

Getting active now could take away the pains later Were you aware that all of Seventh Street in Wayne is desig-

nated commercial property?

And were you aware that under some interpretations of the cur-rent city administration, that parking on the city terrace property is not encouraged and may soon become threatened? These are just two little-known items. How many others de-pend on whether or not we become involved in the next city zoning plan.

We need to focus our attention on this issue over the course of the next year. That's when the city will draw up the new compre-hensive plan, which will include zoning laws.

If we don't get involved in this process, we will only hurt our-selves. An uninformed public provides a city government the op-portunity to do what it wants. If we remain uninformed, we will suffer. If we participate in the updating process of the plan, we will benefit will benefit

If residents oppose certain zoning laws, this is the time to air those concerns. Not in five years, when the laws are in place and what has always been is threatened by change.

New laws need challenging and the time to challenge is now. Since every person has a different interpretation of laws, we need to show we all understand what each law means and why it's

written the way it is. Making a zoning item a law is like buying a life insurance policy. But if you don't understand it, the policy will never benefit you.

Death row case creates call

for changes in appeals system By now, we are all probably getting sick of hearing about the appeals of death row inmate Harold Lamont "Walkin' Willie" Otey. For a minute, let's shed some light on the matter.

Lawyers for Otey have filed appeal after appeal after appeal. While we should understand the ramifications of executing Otey for a crime he admits to committing, his case, like many others before it, exploit the appeals process in the United States.

Probably one of the best-known cases of recent times surrounded the Ted Bundy execution during the mid-1980s. Bundy was able to remain alive as long as he could effectively exploit the system. When his appeals ran out, so did his time. What we need to ask ourselves is whether convicted murderers

who admit to having to committed the crime, or murderers which have evidence against them that is so incriminating, deserve as many appeals as they receive. We think not.

The public needs to encourage changes in the appeals process, changes which are not only fair to the convicted but fair to the victims

By drawing on so many appeals, Otey's lawyers have not only punished the family of Jane McManus, who Otey murdered, but they are punishing all of us.

President leaves ink blot on bad record with nominee

President Bush's selection of Federal Appeals Court Judge Clarence Thomas to the United States Supreme Court leaves yet

another ink blot on the president's already bad civil rights record. Although Thomas obviously has strong credentials to be nom-inated, Bush's gesture to nominating him is almost as pathetic as Walter Mondale's selection of Geraldine Ferraro for vice-president in the Democrat party's failed 1984 bid to the White House. Se-lecting Thomas is a token gesture to the African-American com-

munity just as Ferraro's was to women. When Bush selected Supreme Court Justice David Souter in 1989, there wasn't enough known about him to prevent him from receiving a seat on the Supreme Court. Two years after that selection, Souter has proven to be almost as much of a dud as a cheap firework on the Fourth of July.

We cannot encourage a mediocre Supreme Court; therefore, we cannot encourage Bush's selection of Clarence Thomas.

With the swing to a conservative court, Bush would have been wise to have selected a moderate, rather than a conservative. We hope if Thomas fails in his bid for the vacancy on the Supreme Court, that Bush will recommend someone with more moderate views. After all, a Supreme Court nomination today will guide the nation for the next 20-plus years.

TAX FAIRNESS FOR FAMILIES

I am cosponsoring a bill that would allow parents to keep more of their hard-earned money by increasing the personal exemption amount for dependent children under age 18 to \$3,500. This bill, the Tax Fairness for Families Act (H.R. 1277), now has more than 160 cosponsors, including many members of the House leadership. Many Nebraskans have written to me to express their support for this

legislation. FARINESS FOR ADOPTING

FAMILIES ACT Children without permanent homes deserve the stable, caring environment which adoptive families can provide. Yet, many families who want to support a child have trouble meeting the initial adoption related expenses, which aver-age between \$5,000 and \$10,000. President Bush noted the urgency of this problem in his State of the Union address.

I am cosponsoring the Fairness for Adopting Families Act (H.R. 1515), which would provide a modest tax break for American families who wish to adopt. This tax deduction would be similar to deductions given biological families to cover the expenses sassociated with childbirth.

with childbirth. The proposed deduction would not exceed \$5,000 (\$7,000 for in-ternational adoptions). It would not be available to families with a net annual income above \$60,000, nor would it include ex-

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



Keeping cool **Officials offer** tips to avoid heat stress in livestock Nebraska dairy producers should

take steps to keep their cows cool during a heat wave. Hot, humid weather can cause up to a 20 per-

during a heat wave. hot, humu weather can cause up to a 20 per-cent decrease in milk production, said Rick Grant, University of Ne-braska dairy specialist. The highest producing cows and cows in early lactation are more severely affected by heat stress during temperatures over 80 de-grees F, Grant said. He offered the following tips for dairy producers. • Modify the cow's environment with shades, water sprinklers and fans. The goal, Grant said, is to have the cows eat as much as pos-sible since they need more energy to keep cool. He advises keeping the feed and water in a cool area. • Alter the cow's diet to in-crease the energy density. In-crease fat supplementation and concentrates. Use forage, such as concentrates. Use forage, such as alfalfa, with a high-quality relative feed value of 150 to 160.

· Feed cows more often and during the cooler times of the day, such as before 7 a.m. and after 8 p.m. Avoid large amounts of feed during mid-day.

during mid-day. Remember, although cows un-der heat stress tend to eat less, a producer's goal is to maximize feed intake, Grant said. Contact your_local extension agent for more detailed information on feeding cows during hot weather.

Because Helen Boley took a rou-tine blood test at the University of Kansas Medical Center, she has become a celebrity among researchers. She is the only person known to have inherited a rare variant of a gene from both parents, a gene that may yield clues to longevity. The blood test showed Mrs. Boley has a very low level of the "bad" form of cholesterol and an extraordinary high level of the "good" form that helps to prevent artery-clogging. Mrs. Boley, 61, a State Depart-ment retiree, told researchers that longevity runs in her family great-grandparents on both sides of the family tree lived into their 90s, and some past 100. Government scientists in Bethesda, Maryland, are continuing the studies of Mrs. bolev and her relatives. She has no children.

It took an act of Congress to make it easier for senior citizens to get information by phone from the Social Security Administra-tion (SSA). In 1989 SSA set up a toll-free line, 1-800-234-5SSA, and stopped listing the numbers of local SSA offices in phone directories. But too often the 800 number is "busy."
