## Housing push soon to begin

Things are shaping up for an extremely busy construction season in Wayne this year. Joining already announced public projects involving Wayne State College, The Day Care Center and Wayne Care Center, will be a major new housing push.

Wayne Planning Commission is scheduled to review preliminary plans for the 50-lot phase II of the Vintage Hill subdivision in the Northeast corner of the city when it meets March 22.

Members of the school board approved the subdivision plans at their meeting Tuesday. Plans for phase II call for the extension of Claycomb in a loop that will connect with Vintage Hill Drive, which is part of phase I that connects with Aspen Street.

THE NEW development area, planned for the north slope of the hill and bordering the Wayne Country Club, will require the construction of a sewage lift station to connect the sewer lines for the new homes with the city sewage treatment plant.

Don Siefken, Wayne city planning officer said the subdivision developer has indicated to the city that he would like to have the process moved along as quickly as possible to permit home construction in phase II this fall.

City Council awarded contracts Tuesday night for the extension of

## New plan is approved

A major step toward revision of Wayne's first planning and zoning regulations was taken Tuesday night when City Council approved the new

comprehensive plan for the community.

The document outlines general plans for development in the city and identifies general land use guides.

The next step in the process will be the passage of the zoning ordinance and subdivision regulations. The City Planning Commission and Council have been meeting jointly to review those proposed changes.

Following Tuesday's final public hearing on the comprehensive plan, council passed the ordinance accepting the guide for the city.

A final debate was staged during the hearing on a possible mobile home park south of Grañland Road. Landowner Jessica Olson made a final plea to be allowed to develop a small mobile home park in the area.

Fred Arnold, a home owner on

Grainland encouraged the city to maintain its earlier stance which removed the high density residential designation for the Grainland Road area. Such a designation would be needed to allow development of mobile home parks or apartments in the area.

The Planning Commission had recommended the area be designated for high density but residents in the area were successful in convincing council to change that to low density.

Planning commissioner Sam Schroeder, speaking at the public hearing, said the document and the process was too important to delay any further over minor points of contention.

The process of changing the city planning and zoning regulations has been going on for nearly three years.

## Board draws crowd

More than 50 people crowded into the Wayne High School home economics room Tuesday night to attend an uneventful school board meeting.

Several Carron parents attended the meeting to express concern over busing decisions which left their children stranded once and late to be picked up on other occasions.

"We're kind of left in the dark over there," said one parent.

School superintendent Dennis Jensen and the bus supervisor for Nebraska Bus Company, acknowledged the problems and said they

would not happen again.

Little mention was made of the issue which dominated discussion the previous night at the school—the possible elimination of strings music and German programs. Jensen said he reversed his decision to cut the programs as a budget saving move.

Members of the audience were limited to ten minutes of discussion on any subject at the beginning of the

## Developers will meet in Wayne

The quarterly meeting of the Nebraska Rural Development Commission canceled last month due to the weather is reset for next week. Lieutenant Governor Maxine Moul, Chairperson of the Commission, will be in Wayne for the meeting Thursday and Friday.

Commissioners will meet with area community leaders and elected officials Thursday at 7 p.m. at Riley's Pub, to discuss ways that local, state and federal government can work more effectively for community development.

The commission's quarterly meeting will begin Friday at 9 a.m. at the Wayne State College student center. Task Forces on health care, infrastructure, advocacy and education and government will give reports on their progress.

Public comment will be encouraged at the end of the commission meeting, approximately 3 p.m.

## Special education funding changes hit Wayne hard

Wayne School District taxpayers are being unfairly hit with increased costs for special education under a law passed during the special legislative session last summer, both school officials and representatives of Educational Service Unit #1 agree.

"This is something the taxpayers of this community should be really upset about," said ESU director Rod Garwood. "It's really unfair."

THE LAW change under LB 3 requires local school districts to bear the cost of special education for foster children and wards of the state when those students are placed by the Department of Social Services in foster homes in the local district.

Previously the cost had been funded by the state. The funding shift which will hit Wayne with as much as \$100,000 in additional budget responsibilities next year, according Superintendent Dennis Jensen, was simply an effort by the state to reduce its budget problems by passing the responsibility down to local entities. The state does reimburse local districts for a share of the costs of special education, but it is a declining scale and is paid a year in arrears. Currently the reimbursement is about 77 cents on the dollar.

WAYNE WILL suffer even worse budget woes if LB 92, currently in the legislature is passed. That will make local districts responsible for the special education needs of youngsters in

group homes and detention centers. "It's just bad legislation," said Garwood.

Both men said the law change was ultimately responsible for the special education budget growth for the Wayne Schools and not the construction of Tower School.

An article last week in the Herald had mistakenly attributed part of the additional costs in Wayne to the construction of the new special education facility.

"TOWER SCHOOL is not the problem," said Jensen. "We would have had these costs whether or not Tower School had been constructed." He said the school and special education services it provides save the district a great deal of money over the cost of Wayne providing special education on its own.

"It would be more expensive for the community if Tower School were not here," said Jensen. But neither men could discount the fact that the school might be an incentive for the Department of Social Services to place more handicapped youngsters in foster homes in Wayne. South Sioux City also with a ESU special education service site is in much the same situation.

CURRENTLY THE 25 schools in ESU 1 pay an average of \$18,000 per year for each student enrolled in the ESU program.

What upsets Jensen and Garwood is that the state can unilaterally place

## Administrator says PMC impacts area's economy

With 80 employees and a payroll of \$1,300,000, Providence Medical Center Administrator Marcile Thomas says the hospital is one of Wayne County's largest employers and has a significant impact on the area's economy.

By providing \$3,000,000 in payroll and purchases, Thomas added that Providence Medical Center injected over \$2,900,000 into Wayne's economy last year, including approximately \$2,300,000 in goods and services purchased in the area.

"Our hospital has an incredible economic impact on the Wayne area," said Thomas. "It is good that people think about the hospital as a provider of quality health care, but it also is important to remember that we are a big part of the business community."

AS IN WAYNE, Thomas said hospitals are among the largest employers in most Nebraska towns.

The 94 members of the Nebraska Hospital Association (NHA) employ over 31,000 people across the state, with a combined payroll of over half a billion dollars.

Thomas said Nebraska's hospitals provide an additional \$600 million to the state's economy for goods and services purchased.

"In addition to employing local people and buying goods in the area, we also care for the area's needy," Thomas said. "Last year the hospital donated over \$60,000 in unreimbursed care for the poor, and incurred \$59,000 in bad debts.

"OF COURSE, our number one concern is keeping people healthy and curing the sick. But as a business, we are concerned that the hospital remains a viable community resource," said Thomas.

"For health care, as with any other business, it benefits the community when you 'buy locally.'"

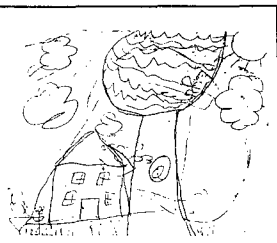
#### WSC presenting planetarium show

sewer and water lines and paving of streets in the Vintage Hill Phase I. Lots in that area will include the new Day Care Center. Underground work and street construction is set to begin as soon as weather permits, said Sicklen. The 15 phase I lots should be ready for home building early this summer, he said.

**WATER AND** sewer work was awarded to Albenesius Contracting of Jackson, Neb. for \$54,648. There were three other bidders with the quotes ranging up to \$79,800. The street paving and storm drainage project for Vintage Hill and East 6th Street was awarded to GLC, Inc. of Columbus for \$158,815. High bid on that work was \$208,000.

A new roof, new windows, tuckpointing of walls, insulation, a new electrical system, air conditioning, handicap accessibility and a new heating plant are all identified as needs in the report.

Skudder presented his findings to council Tuesday.

youngsters to a foster home in the district and thereby the district must bear the cost of their education, whether it be special needs or otherwise. Wayne must have a budget contingency for potential new placements in Wayne by the Department of Social Services.

Garwood said there is at least one school district within the ESU 1 area that is openly encouraging families not to become foster parents because of the additional costs the state is forcing on the local districts.

Both educators encouraged residents to contact the area's state legislative delegation to stress the need to defeat LB 92 and revise LB 3.

# ESU board hears school report

The board of directors of Educational Service Unit One (ESU 1) met Tuesday night in Wakefield and heard a review of the Bryan School programs in South Sioux City, which are operated by ESU 1.

Jean Dowhower, ESU 1 assistant director of special education, explained how students are accepted into the three programs offered at Bryan School, including severe and profound, moderately handicapped and early childhood.

Dowhower said the programs are labor intensive and take "very special, talented people."

She added that the school presently has 59 students and 22 staff members, although those numbers are expected to decrease next year when the South Sioux City school system will begin its own moderately handicapped and early childhood programs.

IN LIGHT of the fact that

South Sioux City Schools own the Bryan building and will begin their own programs next year, ESU board members Tuesday night heard a report by the building and grounds committee regarding the possibility of purchasing the Bryan School.

ESU 1 Administrator Rod Garwood said the South Sioux City School superintendent is in the process of having the building appraised and he believes the school would be "very amiable" regarding terms of a purchase agreement.

ESU 1 board members Tuesday night also accepted the resignations of five Bryan School employees, Linda Hamm, Tana Concaly, Chris Jorgensen, Diane Lundquist and Peggy Akins, who are expected to be contracted with the South Sioux City Schools.

IN OTHER business Tuesday, the ESU 1 board set the 1993-94 mileage rate at 28 cents, the same as last year, and heard a report on negotiations by board member Ron Wenstrand, who said 1993-94

marks the second year of a two-year contract.

The board voted unanimously to reaffirm the previous agreement and to approve wages and conditions for 1993-94.

GARWOOD reported on the progress of a contract for a technology feasibility study, being under-

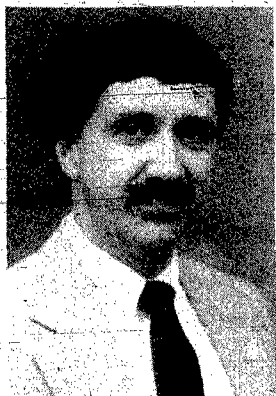
taken by ESU's 1 and 8, Wayne State College and Northeast Community College, to study the availability of distance learning. The cost to ESU 1 will be \$5,000.

## Learning is all wet

What makes clouds? Why do bubbles float? What are nitrates and where do they come from? Four-hundred-seventh-two fifth graders from Cedar, Dakota, Dixon, Thurston and Wayne Counties learned the answers to these and many other questions at AquaFest held this week in Wayne.

AquaFest is a hands-on educational program sponsored by the University of Nebraska in conjunction with Wayne State College Math/Science Division and the Lewis and Clark, Lower Elkhorn and Papio Missouri Natural Resource Districts and ESU 1.

Students participated in 12 educational workshops taught by members of the Jr. Academy of Sciences, Soil Conservation Service, University of Nebraska Cooperative Extension and Wayne State College faculty. Workshops dealt with wetlands, weather, recycling and other water-related topics.

"The program was designed to help students realize the importance of a clean, ample water supply,"

according to Michael Lechner, extension agent and coordinator of the event. "The program definitely realized it's goals!" he added.

"It's pretty cool," said Mike Lingo, a fifth grader from South Sioux City. "We learned that oil kills eggs and harms feathers and we've made big bubbles filled with propane." The bubble was to teach about various gasses and combustion.

"We learned Newton's three laws and learned how to fire off bottle rockets with air pressure," added A.J. McCaffrey, also of South Sioux City.

"The students are very excited and interested about all that they're doing today," said Evelyn Hamley, a fifth grade teacher at Wayne Public School. "The presenters are very enthusiastic and interesting."

AquaFest sponsors and presenters are busy making plans for next year. "We've already had schools asking about participation next year," said Lechner. "We hope to make this an annual event."

A new policy for school dismissal when extra curricular teams compete in state tournaments, was proposed for board consideration. Previously, the tradition had been to dismiss classes for state tournament attendance.

The proposed new policy would not dismiss classes but students would be allowed to attend the tournament. Those who chose to attend would be expected to make up missed classroom work. Teachers with children participating on the teams would be excused to attend, according to proposed policy change.

The board also set new drivers education fees for this summer. The charge for driver's education will be \$65 for resident students and \$110 for

non-resident students.

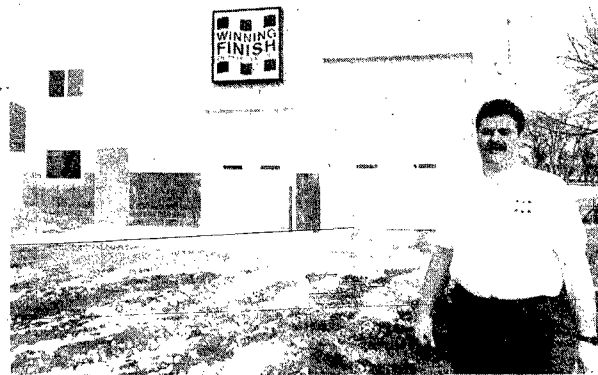
