Role of kindergarten changing

When are 4, 5 and 6-year-olds

ready to start school?
That depends on whom you ask.
According to a Nebraska law, children 5-years-old or older by Oct. 15 may begin kindergarten. But the decision of when to start a

child's formal education is ulti-mately up to the parents.

"I tell the parent that if they're uncomfortable with sending a child to school when they're five, to do what they think is best," says Wayne Elementary Principal Dave

Under the law, elementary edu-cators cannot advise parents when a child can start school. In addition, public schools cannot screen children prior to being enrolled. The law, however, does not apply to parochial schools.

MARILYN MUDGE, an interim assistant professor at Wayne State, suggests that a S-year-old is prob-ably ready for school. "A good kindergartner meets a variety of needs levels," she says.

"Kindergarten children are given a "Kindergarten children are given a lot of choices to do a lot of things. One way we know they learn is by watching others. If we give them a chance to see what others are doing, they'll try the same things." A child's education begins early in the same things. The watcher same things are the same things.

in life, Mudge says. At three months, baby squeaks are the first attempts at using language. As the child gets older, the noises and scribbles children make are their first attempts at communication. It's a simple matter of progression.

That's one reason why schools have kindergarten round-up, Ley says. During that time some children get their first exposure to school. For others, exposure begins if they're in pre-school. Both Lutt and Mudge recommend having children in a pre-school

"The big thing we see is that some children have not spent much time away from their par-ents," Lutt says. "Pre-school is an excellent way to break a child away from parents. Leaving the child with a relative or in a day care is another way. If that happens in a child's early years, they're not as likely to have that emotional breakdown their first few days of school.'

ACCORDING TO published reports, most recent reports on the status of American education calls for children to be exposed to day care and pre-school settings prior to starting kindergarten. That's one reason why the federal government has increased funds for the Head Start program. Just recently, Wayne was one of the recipients of a Head Start. Lutt says eventually, the schools will be required to

offer pre-school programs.
"By the time children go to kindergarten, it's incredible what they know," Mudge says. "They know sentence structure, they know numbers and they're aware of the tenses of verbs, although they don't always use those tenses correctly.

"There's not a kid around who can't read the word Coke or Mc-Donald's. If you give them experi-ences and talk with them about things, it helps them learn through

SOME EXAMPLES Mudge cites is by using every day experiences to enhance a child's education. For instance, you can ask the child to get out the forks for the dinner table for each person who will be eating. If there's four people eat-ing, the child will count out a fork for Mommy, Daddy, a sibling and themselves. Then you ask the child how many forks that is and the child will count them out — four. The same can be done with plates. You can ask the child what shape a plate is and the child can tell you round. The same is true with colors and textures.

In the Wayne schools, 12 to 15

youngsters' parents held them back for a year prior to starting kindergarten because the parent felt the child wasn't ready, Lutt says of data compiled over the last three years.

"I say parents should send their child to kindergarten if he or she meets the requirements," Mudge says. "Kindergarten is the place where the student gets ready for school. We have teachers who ac-

cept kids at their own levels.
...Parents need to let the child know that it's OK for them to make squiggles while other class-make squiggles while other class-mates are writing words. Schools and parents should encourage the child's growth."

Vicky Skokan is a survivor. That's because she's a

Skokan, who works in the business office at Wayne State, is one of a number of people to be featured on an upcoming program on KTIV. "Profiles in Survival" airs April 17 from 8-10 p.m. Skokan is featured because she survived a battle with cancer.
"The first words any cancer patient will tell you is 'why the hell me?" she says. "I was mad (upon learning she had cancer). All I can remember is how terrible I was to Dr. Bob. I was limp. When you learn you have cancer, you just go into shock."

Skokan had cancer of the tonsils, a rare disease for a sponsar to have Infect, her cancer was so case that

woman to have. In fact, her cancer was so rare that the physicians who treated her in Sloux City and the nose and throat specialist who visits Providence Medical Center, had never treated it before.

IT WAS NOV. 15, 1986, the night before Skokan was scheduled to go to Minneapolis, Minn. to take partin a college function. Around 3 a.m., she woke up and found that she was bleeding from the mouth. One of her tonsils had unknowingly burst and she had no idea what was wrong. She said she hadn't had any pain in her throat and at no point in her life can she

remember having tonsillitis.

A month later, she decided to see Dr. Bob Benthack, her family's physician, to have him determine what to do with a lump on her neck she had for the year previous. She was then advised to visit the ear, nose and throat specialist who visited Providence Medical Center. Less than a month later, the specialist removed her remaining tonsil and the lump in her neck.

While the lump was benign, the tonsil wasn't.
"They gave me all the hope they could but they weren't sure hope would be enough," she says.




