Clinton no better than third here

·Wayne County Election Results

Bush Clinton Perot Bereuter Finnegan

Bill Clinton may be the presidentelect for the nation, but for many Northeast Nebraskans he was no better than third choice.

Northeast Nebraska voters, espe-cially those in Wayne, Cedar, Pierce and Madison Counties, favored Pres. George Bush first and Independent Ross Perot over Clinton. In Wayne County the vote was 2.122 for Bush: 1,047 for Perot and 921 for Clinton.

With narrow margins over Perot in Dakota and Dixon Counties, Clinton still was not able to finish better than third in the region.

The hotly contested presidential race helped contribute to a record voter turnout, according to Wayne County Clerk Deb Finn.

Perot out-polled Clinton in all the rural precincts of Wayne County and stayed close to the president-elect in

presidential balloting here.

Bush's 52 percent plurality in Wayne County compared to only a 47 percent vote total state-wide, but that was more than enough to win the Nebraska electoral votes.

Clinton, at 46 and the nation's third youngest president, won the election by carrying states all over the nation. Democrats also maintained control of Congress during the historic elec-

It's 'Magic Time' for Wayne holidays By Kathy Stalling-Berry

The season of good cheer and glad tidings is almost upon us. That means only a few more weeks of shopping for those Christmas gifts. The Wayne Chamber of Commerce and participating merchants will sponsor the ever-popular Holiday Magic, Fantasy Forest and a new idea, Santa Cash.

Instead of paying the 18 percent interest on your credit cards during

the Christmas season, Santa Cash enables you to get a loan for zero percent interest, to be paid back within 120 days and can be used at any of the participating merchants in Wayne. The Santa Cash loan can be taken out at a minimum of \$300 and a maximum of \$1,500. All three of the banks in Wayne are participating in this project.

The Santa Cash can then be used at participating merchants to purchase products and merchandise on or before December 24. This idea is hoping to draw out-of-town cus-

tomers and encouraging them to shop in Wayne. "It's a win-win sit-uation for both consumers and businesses. It benefits the mer-chants because it is a good-will gesture to consumers and it is hoping to bring new people to Wayne and encouraging locals to stay. It is to their advantage to use it," Wilwerding said.

Along with the Santa Cash, the Holiday Magic promotion will be used again this year. "Over the past ten years, the merchants and consumers have enjoyed it," Wilwerding said. The Chamber will be giving a total of \$2,000 to lucky winners in this year's Holiday Magic. Weekly drawings will begin Friday, November 27, with \$500 drawn in Chamber Bucks for the four weeks.

To become eligible for one of the four weekly drawings of Holiday Magic, a customer fills out a registration form in the amount of the purchase that is made. The consumer can then win the purchase price back, which can not exceed


lenges in coming weeks. Nebraska Sen. J.J. Exon said he would work hard during the time he has left in office to pass a national Constitu-tional Amendment making term limits uniform in all states.

Exon is eligible to run for two more six-year terms after his current term expires in 1996. The term limit measure prohibits local and state elected officials from holding office longer than 8 years and senators for longer than 12 years.

Local voters also agreed with their state-wide counterparts on the lottery issue. Countians favored enactment of the first state-wide lottery by a 56 percent margin, 2,185 to 1,706. The winning margin state-wide was higher at 62 percent. The lottery measure carried the county with approval in all but three precincts, Logan, Strahan/ Wilbur and Leslie.

IN A RELATED measure, voters nixed the idea to spend part of the lottery proceeds to reimburse inves-tors in failed industrial banks. The county voters rejected the idea by a 73 percent margin, 1,004 to 2,596.

The other amendment issue received less attention during the campaign, but voters passed the proposal to give municipalities and counties the constitutional authority to regulate liquor licenses in their jurisdic-tions. The authority previously had been given the local entities by statute. The liquor regulation amendment vote was 1,856 to 1,727 in Wayne County, a 51 percent margin. State-wide voters passed the liquor regulation issue with 55 percent of

Dixon County voters go to polls in droves

Voters in Dixon County overwhelmingly supported President Bush for re-election, approved another term for Congressman Doug Bereuter, gave their okay to a state lottery measure, and voted in favor

of placing term limits on elected

A spokesman in the Dixon County Clerk's office in Ponca reported that 3,100 Dixon County residents cast ballots Tuesday That's about 78 percent of the county's 3.981 registered voters.

In Dixon County, President

Bush garnered 1,484 votes, followed by President-Elect Bill Clinton with 830 votes and Ross Perot with 726 votes

Incumbent Republican Congressman Doug Bereuter was a heavy favorite in Dixon County. Bereuter captured 2,078 votes, while his Democratic challenger Gerry Finnegan received 895 votes.

DIXON County residents joined Nebraskans in supporting the state lottery measure, with 1,668 votes cast in favor and 1,231 votes against.

A section of the lottery proposal to use some of the proceeds for re

dustrial savings and loan companies failed in Nebraska and in Dixon County, with 743 votes for and 1,884 votes against

Bereuter elected to 8th term

Voters in Wayne County and have elected to send Republican Congressman Doug Bereuter back to Washington for an eighth term.

In Wayne County, Bereuter cap-tured 72 percent of the vote (2,789 to 1,086), compared to 60 percent (140,994 to 95,397) in the 616 precincts included in District 1.

Bereuter's Democratic challenger as Lincoln businessman Gerry Finnegan.

WHILE Finnegan, 44, challenged Bereuter in Lancaster County, which includes Lincoln, the incumbent overwhelmed him in

Bereuter, 53, said he wasn't surprised that the District 1 race was fairly close because of a rash of term-limit television ads as well as some "bash-the-incumbent" ads aired by Finnegan's campaign.
"The very negative campaigning

Gerry Finnegan had on television the last few weeks fit in well with term-limits campaigning. It couldn't have been a better fit for his distortions.'

Bereuter said he objected specifically to criticism over the sale of his house in the district when he moved his family to Washington early in his congressional career, and pointed out that other Nebraska congressmen, including John Cavanaugh and Peter Hoagland, had done the same thing.

Finnegan, who congratulated Bereuter, said he might have had a better chance if he had declared his candidacy earlier and there had been more debates between the candidates.





We played probably our best volleyball all year against Wisner," Eaton said. "The first game was very competitive and we won the second game. The third game was totally in Wisner's favor."



Looking back at last week's game with Michigan Tech, Wagner felt the Huskies were a good team but the 'Cats made too many mistakes to beat a team of their caliber.

"Defensively, we didn't play as well as we have in the past." Wagner said. "We had some poor tackling, and missed assignments. Normally, when you score 38 points it is enough to win. We missed some opportunities to score. Jason Williams getting kicked out of the game affected our game plan. We need to learn from our mistakes and get better before we play Peru on Saturday," Wagner added.

Wayne State has five individuals ranked nationally among this week's NCAA Division II leaders. Damon Thomas ranks fourth nationally with 6.9 receptions per game while quarterback Troy Mott ranks 14th in total offense with 238.1 yards per game.

Sean Francisco ranks 12th in punt returns at 13.6 per return and Rick Starling ranks third in the nation in kickoff returns at 31.1 per return. Andy Parr is tied for seventh in field goal kicking with seven

The 'Cats rank 16th in total offense at 416.4 yards per contest and 27th in passing offense at 234.4 yards per game. They rank 21st in scoring with a 29.4 point per game average and defensively, WSC is 17th against the rush, allowing just 95.3 yards per game.

Lamont Rainey was forced to carry the load against Michigan Tech from his running back position when Jason Williams was ejected in

Rainey surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark for the second straight week with 146 yards on 28 carries. His efforts earned him Nebraska's NCAA-II Player of the Week. He also scored three touchdowns

Peru State will have some familiar faces as Branden Bender, (Nebraska City) began his career at WSC before transferring to Peru. He ranks fifth on the Bobcats squad with 46 tackles.

WSC defensive lineman Jeff Leo played for the 1990 NAIA National Champions from Peru before transferring to WSC. The 'Cats will be entering hostile territory and where very few teams come in and win.

Peru State is undefeated at home in the 90's and haven't lost a home contest Since Nov. 18, 1989 against Baker in the NAIA playoffs. The last regular season loss at home for Peru was in 1988 when the Bobcats lost a 24-21 decision to Benedictine on the last play of the game

Peru State's two losses, incidentally, have come Northwestern of Iowa and Missouri





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Stay in your car

The Nebraska Civil Defense Agency (NCDA) advises everyone to avoid driving in severe winter storms, but they say if you are trapped by a blizzard, stay in your car and await rescue.

Leaving your vehicle is inviting disaster. You can become disoriented in a blizzard and being lost in a severe storm is exceedingly dan-

If your car is disabled and you find yourself trapped, turn on the engine occasionally to provide heat, but always leave a down-wind win-dow open slightly to avoid deadly carbon monoxide poisoning. Make sure your exhaust is free of snow.

Exercise occasionally to increase circulation by clapping your hands and moving around. Do not remain in one position for long periods of time. To avoid exposure and overexertion, don't spend a lot of time shoveling snow or pushing

Leave the dome light on at night as a signal for rescuers and tie a brightly colored cloth to the radio antenna.

The best bet is to have your car winterized before winter sets in and have an emergency kit in your car along with a small supply of high energy foods.

A well-planned emergency kit contains blankets, an extra set of dry clothes, a shovel, sand, tire chains, jumper cables, a first aid kit, a flashlight with extra batteries and an antenna cloth.

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

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

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
