National Omaha Service Center and the M.G. Waldbaum Company, to name a few.

THE NEW runway will be approximately 4,200 feet long, which is almost one mile long. The lengthened runway will promote the arrival of corporate business in Wayne. The current runway, which runs east and west, is 3,400 feet long and it is not a prevailing wind runway, which makes it more difficult for pilots to insure safe landings.

Other members of the Wayne Airport Authority include Dave Ley, Stan Morris, Earl Tooker, Carl Rump and Nissen. Probably most instrumental in seeing the project to this point have been Ley and Morris, who have been on the board since it was formed in the late 1970s.

"We feel it is very important to the community and there are all kinds of statistics and figures to back this up," Nissen said. "When a community has improved its airport then the community will benefit. We think that will be the case for Wayne."

Winside school officials say tax request down

The tax request for school purposes in Winside will be down for the 1991-92 school year in comparison with the 1990-91 school year by about 7.6 percent or \$50,233, even though the budget is projected to increase by about \$114,902.

The school received more in non-property tax receipts during the year and had a larger county treasurers balance in September 1990 than was projected. This has

helped to allow for the tax decrease.

Increases in salary and salary related items, special education program expansion, building improvement, state hot lunch transfers, personal property payback, utilities and purchase of a new bus make up about 80 percent of the total increase.

The public budget hearing will be at 7:30 p.m. on Aug. 15 in the elementary school library.

Webber participates in math camp at CSC

Steve Webber of Wayne was among the 30 participants at the Math Appreciation Camp held at Chadron State College Aug. 1-3.

The camp was sponsored by the Nebraska Association of Teachers of Mathematics, and was designed for students who are motivated and enthused about math. This marks the fourth year the camp has been held.

Four master teachers, assisted by four math majors at Chadron State, served as the instructors. Marie Smith, professor emerita at Chadron State, helped coordinate the camp.

All the students completed seventh grade this year. Each was chosen on the recommendation of his or her math teacher.

The students, divided into four groups, studied a variety of math during the daily sessions. Included were geometry by making original string art projects and pentomino puzzles, which allowed them a variety of choices in problem solving.

Also featured were probability and statistics, which is math taught through a variety of games and cards, and the math pentathlon involving problem solving through group cooperation.

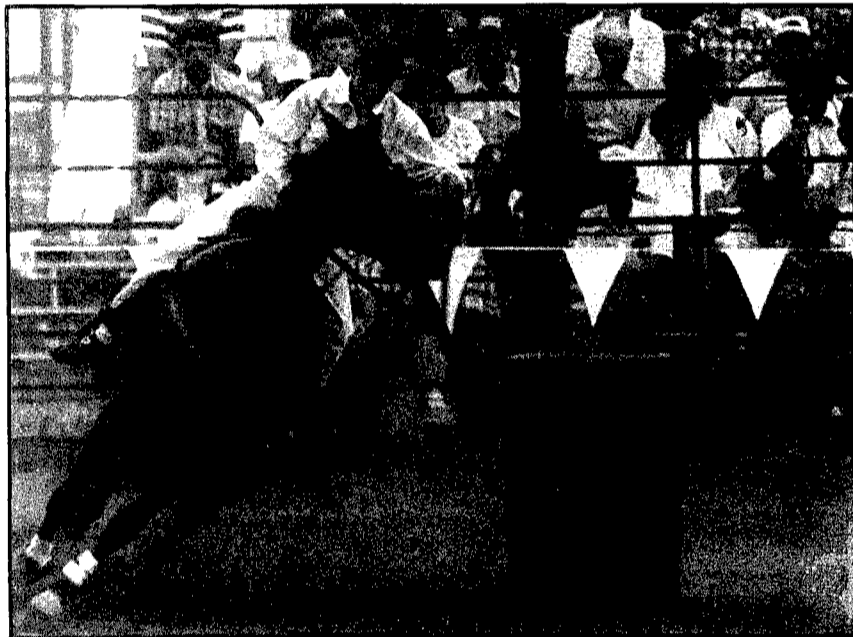

## Viewpoint

### Enclosing facility looks like only feasible solution

The importance of the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Facility has been cause for debate since it first opened. Today, that debate is continuing.

It could be said that it is important to Wayne County taxpayers because of the funds it brings in from the 20-plus counties and the two reservations which house youngsters there, not to mention the state and federal dollars which are used to support it. It could also be argued that the facility is a threat to the community, and on occasion, a public menace.

While there have been a limited number of escapes, about 1 percent of the 1,000-plus youth the facility has housed, the fact the majority of the escapes have occurred due to breakouts does create reason for concern. The two most recent escapes involving four juveniles underline the problem: Had the youth been slowed by whatever means, would they have ultimately escaped? Probably not.

We must see that the facility be enclosed by a 12-foot tall fence lined with razor wire around its rim. Sure, kids may be able to break out the windows if they try hard enough, but having a fence slow them down should give the authorities the time they need to stop escaping juveniles from ultimately getting away so long as appropriate security precautions are observed.

Because of the protective laws surrounding juveniles, law enforcement has limited options once any escapees are caught. Enclosing the facility now has become the only viable option. The community's trust is wearing thin. If a solution cannot be found quickly, our next choice will be shut the facility down.

This is the only way we have of taking the law into our own hands. Let's not waste the opportunity.

### Another pat on the back to Wayne County Fair officials

It's amazing how well put together the Wayne County Fair was this year. Fair Board officials really had everything together and it was thanks to their efforts that this year's fair was among the best-attended ever.

The fair board has been open-minded in their approach to offering total family entertainment and it shows as attendance at the fair seems to grow even bigger each year. That's good because the fair is one of the best ways we have of promoting the family atmosphere of our county.

In the next 12 months, the Wayne County Fair Board will be hard at it again, preparing for the annual event in 1992; an event we are certain will be as well received as this year's.

Again, we salute the Wayne County Fair Board, the families who take such an active role in the fair activities and the Wayne County Extension office, which helps coordinate all the 4-H activities. It was a job well-done.

### Public should take active role in seeing contract drawn up

We need to take an active role to insure that a contract between the City of Wayne and Wayne beautician Hazel Mau is drawn up.

It was the city council's decision that Mau should have a contract for however long she wants to remain at her location in the northeast corner of the city auditorium — a site she has had for 15 years. If the city doesn't move on the matter quickly, then the public should start to wonder.

Mau was threatened to be forced out of her present location under the proposed 1991-92 budget. Thanks to public sentiment and support, her shop was saved. Because of the council's action, it became apparent that this time the cart was in control of the horse, which hasn't always been the case.

We are concerned by the apparent shoddy treatment Mau received by certain city officials. On her own accord, she has done nothing wrong during her tenure at the site and she deserves to have some protection. It was wrong of a few city officials to believe that she could be forced out.

If a contract isn't drawn up quickly, it should leave the public wondering whether the city government is trying to forget the matter and sweep it under the carpet. If a contract is drawn up quickly, although one wasn't done a week after the meeting, then Wayne residents can feel a little more comfortable that the city does care about its citizens.

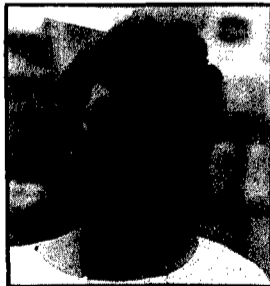
The reins are there. How the city uses them will answer some of the public's questions.

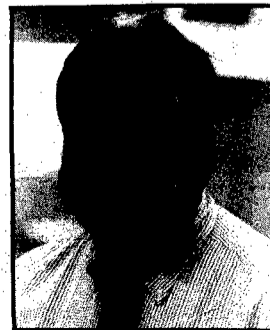

### Security concerns

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following letter to the editor was submitted as a letter of resignation to Dee Gable, supervisor at the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Center, and the Wayne County Commissioners. It is reprinted with permission of its author.

I, Patty Lamb, was forced to quit the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Center due to the fact that juveniles are left in non-secure (housing), during the midnight to eight shift when only one person is left in attendance. No matter their age, size, or previous record before coming to the center we are still left all alone each night. Such as the last midnight I was working, there were three male juveniles in non-secure, a 14 year old, a 16 year old and a 17 year old. At 0145, the 17 year old walked into the office area several times, the last time he came in, he repeatedly asked me to lie on the floor so he could tie me up. I refused several times, each time I refused he became more verbally aggressive (during this time he was holding a towel bar in his right hand smacking into my left hand). He advanced toward me hitting his left hand harder with the towel bar angrily telling me "LIE ON THE FLOOR!" He wanted to escape and he wanted it to look like there was a struggle so he would have additional charges, thinking he wouldn't be sent back to Grayhill. He planned on tying me up with the cord off the typewriter in housing. I kept refusing to let him tie me up for fear of what he might do to me after he did. He kept saying he wanted to make it look like I put up a fight. I was afraid after he tied me up he'd hit me with the bar a few times to make it more convincing. I was so scared it was becoming hard for me to talk with the trembling. He, at this point, said he was going to lock me in the solitary cell.

That I agreed to. I knew he was leaving, no matter what. After putting me in solitary, he went through my purse, took my money and my car keys. He also took the account sheets money and his street clothes.

I talked with Sheriff Janssen about getting two people to work the midnight shift or have all juveniles locked up from lights out to 0800 when more people are on duty. He said no to both ideas. I was forced to quit because of my fear and my husband's fear for me during these shifts, as Dee told me the next day, they didn't need anyone that refused to work midnights. I wasn't allowed to finish out the rest of the month unless I worked my midnight shifts.

This is so unfair of them to force us to work alone. We're just women. I'm 5'2" and weigh 110 lbs. How am I, and I alone, supposed to handle a male 17 years old who weighs in at least 170 lbs.? Or three males at once, if all three were to be in on it. Anything could happen and I'm left powerless to protect myself, call for help or get to a phone. They even refused to look into an inexpensive remote device that we could conceal on our person and in a dangerous situation summon help. This would certainly be better than nothing. At least we'd feel safer.

Why are these unsafe conditions allowed? Why isn't the county willing to help insure it's employees' safety? Not only the employees, but the community's as well. That night, for some reason, he was unable to take my car, maybe because of all the keys I have on my key ring and the fact that my

car was locked. The other car in the parking lot, belonging to a resident across the street, was left unlocked and a set of keys were in it that were for something else other than the car. The youth was unable to start the other car and was apprehended in the parking lot by Sheriff Janssen. He had been called from a cell by another juvenile awakened by my summoning from solitary. Sheriff Janssen called the police department before leaving home. The police arrived before Sheriff Janssen, walking past the escapee, and releasing me from solitary. Sheriff Janssen recognized the youth and blocked the resident's car with his vehicle.

Another concern is that knives are left in an unlocked drawer in the front office where all juveniles can see and have easy access to. (The escaped juvenile, name removed by The Wayne Herald) had been there for eight days. He knew how things worked around the center. He could have been holding a knife instead of a towel bar. Finally, the juveniles know that there is just one person working the midnight shift. Even the juveniles say "it's stupid for just one person to be there."

Why can't there be two employees for the times there are youths being kept in non-secure, this way there wouldn't be double shifting every night. Dee Gable shot down this idea because she said the county wouldn't go for it. I can't go for working alone on a shift that has no security or for a facility that doesn't hold its employees' safety to be important enough to help insure it. Therefore, I am forced to resign my position as jailer of the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Center.

I can only hope for the sake of future and fellow employees of the detention center that some sort of action is taken. It is just a matter of time before someone is seriously hurt or, perhaps, killed.

North Platte St. Pat's will visit Wayne on Sept. 13 before Wayne hits the road for a four game stand at Grand Island Central Catholic, David City Aquinas, West Point and O'Neill respectively before closing out the schedule with three home games in Tekamah-Herman, Hartington Cedar Catholic and Pierce in order. The regular season will end on Nov. 1.

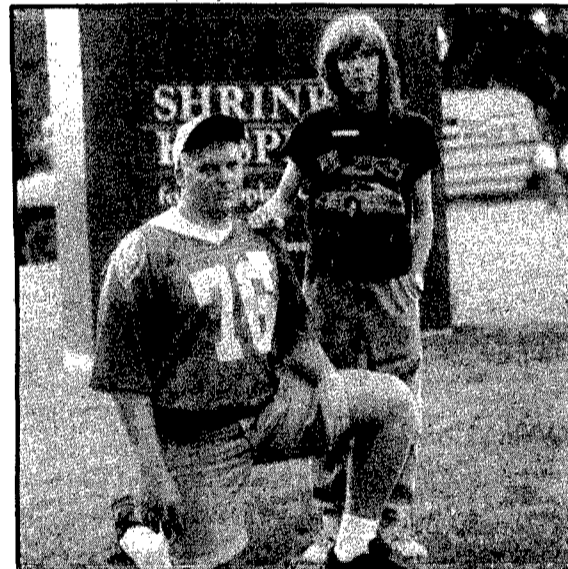
Wayne will begin practice on Monday, Aug. 19 but the players will report next Monday for testing according to Wayne coach Lonnie Ehrhardt. "We will be testing the players on physical fitness and conditioning," Ehrhardt said. "Everyone will be tested in the 40-yard dash, the seated shot put and the 300 meter shuttle run."

Ehrhardt also said that during all of next week in the weight room athletes will be tested there as well. "We will test everyone in the bench press, vertical jump and the agility run," Ehrhardt said. "We will use part of that testing as our lift-a-thon in which we try to raise money to help defray some of the cost of chartering a bus to Grand Island for our game on Sept. 20. Athletes will look to get pledges for so much a pound lifted." The Booster Club is also contributing to the cost as well as each of the players.

The Wayne team will attend a University of Nebraska football game this season but at press time which game they would be attending had not been determined. Also, they will be attending either a Kansas City Chiefs game or a Minnesota Vikings sometime after the season is completed.

"We've had a real good summer as far as weight lifting is concerned," Ehrhardt said. "I would like to take this time to encourage guys who haven't lifted a lot this summer to come out for football anyway because there will be a big opportunity for a lot of people due to the fact we lost a lot due to graduation last spring."

Kennedy totalled 41 tackles before being sidelined with a knee injury, while Fleming had 18 stops in seven games. Redshirt freshman Jeff Lutt (6-4, 230, Wayne) and sophomore Jim Scott (5-11, 205, Randolph) will battle for starting spots during camp.

Brad Ottis (6-4, 230, Fremont), John Lanier (6-2, 250, Indianapo-

lis), Adam Boryca (6-3, 225, Fullerton), and Scott Vokoun (6-3, 230, Sr., Grand Island) give the 'Cats a proven defensive line. Ottis has impressed WSC coaches with his work in the spring, and much is expected of redshirt freshman Mike Einspahr (6-4, 240, Lincoln).

All-State picks Joel Ott (5-11, 180, Beemer) and Terry Bear (5-10, 180, Tulare, CA), patrol a secondary that includes returning starters Todd Alberti (5-10, 180, Tulare, CA) and Chris Nelson (5-10, 180, Fairfield, CA). California's junior college 100-meter dash champion Rick Starling (5-10, 185, Miami, FL) joins the secondary from Imperial Valley J.C. Senior Mike Thorrell (6-1, 180, Wausa), sophomore Troy Carmichael (5-11, 185, Madison), and redshirt freshman Sean Francisco (5-9, 175, Lincoln) add depth.

The Cats' begin the most difficult schedule in school history August 31 at Missouri Western. "The first game is always the most important," Wagner said. "We finished last year on a positive note (three straight wins), and we hope to build on the foundation we started.

"It's going to be a difficult task, but we hope the 93 kids reporting to camp are in good physical shape so we can begin the mental preparation necessary to handle the schedule that lies ahead."

## Jason Ehrhardt is tabbed with all-American honors

Former Wayne wrestling stand out Jason Ehrhardt added one more honor to his long list of achievements to round out his high school career last week, as he achieved All-American status for placing eighth in the Junior National Wrestling Tournament which was held July 28-Aug. 3 at Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, Mo.

A total of 991 wrestlers took part in the national wrestling tournament representing 46 states. The top eight wrestlers in each weight class earned all-American honors and Ehrhardt was one of two Nebraskans to earn the status. Clinton Childs of Omaha North placed fifth. Ehrhardt and Childs are the first two to be named all-American since 1987.

"There were 16 mats of wrestling going on all the time," Ehrhardt's father Lonnie said. "It was just unreal. It's the largest high school wrestling tournament in the United States."

Ehrhardt came back strong however by pinning Brian Kurek of Maryland in just 63 seconds. In a most interesting match with Eric Hedin of North Carolina, Ehrhardt won by disqualification. It seemed Jason was ahead 9-0 over Hedin with the opponent lost his temper and was disqualified. "That was the first time that Eric Hedin had been beaten this year," Ehrhardt said.

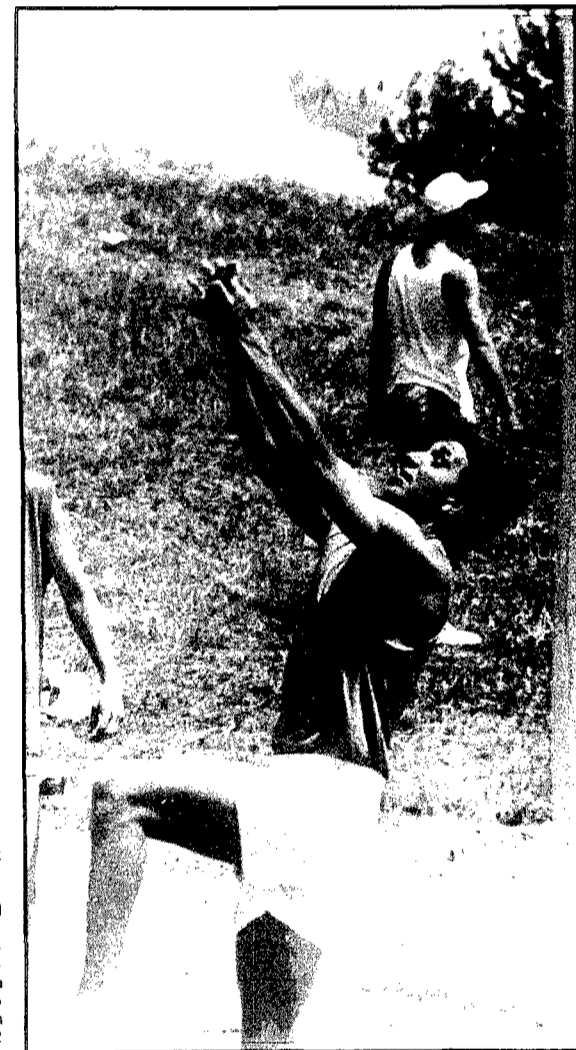

# Group selects firms

Peoples' Natural Gas Company Rate Area Two Executive Committee selected the firms of Harding and Ogborn of Lincoln and GDS Associates of Austin, Texas to analyze the proposed natural gas general rate increase being filed on Aug. 1. Wakefield, Wayne, Jackson and Emerson are members of Rate Area Two.

"After reviewing proposals from nine different consultants — rate analysts, legal counsels and a hearing officer — the executive committee authorized me to negotiate a contract with Harding and Ogborn and GDS Associates," said Jim Anderson, chairperson of the executive committee. "The special legal counsel and rate consultant were selected, in part, because of their handling of the Nucor Steel vs. NPPD rate cases." According to the League of Nebraska Municipalities, the consultants selected prevailed in a court case resulting in an award to Nucor of over \$4.4 million because of excessive utility charges and the consultants continue to be utilized by Nucor in additional court cases involving later rate periods.

"Consumers will not see an immediate change in their natural gas bills," said Bob Harris, director of the state's Energy Office. "State law does not allow for a natural gas utility to begin charging the proposed rates until November. Because of the time it takes to analyze the filing, the towns will not be able to take action — approving the proposed rates or authorizing a different rate — until about mid-January." According to Peoples' Natural Gas, customers will be informed of the details of the increase in their August billings.

The Executive Committee after selecting the two consultants, authorized the chairman to negotiate a contract not to exceed \$82,000. Ultimately, the costs paid by ratepayers will be determined by the actual cost of regulation and a ratepayer's natural gas use.

The Energy Office said that the way rate analysis costs are paid was changed with the passage of the Municipal Natural Gas Regulation Act in 1986. In contrast to the former practice under which only the towns which contracted for an analysis paid the costs of regulation from general funds, all costs and benefits of the rate analysis are now shared by all affected ratepayers.



## The GOLDEN YEARS by George Delacorte

Dealing with health insurance paperwork is an annoying "side effect" for elderly people when they consult a doctor. But Federal law has brought some relief: Claims for Medicare reimbursements now must be filed by the doctor, not the patient. This applies whether or not a physician accepts reimbursement levels set by Medicare. After a claim is processed, the patient receives by mail a form called "Explanation of Medicare Benefits" which tells how much Medicare has paid for the claim and how much is the patient's responsibility. Many people carry other health insurance to supplement Medicare. For some, the next step is to send a copy of the Medicare Explanation of Benefits to the supplemental insurer in order to collect whatever additional payment the supplemental policy provides. It's wise to keep records of each doctor bill and the status of reimbursement by Medicare and supplemental insurance.

George Delacorte made a fortune as founder of Dell Publishing and gave away millions for cultural and beautification projects. He gave up tennis at 91, but continued golfing until he died at 97 this year. He liked to tell how he wooed his second wife at their first meeting, three years after his first wife died in 1956. 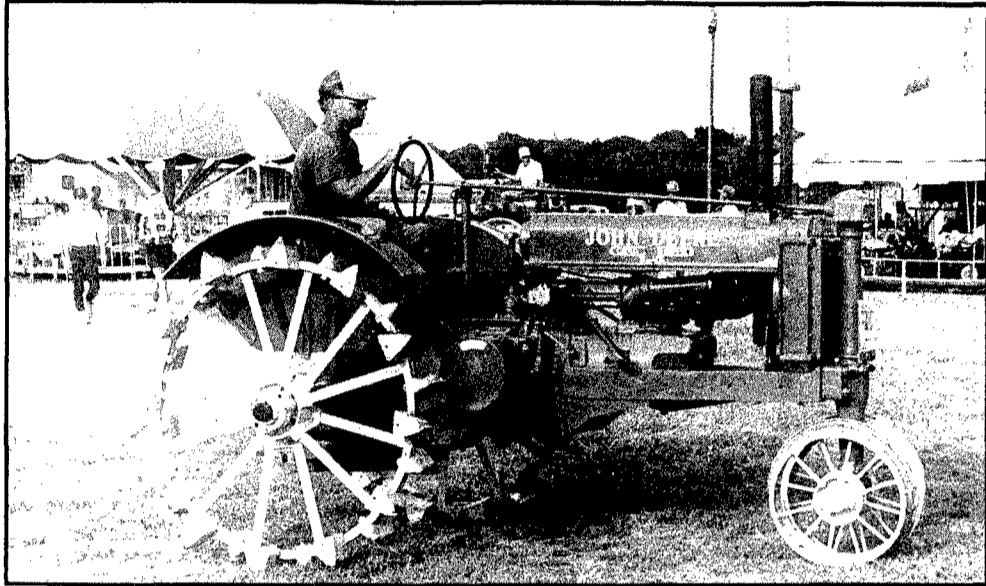

## Farm families honored

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following article has been provided to the Wayne Herald from notes compiled by the Wayne County Fair Secretary Leland Herman. The information is about 100 year farm families honored by Ak-Sar-Ben.

Lloyd and Vivienne Hugelmann are the present owners and residents of the farm which was purchased by Lloyd's maternal grandfather, E.E. Driskell on Sept. 28, 1882. Lloyd's father William Hugelmann started farming in 1905 and was married to Fannie Driskell in 1906. Lloyd started farming in 1926.

Driskell Farms was purchased by E.E. Driskell in 1882 where he lived until his death in 1919. His grandson William O. (Buck) Driskell moved there with his bride Dorothy Sar in 1940, where they lived until Buck's death in 1988. Their son Richard and his wife Sandy and their children Dester and Desiree are the present residents.

Levi Thompson is the present owner of the farm which was purchased by his maternal grandfather Samuel Barnes on Sept. 27, 1885. Levi maintains a life estate in the farm which he has conveyed to the Nebraska Game and Parks Foundation. The farm is known as the Thompson-Barnes Wildlife Management Area.

Woods home place is currently owned and operated by Bob Kenney. It was purchased Sept. 7, 1889 for \$10 an acre by Thomas M. Woods. It was sold to Eldon Woods in 1953 and the Merlin and Margaret Woods Kenney in 1970 and to Robert Kenney in 1990.

The Arthur P. Ulrich Farm was purchased Aug. 26, 1889 by Peter Ulrich Sr. for \$1,600. He gave the farm to Fred Ulrich on Aug. 5, 1907. Fred started an evergreen grove for a building site that is a landmark in the area today.

Kenneth Frevert Farm was originally acquired by Cyrus Curtis of New York City by patent on Oct. 1, 1870. Herman Frevert, grandfather of Kenneth, purchased it from the heirs on Feb. 15, 1890 for \$15 an acre. Kenneth and Darlene Frevert are the present owners.

Howell Rees left his native country of Wales in 1879 for America but worked his way west gradually, stopping in Montgomery County, Iowa for 12 years before continuing on to Carroll, where he purchased 160 acres for \$2,240. His grandson Howard and Dorothy Rees are the present owners.

Alfred Haglund and his wife Charlotte were natives of Sweden and came from Illinois in March 1891. His daughter Lydia married Ezra Boeckenhaur and they moved to the present day farm in 1934. Their son Robert purchased it in 1967. Maurice purchased it in

1978. Maurice and his wife Dee are the present owners.

The Reilman Homestead was purchased March 1, 1891 by Henry Reilman. The farm was passed on to daughter Amelia and her husband Charles Temme in 1917. The farm then was passed on to their son Herbert and his wife Margaret. Alvin Temme was the receiver of the 1991 award for the farm.

Ruth Boeckenhaur's grandparents were born in Sweden and came to the United States in 1868, where they lived in Illinois before coming to Nebraska to purchase the farm Feb. 4, 1891. 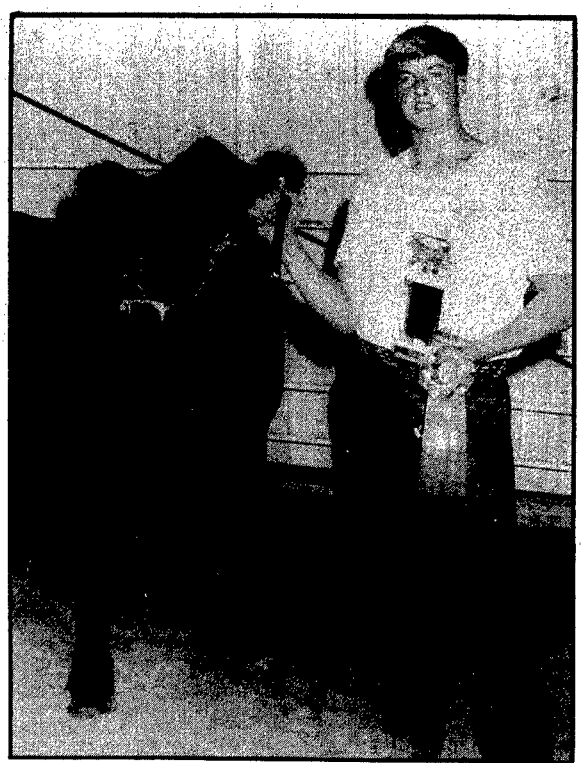

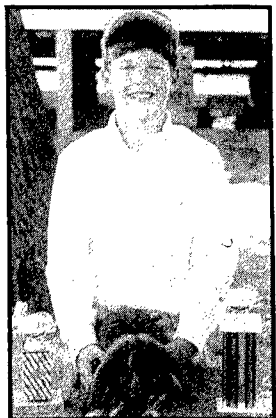

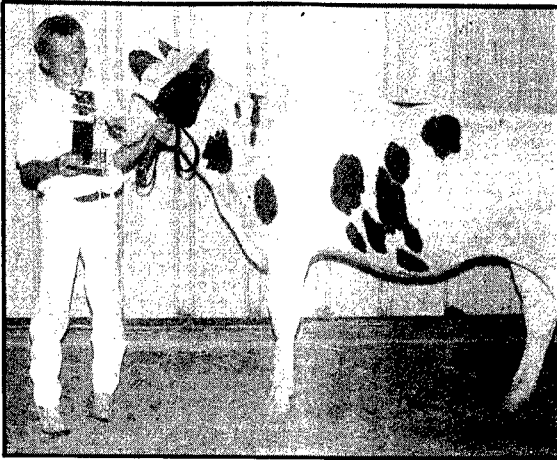

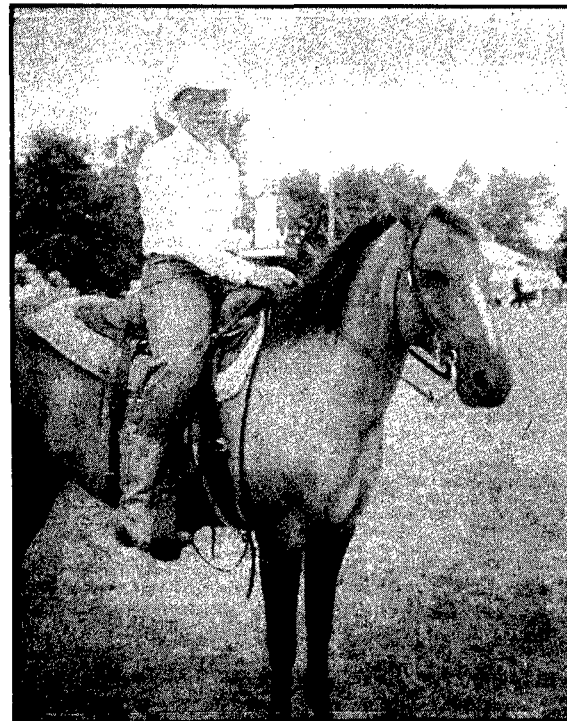

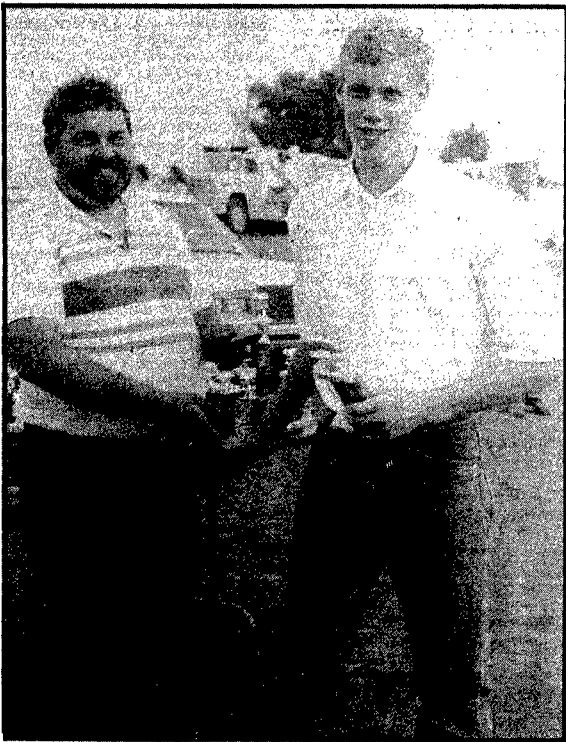

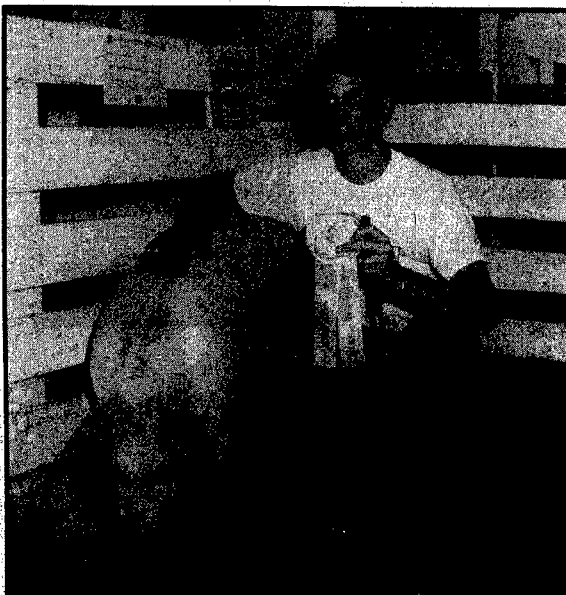
Brester was the winner in the six year old division, finishing ahead of second place finisher Joshua Harmeier and third place finisher Ryan Shurman.

## Economist: More rulings needed

The Nebraska Legislature's unsuccessful attempt to amend the state's property tax dilemma has left tax policy in the hands of the Supreme Court, and the sooner the court rules, the better, according to a University of Nebraska-Lincoln agricultural economist.

Roy Frederick, UNL economist-public policy, said that until the court rules on 1991 personal property tax exemptions and a new law intended to generate revenues from other sources, Nebraskans will have to wait.

After the decision, "we will have an idea of where we are going with respect to tax policy in this state," he said. "In the meantime, there's great uncertainty."

During the early 1970s, Frederick said, about 22 percent of the Nebraska property tax base came from personal property, including agriculture machinery, farm and business inventories, livestock and business equipment.

By 1990, exemptions had reduced that amount to 8 percent, with the remaining revenue coming from real estate taxes.

A March 1 Supreme Court decision calling for taxation in a "uniform and proportionate manner" brought those exemptions into question and convinced the Legislature to remove all personal property from the tax rolls for 1991.

To make up for the estimated \$100 million tax shortfall, the Legislature approved a package of other revenue enhancers in the form of LB829, which included a surtax on depreciation credits, a sales tax on energy to commercial users and other taxes.

But the Supreme Court, in another ruling July 10 on equity in personal property taxes, said that all personal property should be placed back on the tax rolls. That ruling addressed only 1990's exemptions, not the plan for 1991.

"Thus, the real question for this

tax year is whether LB829 is constitutional," Frederick said. "Some people believe it is; that is, if you take all personal property taxes off, you are in good shape. The opposite view is that you're in trouble as long as real estate is taxed but personal property is totally exempt."

Under LB829, he said, all personal property that was taxed in 1990 will be taxed again in 1992, unless the Legislature takes action to exempt it or a ballot issue is proposed.

If the court rules that LB829 is unconstitutional, Frederick said, a voter-approved constitutional amendment may be necessary to allow any future exemptions.

"Perhaps the real frustration with what's been happening is the sheer difficulty, indeed impossibility, of designing a totally fair property tax system," he said. "It's no wonder that the Legislature really wrestles with the issue from a fairness standpoint."

In the grape competition, Clyde Fields of Tilden won grand champion and reserve champion honors for his entries. Fields took grand champion honors with his petit sirah entry and reserve honors for a zinfandel entry.

In the special awards category, Harvey Brasch of Wayne won grand champion honors for his choke cherry entry. Bob Leonard of Emerson won reserve honors for his black raspberry entry.

In the sweet fruit competition, Leonard was the top winner with his black raspberry entry and Fields took

the second highest honors with a kiwi entry.

Bruce Trindle of Norfolk won top honors for dry fruit wine with a red raspberry entry. In the sweet red grape, Keith Jech of Wayne was first and Leonard was second for his concord grape entry.

Fields took the first and second place honors for dry red grape entries with the petit sirah and the zinfandel entries.

Roberta Carman won the grape category with a dry white wine and in the sweet vegetable competition, Fields again took both first and second place

with a malted rhubarb and a golden dream.

Carman also took top honors for her dry vegetable rhubarb entry.

In the sweet wild fruit competition, Harvey Brasch of Wayne took top honors with a choke cherry entry. Leonard was second with his mulberry entry.

In the dry wild fruit competition, Fields took first place with a wild country choke berry entry. Keith Jech was second with an elderberry entry.

Leonard finished out the wine competition with the most unusual entry winner, a wine with a concord grape dill flavor.

## When in drought, wean calves early

**CONCORD - Weaning beef calves early is a management practice that should be considered under situation such as fall calving, drylot cow-calf production and drought, according to a University of Nebraska beef specialist.**

"In areas where forage quality is very poor during late summer and early fall, early weaning might also be considered as a regular practice," said Terry Mader, member of the NU Northeast research and Extension Center staff.

He adds that early weaning also can enhance efficiency of drylot cow-calf operations by allowing greater use of poor quality roughages by the cow herd.

According to Mader, weaning calves early from 2-year-old heifers can reduce their stress during nursing and raising a calf. As a result, the heifers should recycle,

breed back early and grow more rapidly.

"For heifers bred for higher milk production, early weaning takes on greater importance," Mader said.

Calves to be weaned early should be creep-fed a palatable ration for as long as 20 to 30 days before weaning. After weaning, calves should be fed a starter ration high in protein and moderate in energy, he said. When all the calves are eating well, they can be continued on a complete ration or a grain-supplement mix and hay designed for the rate of gain desired.

If a grain-supplement mix following the starter ration is preferred, feed hay to appetite and gradually increase grain and supplement to a level that will produce the desired growth without fattening. Mader said "it is generally recommended to feed a minimum of a half pound of long grass hay per head daily in addition to the complete ration."

Local extension agents can provide additional information on early weaning management and a publication, NebGuide G83-655, "Management of Early Weaned Calves."

I played for a wedding this weekend. Red has been a very popular color for bridesmaids the past year or so and there have even been a few black ones. It's evidence of how brides are choosing what they like, not just what is

considered traditional. This one gave us all a chuckle as the aisle runner was unrolled. The word, HELP, was printed in big red letters at the end. In spite of that message, Ken appeared willing and eager to fall into the "marriage trap".

I should tell you a little more about the couple who picked us up on the Interstate last weekend. They are from California and are moving to Florida. They were staying in Kansas City and driving to the town at the exit we were headed for to have dinner with friends.

When we got to a pay phone, I called for a tow and they called the friends to explain why they were late. The friend apologized for sending them on the 435 bypass, saying she could have sent them on a shorter route.

The couple works for Campus Crusade. The friend is a Baptist minister. The driver decided it was no mistake that they were on that highway at that particular time. Another proof that "things happen the way they're supposed to happen", whether we believe it is by "divine appointment" or not. I heard Pastor Lee telling the bride and groom this on Friday night at rehearsal. We can plan for weddings, and moves, and life itself, as carefully as possible. But "life is what happens, when we were making other plans." The trick is to be flexible enough to savor it, even as our plans go askew.

Time is ripe for scouting fields

Corn producers should start scouting their fields for European corn borer moths and eggs to determine if control of the second generation is necessary, according to a University of Nebraska-Lincoln entomologist.

Bob Wright, integrated pest management specialist-field crops, said the corn borer moths have begun to emerge and lay eggs in much of the state.

Using 30-year average weather data for Dixon County, Wright said, a computer program predicted the percentage of completed egg-laying in selected areas by the following dates: July 25 — 5 percent; July 28 — 25 percent; Aug. 1 — 50 percent; Aug. 8 — 75 percent; Sept. 1 — 95 percent.

According to the report, the predictions are based on less than 50 borers collected during the first generation and are somewhat less reliable than the other predictions.

Because the predictions are

based on average weather data, Wright said, weather conditions that differ greatly from the average could cause changes in egg-laying dates. Field tests have shown that the predicted dates for 25 percent to 50 percent of egg-laying tended to be two to three days ahead of field occurrence.

Wright said fields that have green silks and are shedding pollen during the peak moth flight are most susceptible to attacks from second generation borers.

The masses of five to 40 white, flat eggs usually appear on the underside of the leaf, near the midrib, on the ear leaf or on the three leaves above or below the ear leaf. The eggs, which overlap each other like fish scales, may show black spots for about 24 hours before the eggs hatch. The spots are the heads of the developing caterpillars.

Borer infestations are most

damaging when borers enter the stalk early in the reproductive cycle of corn, Wright said, so growers have just a short time to effectively control them between first egg hatch and the start of tunneling activity.

To determine if control is necessary, Wright said, growers should examine 25 plants at four sites per field and record the number of egg masses and the number of plants sampled. Scouting efforts should be targeted for the dates from 25 percent to 50 percent of predicted egg-laying and should be repeated every three to five days.

Growers then may calculate the possible field damage from the borers, he said, by using a worksheet available in the NU Cooperative Extension publication EC 91-1509, "Insect Management Guide for Corn and Sorghum." Copies can be obtained at local extension offices.

If treatment is needed, Wright said, insecticide applications should be timed to coincide with the beginning of egg hatch.

Although both granular and liquid formulations of the same insecticides are effective, he said, liquid formulations are preferred when other insects are present or the number of corn borer moths is high.

As the plant matures beyond the blister stage, Wright said, the economic benefits of applying insecticides rapidly decline.

Wright warned that growers also should be alert to the possibility of spider mite buildup after insecticide applications. If mites are expected to be a problem, he said, insecticides such as Dipel for corn borer control are least likely to cause mite buildup, while Furadan, Counter and Lorsban have only a slight tendency to cause buildup.

Irrigators: keep systems on

The passage of a cold front last week let many Nebraska growers catch up on crop irrigation, but members of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Agriculture Climate Situation Committee warned Monday that it's not yet time to turn off the systems.

Delynn Hay, UNL water resources and irrigation specialist, said the inconsistent weather makes irrigation scheduling difficult, but growers should plan to keep systems operating.

"The weeks ahead could be

critical for adequate moisture levels," Hay said.

Last week's reports of early and late planted corn from sites throughout Nebraska showed that most fields were in the blister or dough stages.

A University NebGuide recommends 1 1/2 inches of moisture are necessary for corn from blister stage through maturity and 7 1/2 inches from dough stage through maturity. This NebGuide G82-602, titled "Predicting the Last Irrigation for Corn, Grain Sorghum and Soy-

beans," is available at local extension offices.

Much-needed rain fell Sunday and Monday on one drought-stricken area of the state. For the 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. Monday, a station in Fairbury reported 1.42 inches of precipitation. Since April 1, Fairbury had received just 45 percent of normal precipitation.

Committee members said the rain probably was welcomed by area growers but may have been too late to save crops suffering from severe moisture stress.

The Principal's Office

Experts suggest that back-to-school shopping and allowances are two of the best means of teaching your school-age kids how to handle money.

Begin shopping with a list of needed items. Have your child help make up the list with you. Then set priorities by ranking the items in groups by importance, from the most to the least necessary. Should you wait until later to get some items — say, until they are requested from school?

Explain that you must plan carefully — or else you might run out of money before you have bought all that you need. Go into details about all the alternatives. Is it wise to purchase several dozen pencils, folders and rulers because they are cheap, or to buy fewer things in variety, some of which are more expensive — like a ring binder, filler paper, scissors and a pen? Will buying one thing keep you from buying something else?

When shopping you might let your child handle money long enough to give it to the sales clerk. This builds a little self-confidence.

After you get home, ask your child to evaluate the purchases. For instance, you might say, "Would you buy that large box of crayons again? Do those scissors work as well as you thought they would?"

ALLOWANCES work much the same way, showing kids how to plan their spending with care, and to spend within limits. Yet younger children should not be rushed: "Until she's five or six, a child is unable to understand concepts relating to money," says Eugene Kornhaber, M.D., a child psychologist. Kornhaber says the younger kids can be paid smaller sums — like a dime — for special tasks, such as cleaning their room or watering

plants. Unless the concept is well understood, however, experts say it's best to start providing an allowance no earlier than age 6 to 8.

How much should you give them? It depends upon the family's needs and the child's. Openly discuss the size of the allowance, and clearly explain that there are limitations within all families. Talk about how the allowance money should be used.

Should you ever give an advance on an allowance? Experts say no. Your firm refusal shows that the limitations are real, and that

the child must live within her means. Furthermore, children on allowances should not be rewarded extra for doing routine household chores, like cleaning their room. This, after all, is just a part of family membership, and the family is more important than money.

Along those same lines, it is not wise in the long-run to withhold an allowance for specific misdeeds or failures. Economists say this teaches that money is a weapon — a lesson that too many people carry into marriages, with unhappy results.

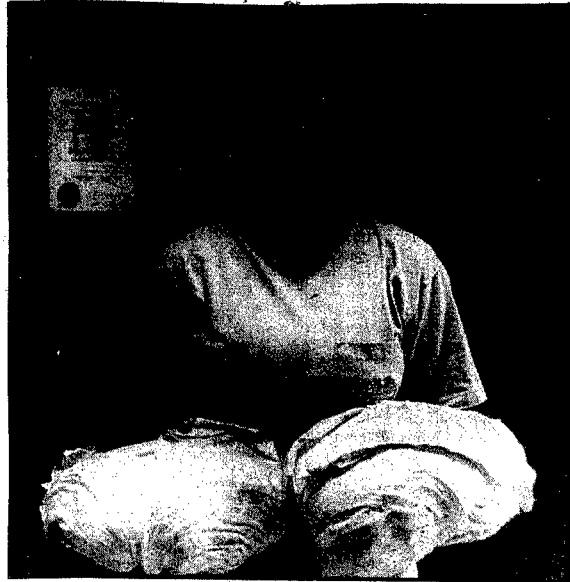

In addition to the certificate, Schwarten received a 25-year pin. She began working at the Wakefield Post Office in April 1966 as a replacement clerk under Postmaster Raymond Paulson. She was later made a part-time flex clerk and in January 1986 became a full-time rural carrier out of the Wisner Post Office. She transferred to Wakefield's Route 2 in March 1989 when Alfred Benson retired.

**FIVE DON'TS FOR FOLKS OVER 50:** The Johns Hopkins medical letter — Health After 50, offers these important health warnings:

1. Don't take laxatives. The Johns Hopkins publication cites advice from the National Institute on Aging which reports that all types of laxatives can cause unpleasant side effects ranging from irritation of the digestive tract to bloating. Laxatives can also cause interference with the absorption of vitamins and minerals and are potentially habit forming. Instead of laxatives, eat a diet higher in fiber (include fruits, vegetables, grains), and drink at least eight glasses of water a day. This high fiber diet may also protect you from colon cancer.

2. Don't treat osteoarthritis (OA) with diet. Remember that we don't yet know what causes OA, or how to cure it. (Despite any claims you may have read, no cure has been found.) Diseases such as OA attract all sorts of quacks peddling everything from bee venom to cod liver oil. Persons with osteoarthritis who are overweight often benefit from losing the extra poundage and keeping it off. This helps reduce pressure on painful joints.

3. Don't go to walk-in laser clinics for hemorrhoid treatment. Laser therapy for the condition, despite claims for quicker service, less pain, reduced recuperation time, and lower cost, certainly seem scientifically advanced. However laser therapy, says the Johns Hopkins letter, is not a miracle cure, nor can it be used by everyone. Also, contrary to what the ads promise, laser therapy may not necessarily be pain free. Johns Hopkins advises, if you believe laser therapy is for you, get a second opinion from a doctor with no vested interest in a laser therapy clinic before you decide to have the treatment.

4. Don't take minoxidil for baldness. Although clinical trials indicate regular use of the drug (brand name Rogaine) does produce limited growth of new hair, the most successful beneficiaries are men under 30 whose balding has gone on for less than five years. There's also some doubt about long range safety for folks over 50. The drug was originally used to treat high blood pressure. Therefore, it could produce unwanted side effects in anyone, especially those who may have cardiovascular problems. It's also expensive — \$50 to \$100 for a month's supply.

5. Don't take fish oil supplements to prevent heart disease. Despite a successful advertising campaign (\$35 million worth of supplements were sold in 1988), "no clear benefit from eating fish oil has been established," says Dr. Myron Weisfeld, professor of cardiology at Johns Hopkins, and president of the American Heart Association. Get your fish oil from fish, not supplements — which can add calories and make some people smell like fish.
