Wayne water fails test for copper in it

Wayne is one of 19 cities in Ne-braska that the Nebraska Department of Health will be retesting for high copper levels in residential water.

Last fall the Wayne Water Department submitted water samples from 10 residences in the community for State Health Department testing to determine the levels of lead and copper in the drinking water. Under Environmental Protection Agency guidelines, the state is required to test

all municipal water systems.
WHILELEAD levels in the Wayne water tests were well below EPA action levels, the city did not pass its

copper test with the same high grades. The copper level in seven of the 40 single-family residential locations tested exceeded the federal action levels and three were slightly over the acceptable levels for copper content. Eighteen other Nebraska medium-sized communities (3,300 to 50,000) population) had similar results.

City officials were quick to point out that the state tests indicate that the city's overall water quality is very

Federal rules declare a system out of compliance if the copper concentration is greater than 1.3 parts per million. State Health Department Official Scott Peterson said he thinks the results of the tests indicate that the household copper plumbing and not the municipal water systems.

COPPER DOES not pose the same health risks as lead, health department toxicologists said. In the kind of concentrations found in the city water samples copper is seldom more than a gastrointestinal irritant, sometimes causing nausea or diarrhea.

Wayne water department foreman Mert Marshall advised residents with copper water pipes to run their tap for a brief time before using it. He said the longer water is allowed to sit in pipes, the more copper can leech into it. When the water tests were conducted, he explained, the city was required to draw water from pines which had been allowed to sit idle for

at least six hours.
In spite of the low risk health problems and the ease in avoiding problems by allowing taps to run a few seconds before drinking, if the city's repeat tests for copper content still show high copper content, Wayne could be forced to adopt several methods to bring the community under compliançe

ONE MEASURE might be to ban copper plumbing in the community.

Another measure might be to add treatment measures to reduce the coppercontent throughout the whole city.


"It is a great opportunity for us to have all the top leaders in the state in our community," said Mrs. Endicott.

There is a chance the EPA will force out of compliance systems to conduct corrosion control studies. Such a study in Lincoln could cost as much as \$100,000 the Associated Press reported.

Marshall suggested that residential customers, especially those with fairly new copper plumbing, consider letting their water run-from the tap before using it for cooking or drinking anytime the water in the faucet has not been used for more than six hours. He added that many Wayne water

customers already use water softeners because the Wayne well water is relatively hard.

The new water tests are expected to be conducted soon. All the water testing is enducted by a state certified lab.


