Senators approve districts

LINCOLN (AP) — It took a rare procedural move to round up missing senators, but lawmakers passed a measure to give Madison County a legislative district.

The measure, passed Wednesday after three of six missing legislators returned to the legislative chambers, eliminates one Northeast Nebraska district and restores Madison County to one district, as per the July 2 order of the state Supreme Court.

The 34-12 vote followed a 90-minute delay Wednesday while six missing senators were located.

After three of the six returned, Sen. Jerry Conway of Wayne withdrew his motion to compel every legislator to be present for the vote, and the Legislature reconsidered the redistricting bill that failed earlier in the day.

Gov. Ben Nelson lauded lawmakers for the extra effort and said he will sign the Madison County measure (LB7) and two related measures.

The bill would assign the District 19 number to Madison County, allowing election of a new senator this year. The primary victories of two current 19th District candidates, De Carlson of Crofton and Gus Pick of Hartington, would be nullified since they would no longer live in the district.

The measure passed with one more vote than the 33 it needed to make the measure effective immediately and have it in place before the November elections.

Sens. Carol Pirsch of Omaha, Lowell Johnson of North Bend and Rex Haberman of Imperial missed the vote. Pirsch could not be found, and Johnson was at a banquet in

In spite of damage —

Picture still positive

The state and nation are going to share in a bumper harvest this fall it was announced this week, but Wayne County farmers are not going to be contributing as much to the expected record as it had appeared they would a week ago.

Nearly one third of the county croplands were affected by the heavy wind and hail early Monday morning according to statistics released by the local and state agricultural stabilization and conservation service.

Level of crop damage ranged

from 100 percent loss to as little as 10 percent in the affected areas, said Terri Post, Wayne County ASCS director.

The Wayne County report was the first to be received in the state ASCS office following the storm, but that does not mean there wasn't extensive damage in neighboring counties as well, said Joyce Pope at the state office in Lincoln.

She said she has heard of other isolated reports of hail and storm losses but that it does not appear that the damage will be extensive enough to set wheels of government aid in motion.

Disaster declarations require 30 percent of a total crop to be destroyed in an area larger than a single county, said Mrs. Pope, before

aid applications will be filed.

In spite of the reports of damage, she said the state crop picture still looks pretty positive.

Ag extension agent Rod Patent said he would agree, that the area crop picture is still positive in the regions he has seen.

"Crop condition and yield potential look great," he said even though the recent cool weather have everyone feeling a little nervous. He estimated over 70 percent of the crops in Wayne County are covered by federal crop and hail insurance and that should lessen the negative impact of Monday's storm somewhat.

But he added some of the damaged corn he saw will have to be cut for silage because of the severity of the hail damage.

Schools ready for students to come back

Wayne-Carroll Community Schools will be ready when students return to classes in less than two weeks according to new superintendent, Dr. Dennis Jensen. Classes resume at 8:30 a.m., Wednesday, Aug. 26.

Besides a new school superintendent, students will return to spruced up buildings but few curriculum and rule changes said Jensen.

New lighting and new ceilings will make the elementary building brighter and a newly repaired boiler should keep the building warm at better efficiency he said.

MOST OF THE elementary school work is being funded by energy grants from the state and federal governments.

This week crews are finishing painting and tuckpointing work on the Middle School building that will enhance its appearance and help control weathering.

Middle school students will also be the first in the district to have access to a computer modem that will connect them to a vast worldwide information network through Wayne State College's computer system. Besides on-line research, the new middle school computer equipment will introduce students to computer assisted drafting in industrial technologies and home economics classes.

OTHER COMPUTER upgrades in the entire district will be introduced throughout the coming year and in future years, promised Jensen. He is a strong proponent of new learning technologies.

A new roof has been installed on the high school gym following last June's storm which removed parts of the old roof. Work is still being done on the gym floor, which was damaged when the roofing departed.

The gym floor work will force the high school volleyball team to begin practice at Winside High School. The team will also use facilities at Wayne State until the floor is ready.

The Carroll school is getting new windows, major weatherization work on its south side and new paint in the gym this summer.

REGULAR BUS schedule will begin Aug. 26 on the regular routes. Bus students will be receiving a schedule in the mail, prior to opening day, that will allow them to anticipate the arrival of the bus near their home. Buses leave the schools in the afternoon at approximately 3:50.

Students new to the district this year are asked to register between now and opening day at the school office in the high school building from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

School lunch prices are one other change students will face this year. They have gone up 5 cents. High school and middle school students will pay \$1.35 a day for lunch and elementary students will be charged \$1.25. Adult lunches are \$1.85.

There will be two morning sessions of kindergarten and one afternoon in Wayne this year. All other elementary grades will have three different classes as well. Morning kindergarten sessions will be from 8:30 to 11 a.m. and the afternoon session will be from 12:30 to 3

PENDER — Work is scheduled to begin Sept. 8 on Highway 16 west of Pender on culverts. Traffic will be detoured for approximately one week.

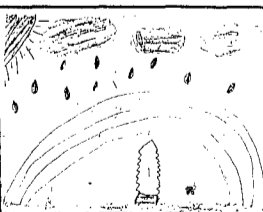
The \$39,493 project is expected to be completed in October.

Tree City USA —

But they're all hurting

Wayne's residents are going to have to get into the habit of planting trees in the next few years or the community's designation as a Tree-City USA may be laughable.

Mother nature has dealt a cruel blow to the city's trees, according to State Forester Steve Rasmussen and the stress they have endured has weakened many of the stately old trees which make them more susceptible to disease and death in the coming years.

Last fall's severe ice storm, the wind and hail this spring and last week's wind and hail, each in turn dealt a death blow to many trees and mortally wounded many others.

RASMUSSEN, who works out of the Northeast Station in Concord, said residents should energetically approach the idea of planting new trees now to get them established before the older, weakened trees die. In some cases, Rasmussen said, immediate removal of the damaged trees may be advisable. Those with extremely large wounds, over 50 percent of the tree, probably should be removed now, he said.

Limb breakage and loss means the tree will also lose the equivalent percentage of its root system, said Rasmussen. With less limbs and roots to produce food the trees will be weakened—increasing their chances of becoming future wind, insect or disease victims.

"All the damage may not show up this year or even next year," he said. With long-lived

plants it may take several years before the homeowner will notice his tree is dying.

"It just seems to be a bad year for trees," said Rasmussen.

HARDEST HIT by the weather oddities of the last few

months were the softer wood varieties, said Rasmussen. The silver maples were particularly devastated, he said. Oaks, hackberry and ash suffered less, he said.

Robert Boeckenhauer

Robert Boeckenhauer, 82, of rural Valentine, formerly of Wayne, died Monday night, Aug. 10, 1992 at Valentine.

Services were held Friday, Aug. 14 at the First United Methodist Church in Wayne. The Rev. Don Nunnally officiated.

J. Robert Boeckenhauer, the son of Ezra and Lydia Haglund Boeckenhauer, was born Jan. 15, 1910 near Wakefield. He grew up in the Wakefield area and received his elementary and high school education in the Wakefield Public Schools, graduating in 1928. He attended the University of Nebraska and Wayne State College. He married Inez Wriedt on May 16, 1936 at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in Emerson. The couple lived in the Wakefield and Ainsworth areas, until moving to Wayne in 1946. After Inez' death, he ranched in Cherry County. He was a livestock producer, community and church leader, the founder and first secretary to the board of the KBR Rural Public Power District in Brown County, a 4-H Leader and received the Ak-Sar-Ben Good Neighbor Award (one of the first in 1946). He and his wife initiated Sunday worship service in rural schools in conjunction with the American Sunday School Union. He was a life-long member of the United Methodist Church, served in numerous leadership roles and was a Sunday school teacher for over 25 years. In Wayne County he was a charter member and officer of Wayne County Farm Bureau and officer of the Wayne County Historical Society and active in County Fair Activities. "He was a role model for life-long learning, civic responsibility and quality of life. He had a love of people and of nature, that has had an impact on many people," said his children.

Survivors include four children, Juanita Reed-Boniface (Mrs. Dick) of Cedar, Minn., Mrs. Gene (Karen) Weeks of Duluth, Ga., Lauren Boeckenhauer of Valentine and Maurice (Moe) Boeckenhauer of Wakefield; five grandchildren; five great grandchildren; and one sister, Opal Wriedt of Wayne.

He was preceded in death by his parents, wife in 1979, one sister Dorothy Lofgren and two grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Kent Reed, Kelly Willis, Kevin Weeks, Leah Boeckenhauer, Ron Wriedt and Bob Wriedt.

Burial was in the Greenwood Cemetery in Wayne with the Schumacher-McBride-Wiltse Funeral Home in Wayne in charge of arrangements.

Wayne fair to get Ak-Sar-Ben funds

The Wayne County Fair Board officials announced this week that they have received \$500 from the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben. The money is to be used for new projects on the fairgrounds or repair programs on existing buildings. They submitted an application for funds from Ak-Sar-Ben in May, stating what project the money would be used for this year.

For the 39th year, the Knights of

Ak-Sar-Ben have offered up to \$500 annually to Nebraska County Fairs for improvements on their fairgrounds. It is a matching grant, wherein the county fairs agree to match the Ak-Sar-Ben contribution dollar for dollar.

Ak-Sar-Ben has set aside approximately \$40,000 for this program, which over the years has totalled around \$2,000,000 to County Fairs throughout Nebraska. The grants are

made available to all county fairs which do not conduct pari-mutuel racing.

"This program is one of Ak-Sar-Ben's most vital programs benefiting the people of Nebraska all across the state. We are very proud of this commitment to our county fairs, which we know are among the best in the country," according to Bruce Lauritzen, Chairman of the Ak-Sar-Ben Board of Governors.

ON THE FIRST day of school, ninth-grade students are asked to report to the high school for orientation in the lecture hall at

8:30 a.m.

Students who have not received their class schedules may pick them up from the guidance counselor beginning at 8 a.m. the first day of classes.

High School Principal Dr. Don Zeiss also reminded students and parents of the ban on students who drive leaving the school during the lunch hour unless permission is obtained from the principal.

"STUDENTS ARE encouraged to use the hot lunch program or bring a sack lunch," said Zeiss. Driving home for lunch is permitted only with the principal's permission and is only permitted if the student lives more than 6 blocks from campus.

Students are not allowed to drive downtown for lunch, he said. Violation of the policy may result in suspension.

When home owners make planting plans they should check with their local extension, natural resources district or state forestry office to determine the best varieties, urged Rasmussen. He said the elms, maples, cottonwoods and other fast growing trees are not the best for this area of unpredictable winds.

He said he understands homeowners are impatient and want quicker growing trees, but he said with proper care, the more desirable varieties will see growth rates of up to two feet per year and will create a much safer, healthier urban forest for the future.

PROPER PRUNING when a tree is small may also help prevent wind damage in the future.

The best thing that homeowners can do for damaged trees now is trim the wounds so the smallest area of

damage is exposed. This means cutting broken limbs below the area of torn bark. It is no longer recommended to paint over or use wound dressing on damaged trees, said Rasmussen. He said recent studies have indicated the plant's own sealing effort is more effective.

Smoothing the jagged edges of broken branches and torn bark by proper pruning will aid the tree in its healing process, he explained.

FERTILIZER AND extra watering is not going to help the trees now, said Rasmussen. They should not be sending out new growth now he said. Now is the time they should be storing up for the winter he said.

He said the storms this past year should provide incentive for area homeowners and rural landowners both to redouble tree planting efforts for the future.

Budget approved Schools are great value

The Wayne community is getting a good educational system at a fair price according to new school superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen.

Speaking at the annual budget hearing for the schools, Jensen praised his predecessor, Dr. Francis Haun, who prepared the '92-93 budget as his last official function before retirement.

The board of education approved the \$4 million budget following the hearing and thanked Haun and Secretary Doris Daniels for their work on the document.

It calls for a 4.9 percent increase in expenditures and a 4.66 percent increase in revenues. The effect on local property taxes will not be known until valuation figures are finalized, but if there is an increase it will be minimal because the sinking fund levy for the district will be reduced to only 10 cents due to the retirement of the bonds on the

elementary school addition.

Jensen explained that Wayne compares favorably with other school/districts of like size in the state. The local tax request for schools ranks in the lower 30 percent of school tax requests, he said.

Jensen said the budget increases are "conservative by any measure" and pointed out that the state aid to Wayne schools this year will be down by \$30,000 from last year.

In a related budget item, the board deferred until future years any decision to hire bus services rather than own buses and hire drivers.

The board had been considering hiring a private busing company to provide transportation for the district. Jensen said the bids received from two bus companies indicated the district could save up to \$100,000 in five years by hiring a private bus company.

Jensen said he is convinced there would be many benefits to having a private bus company for the district.

Besides the cost savings, he said there would be a reduced liability factor for the district and district personnel currently directed at management of bus services and schedules, could work in other areas.

Jensen said he thought in the future the district may have the four or five bids from different bus companies interested in providing the service. The competitiveness should allow the district to save much more than the initial bids indicated.

The board also approved at its meeting Tuesday, the additional position of a half-time physical education instructor for the middle school. Previously, staffing had allowed students in grades 1 through 6 the opportunity to participate in PE just once a week.

Jensen said this limited exposure to PE was below average for schools Wayne's size. The dollars for the additional position had been included in the budget.

ESU board approves budget; hears report on construction

The board of directors of Educational Service Unit One (ESU 1) met Tuesday night in Wakefield and unanimously approved the 1992-93 fiscal year budget totaling \$4,721,470.

The new budget reflects a hike of just under 7.5 percent from last year and includes a tax requirement of \$598,985.

ESU 1 board members conducted a public hearing prior to Tuesday night's regular monthly meeting and voted unanimously to exceed the 0 percent lid.

A special meeting to set the levy is scheduled Aug. 27 at 7 p.m. in Wakefield.

THE NEW 1992-93 budget shows an increase of \$343,860 over last year's budget.

A complete breakdown of 1992-93 expenditures includes \$2,341,385

in special education services; \$979,285 in general levy services; \$34,300 in LB 91 funds; and \$616,500 in transfers, for total budget expenditures of \$3,971,470.

The budget also calls for \$750,000 in cash reserves, bringing the total to \$4,721,470.

Estimated revenues during 1992-93 include \$1,000,000 in estimated cash carry-over; \$2,341,385 in special education contracts; \$61,300 in nursing contracts; \$42,000 in gifted contracts; \$34,300 in LB 91 funds; \$526,500 in transfers; \$45,000 in interest; \$30,000 for presentations; \$42,000 for miscellaneous sales; and \$598,985 in total taxes, for a total of \$4,721,470.

IN OTHER business Tuesday night, the ESU 1 directors heard a report by Administrator Rodney Garwood regarding the new facility being constructed in Wayne to house the unit's two Wayne programs.

Garwood said the facility did sus-

tain some damage during the storm which ripped through the area early last Monday morning, however the damages are the builder's responsibility and the unit is still planning to move into the facility on Sept. 1.

Board members unanimously approved a list of change orders for the new facility, totaling \$2,224. They also approved the construction of an overhead storage area in the garage, placement of a concrete slab for the dumpster, and the purchase of appliances.

Action on formally naming the new facility is expected to be taken at next month's ESU 1 meeting. Garwood said suggestions are welcome from staff and board members.

OTHER ACTION taken at the August board meeting included:

—Second and final reading of several policy changes, which were unanimously approved;

—Unanimous approval of a contract with Don Phipps, van driver, at 72 cents per mile;

—Unanimous approval of a building lease agreement with Bryan and Lewis & Clark at the same cost as last year;

—Renewal of membership in the Nebraska Rural Communities School Association at a cost of \$200;

—Contract approvals for new staff members Joyce Zulkosky, motors skills technician who will be working in the occupational therapy area, and Sandy Dahl, a teacher assistant in the Wayne program for behaviorally disordered.

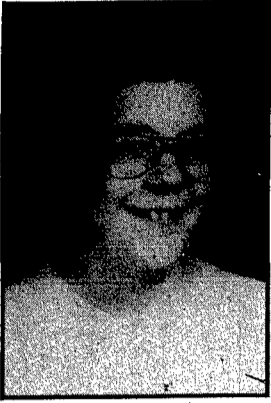

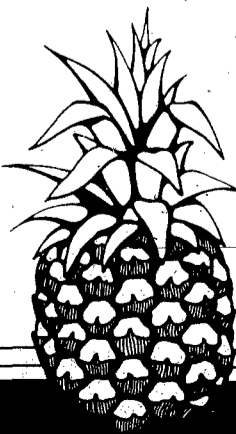

Grant sends medical students to rural areas

U.S. Sen. Jim Exon (D-NE) and Bob Kerrey (D-NE) announced this week that a \$116,953 grant has been awarded to the University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) in Omaha to be used to send medical students to rural areas in Nebraska.

The grant was awarded by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and will be used to send students from the School of Allied Health Professionals, the Colleges of Nursing, Medicine,

Pharmacy and Dentistry at UNMC, to rural areas for four weeks to work under local health care practitioners. The grant will also pay for UNMC faculty members to provide training and workshops for rural health care workers.

"I am pleased to see HHS recognize the need to fund innovative programs to provide health care for Nebraska's rural citizens," Exon said. "This program benefits patients in rural areas that generally have a shortage of health care work-

ers and students who are getting valuable training while under faculty supervision."

"Unless changes are made in the overall health care system, access to health care services in rural areas is in great danger," Kerrey said. "It is one of my priorities to support initiatives that assist in the recruitment and training of professionals who will practice in rural areas. It is important that HHS promote these efforts and I am pleased it has done so."

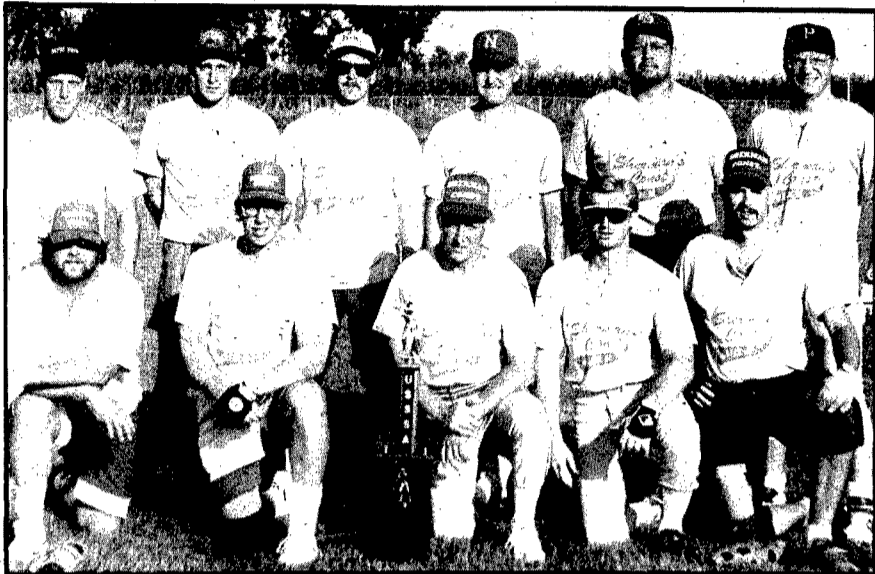

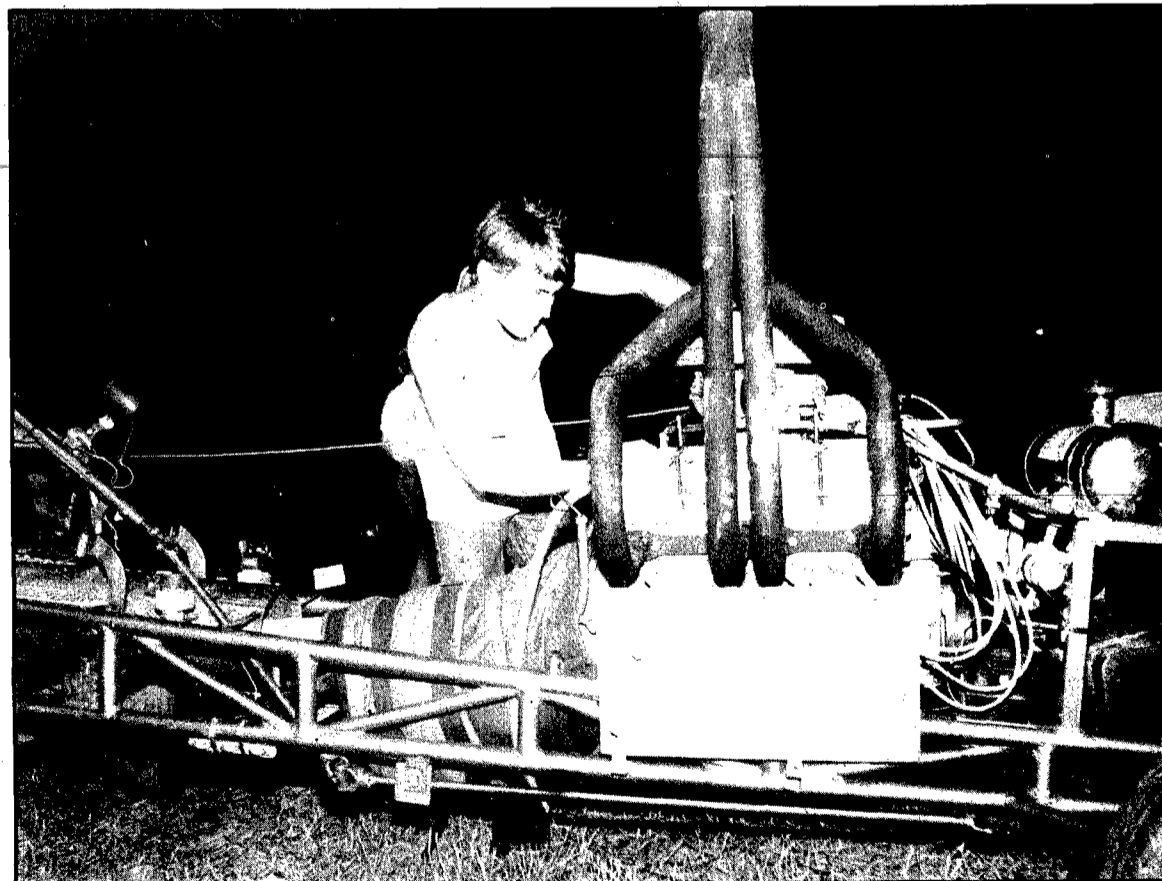

They will also participate in a grain marketing seminar sponsored by the Nebraska Grain and Feed Association, Aug. 13 in Grand Island.

"This is a unique project which could benefit corn growers with a premium price for the high quality corn grown in Nebraska," said Pat Ptacek, assistant director of the Nebraska Department of Agriculture. "Our goal is simple: To ship high quality Nebraska corn, via rail, directly to buyers in Mexico."

Ptacek said direct rail shipments would streamline the marketing process by linking Mexican corn importers with Nebraska producers and elevators. Such an arrangement would avoid additional handling or transfer of ownership of the corn. This will guarantee our high quality Nebraska corn retains its identity from shipping point to destination.

This Mexican trade project is made possible through a cooperative effort between the Nebraska Department of Agriculture, the Nebraska Corn Board and the Univer-

sity of Nebraska-Lincoln. Partial funding is provided by the USDA through a federal-state marketing improvement program designed to export identity preserved corn to niche markets.

According to Randy Klein, Field Services Director of the Nebraska Corn Board, Mexico was chosen as a target market for Nebraska corn because of that country's expanding economy and a growing population. The potential of transporting Nebraska corn directly to buyers in Mexico by rail was also a factor, he said. "Mexico is already one of the United States' largest agricultural customers," Klein said. "The Nebraska Corn Board has placed a high priority on the emerging market for corn sales to Mexico." Klein, Ptacek and several representatives of the Nebraska grain trade were in Mexico recently to identify importers who would be interested in buying corn directly from Nebraska.

Soybean yield contestants sought

"We're looking for winners!" says Scott Kinkaid of Hartington. Why?

The Nebraska Soybean Association (NSA) is sponsoring again this year the Nebraska Masters Soybean Yield Contest.

The goal of the Nebraska Masters is to promote and reward excellence in soybean production. NSA and the Nebraska Crop Improvement Association (NCIA) present awards in five categories in addition to district awards. Agribusiness companies also present awards to winners utilizing their products.

Kinkaid encouraged soybean

farmers all across the state to enter their best fields. "The deadline for entering the contest is 30 days prior to harvest," says Kinkaid. "So we only have a few weeks left when we can accept entries and we don't want to leave anyone out."

"The weather has been a real factor in soybean production this year," he continued. "There are some producers out there looking at some of their best crops ever. We want to be able to recognize those farmers for a job well done."

The contest will be judged on yield only in both irrigated and non-irrigated categories. Entry blanks

must be postmarked 30 days before the contest field is harvested. The area harvested for the contest must be from a single block of five acres in a field of at least 10 acres. Entry blanks are available from the Nebraska Soybean Association by calling 800/852-BEAN (2326).

"Farmers want to maximize their net profits and that means obtaining the highest yields at the lowest costs," says Kinkaid, Yield Contest Chairman and NSA board member. "We base our contest on yield, but we also collect a lot of information from our contestants."

ORDINANCE NO. 92-20 AN ORDINANCE CREATING STREET IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 92-03 IN THE CITY OF WAYNE, NEBRASKA, BEING PART OF EAST 6TH STREET AND TOMAR DRIVE, DESCRIBING THE PROPERTIES INCLUDED IN SAID DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS THEREIN. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Council of the City of Wayne, Nebraska: Section 1. There is hereby created within the City of Wayne, Street Improvement District No. 92-03, the outer boundaries of which shall include the following described properties: A tract of land beginning at the Northeast corner of Farran's Addition to the City of Wayne; thence southerly 582 feet, more or less, to the North line of the abandoned Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Omaha Railroad right-of-way; thence northeasterly along said Railroad right-of-way 462 feet, more or less, to the East line of Lot 3, Replat of McCright's First Subdivision; thence northerly 292 feet, more or less, to the South line of the Highway No. 35 right-of-way; thence westerly along said Highway, 530 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning.

Section 2. Within said district, improvements shall be constructed consisting of grading, curbing, guttering, concrete paving, subsurface drainage structures, and constructions of other necessary appurtenant improvements. Said improvements shall be made on and along the following described streets within said District: East 6th Street from approximately twenty-five feet West of its easterly paved terminus to the westerly line of Lot 3, Replat of McCright's Subdivision; Tomar Drive from its southern paved terminus to the intersection with East 6th Street as proposed for extension and paving; and the easement lying along the west line of Lot 1, Replat of McCright's Subdivision. Section 3. The improvements provided by this ordinance shall be made in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by the special engineer of the City to be approved by the Mayor and City Council. Said improvements shall be made at public cost, but the City shall levy special assessments on the property within the district especially benefited thereby as provided by law. Section 4. After publication of this ordinance, notice of creation of said district shall be given by publication in the Wayne Herald, which the Mayor and City Council find to be a legal newspaper of the City, one time each week for not less than twenty days.

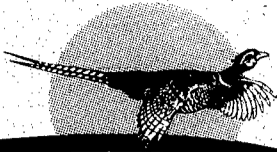
