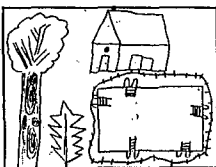

High court says all personal property must go on rolls

Ruling concerns Wayne merchants

A number of Wayne merchants are concerned by Wednesday's announcement by the Nebraska Supreme Court that all personal property tax has to be placed back on the rolls.

While the legislature deals with the matter, a number of the merchants interviewed said their businesses will be hurt if all personal property tax goes on the rolls. Some said they will reduce inventory if it does. Some merchants offered no comment on the matter.

Businesses which will be hurt the most if all personal property tax is placed back on the rolls, represent those in agriculture or ones with large or expensive inventory. Previously, state laws exempted agricultural inventory and business inventory.

"ALL BUSINESSES will be affected equally," said Wayne County Assessor Joyce Reeg. "Some may be hurt a little more than others because of the value

of their merchandise but it will especially be tough on agricultural businesses.

"If the legislation doesn't resolve the matter and put it up to a public vote Aug. 6, we could face some major problems," Reeg added.

The Nebraska Supreme Court has ordered that the county assessors offices in the state be notified immediately of what effects its ruling has on personal property taxes. The Nebraska Department of Revenue is expected to notify county assessors' offices immediately, according to the court's announcement.

ONE OF THE scary things about the Supreme Court's special ruling Wednesday, is that taxes could be assessed on household goods. In other words, taxes may be levied for goods people have in their homes.

Grocery store owner Rick Endicott said Pac 'N' Save will reduce inventory on its shelves. Customers may find that they have less to choose from because stores will

not be able to carry a great deal of inventory for fear of being taxed.

"If they're going to tax everything, there will be more holes on the shelves," Endicott said. "This will be the same with our suppliers. Warehouses will have to run closer to the demand retailers have so they won't be taxed as much."

Quality Foods Owner Randy Brenner had no comment on the matter, nor did Pamida store Manager Robbi Bishop and Diers Supply Manager Randy Gamble.

ELLINGSON Motors Owner Grant Ellingson said the ruling upsets him because "businesses with large inventories shouldn't be

\$5,000 to \$25,000 in sales tax. If the ruling sticks, and the legislature doesn't find a solution, most farmers probably won't be able to afford the personal property taxes on top of the sales tax ticket.

"We're already seeing border bleeding, where farmers go to other states to make their purchases," said one agricultural businessman, who asked not to be identified. "If you add personal property on top of that, it will hurt even more."

The dealer added that his business will have to reduce inventory because if he doesn't "we'll be paying a bundle."

According to Gary Pick, manager of Logan Valley Implement, the property tax dilemma will not only hurt agriculture, but all other businesses as well.

"I can guarantee it will hurt our business because we won't be able to service our customers as well," he said. "It's really going to hurt agriculture and that's the heartbeat of Nebraska. If it hurts agriculture, I guarantee it will hurt everything else."

taxed the same way as businesses that sell expensive merchandise on commission." He said the laws were changed in the early 1970s to resolve this problem.

"That's the reason the laws were changed in the first place," he said. Arnie's Ford-Mercury Owner Bill Reeg said he didn't want to comment on the matter.

PROBABLY the hardest hit by the special ruling will be farm implement dealers like Logan Valley Implement and Midland Equipment, or grain dealers like those in the area.

Wayne State gets ready to offer MBA degree starting in the fall

WAYNE - Wayne State College will begin offering a Master of Business Administration Degree (MBA) this fall. Courses will be offered through South Sioux City and Norfolk Extended Campuses and in Wayne.

The MBA program, which was funded in part by the Nebraska legislature in June, has been in demand in northeast Nebraska for many years, according to Dr. Vaughn Benson, division head of business at Wayne State College. He says the program will be designed for working persons who want to pursue professional development without terminating their employment.

"We will try to cater to the needs of working professionals who have demanding schedules," Benson says. "We realize that many MBA candidates will be employed full-time, so we'll be very sensitive to their schedules."

Wayne State College president, Dr. Donald J. Mash, says he is pleased that the college is finally able to offer the program because it will be a business and economic development boost for the region.

"The legislature's decision to fund Wayne State's MBA program represents an investment in northeast Nebraska," Mash says. "The

availability of an MBA program will be a 'difference-maker' in attracting and retaining working professionals who represent critical human capital for our businesses. It will make northeast Nebraska more desirable to companies looking to expand or relocate their businesses, and the program will help existing northeast Nebraska companies to further develop their work forces to help our state keep pace in a competitive knowledge-driven economy."

Benson says Wayne State's top business professors will be teaching MBA courses.

The MBA curriculum will be designed primarily for students who want to assume positions of increasing responsibility in business, Benson says.

NASA official visits Wayne

Work currently being done by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) almost sounds like something you might see on TV's Star Trek.

NASA is boldly going where no one has gone before.

According to Gordon Eskridge, an education specialist with NASA, the purpose of his visit this year to Wayne State College is to re-introduce a variety of learning techniques to teachers. He's also introducing teachers to technology that might revolutionize the classroom.

In addition to emphasizing auditory, visual and hands-on techniques in the classroom, Eskridge says NASA is working on robots which could be used to decrease the workload of teachers. If everything goes as planned, these robots could find a place in the classroom within the next 20 to 30 years.

"THIS NEXT year is 'the year in space' across the world," Eskridge said in an interview. "We're trying to use space as a stepping stone to learning of all kinds of things. We're trying to emphasize a holistic approach to education."

The NASA education specialist said part of the reason for the workshops he's doing is to encourage more hands-on activities. He said studies show that students learn better when they are able to get hands-on experience.

He said NASA is hoping to augment the classroom experience by showing teachers how to utilize the materials they already receive.

"For so long, teachers have been having kids read things and then write reports," Eskridge said. "If kids can have a hands-on approach to learning, it will enhance what they're already doing."

The purpose of his visit this week is to allow teachers to sam-

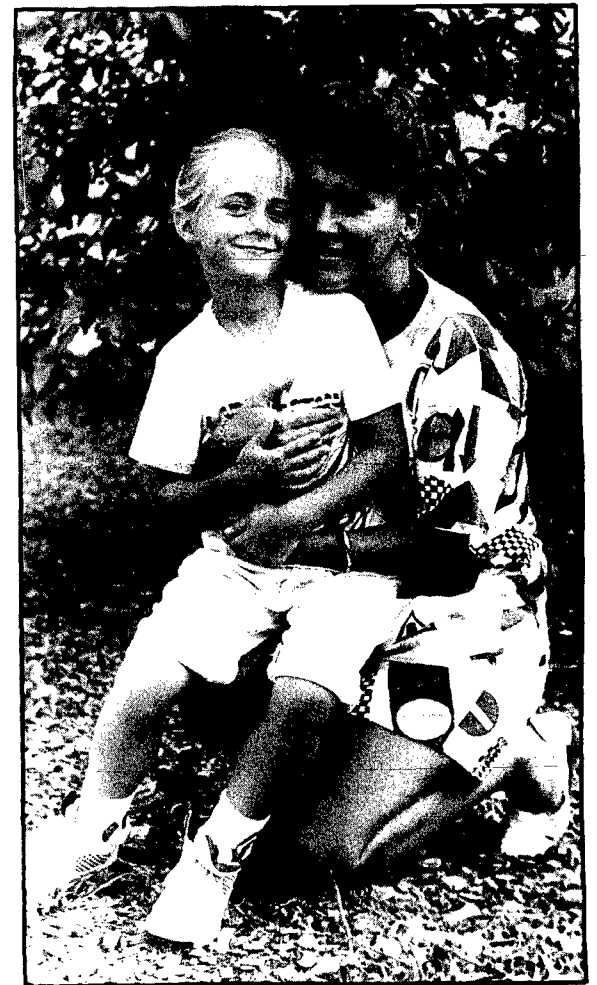
ple what the children will feel in the classroom through utilizing their motor skills.

IN ADDITION to re-emphasizing the hands-on approach, NASA is currently trying to develop an artificial intelligence, or a robot. Eskridge said this will not only help teachers but it will also help students to better understand the rapidly growing wave of technology.

With the artificial intelligence, teachers will know faster whether a student is an auditory learner, a visual learner or a physical learner.

"It will come back and say 'this is the type of program this individual needs,'" he said. "It will improve the student's learning ability. It will bring kids up to speed a lot faster."

"Not only will it enhance youngster's knowledge of technology but it will make you unafraid of it."

Wakefield woman finds joy in return from Persian Gulf

Deb Ball has come away unscathed from the most trying nine months of her life.

Ball, the daughter of Dot and Deloy Benne of Wakefield, returned July 3 from Saudi Arabia. She was stationed near King Khalid Military City with the 1012th Army Reserve Unit, which participated in Operation Desert Storm. The unit returned to Norfolk July 3, just in time for the Fourth of July holiday.

"Time went very fast during the war," she says. "I worried more about my daughter and family back home more than anything else. I missed them so much but we were kept busy with the work we did."

Ball's daughter Lacey is 7-years-old. She stayed with her Wakefield grandparents during the war.

THE RESERVE specialist admits she's just happy to be alive.

"I was really glad to see Lacey again," she says. "I wasn't sure if I ever would."

"Of all the things (experienced in the war), probably the most difficult was all the holidays we missed together," Ball says. "It was tough to be away from her at Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter."

Ball's unit was activated Oct. 11, 1990, where they spent the first month of active duty in Fort Riley, Kan. preparing for their mission. The unit left the United States Nov. 12, 1990.

Once the 1012th arrived in Saudi, Ball says they worked 24-hours-a-day, seven days a week supplying units headed for the front lines. During their term, the unit lived in tents with wooden floors with lights run by generators. Often times, the unit would find itself in two semi-trailer bunkers covered with sand and sand bags.

"We would automatically mask and run to the bunkers whenever the sirens went off," Ball says. "Every time Iraq launched a Scud, we would head to the bunkers. There were two different times Scuds were blown up by Patriots in our area."

ALTHOUGH her unit's mission seemed to go quickly, the time Ball spent following the war's end seemed an eternity. She says it was difficult to see many members of the regular military heading home and the 1012th was still there.

"We felt like we had served our mission," she says. "Time ran slower when we saw that many of the troops were heading home. I

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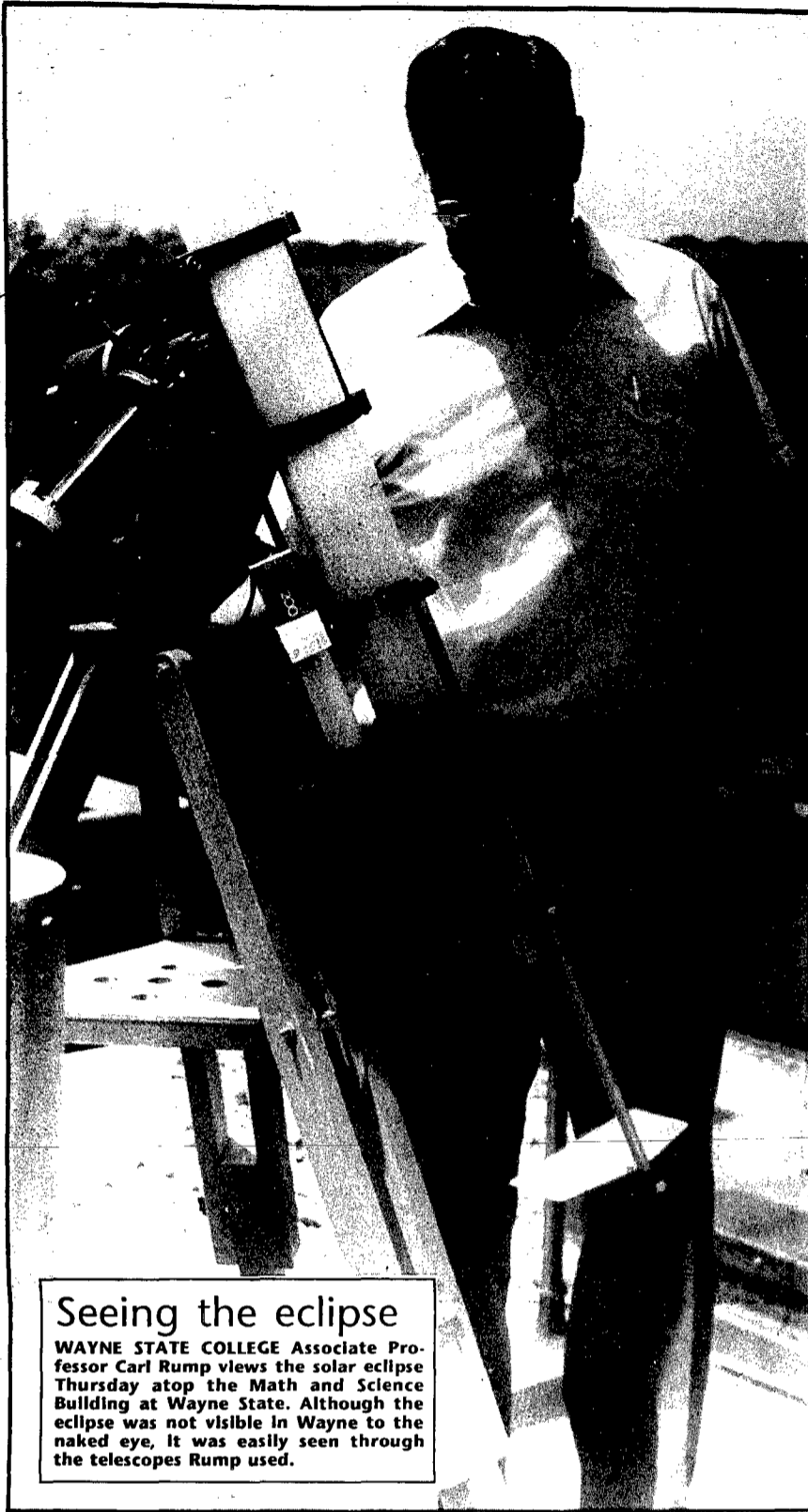

Law should help recipients

A new law to combat mail scams is expected to provide much needed protection to Social Security beneficiaries besieged by various solicitations under the cover of official-looking envelopes. Called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, the new law gives the United States Postal Service specific power to stop delivery of mail that gives the impression it is connected with the government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term or symbol that could reasonably cause it to be mistaken for a mailing from the government will not be delivered unless there is

also a prominent "disclaimer." The disclaimer must appear on the envelope (or face of the postcard), and must clearly state that the mailing is not made or endorsed by the government.

O'Connor pointed out that many companies use "Social Security" or "Medicare" as a "come-on" to get people to read their advertisements. Even worse, some of these ads appear to deliberately try to mislead people into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medicare benefits.

Here are the steps you should take if you receive mail you think violates this new law. First, you can go to your local post office, explain

why you're concerned about the mailing, and ask the people there to forward the mailing to the Postal Inspector's office.

Second, if you prefer, you can send in a complaint directly to the Chief Postal Inspector, at this address: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20260-2100.

Be sure to give the post office everything you received, including any envelope or wrapper. Also, be sure to include your name and address, the nature of your concern and the date you got it in the mail. All that information will help the Postal Inspector take any necessary action.

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NRD OFFICIALS ATTEND REGIONAL CONFERENCE IN GRAND ISLAND

Concerns about future clean water legislation, tying conservation to commodity programs and the need for urban and rural conservation efforts were issues discussed at a six-state meeting of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) June 23 - 26 in Grand Island, Nebraska.

More than 200 participants from Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana, including representatives from the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District, met with officials of the NACD, the USDA Soil Conservation Service and other federal and local agencies.

Lower Elkhorn NRD general manager Stan Staab said, "This meeting was timely with regard to several national issues that affect all Nebraska NRDs, including wetlands, water quality and the future of conservation in farm programs."

NACD president Robert Wetherbee, of Fairmount, North Dakota, said debates on reauthorizing the 1992 Clean Water Act in Congress will focus upon controlling pollutants from getting into the water through either voluntary or regulatory action. It will also look at the states' role in setting standards.

Wetherbee also said farmers' compliance with the 1985 and 1990 Farm Bill legislation and wetlands will continue to be important to districts.

SCS Chief Bill Richards told the delegates the Farm Bill work is today's priority. "At stake is the voluntary approach in delivering conservation. What we as producers, USDA agencies, universities and districts do in the next couple of years will decide if conservation application will be voluntary or regulatory in the next century," said Richards. "SCS will honor its obligations to farmers and we expect farmers to do the same by implementing their conservation plans on schedule," he said.

The NACD Northern Plains Regional Council, the Association's regional policy-making body, also met to establish an issue platform for the coming year. Convention attendees participated in sessions on a variety of topics and toured a water quality project near Shelton. Awards for excellence in conservation education were presented.

Staab summed up the conference by saying, "This meeting was an opportunity to explain in detail several projects and programs, especially in the area of water quality, that are sponsored by local NRDs, the most unique, multipurpose conservation districts in the country."

Group focuses on gas hike

As a result of a notice filed on June 1, 1991, Peoples Natural Gas Company plans to request a general rate increase for retail natural gas service in Wayne, Wakefield, and 31 other cities and villages in eastern Nebraska.

"This is the first time cities served by Peoples will evaluate a rate increase request under a state law passed in 1987," said Bob Harris, Director of the Nebraska Energy Office. "One of the key changes from previous regulatory practice is that group of cities work together on rate regulation."

The law also changed the way rate regulation is financed. Rate areas receive loans from the Energy Office and those loans are repaid by the utility. Then the utility is allowed to recover the cost of regulation from the rate payers. "In the past," Harris said, "the one-time cost per rate payer has averaged about a dollar, but we

don't know what the costs will be on this particular rate filing."

According to the Energy Office, one appointee from each community in an area represents that community throughout the regulatory process. Joe Salitros, Wayne City Administrator, and Lowell Johnson, Wakefield City Administrator are their town's representatives on the rate area committee. The final action in the regulatory process—acceptance, modification or denial of the rate request—is still made by the elected body in each of Peoples' 33 towns affected by the filing.

Organizational meeting held in Lincoln

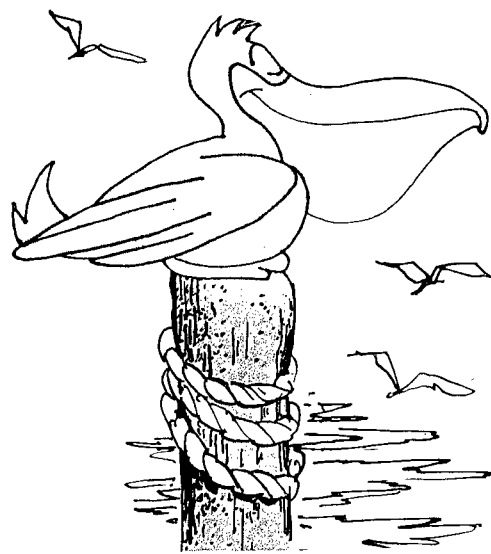
Carhart of Wayne, and Sherry Heskett of Auburn, were elected Rate Area Two Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary/Treasurer, respectively, at an organizational meeting of the rate area on June 26 in Lincoln. Rate area committee members also selected Joe Salitros of Wayne, Ken Snyder of Elmwood, Eldon Garber of North Bend, Laverne Kracl of Schuyler, and Lowell Johnson of Wakefield to serve on the rate area executive committee. Over the next month the members of the executive committee will be soliciting and reviewing proposals from consultants qualified to analyze natural gas rate filings. It is anticipated that a consultant would be selected around Aug. 1.

Rate Area Two members approved extending an invitation to the two towns in Rate Area Three to join them in analyzing the Peoples' proposal. Costs would be divided on a pro rata basis. Discus-

sions by the Executive Committee will be held with the towns in Rate Area Three—Murray and Avoca—regarding an agreement to select the same consultant to analyze the rate proposal from Peoples. Taking this action could result in significant cost savings to rate payers.

"Over the next 30 days, most of the towns will be getting ready for the formal filing which is expected on or about Aug. 1," said Harris. "The consultants for the towns will then have six months to analyze the proposed rate increase, so the matter should be resolved by February first."

According to the Energy Office, municipal employees and elected officials will be invited to a workshop on natural gas rate regulation to assist them in performing this regulatory function. Throughout the process, the Energy Office will periodically inform them of the progress of rate analysis.
