Top Moms named by their kids

The top moms in the Wayne area were given medals Friday morning at the second annual Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce Top Mom's coffee.

"They are excellent models for all of us," said Will Davis, chairman of the Chamber Retail Council, which annually sponsors the contest as a Mother's Day Tribute. He spoke not just of the mothers but also of the warm-hearted relationship between them and their children.

Youth in the area were invited to write essays nominating their mother's for the honor. Five winners were named out of the nearly 100 entries judged by a panel of retired school teachers.

DAVIS, WHO addressed the Mother's Day tribute at the Chamber Coffee, said the young essayists, both those who won and those who didn't "were reflecting back the positive things--the image of that loving relationship--that you and your child have for each other."

He said mothers should be more willing to accept the compliments from their children, and children should be more willing to give those compliments. That is what Mother's Day is all about, he added.

Davis cited the many things mentioned in the essays the children submitted about what mothers are, "they are providers, nurses, chauffeurs, teachers, friends, confidantes, and sometimes the rudder that gets us back on course," he said.

THE FIVE honorees and their children all were in attendance for the ceremony at the Black Knight. Those honored were Beth Deck, nominated by her daughter, Rachel; Diane Borgmann, nominated by her daughter Emily; Debbie Ensz, nominated by her son Jeff and a two-time winner; Dan Hledik nominated by his daughter Cassandra, and Cynthia Rethwisch, nominated by her son Jason.

They each received medals that say Top Mom 1993.

Detour ahead

Work is scheduled to begin May 17 on Highway 9 between Wakefield and Emerson, according to the Nebraska Department of Roads.

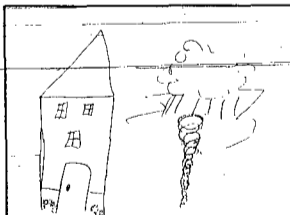

Gardner Foundation funding scholarship

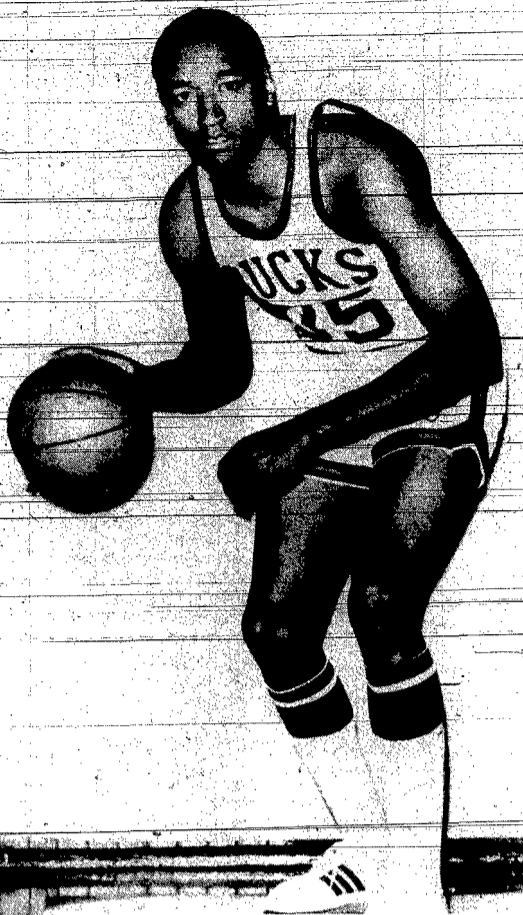
Bob was a member of the 1960 Olympic Gold Medal Basketball Team that played in Rome, Italy. That team was later labeled as the

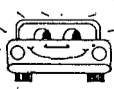

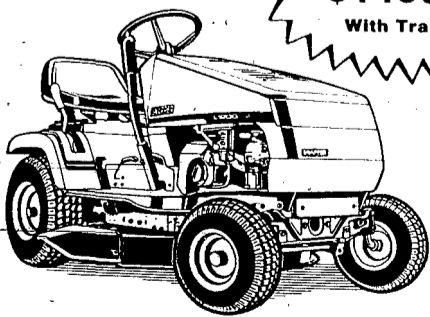
During their six-month stay in Nebraska, the Andreuskins have been offering classes and making

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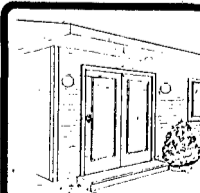

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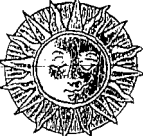
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
