

Wayne State gets nod from state lawmakers

WAYNE - Wayne State College will be getting a new business building campus and a masters of business administration program, under two

on campus and a masters of business administration program, under two separate measures passed by the Nebraska legislature.

In a 33-7 override of Gov. Ben Nelson's veto of the cigarette tax bill, the legislature gave initial approval for construction of a \$4 million project for Wayne State.

According to Jeff Beckman, WSC director of college relations, major funding for the building will not be provided by the state until 1993. College officials will be providing a construction time line in the near future.

Beckman added that college officials hope to get the MBA program started in the fall.

"WE ARE pleased with the news," he said. "This is a project that will benefit thousands of future business students at Wayne State. It will be a great addition to our northeast Nebraska service region."

Beckman said he expects that information about the business building will be released in time for the Wednesday, June 12 Wayne Herald. Information about the MBA program will be released at a later date.

The legislature's override of Governor Nelson's veto for the business building brought a total of \$11.2 million for the college and university construction package over state prisons.

Along with the \$4 million for Wayne State, money will be appropriated to the University of Nebraska-Uncoln.



ACCORDING TO Olson, Wake-field Recreation, Ltd.'s attorney, Bill Horneber of South Sioux City, be-lieves that two banks will sell the bowling alley to investors. Brent-wood Bank of Omaha holds a note against the equipment, valued at \$40,000, and the Papillion Bank holds the building note, worth

Firm signs contract to do facility work

WAYNE - Residents around the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Facility might be able to sleep a little easier come 30 days from

According to Wayne County Sheriff LeRoy Janssen, a contract has been signed with Prokop Con-struction of Wayne to construct a new fence around the exercise area on the southwest corner of the facility. The contract runs for 30 days. It was signed May 28.

The new fence will be 18 feet

high with razor wire around its rim. In the past, barbed wire topped the rim.

THE FENCE was necessitated following three breakouts last summer. One breakout occurred when a juvenile climbed the fence, another when the escapee got away from guards while being transferred from the facility to the exercise area and the third occurred when two juveniles escaped when they broke the window to the back door. The last escape was Aug. 16, 1990.

Janssen said one of the reasons

it has taken the facility nine months to get the project going is

due to the difficulty in getting supplies. He said the type of supplies needed aren't readily available.

THE WAYNE County Sheriff added that when the youth are outside in the exercise area, they will be supervised by detention center personnel.

center personnel.

Janssen said it will be beneficial
to the youth staying in the center
when the new fence is finished. He
said although the facility is not
running anywhere near capacity,
he said it is important that youth have access to exercise outdoors.

He said if the new fence does not prevent escapes, youth will no longer have access outside.

"Razor wire isn't the type of thing you run down to the store and buy," Janssen said. "It's some-thing we've had to look for." He added that when they started to try to enclose the out-door exercise area last fall, there

wasn't enough time for construc-tion crews to work on it before winter came.

ANOTHER PROBLEM is that last year when the facility called for bids none came in. Janssen said one contractor showed some interest in doing the project but said it would be done on a time avail-able basis, so no contract was established.

This spring, however, when the call for bids went out, construction crews had time to work up bids for the project.
lanssen said the new fence

doesn't come with any guarantees of keeping juveniles from escaping. He added that the fence is de-

He added that the fence is designed to keep people in.

"We're hoping this added construction will help keep them in," Janssen said. "We know for a fact that this will keep the kids from escaping the guards during transfer."



He says that although bromegrass, bulgerass orchardgrass and bluegrass, orchardgrass and bluestems have shown tolerance to Ally, musk thistle, common mullein, curly dock, marestall, wil-drose and buckbrush are sup-pressed or controlled by Ally at rates of one-tenth to three-tenths ounce per acre. For musk thistle, Ally should be applied in early summer prior to flowering.

"Field research in western Nebraska demonstrated the effectiveness of Ally in controlling musk thistle plants and seed production," said Moomaw. Ally, applied at one-quarter ounce per acre at the bud stage, gave 96 percent control of musk thistle plants and only six seeds were collected from 20 seed heads. "When applied at the flower stage," says Moomaw, "84 percent plant control was achieved and 19 seeds were collected from 20 seed heads."



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
