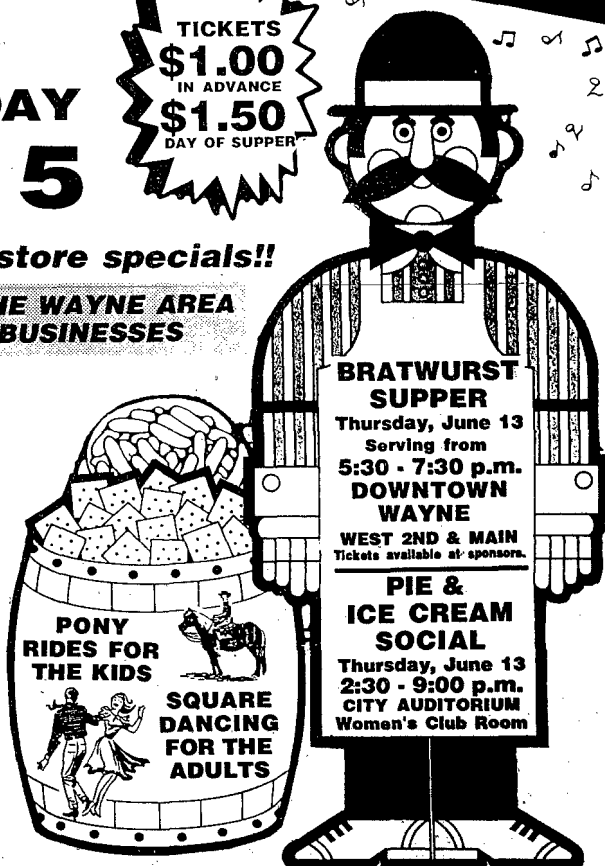

Warren announces retirement

AREA - District Judge Merritt C. Warren, Creighton, has announced his retirement as of Aug. 1. Warren, 67, submitted his resignation to Governor Nelson May 31.

Judge Warren has served as judge of the district court of the ninth Judicial District since Feb. 1, 1969. After his appointment by Gov. Norbert Tiemann, he was retained in office in 1972, 1978, 1984 and 1990, with affirmative votes of more than 80 percent in each election.

During his 22 1/2 years on the bench, Judge Warren has presided in over 13,000 cases, and has traveled more than 250,000 miles to hold court in Madison, Neligh, Pierce, Stanton, Wayne, Center and West Point. He has served many times by special appointment on the supreme court and on district courts in other areas of the state.

His successor will be appointed by Gov. Nelson, after a judicial nominating commission takes applications, holds a public hearing and submits the names of qualified attorneys to the governor.

Channel One will provide additional service to schools

WAYNE - Beginning this fall, Whittle Communications (Channel 1) will begin providing a new programming service for educational networked high schools.

Wayne High School, a participating school since the spring of 1991 currently receives three channels: Channel One, The Classroom Channel for students and the Educators' Channel for teachers. Whittle also provides blank video cassettes designed specifically for the recording of these college videos.

There are no demands or requirements placed on the school. By November 1991 Wayne High School will have a college video library of hundreds of colleges to make available to students, at no cost.

Farmers Home Administration raises income limits

WAYNE - Effective May 15, Farmers Home Administration's income limits were raised for Wayne and Stanton Counties.

"The revised income limits will increase the number of households that qualify for our housing program," said Mark P. Moser, Farmer Home Administration County Supervisor in Wayne.

Oswald graduates from South

WAYNE - Scott Oswald, son of Vern and Rita Oswald of Omaha, and grandson of Roberta Oswald of Wayne, graduated May 22 from Omaha South High School, ranked third in his class of 218.

Oswald maintained a grade point average of 4.26 on a 4.0 scale. He was awarded four year Regents scholarships to both the University of Nebraska at Lincoln and Omaha. In addition, he was awarded the Walter Scott Jr. Scholarship, the Garrett Memorial Scholarship and the Omaha World-Herald Outstanding Student College Scholarship.

He will attend the University of Nebraska at Omaha and will study civil engineering.

Treatment available to battle musk thistle

AREA - "If musk thistle got away from you earlier this spring, there is a rescue treatment available," says Russell Moomaw, agronomist at the Northeast Research and Extension Center in Concord.

Moomaw added that Ally herbicide has recently been registered for weed control in pastures. He says that although bromegrass, bluegrass, orchardgrass and bluestems have shown tolerance to Ally, musk thistle, common mullein, curly dock, mare's tail, wildrose and buckbrush are suppressed or controlled by Ally at rates of one-tenth to three-tenths ounce per acre. For musk thistle, Ally should be applied in early summer prior to flowering.

"Field research in western Nebraska demonstrated the effectiveness of Ally in controlling musk thistle plants and seed production," said Moomaw. Ally, applied at one-quarter ounce per acre at the bud stage, gave 96 percent control of musk thistle plants and only six seeds were collected from 20 seed heads. "When applied at the flower stage," says Moomaw, "84 percent plant control was achieved and 19 seeds were collected from 20 seed heads."

To avoid later injury to sensitive crops, Moomaw suggests that the sprayer be thoroughly cleaned after spraying Ally. He concludes by saying to carefully read the Ally label before using the product.

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U.S. Air Force appoints Wayne native to post

WAYNE - U.S. Air Force officials have announced that the president has nominated Lieutenant General James B. Davis for promotion to General with reassignment as Chief of Staff, Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe (SHAPE), in Mons, Belgium.

General Davis was born in Wayne and attended Wayne High School and Wayne State College.

The general, a command pilot with more than 4,500 flying hours including 270 combat hours, has been the commander of U.S. Forces, Japan and Fifth Air Force since January 1988.

At SHAPE, he will replace General John A. Shaud who is retiring. General Davis' replacement has not been named.

This assignment will be General Davis' fifth overseas tour. Previous assignments include serving as a pilot and assistant operations officer

with the 13th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Udorn Royal Thai Air Force Base, Thailand in 1968. He was then selected as aide to the commander in chief, U.S. Air Forces in Europe, Lindsey Air Station, West Germany. Three months later, when the commander in chief was assigned to Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe in Belgium, General Davis also moved and became the aide to the chief of staff there, the position he will now assume. He also has served as deputy chief of staff for operations and intelligence and later vice commander in chief, Pacific Air Forces, Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii, from 1986-88.



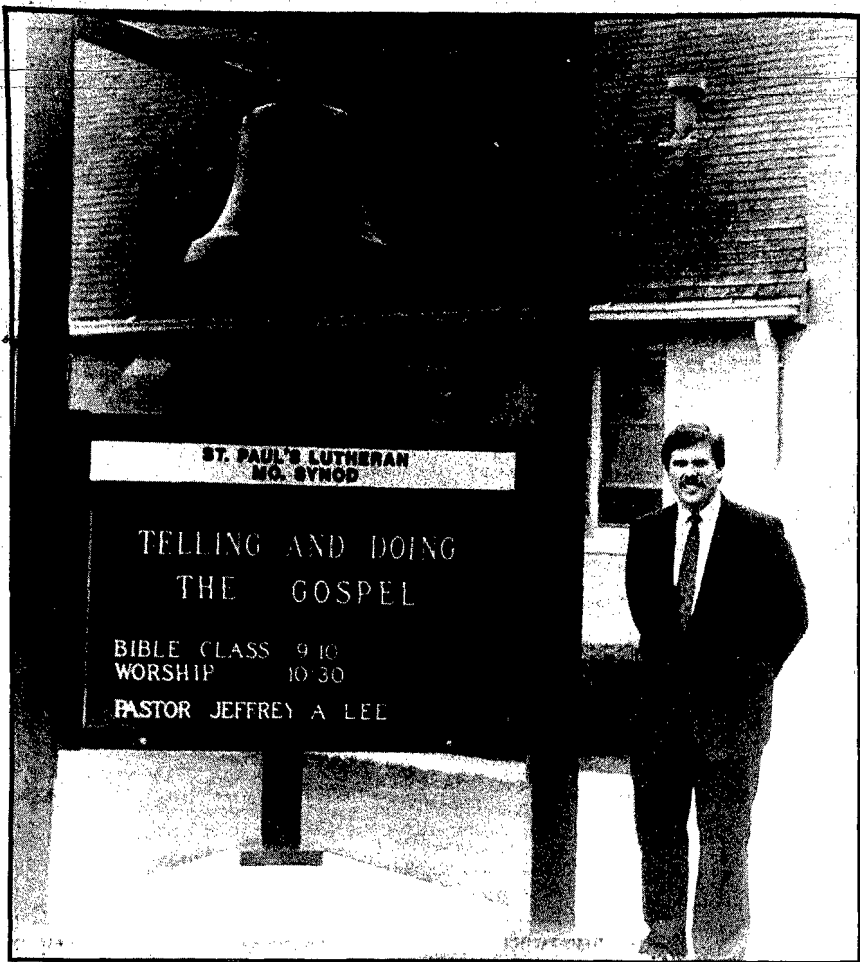

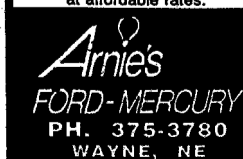
