## Man dies of fight injuries

A fight outside of the Max Lounge in Wayne last Friday has resulted in the death of 28-year-old Robert Jones, an Omaha native and resident of Phoenix, Arizona

Jones never regained consciousness before being pronounced dead late Wednesday night in Sioux City's Marian Health Center as a result of a severe brain injury and

Another Omaha native and former Wayne State graduate Bob Sterba, was arraigned Thursday morning in Wayne on first-degree assault charges. Wayne County Attorney Michael Pieper said that Sterba could face additional charges as the investigation into the incident is still on-going. Pieper also said that other participants may be

Sterba was originally placed in custody of the Pierce County Jail on \$100,000 bond but during Thursday's arraignment his bail was reduced to \$75,000.

A preliminary hearing for Sterba has been slated for Thursday, May 27 in Wayne at 2:15 p.m. He is currently out of jail on bond after 10 percent of the bond was posted.

# City finds meaning of where sidewalk ends'

'Where the Sidewalk Ends" is a popular children's book, and Wayne City Council heard a grown-up version of the story Tuesday night as an overflow crowd argued for and re-ceived several changes in the city

sidewalk policy.

More than 50 residents attended the meeting to discuss a variety of issues involving sidewalk requirements and policies.

The city is entering the third year of a comprehensive sidewalk improvement plan. Until Tuesday, the plan had been to provide joint funding for replacement of damaged or

THE PLACEMENT of new sidewalks where none existed before is what brought out Tuesday's mild and often light-hearted protest.

'If people don't want it, why do we doit," said attorney Duane Schroeder arguing for climination of what he called an effort to force new sidewalks down residents throats.

'I don't think there is a need for hem-everywhere," said Dick Gavit. Ed Brogie told council members he

was a member of a special "sidewalko-phobia" club in Wayne and was opposed to the idea of new sidewalks everywhere. In a more serious vein he said, "Good ideas don't always make good laws or good ordinances, especially when you have to enforce

NO ONE SPOKE against the idea of repairing existing sidewalks, but a proposal to place a new sidewalk on the west side of Walnut Street as part of this dar's improvement program drewalmostuniversal opposition from no place to park and would loose front yards and landscaping if the proposed sidewalk was installed. He said the houses on the street, built in the 60's are too close together to allow the addition of garages and are too close to the street to allow for the installation of sidewalks.

Council agreed with the hardship sidewalks would create on Walnut and removed that segment from the 1993 plan in a unanimous vote

**BUT, COUNCIL** members argued for the general need for sidewalks in many areas of the city where they aren't currently located.

New sidewalks should be a priority and then make exceptions (like Walnut Drive)," said Jane O'Leary.

# Farmers rush 'like ants' to do field work

Only about 20 percent of the Wayne County Corn Acres have been planted to date, according to the Wayne County ASCS office and most of that vas planted in the last two days as farmers scramble to make use of the asonable weather

Cool wet conditions statewide have delayed field work and created potential weed and pest woes.

They're out like ants in those fields now," said Terri Post, Wayne County ASCS director explaining that everyone is trying to make up for lost time.

By comparison, last year at this time, 95 percent of the county corn crop was planted and 70 percent had already emerged, she said. Last year's cool summer delayed maturity, however, and she said she hopes that does not happen again.

Many farmers missed the window

mates in the county show the wet weather delayed out seeding until it was too late. She said about 40 percent of the designated oat acres have gone unplanted and that land may be shifted to other crops.

By this time last year, 15 percent of the soybean acres in the county had ecmplanted. "We've got none planted

so far this year," she explained.

By comparison 27 percent of the corn acres are planted according to statewide estimates. During the first week of May, rainfall exceeded 200 percent of normal in eastern Nebraska according to Al Weiss, agricultural

meteorologist.
The ASCS office reported they haven't heard of farmers shifting to short season corn plantings in Wayne County yet. Ms. Post said at the rate farmers are planting now, most of the crop could be planted in the next few





# School changes discussed; students are liking math

one of them since kindergarten."



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


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


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Ginny pauses to point out that Mrs. Shelton was featured in the 1982 edition of Woman's World magazine in an article they did on rural schools.

"All of the kids get-along well despite the age differences," adds Ginny. "They all watch out after one another, and its common to see the older kids helping the younger ones with their studies

Ginny says the highlight of the year was probably during the Christmas holidays when the stu-dents put on a play for relatives and friends. "The kids and teacher worked very hard."

Ginny said she is very disap-pointed and sad to see District 77 shut down and she sincerely hopes that all of the children will someday realize the significance of the little school on the hill and the role it played in their lives.

ACCORDING to an article which appeared in a Wayne County history book and was written by Leonard Nelson, the first teacher at District 77 was Frankie Stimson, who conducted three terms between January 1897 and March 1898.

The first two terms were two months long and the third was four months. Only reading, writing and arithmetic were taught and the pupils were arranged in grades A, B and C according to their achieve-

Patrons of the district are proud o boost the fact that Nebraska Poet Laureate John G. Neihardt also served as a teacher at District 77 from December 1898 through the following March.

School attendance was irregular during the first few years, with records showing that in 1898, during a two-month term, one boy attended school three days and was tardy each time. Enrollment figures in 1900 showed 49 students attend-

ing District 77.


The number of students attending the school has continued to decline in recent years, with records indicating an average of 14 students

in the 1950's, and an average of 16 students in the 1960's and 1970's.


During the past 12 years, enrollment at District 77 has averaged seven students per year.

THE PRESENT school structure, which was constructed in 1924 when the original school building became rundown, will be auctioned off, along with its contents, on Sunday, June 6.

Present plans call for the school bell to be cemented in on the school grounds as a memorial to Wayne County School District 77 and the hundreds of children who passed through it's doors.

# April weather: wet as usual

Wayne -weather observer Pat Gross says the month of April was wet as April's go, with 5.04 inches of precipitation compared to a 10-year average of 3.75 inches.

Gross said that is considerably short of the record 8.74 inches in 1984 or the 7.91 inches in 1920 and the 7.42 inches in 1927. Other recent amounts of interest in the last 10 years include 6.99 inches in 1985 and 6.73 inches in 1986.

"The farmers, especially those with livestock, could sure use some drying weather," observed Gross, pointing out that the greatest daily rainfall for the month came on April 20 with 1.37 inches.

The average high temperature was 55 degrees for the month, however Gross said there wasn't an abundance of sunshine and wind to make for good drying conditions

The average low temperature for

the month was 34 degrees. coldest days of the month were April 2 and 3 with 18 degrees, and the warmest was 73 degrees on April 24,

"There is no doubt Spring is well on its way; the grass is green, the trees are budding and people are sneezing more," said Gross. "And we are seeing old friends who have returned from winter hibernation."

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

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
