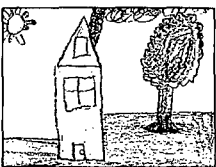

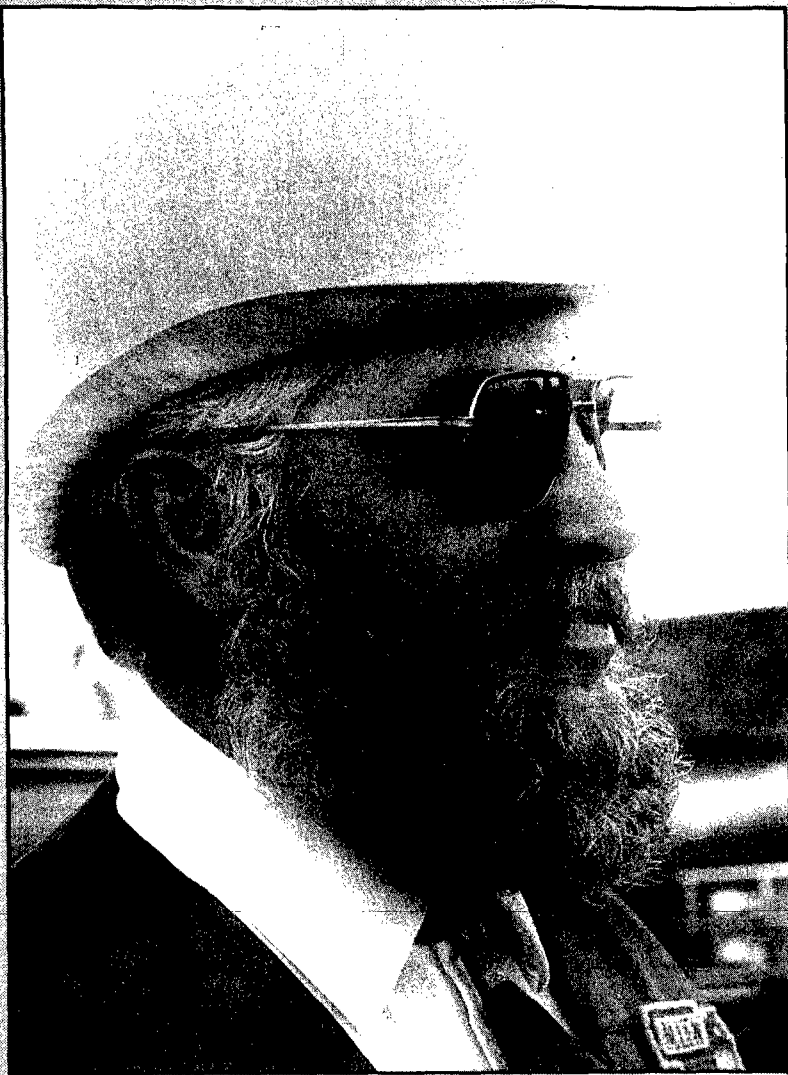

# Allen celebrates 100 years

ALLEN - Probably more people were in Allen last weekend than ever before in the village's 100 year history. According to information from Allen sources, between 8,000 and 10,000 people were in town last weekend.

That's because Allen celebrated its 100 years of existence from Thursday, July 4 to Sunday, July 7.

By all reports, the centennial was a huge success, according to reports from Wayne Herald Allen Correspondent Doris Linafelter.

Along with hosting as many as 10,000 visitors over the weekend, a lengthy schedule of events produced many results.

FOR INSTANCE, the alumni banquet Friday saw over 900 people attend. The parade Saturday featured 220 entries.

As with any large event, however, the centennial did run into some problems. The Friday night street dance was rained out and had to be moved to the school gym. The sled in the sanctioned tractor pull broke a gear box and the event had to be cancelled after the fifth entry had been held.

Despite these few problems, other events pleased the crowd.

In individual events, the team of Randy Ellis, Todd Ellis, Jim Koester and David Emry placed first in a golf tournament held in Wayne Friday. Second place went to the team of Troy Harder, Robb Linafelter, Karen Schultz and Susan Malcom.

IN THE beard judging contest Thursday, a number of awards were presented. Bill Magnuson received

the top award for having the longest beard. The fullest beard went to Courtland Roberts and the best groomed beard went to Eldon Durant. The most creative beard was won by Richard Olesen. The special (busiest beard) category was won by Charles Fiscus, who was too busy to compete in the contest.

The quilt show had over 500 people attend. The viewer choice quilt went to Tillie Rastede and second place went to Anna Marie White. The door prize was won by Kevin Campbell of Omaha. There were 159 quilts on display.

The number one belt buckle was auctioned and it went to Mel Mathiesen for \$60. The number two was purchased by Verlin Hingst for \$50 and James McDonald purchased number 91 for \$35. Belt

number 100 went to Harold Wiig for \$45.

IN DRAWINGS, the Winchester rifle was won by Bob Fredrickson of Omaha and Vernon Ellis, Jr. of Parker, Colo. won the centennial clock. The picture of Allen was won by Myron Armour of Smithland, Iowa. The centennial quilt was won by Dorothy Andrews of Applevalley, Minn. and the afghan was won by Scott Chase, son of Rick and Deb Chase.

The fun run had 164 entries. Winning the overall one mile run for the men was Todd Knutson and the women's winner was Beth Meyer. Todd Fuelberth of Wayne won the men's 5K and Tammy Schluns of Wayne won the women's 5K race.

In mud volleyball competition, 20 teams entered. First place went

to the Matt Hingst team and the Kraemer family placed second.

In family softball competition, eight teams were entered. The Harder Family placed first and the Oswald-Werner family took second.

FOURTEEN teams competed for honors in the firemen's water-fights with top honors being won by a team from Merville, Iowa. Martinsburg placed second and Wakefield took third. Results for powder puff teams were not available but five teams did compete.

Results were also not available for the local tractor pull and no floats were judged in the centennial parade on Saturday.

In the kiddie tractor pull, there

## Council takes first look at 1991-92 budget, 14.5 percent decrease on tap for new year

There really wasn't one item that dominated the Wayne City Council agenda Tuesday night but they did get a lot done.

Wayne's city council also got its first look at the 1991-92 budget. The proposed budget is estimated at \$11.5 million.

As proposed by City Administrator Joe Salitros, the budget is expected to be 14.5 percent lower than its 1990-91 predecessor. While that may sound like good news, residents may find out they have to pay more for services than in the past.

Many of the details surrounding the city's budget depend on what happens involving personal property taxes, Salitros said.

Part of the reason for the decrease in the budget is due to the completion of the swimming pool renovation. In the outline of the 1991-92 finances, the city administrator outlined some possible increases in services the city offers, which may include recreation and access to the city auditorium.

In dealings with the proposed budget, the council recessed its meeting until Monday, July 15 at 7 a.m. when they will meet at the Wayne State College Student Center to discuss it.

IN OTHER matters, the city council found itself having to delay action on a number of agenda items. The council had to defer action on the consideration of a storm sewer easement agreement on property at the Wayne Greenhouse, bids for city sidewalk improvements and a request to waive a sewer connection at the former Fat Kat restaurant.

In discussing the proposed new business at the Fat Kat restaurant, Rick Benson asked the council to waive a connection with the city sewer line for five years while allowing the new business to build up enough revenue to where it could

## Board gives nod to lid provision

Although the Wayne Community School Board voted to remain under the 4 percent lid restriction required under LB 1059, the school refinancing measure of 1990, the board also discovered that the 1991-92 budget is somewhat in limbo.

Due to an increase in enrollment of a certain type of handicapped students, however, the schools may not be required to remain under the 4 percent lid, according to Dr. F.R. Haun, superintendent of

schools. This means the schools could increase its budget more than 4 percent.

According to conditions under Nebraska law, certain exceptions to the 4 percent LB 1059 lid are permissible. Increases in enrollment for certain special education students may qualify the schools to fall under that exception.

The board discussed the matter during a public hearing at Tuesday's monthly meeting. After discussing the matter, the board

voted 5-0 to remain under the 4 percent lid. Board member Carter Peterson was absent from the meeting.

THE BOARD also learned that data is still unavailable from the State Department of Education for certain aspects of the budget, which is scheduled for adoption in August.

According to Haun, the board

### Getting active now could take away the pains later

Were you aware that all of Seventh Street in Wayne is designated commercial property?

And were you aware that under some interpretations of the current city administration, that parking on the city terrace property is not encouraged and may soon become threatened?

These are just two little-known items. How many others depend on whether or not we become involved in the next city zoning plan.

We need to focus our attention on this issue over the course of the next year. That's when the city will draw up the new comprehensive plan, which will include zoning laws.

If we don't get involved in this process, we will only hurt ourselves. An uninformed public provides a city government the opportunity to do what it wants. If we remain uninformed, we will suffer. If we participate in the updating process of the plan, we will benefit.

If residents oppose certain zoning laws, this is the time to air those concerns. Not in five years, when the laws are in place and what has always been is threatened by change.

New laws need challenging and the time to challenge is now. Since every person has a different interpretation of laws, we need to show we all understand what each law means and why it's written the way it is.

Making a zoning item a law is like buying a life insurance policy. But if you don't understand it, the policy will never benefit you.

### Death row case creates call for changes in appeals system

By now, we are all probably getting sick of hearing about the appeals of death row inmate Harold Lamont "Walkin' Willie" Otey. For a minute, let's shed some light on the matter.

Lawyers for Otey have filed appeal after appeal after appeal. While we should understand the ramifications of executing Otey for a crime he admits to committing, his case, like many others before it, exploit the appeals process in the United States.

Probably one of the best-known cases of recent times surrounded the Ted Bundy execution during the mid-1980s. Bundy was able to remain alive as long as he could effectively exploit the system. When his appeals ran out, so did his time.

What we need to ask ourselves is whether convicted murderers who admit to having committed the crime, or murderers which have evidence against them that is so incriminating, deserve as many appeals as they receive. We think not.

The public needs to encourage changes in the appeals process, changes which are not only fair to the convicted but fair to the victims.

By drawing on so many appeals, Otey's lawyers have not only punished the family of Jane McManus, who Otey murdered, but they are punishing all of us.

### President leaves ink blot on bad record with nominee

President Bush's selection of Federal Appeals Court Judge Clarence Thomas to the United States Supreme Court leaves yet another ink blot on the president's already bad civil rights record.

Although Thomas obviously has strong credentials to be nominated, Bush's gesture to nominating him is almost as pathetic as Walter Mondale's selection of Geraldine Ferraro for vice-president in the Democrat party's failed 1984 bid to the White House. Selecting Thomas is a token gesture to the African-American community just as Ferraro's was to women.

When Bush selected Supreme Court Justice David Souter in 1989, there wasn't enough known about him to prevent him from receiving a seat on the Supreme Court. Two years after that selection, Souter has proven to be almost as much of a dud as a cheap firework on the Fourth of July.

We cannot encourage a mediocre Supreme Court; therefore, we cannot encourage Bush's selection of Clarence Thomas.

With the swing to a conservative court, Bush would have been wise to have selected a moderate, rather than a conservative.

We hope if Thomas fails in his bid for the vacancy on the Supreme Court, that Bush will recommend someone with more moderate views. After all, a Supreme Court nomination today will guide the nation for the next 20-plus years.

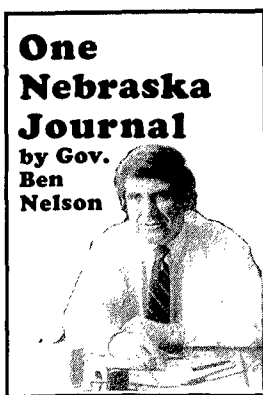
# Governor makes call to have lawmakers find tax solution

I have called state lawmakers back into session to give them another chance to solve the property tax crisis and to give Nebraskans the opportunity to decide at the polls what statewide property tax policy should be.

Local government subdivisions are concerned that the Legislature act quickly to avoid further court decisions that could devastate the \$1.2 billion property tax revenue base, threaten local services and increase the burden already weighing heavy on middle-income Nebraskans and homeowners.

In order to adopt a constitutional amendment on property taxes, set a special election on the amendment, and change the date by which counties must levy their taxes, I asked the Legislature to convene on July 8 and it should complete its work by July 18.

Our challenge is to develop a solution that protects middle-income Nebraskans and homeowners from an unfair property tax burden. The solution must be fair and pass constitutional muster; be-

cause of pending court action it must come quickly.

I intend to introduce the same amendment the Legislature failed to adopt during the regular session: separating real and personal property in the constitution. I am

grateful to Senators Ron Withem, Scott Moore and Jerome Warner for coming forward with alternative constitutional amendments.

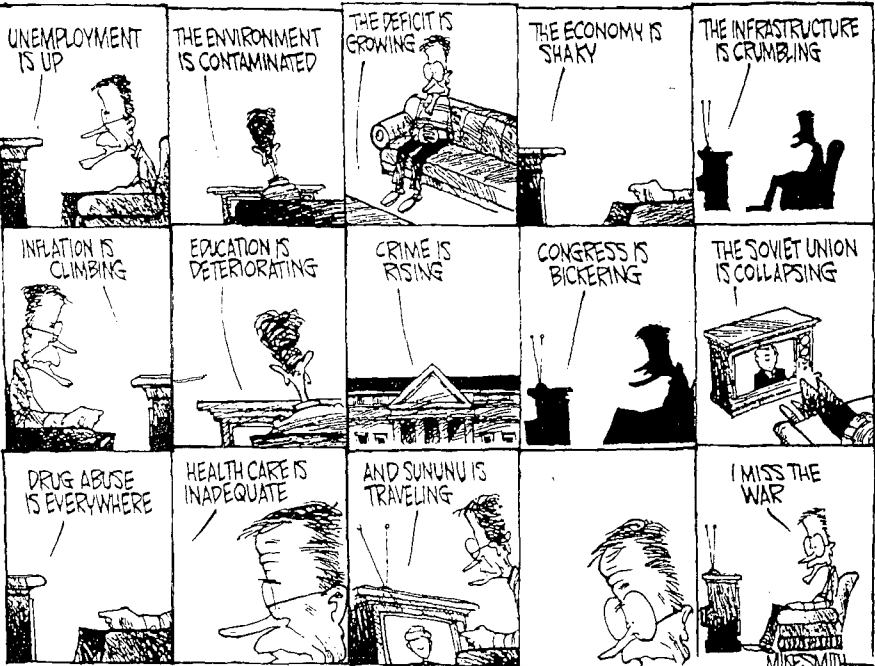
Regardless of the outcome, we must act now and I'm going to give the Senators a chance to fix the problem and to gather the 40 votes necessary to protect homeowners and save Nebraska from disaster.

I will also ask the Legislature to move the levy date by which counties must set their tax rates from September 15 to September 30. The change is necessary because the constitutional amendment must pass before taxes are levied. As 60 days must elapse before a special election on a constitutional amendment can be held, the levy date must be moved to a date after the constitutional amendment is certified by the State Board of Canvassers. Delays in action on the situation have made it unlikely a special election could be held before the September 15 deadline facing counties.

We've waited over a month for consensus to develop in the Legislature, and we've had some constructive discussions and have heard of many discussions among members.

I firmly believe the Legislature must act now on the crisis. Waiting for the Supreme Court to declare the real property tax unconstitutional is an irresponsible gamble we should not take. It places local government services at risk and only prolongs the uncertainty facing Nebraskans. If nothing is done, and the system collapses, ad-reunds are due, there is no way local governments can cover their obligations. We'd have to gut the entire state budget to cover the \$1.2 billion revenue loss local governments face if the personal property tax system fails.

The property tax crisis will not go away, it will only get worse. For twenty years the situation was ignored and, as we know, the Supreme Court has said we must address the inequities in the system now.

# Congressman addresses issues

### TAX FAIRNESS FOR FAMILIES

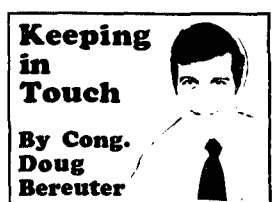
I am cosponsoring a bill that would allow parents to keep more of their hard-earned money by increasing the personal exemption amount for dependent children under age 18 to \$3,500. This bill, the Tax Fairness for Families Act (H.R. 1277), now has more than 160 cosponsors, including many members of the House leadership. Many Nebraskans have written to me to express their support for this legislation.

### FAIRNESS FOR ADOPTING FAMILIES ACT

Children without permanent homes deserve the stable, caring environment which adoptive families can provide. Yet, many families who want to support a child have trouble meeting the initial adoption related expenses, which average between \$5,000 and \$10,000. President Bush noted the urgency of this problem in his State of the Union address.

I am cosponsoring the Fairness for Adopting Families Act (H.R. 1515), which would provide a modest tax break for American families who wish to adopt. This tax deduction would be similar to deductions given biological families to cover the expenses associated with childbirth.

The proposed deduction would not exceed \$5,000 (\$7,000 for international adoptions). It would not be available to families with a net annual income above \$60,000, nor would it include ex-

penses related to spousal adoption of step-children. To encourage private companies to assist their employees, adoption expenses reimbursed by employers would not be included in an employee's gross income.

### LEGAL HELP FOR CHARITIES

Many times when an individual leaves a bequest to a charity, the executor fails to notify that charity that it is a beneficiary of a charitable remainder trust created by the decedent's will. In some circumstances, years may pass before a charity has any information on the finances of the estate or the trust. There is no Federal requirement that the charity be notified of its financial stake in the charitable remainder trust.

I am cosponsoring a bill, (H.R. 1132), that would require that an executor file two notices with the charitable beneficiaries containing information of the estate and the charitable remainder trust. This bill is revenue-neutral and follows a similar rule now in place for private foundations.

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## Softball season winds down

Following that contest the Wayne 16 and under team played Wakefield and was defeated soundly, 18-5. Katie Lutt was given the pitching loss in her first outing on the mound. "Our normal starting pitcher Wendy Beiermann was sick which forced us to shuffle the line-up," Sturm said.

Wayne had just four hits in the contest as Jenny Thompson doubled while Kristy Hall, Tracy

Oborny and Tina Lutt each singled. In the nightcap Wayne's 18 and under team defeated Wakefield by a 15-1 margin as Holly Holdorf and Jennifer Hammer combined on a no-hitter as the game lasted just three innings.

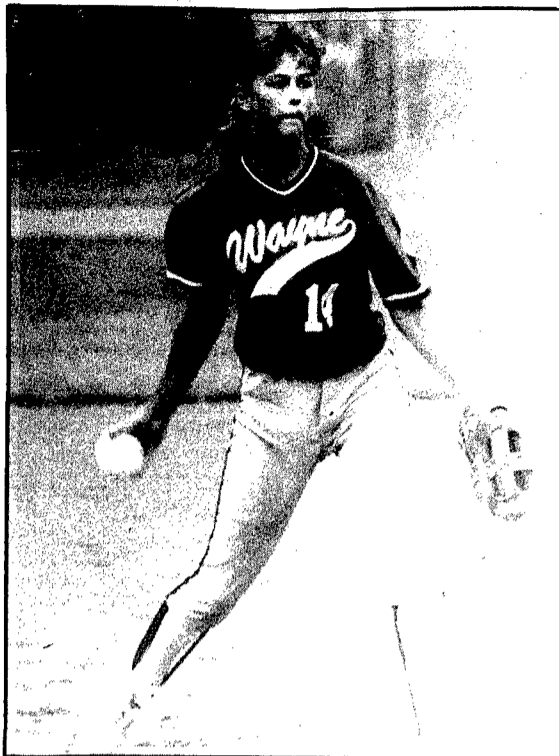

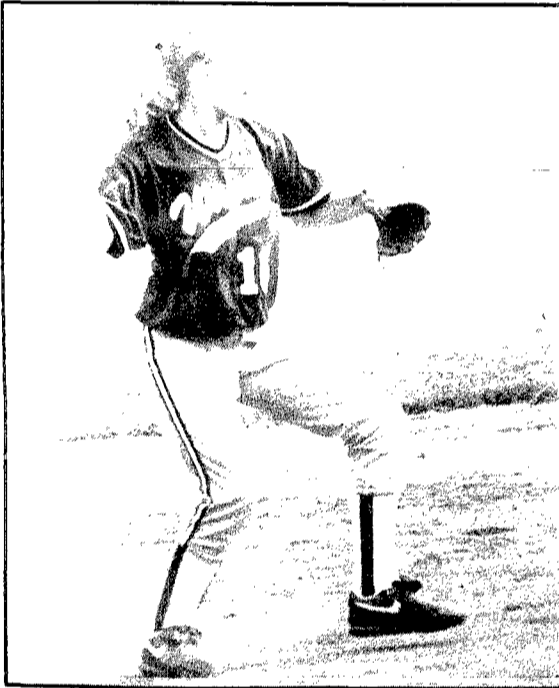

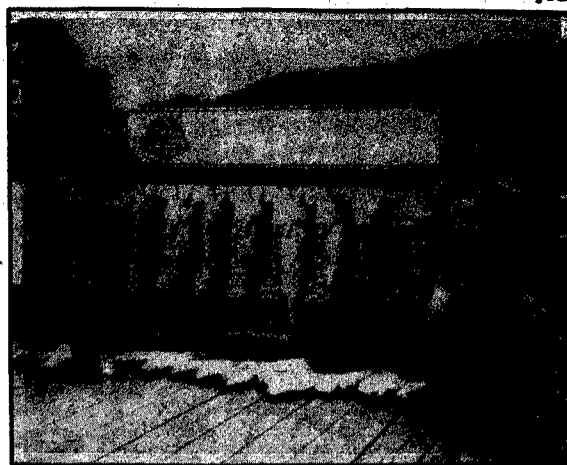

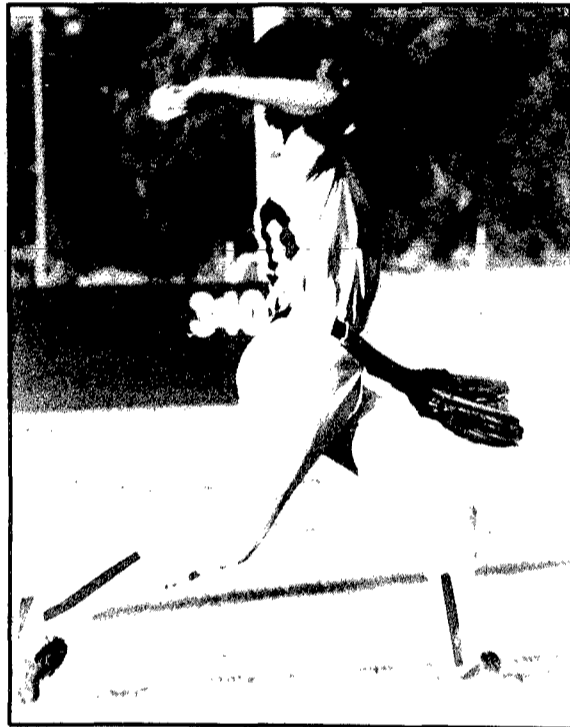

The new ambulance was on display during alumni activities at Wakefield High School on July 6 and later at the fire hall.

The Wakefield Rescue Squad was organized in 1971 and since then has responded to 1,424 calls and has used five different units.

## Nelson makes selection of four to soybean board

Governor Ben Nelson has announced appointments for four district seats on the Nebraska Soybean Development, Utilization and Marketing Board (NSDUMB). Selected to serve on behalf of the state's soybean producers were: Cecilia Grevson, Madison; Bob Eills, Central City; Gordon Ohnoutka, Valparaiso; and Norm Husa, Barneston.

To qualify for appointment to the NSDUMB a person must be a citizen of Nebraska who is at least 21 years of age; be actually engaged in growing soybeans in this

Prospective candidates for the Board must place their names on a candidacy list by filing a petition signed by at least fifty resident soybean producers of their district. The term of office is three years. There are eight appointed members on the Board, plus one at-large member elected by the Board members.

Grevson will represent District 1 consisting of Antelope, Boone, Cedar, Knox, Madison, Pierce, Stanton and Wayne counties.

### Poison Ivy, Oak, Sumac...

The long days of summer provide more time for outdoor activities and the problems that go with them. June and July are peak months for contact with plants that cause contact dermatitis - inflammation and blistering of the skin. As many as 8 out of 10 persons are sensitive to poison ivy alone. Other plants that cause contact dermatitis include poison oak and sumac. After exposure to such plants, many experts recommend immediate washing of exposed skin with soap and water. Even touching clothing that has made contact with these plants may cause skin reactions. Calamine lotion is an old standby that may reduce inflammation and itching. Anesthetic creams, such as those containing benzocaine, may help relieve itching. Hydrocortisone cream or spray helps fight inflammation and itching.

MAKE THAT YOUR LAST CIGARETTE — and chances are you'll last longer! The good news coming out of the carefully monitored study done at Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston indicates that many older folks who stop smoking can benefit by quitting.

One of the problems associated with getting older people to stop smoking is the prevalence of a misconception that seniors are immune to the dangers of smoking. At one time, people believed that if you passed a certain age, smoking could no longer do you any harm. Now, however, we know that that's not true. Smoking can cut one's lifespan, and can cause health problems including coronary and artery disease, as well as cancer of the esophagus, lungs, and mouth. Smoking can also cause complications in diabetics and those who have reduced blood flow to the lower limbs.

The study of those who smoked showed that smokers over 75 had a 20 percent increase in the death rate. Also, both older women and men who seem outwardly healthy were twice as likely to die during the five year period of the study as those who never smoked, and had twice the risk of dying from both heart disease and cancer.

Another factor is second hand smoke. This has been shown to be dangerous to those who inhale it. The government is said to be sitting on a report on how many people die each year from so-called passive smoking. Most grandparents would be shocked if they were accused of abusing their grandchildren, yet that's just what they do

when they smoke in their presence. Think about it, and then make up your mind to stop smoking now.

REFLECTIONS ON THE SILVER SCREEN: How well (or ill) do movie makers treat older women? Elizabeth Markson, researcher and associate director at Boston University's Gerontology Institute, says not very well at all. She points out that: "Men have entire genres — war, westerns, gangster, 'buddy' films — (each) dedicated to their relationships with each other. But women's relationships with each other, especially older women, have received far less attention." Markson's colleague, Carol Taylor, adds that older women lead active, interesting lives, but the movie image is still that of "hag, nag, witch, or worse, (as) seen years ago in 'Whatever Happened to Baby Jane?', and more recently in 'Throw Momma from the Train.'" The point is also made that, except for Katharine Hepburn and Jessica Tandy, few older women are given screen roles that aren't caricatures.

## The GOLDEN YEARS

By *Helen Boley*

Because Helen Boley took a routine blood test at the University of Kansas Medical Center, she has become a celebrity among researchers. She is the only person known to have inherited a rare variant of a gene from both parents, a gene that may yield clues to longevity. The blood test showed Mrs. Boley has a very low level of the "bad" form of cholesterol and an extraordinary high level of the "good" form that helps to prevent artery-clogging. Mrs. Boley, 61, a State Department retiree, told researchers that longevity runs in her family — great-grandparents on both sides of the family tree lived into their 90s, and some past 100. Government scientists in Bethesda, Maryland, are continuing the studies of Mrs. Boley and her relatives. She has no children.

It took an act of Congress to make it easier for senior citizens to get information by phone from the Social Security Administration (SSA). In 1989 SSA set up a toll-free line, 1-800-234-555A, and stopped listing the numbers of local SSA offices in phone directories. But too often the 800 number is "busy." So Congress has ordered SSA to restore listings for local offices when new directories are published. This will apply to 40 percent of the offices, mostly those outside metropolitan areas.

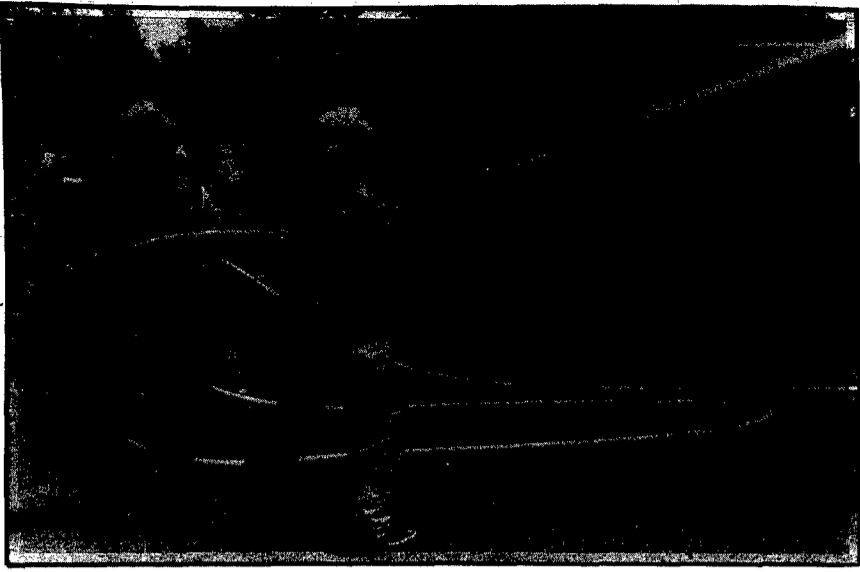

### The Farmer's Wife

A retired farmer told me this week that he had never seen corn suffer from heat so fast after a wet spring. We theorized that it had not developed deep enough root systems; there had not been a need for deep roots.

Thankfully, the weather has moderated, and we can give the air conditioner a rest and grab an extra blanket at night.

I worked in the emergency room the entire holiday weekend, and everyone who came in had a degree of temperature. We saw sunburn, insect bites, cuts, bumps, and even a few firecracker injuries. One lady with a stretched muscle was in a mud volleyball tournament. We had to sweep after she left!

I usually read to get sleepy after a busy evening shift. Last night, I picked up an article about how hospitals are importing nurses these days. It seems that nurses in Ireland and Britain are suddenly finding themselves unemployed due to sharp cost-cutting measures. (It makes us wonder about their system.) No-one seems to have the answer to high health-care costs.

Anyway, the article describes the process that occurs when two Irish folks encounter someone they have not yet met as "root bumping". Where are your people from? What was your mother's maiden name? In America, we add,

"where, and when, did you graduate? It's always fun to play 'It's a small world.'"

We have roots. Plants and trees have roots. The analogy is so simple, and such a good one. If our roots go deep, we can withstand the hot winds of life.

It's good to get in touch with our roots periodically. We've been in that season of the year. High school reunions, family get-togethers, Fourth of July celebrations.

Last week, on the third of July, I noticed signs on the highway saying I was on the right road, then "one mile more", and finally, "welcome home." In the yard were a bunch of picnic tables and lots of people, saying "hello, again" to a member of the guard unit that has been one of the last to come home. I had no idea who they were, but I honked, and everyone waved, and I felt tears in my eyes.

Sometimes we have to be away from those simple farmsteads and cottages before we are even aware of our roots. Sometimes we didn't have an opportunity to establish roots, for whatever reason. We need to take advantage of the "cool breaks" in our lives to "grow deep, not tall", and to nourish our root systems in preparation for the next onslaught.

Because there will be more: hot, dry winds, gloomy days, and restless nights. Be prepared, and put down roots.
