Ruling concerns Wayne merchants By Mark Crist Managing Editor

A number of Wayne merchants are concerned by Wednesday's announcement by the Nebraska Supreme Court that all personal property tax has to be placed back on the rolls. While the legislature deals with

while the legislature deals with the matter, a number of the mer-chants interviewed said their busi-nesses will be hurt if all personal property tax goes on the rolls. Some said they will reduce inven-tory if it does. Some merchants of-fered no comment on the matter fered no comment on the matter.

Businesses which will be hurt the most if all personal property tax is placed back on the rolls, represent those in agriculture or ones with large or expensive inventory. Previously, state laws exempted agricultural inventory and business inventory.

"ALL BUSINESSES will be af-fected equally," said Wayne County Assessor Joyce Reeg. "Some may be hurt a little more than others because of the value

High court says all personal property must go on rolls

The Nebraska Supreme Court has ordered that the county asses-sors offices in the state be notified immediately of what effects its ruling has on personal property taxes. The Nebraska Department of Revenue is expected to notify county assessors' offices immediately, according to the court's announcement.

ONE OF THE scary things about the Supreme Court's special ruling Wednesday, is that taxes could be assessed on household goods. In other words, taxes may be levied for goods people have in their hom

WAYNE - Wayne State College will begin offering a Master of Business Administration Degree (MBA) this fall. NASA official visits Wayne

Work currently being done by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) al-

Space Administration (NASA) al-most sounds like something you might see on TV's Star Trek. NASA is boldly going where no one has gone before. According to Gordon Eskridge, an education specialist with NASA, the purpose of his visit this year to Wayne State College is to re-in-troduce a variety of learning techtroduce a variety of learning tech-niques to teachers. He's also intro-ducing teachers to technology that might revolutionize the classroom.

In addition to emphasizing auditory, visual and hands-on tech-niques in the classroom, Eskridge says NASA is working on robots which could be used to decrease the workload of teachers. If everythe workload of teachers. If every-thing goes as planned, these robots could find a place in the classroom within the next 20 to 30 years. 100

"THIS NEXT year is 'the year in space' across the world," Eskridge said in an interview. "We're trying said in an interview. "We're trying to use space as a stepping stone to learning of all kinds of things. We're trying to emphasize a holis-tic approach to education." The NASA education specialist

said part of the reason for the workshops he's doing is to encour-age more hands-on activities. He said studies show that students learn better when they are able to

get hands-on experience. He said NASA is hoping to aug-ment the classroom experience by showing teachers how to utilize showing teachers how to utilize the materials they already receive. "For so long, teachers have been having kids read things and then write reports," Eskridge said. "If kids can have a hands-on ap-proach to learning, it will enhance what they're already doing." The purpose of his visit this work is to allow teachers to same

week is to allow teachers to sam-

ple what the children will feel in the classroom through utilizing their motor skills.

IN ADDITION to re-emphasizing

the hands-on approach, NASA is currently trying to develop an arti-ficial intelligence, or a robot. Es-kridge said this will not only help teachers but it will also help stu-dents to better understand the rapidly growing wave of technol-

ogy. With the artificial intelligence, teachers will know faster whether a student is an auditory learner, a vi-sual learner or a physical learner.

"It will come back and say 'this is the type of program this individual needs," he said. "It will improve the student's learning ability, It will

bring kids up to speed a lot faster. "Not only will it enhance young-ster's knowledge of technology but it will make you unafraid of it " it will make you unafraid of it.

Nov. 12, 1990. Once the 1012th arrived in Saudi, Ball says they worked 24-hours-a-day, seven days a week supplying units headed for the front lines. During their term, the unit lived in tents with wooden unit lived in tents with wooden floors with lights run by generators. Often times, the unit would find it self in two semi-trailer bunkers covered with sand and sand bags.

"We would automatically mask and run to the bunkers whenever the sirens went off," Ball says. "Every time Iraq launched a Scud, we would head to the bunkers. There were two different times Scuds were blown up by Patriots in out area."

Law should help recipients

By Thomas O'Connor Social Security Manager, Norfolk A new law to combat mail scams is expected to provide much needed protection to Social Secu-rity beneficiaries besieged by vari-ous solicitations under the cover of official-looking envelopes. Called the Deceptive Mailings Prevention Act, the new law gives the United Act, the new law gives the United States Postal Service specific power to stop delivery of mail that gives the impression it is connected with the government.

The law says that any envelope (or the face of any postcard) that includes a name, seal, insignia, term or symbol that could reasonably cause it to be mistaken for a mailing from the government will not be delivered unless there is

also a prominent "disclaimer." The disclaimer must appear on the en-velope (or face of the postcard), and must clearly state that the mailing is not made or endorsed by the government.

O'Connor pointed out that many companies use "Social Secu-rity" or "Medicare" as a "come-on" to get people to read their adver-tisements. Even worse, some of these ads appear to deliberately try to mislead people into thinking they have to respond or they might lose Social Security or Medi-

care benefits Here are the steps you should take if you receive mail you think violates this new law. First, you can go to your local post office, explain

why you're concerned about the mailing, and ask the people there to forward the mailing to the

to rorward the mailing to the Postal Inspector's office. Second, if you prefer, you can send in a complaint directly to the Chief Postal Inspector, at this ad-dress: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 U'Enfant Plaza, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20260-2100.

Be sure to give the post office everything you received, including any envelope or wrapper. Also, be sure to include your name and ad-dress, the nature of your concern and the date you got it in the mail. All that information will help the Postal Inspector take any necessary action. action.

NRD OFFICIALS ATTEND **REGIONAL CONFERENCE** IN GRAND ISLAND

Concerns about future clean water legislation, tying conservation to commodity programs and the need for urban and rural conservation efforts were issues discussed at a six-state meeting of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) June 23 - 26 in Grand Island, Nebraska.

More than 200 participants from Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana, including representatives from the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District, met with officials of the NACD, the USDA Soil Conservation Service and other federal and local agencies.

Lower Elkhorn NRD general manager Stan Staab said, "This meeting was timely with regard to several national issues that affect all Nebraska NRDs, including wetlands, water quality and the future of conservation in farm programs.

NACD president Robert Wetherbee, of Fairmount, North Dakota, said debates on reauthorizing the 1992 Clean Water Act in Congress will focus upon controlling polutants from getting into the water through either voluntary or regulatory action. It will also look at the states' role in setting standards.

Wetherbee also said farmers' compliance with the 1985 and 1990 Farm Bill legislation and wetlands will continue to be important to districts.

SCS Chief Bill Richards told the delegates the Farm Bill work is today's priority. "At stake is the voluntary approach in delivering conservation. What we as producers, USDA agencies, universities and districts do in the next couple of years will decide if conservation application will be voluntary or regu-latory in the next century," said Richards. "SCS will honor its obligations to farmers and we expect farmers to do the same by implementing their conservation plans on schedule", he said.

The NACD Northern Plains Regional Council, the Association's regional policy-making body, also met to establish an issue platform for the coming year. Convention attendees participated in sessions on a variety of topics and toured a water quality project near Shelton. Awards for excellence in conservation education were presented.






