

WSC building may be budget victim

Wayne State College's \$4 million building to house the business department will be put on hold if the legislature upholds a series of budget cutting recommendations from Gov. Ben Nelson.

The recommendations, issued by Nelson's office this week, would put a hold on projects approved in previous years, including the Wayne State building which had been scheduled for construction in the 1994 fiscal year. The legislature will consider the budget cutting proposals when it convenes in special session Sept. 21 to try to cut as much as \$150 million from the state budget because of massive shortfalls in funding Medicaid.

The construction-halting decision reportedly upset WSC officials who were counting on the new building to help ease overcrowding on campus.

"THIS PROJECT is critical to the college's instructional pro-

gram," says Dr. Donald J. Mash, president of Wayne State College. "We are bursting at the seams and we needed the building, yesterday. Reductions in our operating budget are much more understandable than delaying this building after it is in design. We are surprised and very disappointed by the action and hope the Governor and legislature together will be able to find a way to keep the project moving."

Wayne State College's enrollment has grown by nearly 35 percent — to over 4,000 students — since 1988. In spite of the college's growth, it has not received state support for the construction of additional academic space in over 20 years. During this period, the college's enrollment has doubled.

The business program has the largest number of majors on campus, says Vaughn Benson, division head of business. He says the program has approximately 750 majors on and off campus, which is more

than double the number of majors 20 years ago.

CONNELL HALL, which currently houses business administration and social sciences divisions, is described by college officials as being overcrowded and substandard. They say a delay in funding for the building may result in a delay in funding for the much-needed renovation of Connell Hall.

Benson says when the business and social sciences divisions moved into Connell Hall in 1962, there were 48 class sections and 10 faculty offices. Today, there are 120 class sections and 48 faculty offices in the same space.

The Governor's recommendation to delay the building is one of many reductions in state spending totaling \$118,642 through fiscal year 1995. The reductions are aimed principally at dealing with the state's fiscal problems resulting from increased Medicaid costs.

Being board member no busman's holiday

Wayne-Carroll School Board members faced a busload of problem issues at their meeting Tuesday night with the most weighty issues surrounding school buses.

Parents of students who attend Wayne schools by bus, but do not live in the district, will have to start

paying \$284 a year per student as a busing fee.

The new fee, was put into effect reluctantly by the board. It is mandated by state law.

"We have no choice," said Dr. Dennis Jensen, superintendent. He said the state has a formula and mandates what non-resident students "shall" not "may" pay for busing. "We have to charge the state for-

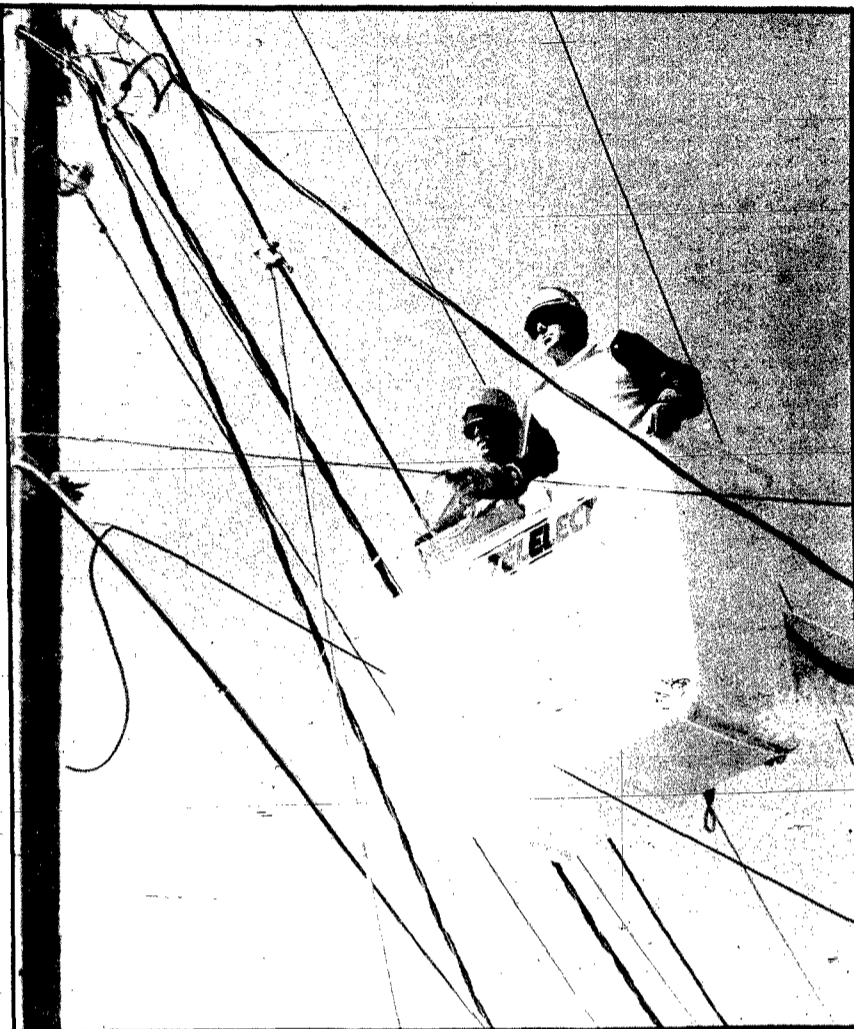
mula," he said.

THE MOVE will affect approximately a dozen students, said Jensen. He said there are currently 39 students attending Wayne schools who have exercised the choice option to attend school outside their own district.

"We went out and invited those people to come to school here," complained school board member Neil Sandahl, he said now it will seem as if the schools are trying to hit the new students with new fees.

For the past two years, the Wayne schools, like most other districts in the state in similar circumstances, have been letting the non-resident students ride free. The policy was, if the student got on the bus at an existing bus route, the ride was free, said Sandahl. Wayne and other districts have been told by the

New facility needs name

The Educational Service Unit One (ESU 1) board of directors is asking for public input to help name the unit's new facility, which is scheduled to open next month in Wayne.

The building is located directly west of the Wayne America water tower and will house the unit's two

Wayne programs — the Wayne Children's Development Center and the Wayne Learning Center.

Rodney Garwood, ESU 1 administrator, said suggested names for the facility can be forwarded to him at ESU 1 headquarters in Wakefield.

"We'd love to have as many suggestions as possible," said Garwood, adding that ESU 1 board members are scheduled to vote on a name at their Oct. 13 meeting.

ALTHOUGH ESU 1 had originally planned to move the two programs into the new facility by Sept. 1, Garwood said completion of the building has been delayed until mid-October.

"There's no one item holding things up," pointed out Garwood. "It's just that we're nearing the end of construction and there are some

Roof to cost \$54,000

WAYNE — The total cost for the new roof and repairs to the Wayne-Carroll High School Gym will total over \$54,000. 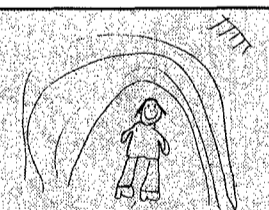

Judge refuses to reverse redistricting

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A judge refused Wednesday to stop a new legislative redistricting law from taking effect, virtually guaranteeing that the new statute won't be blocked before the November elections.

Lancaster County District Judge Donald Endacott said he wouldn't block implementation of the law that redraws some northeast Nebraska districts since it is unlikely that the law could be found unconstitutional.

Gus Pick of Hartington, who won a primary race in a district that disappeared under the new law, asked Endacott last week to delay the new law immediately and ultimately to declare it invalid.

De Carlson of Crofton, another would-be legislative candidate, previously lost a similar bid in federal court.

Pick and Mrs. Carlson won the

primary and were running against each other in northeast Nebraska's 19th District until the new boundary lines left both of them without a district.

They wanted Endacott to order that election officials allow them to run as candidates in the old 19th District.

Attorney John Guthery of Lincoln, who represented Pick and Carlson, previously indicated that their cases hinged on getting an injunction blocking the law because of the approaching elections.

Guthery was not in his office late Wednesday and was unavailable for comment. Pick did not immediately return a call to his home.

The state and federal lawsuits raised similar issues: Both said Pick and Mrs. Carlson had fundamental rights to be on the ballot in the 19th District as it existed before the

new law.

Endacott disagreed.

While an injunction would prevent harm to the candidacies of Pick and Mrs. Carlson, other candidates and voters in the newly devised districts would be hurt, he said.

The new law gave the District 19

number to Madison County and split the old District 19 among Districts 18 and 40 — districts that don't have elections until 1994.

"Redistricting, and the balancing of the various conflicting interests

"The situation was under control," said Tracy Henschke, assistant administrator. She said the young person involved was in the attic trying to find a way out of the center when police arrived.

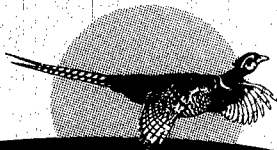
She commended the help of other juveniles in the center who called police and helped solve the episode without serious problems. There were no injuries.

state that their busing policy is illegal, said Jensen.

"THE NEGATIVE publicity we're going to get on this is going to be awful," said Dr. Ken Liska, school board member, who asked if the board couldn't possibly continue to charge nothing.

Knowingly ignoring the law could make the board members individually liable for charges, Jensen told them. The board members had originally thought the per pupil cost reimbursed to the district from the state for its non-resident students would cover the busing,

and continuous program of improvement.

Garwood said he is especially pleased with the high quality of special education services which ESU 1 provides to the schools it serves and students.

ESU 1 board members voted unanimously to participate in a technology feasibility study being financed jointly by Wayne State College, Northeast Community College, Educational Service Unit 8 and Educational Service Unit 1.

"There are all kinds of technology available and we need to see what's feasible in our area," pointed out Garwood. "Technology is going to come, and it's a way for a lot of small schools to provide equity and quality."

Following discussion, the ESU 1 board voted to spend up to \$5,000 on a matching basis with the other three institutions to conduct the study.

Board members also heard a report on new ESU 1 employees for 1992-93, including Pat Weberg, gifted consultant; Sandy Dahl, teacher's assistant; Carol Olson, speech/language pathologist; Lori Ischen, speech/language technician; Sandra Royal, audiologist intern; and Julie Loberg, school nurse.

but it specifically does not, explained Jensen.

Previous board policy has been to offer bus service only to children living outside the city limits and farther than two-miles from school. But that policy was changed when buses started stopping to pick up children near Pamida.

Currently the two buses that make stops on the east end of the city are at or over capacity, said Jensen. He said a policy decision must be made as to how to handle busing within the city limits.

He said adding a bus route would cost approximately \$23,000. He said the issue might be seen as one of fairness.

Options open to the board might be to add a route to bus students from Tarra Ridge the same as students from the Pamida area or drop all in-town busing.

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Wakefield woman heads effort to assist victims of hurricane

Wakefield resident Carol Nixon is heading up a drive in Wakefield to assist victims of Hurricane Andrew. Nixon recently visited with a retired minister in Louisiana and was told that the needs of disaster victims will be long term, when immediate supplies of aid run out, and especially later in the year during the Christmas holiday. Nixon has organized a relief effort in Wakefield and has posted lists of items which can safely be sent and used by the victims. Elementary students at Wakefield will also be given an opportunity to supply Christmas items for children in the storm ravaged area.

The Wakefield woman is in the process of making arrangements with local churches to serve as collection sites for food and other items, and has set up a fund at the Wakefield National Bank for cash donations. Checks should be made payable to the Hurricane Andrew Fund.

Nixon's deadline for collecting items is Oct. 26. It is also her hope that at some point in time she will be able to travel to Louisiana and assist in the relief efforts.

Items that are needed for victims of the hurricane include canned foods, concentrated beverages, coffee and tea, laundry detergents, dishwashing soap, hand soap, deodorant, shampoo and other toiletry items, aspirin, tissues, flashlights, diapers, new or used towels, wash cloths, sheets and pillow cases, blankets and sleeping bags, good used or new children's books, crayons, pencils, paper, coloring books, chalk, scissors, toys and baby bottles.

involved therein, is a duty given to the Legislature, and the courts will not intervene in the Legislature's performance of that duty in the absence of a clear constitutional violation," Endacott wrote.

"Therefore, balancing the harms and equities involved, a temporary injunction would not prevent wrongs and injury any greater than the wrongs and injury which would be caused" by an injunction, Endacott said.

He said it was unlikely that Pick could win his case if a trial were

held on the issue.

The Legislature redrew the districts after the state Supreme Court ruled in July that a 1991 redistricting law unconstitutionally broke Madison County, which had been a single district, into parts of two other districts.

The Supreme Court cites constitutional provisions that require that county lines be followed for legislative districts "where practicable." Since Madison County had virtually the right population for a legislative district it had to be preserved as such, the high court said.

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Fiscal 1993 Budget Set For LENRD

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources Board of directors approved the fiscal 1993 budget at their monthly meeting on Thursday, Aug. 27, in Norfolk.

A public hearing was held prior to the monthly board meeting. The adopted 1993 fiscal year budget requires district property taxes of \$1.207 million. The levy will be 3.24 cents per \$100 valuation. Under Nebraska state law, Natural Resources districts may assess a tax as high as 4.5 cents.

The 1993 budget reflects increased programs and projects to preserve natural resources in northeast Nebraska. The largest budget item in the 1993 NRD budget is \$500,000 for land treatment cost-share assistance.

Water quality is also a high priority for the Lower Elkhorn NRD. The board approved \$152,000 for water resources programs such as well abandonment, wellhead protection and cost-share for livestock waste control systems.


Other important district programs and projects for 1993 include: National Clean Lakes Program Phase II for Maskenthine Lake and Willow Creek Reservoir, Butterfly Creek study, Howells and Dodge flood control projects, residue management campaign, wildlife habitat program, and intergovernmental cost-sharing to build road structures.

In other business, a motion was approved to seek 75 percent cost-share assistance from Nebraska Game and Parks Commission for the proposed Butterfly Creek project.

The board accepted the proposal submitted by Nickel Engineering of Lincoln to perform a safety inspection of Willow Creek dam and outlet works. The dam inspection is a routine, five-year safety check.

The board also discussed the Laurel drainage project and moved to request that the Soil Conservation Service perform a preliminary investigation on the project. And, the directors accepted the resignation of board member, Glenda Reinert formerly of Dodge.

The September Lower Elkhorn board meeting will be held on Thursday, Sept. 24.

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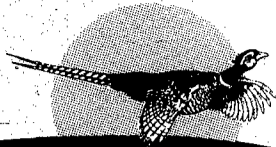
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Wayne runners beaten by S. Sioux

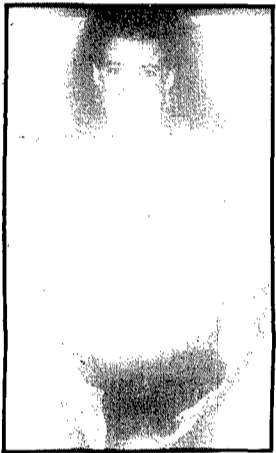

Program designed to assist students at risk

Students in Wayne-Carroll schools who exhibit high risk behaviors such as dramatic drop in grades, personality changes or physical changes—all signals that would indicate potential drug or other problems—will be getting help under a program endorsed Tuesday night by the School Board.

School-Community Intervention Program, (SCIP) is a state and privately funded effort to train teachers and school administrators to recognize signals being sent by students at risk and make sure they and their parents have an opportunity to obtain help.

Scot Ellis, who administers the SCIP program through the Lincoln Medical Education Foundation and the Nebraska Department of Education, attended the Tuesday board meeting to answer questions from board members about the program.

Wayne-Carroll High School already has a trained team of teachers ready to implement the program here and needed board support to proceed.

The intervention program is not just to address drug and alcohol problems, said Ellis, but might also help identify family or medical problems.

At any given time approximately five percent of the student population in any school is experiencing some kind of difficulty, said Ellis. He said teachers are often the first to notice problems and might make the best referral source.

The SCIP program is currently operating in 48 schools in Northeast Nebraska. The program has been operating for eight years.

Board members, who endorsed the effort, expressed mild surprise that they had not been approached about the program before. The intervention team in Wayne was implemented about 1 year ago.

Dr. Ken Liska said he was impressed with the number of schools in this area using the SCIP program.

Ellis said while some parents express denial when their children are identified by the program, by far the most of the parents say it is comforting to know that schools and teachers care enough to help.

"More often than not, parents are appreciative," he said.

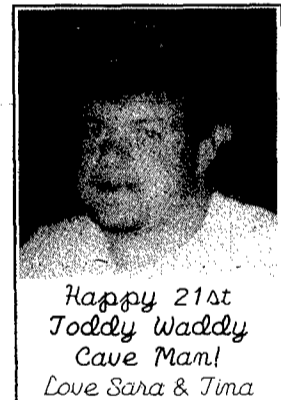
