

Developers to seek rural improvement

Members of the governor's commission on rural development meeting in Wayne Thursday and today observed Northeast Nebraska success stories as they discussed methods to overcome other problems both here and statewide.

Nearly 150 commissioners, economic leaders and local business people gathered for a "town-hall" discussion Thursday night, followed by a day which included discussion about problems raised at the evening meeting and continuing work on the commission's long term agenda.

Nebraska Lt. Gov. Maxine Moul, who chairs the commission promised that the work of the board "will not sit on the shelf and gather dust." She said in the two years since it was implemented, the commission has held 12 regional meetings around the state and developed 46 specific recommendations to the governor for action.

"THE COMMISSION'S goal is to serve as an advocate for rural Nebraska," said the Lt. Governor.

Issues of concern expressed at the

Thursday night session are being addressed by specific recommendations and in many cases administrative and legislative changes, she said.

The need for affordable housing was high on the priority list for representatives of several communities who attended the session.

Wayne was cited as a specific example of the opportunity for rural growth with affordable housing development since a high percentage of the industrial labor force employed in the community lives elsewhere.

Don Macke, director of the Rural Development Commission served as discussion moderator and said the same housing shortcomings have been cited in other Nebraska communities which have hosted the commission.

MACKE ENCOURAGED the group to try to identify specific state and federal regulations imposed on rural communities which are "holding them back" he said.

Red tape and regulations designed for metropolitan areas that don't apply in rural communities were two oft-quoted reasons for why the rural areas have a tougher time tapping

Concerned parents mobilize

Youth — the issues that affect them and most concern their parents — were addressed during a community meeting in Winside on Tuesday evening, hosted by Winside High School Guidance Counselor Leigh Fuhrman.

Fuhrman told a gathering of approximately 70 concerned parents and other interested citizens that this year has been her busiest for counseling students.

Guiding Tuesday night's discussion was Beverly Marion, integrated youth services coordinator from Heartland Counseling Services in South Sioux City.

Also on hand for the meeting were Wayne County Commissioners Bob Nissen and Gerry Pospishil, along with various professionals who shared information, including Julie Glandt of the Northeast District Office of Community Development Services; Alene Johnson, coordinator of the volunteer crisis hotline, a service of Project Access; and Dr. Michael LaCrosse of Monroe Mental Health Center, who told about services provided by the center.

LaCrosse said Monroe Mental Health Center treats more youth than adults and that the majority of their problems include chemical abuse, then depression, followed by parent/child problems and anxiety attacks.

MARION listed concerns given by the audience, which were then categorized into moral values, mental health, authority, social issues, and personal behavior.

From these categories, meeting participants listed the top four issues of concern, including 1) mental health, suicide; 2) alcohol, tobacco and other drugs; 3) attitudes and respect; and 4) lack of things for youth to do.

"If you think there's a problem, it's better to get help early than to delay," said Dr. LaCrosse. "Strong emotions blur our vision — we sometimes need someone to get us back on the right track."

Marion stated that she had previously spent time with Winside High School students and conducted a survey with them. She assured the

Wayne superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen announced the filling of three varsity head coaching spots vacated with the resignations of Marlene Uhing and Bob Uhing, recently. The Uhing's resigned from their coaching duties only.

Joyce Hoskins will be the varsity volleyball head coach and she'll be assisted by Dale Hochstein. Hoskins is a current sixth grade teacher in Wayne and was the junior high volleyball coach.

Hoskins is a 1986 graduate of Hastings High School and a 1990 graduate of Midland Lutheran College in Fremont where she started on the volleyball team.

Hoskins' husband Brad is the

current varsity boys basketball coach in Wakefield. "I feel very good about taking over the position of head volleyball coach," Hoskins said. "I have a lot of things I want to accomplish and I am looking forward to the challenge of coaching on the Class B level."

ROGER REIKOFSKI will take over head coaching duties for the Lady Blue Devils basketball team. Reikofski has been Marlene's assistant for the past five seasons.

Reikofski is a fourth grade teacher in Wayne and has been since his 1988 graduation from Wayne State. He is also a 1983 graduate of Elkhorn Valley High School in Tilden.

Besides assisting Marlene in basketball the past five years he has

been the freshman volleyball coach and the head junior high track coach. "I'm very excited about the move to head coach," Reikofski said. "It's something I've wanted since Marlene said she was going to be resigning."

Reikofski said he feels very confident in taking over the controls of the girls basketball program after following Marlene for half a decade. "Marlene was an excellent coach," Reikofski said. "A lot of the X's and O's that I use will be a direct result of her teachings. She taught me a lot about basketball as did Bob (Uhing)."

REIKOFSKI IS a resident of Carroll and is on the Village Board. He will receive his masters degree

Tornado drill planned

WAYNE — As part of "Nebraska Severe Weather Awareness Week," the City of Wayne will take part in a tornado warning drill on Wednesday, March 24.

Vern Fairchild, assistant civit defense director, said the drill will consist of a mock tornado watch shortly after 10 a.m., followed by a mock tornado warning at approximately 10:30 a.m., with sirens for 60 seconds. The Cablevision Emergency Alert System also will be activated at that time.

Fairchild said the drill would also be a good time for all employers, teachers, parents and others to practice their own tornado plans. In the event of an actual tornado warning, all persons should seek below ground shelter.

Fairchild added that there is no such thing as an all clear signal, and if residents hear the tornado signal being given a second time, it will mean that another tornado has been sighted and residents should remain in their shelter.

In the event of an actual severe weather risk at the time, Fairchild said the drill will be canceled.

into government grant programs for economic development.

Statistical limitations were also cited. Most Nebraska counties have very low unemployment rates because Nebraskans do not stay on unemployment very long. They find other jobs or they move out of the county, said Macke. He said many federal development grant programs are tied to high unemployment rates that Nebraska communities seldom qualify for.

HE SAID THE commission has worked to try to convince the federal administrators to take other factors into account when determining need. He said they should look at underemployment and out migration figures.

"We need to identify those state and federal regulations that are really holding us back," said Macke.

Loss of our well-educated young people to careers out of state is also a real problem identified by the group.

Mrs. Moul pointed out that the state colleges like Wayne State have been working hard to keep kids in the state.

"We should point to the successes of our state colleges," she said. An

increasing percentage of state college grads are remaining in Nebraska for their careers she said.

But, the push needs to continue to provide high tech jobs which will keep our young people coming back.

"If jobs were available, they'd be very happy to stay in rural Nebraska," said Dr. Donald Mash, Wayne State President of the average rural graduate.

TOM UNRUH, a staff member of the National Governor's Association on loan to the National Initiative on Rural America attended the Wayne meeting from Washington, D.C. and addressed the group on the role of the national initiative.

"It is an effort for the federal government to get it's act together on rural development," he said.

He said the effort would help bring the many federal agencies which have a stake in rural development together under one coherent national policy.

"We need to change the position of the federal government from one of being a director of community development to one of being a partner," he said.

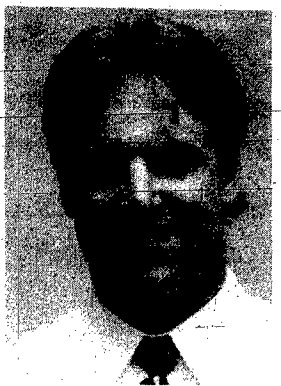

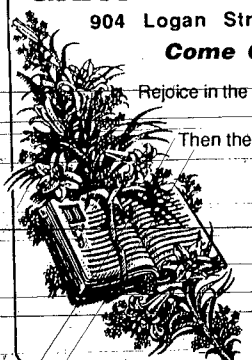

Superintendent tells board

Elementary enrollment growing

The Wakefield Community School board of education met earlier this month and learned that elementary student enrollment has increased from 297 to 318 since the beginning of the 1992-93 school year.

Superintendent Derwin Hartman reported on the student increase and the lack of teacher power in certain key areas.

The board also approved a nursing contract with Educational Service Unit One for one and a half days of service per week at a cost of \$1,575 per year.

LENRD Board Votes To Establish No-Till Demonstration Plot Program

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District board voted to approve a cost-share program to establish several no-till demonstration plots throughout the district at the monthly board meeting, Thursday evening at the Howells Village office.

The approved motion will establish a cost-share program for producers to no-till drill soybeans into corn residue in small demonstration plots.

"Producers who are trying to comply with conservation goals established in their conservation plans are making significant progress with crop residue management," said Ken Berney, assistant manager.

"Several different forms of conservation tillage have been used to provide soil erosion control benefits for highly erodible land," he said. "However, many producers within our district have hesitated to no-till drill soybeans into corn residue."

The Lower Elkhorn NRD will contract with custom operators to drill 10 to 20 acre soybean plots, according to Berney. Soil conservation Service field offices will coordinate the work on the plots and cooperate with the producers to ensure successful demonstration plots. Through this NRD program, landowners will pay the custom operators to drill the soybeans and will be reimbursed \$5 per acre up to 20 acres.

The board also recommended to authorize the formation of an advisory committee for the Groundwater Management Plan revision. The advisory committee-representing diverse interests-will give the Lower Elkhorn NRD guidance in amending the district's Groundwater Management Plan. The amendments to the Groundwater Management Plan are required by state law and will address groundwater quality concerns within the district.

"Participation on the advisory committee will give the public an opportunity to discuss and plan for groundwater quality issues throughout the district," said Rick Wozniak, LENRD water resources manager. The committee will consist of 20 individuals and meet four times, according to Wozniak.

In other business, the board approved the motion to retain Bartlett and West Engineers of Topeka, Kan. to perform the feasibility study for a possible next phase of the Logan East Rural Water System.

The next Lower Elkhorn NRD Board meeting will be held Thursday, March 25, 1993.

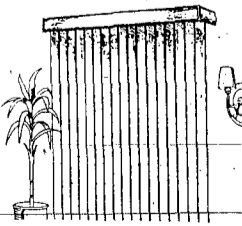

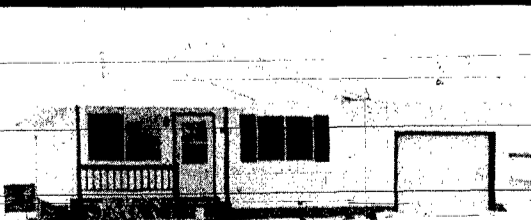

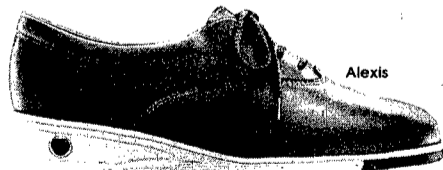
