

## Building boom period opening at Wayne State

The Wayne State College campus will be crawling with construction workers for some months to come as several major construction projects are scheduled to get underway.

Financing is in place for a major new addition to the Student Center at Wayne State College and design work has begun on the project that is anticipated to begin construction next spring.

The Nebraska State College Board of Trustees last week approved the bond issue of \$3.6 million which will be merged with \$2 million of existing student-generated revenue for the \$5.2 million building addition.

The financing for the building will come from student fees.

THE STUDENT center project was originally scheduled to be under construction this summer but has been

delayed by up to 14 months by the Nebraska State Coordinating Commission for Higher Education and legislative approval.

Work will begin yet this summer on the new \$4 million Business Department building. Bids will be opened on the structure next week, and if they come in at expected levels, work could begin in June, said Andrew Sol, Vice President for Administrative Services.

The new business building, the first classroom building to be added to the campus in more than a quarter century, is designed to help alleviate serious overcrowding of classroom space on a campus that has seen enrollment climb to over 4,000 students.

PRIVATE FUNDING is also being sought for an \$880,000 renovation of the old physical plant building.

## Carnival celebrates the start of vacation

All Wayne area youngsters through the age of fourth grade are invited to celebrate the last day of school on Tuesday, May 25 during a carnival being co-sponsored by Dairy Queen and the Wayne Kiwanis Club.

Jaquie Kinnett, manager of the local Dairy Queen, said that while the carnival is designed as a fun event for area children, it is also a fund raiser for the Children's Miracle Network Telethon to help fund children's medical services and programs at St. Luke's Regional Medical Center in Sioux City.

Kinnett pointed out that all of the carnival proceeds will go to the Children's Miracle Network Telethon to be used at St. Luke's to support health care for children.

THE CARNIVAL will take place from noon until 4 p.m. in the Dairy Queen parking lot and will include games, a bicycle safety

check conducted by members of the Wayne Police Department, and a magic show scheduled to take place at 3 p.m.

Kinnett said youngsters can purchase a \$2 package, with \$1 going towards tickets for four games (or a small cone), and the other \$1 going towards the purchase of a Children's Miracle Network Telethon paper balloon which will include the youngster's name and will be displayed inside the Dairy Queen. Each additional game will cost 25¢.

Kinnett added that youngsters may also purchase a brown bag lunch special at a cost of \$1.75.

"THE DAIRY Queen and the Wayne Kiwanis Club hope that a lot of youngsters will attend and we can make this an annual event," said Kinnett.

"I know there are many children out there who have benefited from St. Luke's and the Children's Miracle Network Telethon."

Kinnett added that in the event of rain, the carnival will be canceled.

## Death of a school is lesson for students

In a small one-room schoolhouse four miles north and three-quarters west of Wayne, a teacher chalks the name of President James A. Garfield on the board.

The death of the president probably began the first current events discussion at the school back in the early 1880's.

Twenty-two U.S. presidents and 112 years later, Miss Ginger Grimm has her nine students talking about the same types of topics: war in Bosnia, Ross Perot and the death of their own school — Wayne County District 15.

Wednesday, May 19 at noon was when the kindergarten through eighth grade classes recessed for summer, but if the county reorganization committee agrees as expected and County Superintendent Harry Mills signs the paperwork, District 15 will be permanently closed as of June 1.

"WHEN JUNE 1 rolls around, the school will be officially closed," Grimm says. "Right now the kids are just glad to get out of school for summer vacation, but they're a little apprehensive about where they'll be going for classes next fall."

"With new laws that say all

Class I schools must affiliate or merge, I think it was decided that this was the time to close down," she added.

Onar Spahr, who attended District 15 herself through 1973 and has two children now attending, says part of the reason for closing

is attendance.

"There are just no new prospects in the district for the next few years," Spahr said. "Next year there would only be about five students attending and when you get that

## Teacher to try 'new things'

When students leave her class, Evelyn Hamley wants her fifth graders to think about something they've never thought about before.

If they get nothing else out of the class, she would like them to find an interest they want to pursue on their own time.

"I teach the standard classes of math, science and English of that sort, but I also try to expose the students to things they don't normally get to see in a classroom," Evelyn said.

"One way I do this is with astronomy. We look at the stars and constellations in a basic way. That way," she adds, "when they go outside the door at night they can look up and notice new things."

BUT NEW things are not just for students.

Evelyn has plans of her own to try new things when she retires from her helm at the front of the fifth grade class at Wayne Middle School at the end of the current school year.

"Oh, there's no particular reason why I'm leaving. It's just that I'm old enough."

"You probably don't need to put that in the paper," she says with a quick laugh, "but I just figured there comes a time to go and experience new things."

## Four star Waynian to retire

Four-star General James B. Davis, a native of Wayne, will be retiring in June from his post as commander of the Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, (SHAPE), in Belgium.

Davis' retirement marks the culmination of a distinguished military career which began when he left Wayne State College to enter the U.S. Naval Academy. He will be the last U.S. commander of the European allied forces—being replaced by a German Army General Peter H. Carstens.

The reallocation of leadership positions is part of the overall restructuring.

### School schedules physicals

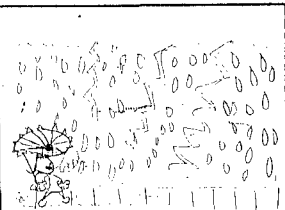

(continued from page 1) on campus into an art studio. This spring the Peter Kiewit Foundation awarded \$220,000 to Wayne State in a challenge grant for the art studio project. Sol said other funding sources are being investigated. Additionally, construction of the Business Building and the addition to the student center will eat into the college's parking spaces. Some 230 spaces will be eliminated by the two projects and in anticipation, Sol said the college is in the design process now on an addition to the new parking lot on the east edge of campus. The college may be ready to sign contracts on that work later this summer, he said.

The chairman added that the prisoner will have to bail himself out of jail with the same amount of matching funds. "The catch is," said the chairman, "the prisoner can't take the money out of his or her own pocket. He, or she, will have to find a friend to bail them out of the ambulance jail."

low, you just can't afford to go on." After the 1992-93 school year ends, only three district schools will remain in operation in Wayne County — Districts 29, 51 and 57. "I'll be kind of sad," Spahr said. "I really believe the students learn more out here in the country because they can learn more from each other."

AT DISTRICT 15, students in grades kindergarten through eight sit alongside each other everyday for every class. Nine students attended this year and came from only five different families.

"Everyone is so close," Grimm says. "It is literally a family atmosphere where brothers and sisters work together."

"When I work with the sixth through eighth grades, the younger students sometimes stop what they're doing to listen. In that way I think they are able to learn more quickly. By the time they are in the eighth grade, they may have been exposed to a topic seven times already. There is definitely a lot of carry-over."

Part of Grimm's teaching involves current event issues as well.

"We've had some very serious discussion here," she smiles. "The kids debated candidates and elected Perot president, and they've decided the U.S. foreign policy concerning Bosnia should be to take care of problems here at home first."

"The kids all form their own ideas and have interesting views for being the age that they are."

dents have given her.

Still on her desk is the film projector ladder that lets her point the projector at just the right height. She also won't forget the boy who made an invention to cut the crust off of bread.

Invention entries in recent years have been sent to Weekly Reader and Fagn Journal, and several have won prize money.

"There are so many little things that I'm going to miss about teaching," she said, "but at the same time I'm happy about my decision."

"There are things we can't do in town because we don't have time to get there until at night after school," Ruwe said.

Eighth grader Nick Spahr says he is anxious to move on as well and meet more people.

"I know we miss out on quite a bit the town school gets to do, but overall I think we're pretty well about the same," he said.

Although the country schoolers are able to get involved with projects for Earth Week or traveling to the Omaha zoo, such things as getting to a fair-sized library can be a hassle.

"ONE OF the benefits of this type of atmosphere," Grimm says, "is that we're not locked into a schedule with lunch at this time and math at this time. If we need to spend more time in the science area, we can."

"A negative side to it all,"

Grimm added, "is the lack of social interaction with other students and teachers that are available with a larger school."

Students at District 15 were able to learn more hands-on skills than most school children get thanks to the fact that they didn't have a hot lunch cafeteria. The kids have to learn to cook for themselves with the stove and microwave that is available. Through this, Grimm explains, they are able to use math skills with fractions and timing.

For Thanksgiving, the students put on a play, read poetry and also learned to shop and cook a feast for 25 people.

So it was family-like experiences such as this that kept District 15 open for well over a century.

However, plans are in the works to keep the building alive by moving it to the Wayne County Fairgrounds provided that the necessary funds are raised to move the school.

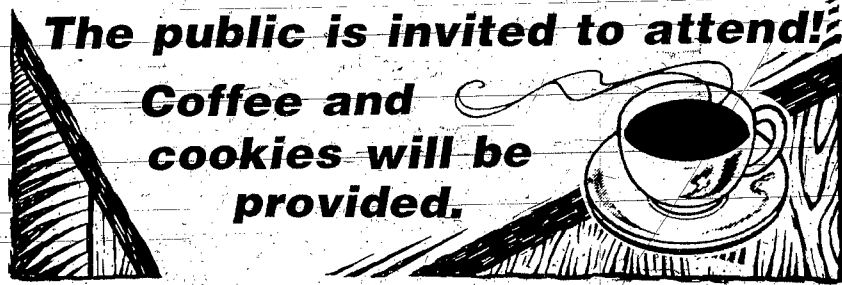

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# Weed management specialist joins staff at Northeast Station

Working in agriculture is nothing new for David Holshouser, the new Cooperative Extension Integrated Weeds Management specialist at the University of Nebraska Northeast Research and Extension Center near Concord.

The climate and the crop and weed varieties may be different from what he used to deal with in Texas, but David says the small farm and small town atmosphere of Northeast Nebraska has brought him full circle to the way of life he and his family like best.

Raised on a small farm near Salisbury, N.C., in the Piedmont Region, David brings with him that flavor of southern hospitality and the knowledge and education to tackle just about anything Northeast Nebraska is willing to dish out.

David's position is replacing, in part, the redefined position of retired weeds and crops specialist, Russell Moomaw, who held the position in the Northeast District for almost 20 years. David, along with Todd Peterson, the new Integrated Cropping Systems specialist housed in Lincoln, will be covering both the Northeast and Southeast Extension Districts. David's position requires 40 percent research and 60 percent extension appointments.

David attained his BS in Agronomy and his MS in Crop Science at North Carolina State. He traveled to College Station, Texas, with his wife Melanic, a CPA, to work toward his Ph.D. in Weed Science at Texas A&M, a degree he will have accomplished by the end of May, 1993.

He worked for six years as a Research Associate for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station where he tried to tackle the enormous problem of weed control forced upon him by the Texas climate and soil conditions.

"Whereas corn is king in the Midwest, cotton is king in Texas," says David, "but weeds are weeds, and weeds affect yield no matter what crop they grow in. The difference between Texas and Nebraska is that Texas has a lot more weeds to deal with — and insects."

David says he hopes to be able to answer any questions asked him by local producers. He added that he is in the process of acquainting himself with his new surroundings and the various cropping systems native to northeast Nebraska. He is currently setting up plots at the Northeast Center and is quickly getting into the thick of things.

David says he knows his family will like northeast Nebraska. "This year was the first time my daughter

saw snow. She was really excited, so I know she'll adjust pretty fast." The biggest change for me, added David, is coming to a region where agriculture is the main industry.

David and Melanic and their three-year-old daughter, Emily, are currently living in Wayne.

Mrs. Ehlers reported that five attended the Spring Event in Albion and that Marjorie Summers' name was drawn to attend the School of Missions at Kearney in July.

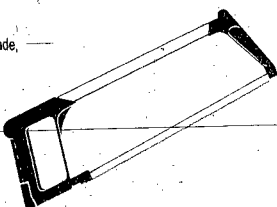
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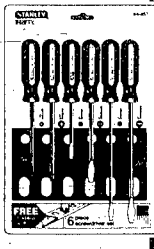

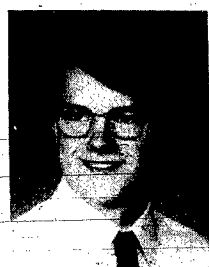

## WSC ex-president to stay at Central

Central Missouri State University President Ed Elliott announced he would not step down from his current post. Elliott joined Central after serving as president of Wayne State College from 1982 to 1985.

There are still a number of goals that remain to be achieved, and I am resolved to provide strong leadership to do just that," Elliott told the Board of Regents.

The president's announcement was met with a standing ovation from the crowd of more than 50 faculty and staff who gathered in the University Union.

Elliott's decision came after almost two months of uncertainty about his future with the university. In a March 31 announcement, he indicated that he would ask the regents to release him from his five-year contract, which expires in 1997, as the university's chief executive officer.

He had planned to discuss details about his leaving the university during an executive session with the board April 14, but following an outpouring of support from faculty, students and alumni, he was asked by the regents to reconsider his decision.

A petition signed by nearly 250 faculty members and another one signed by about 900 students were submitted to the regents during that April session expressing support for Elliott. Almost 100 letters from alumni and other individuals were

also received by the board.

"The principal reason for my action was the need for a substantial period of time away from the intensity, pressure and stress of managing this complex and diverse institution of higher learning," Elliott told the board.

His agreement with the board calls for Elliott to take all official accumulated vacation time as consecutive time off this fall. Additionally, the board has suggested that after the vacation has been taken, the remainder of the fall would be devoted to special projects as determined by the regents. Thus, the total time away from campus would be approximately four months, beginning in mid-August. He will resume day-to-day responsibilities Jan. 4, 1994, immediately following the annual winter break.

On behalf of himself and his wife Sandra, Elliott expressed appreciation to all of those who have offered their support during their intense decision-making process.

"I want to extend our heartfelt thanks to all those who expressed their concern and support over these several weeks. Students, faculty, staff alumni and community members as well as friends and officials from around the state and nation have been so wonderful in their outpouring of genuine support for us and what has been accomplished at Central," Elliott said.

While his official retirement date is July 1, a farewell honors ceremony will be held for him at SHAPE in Casteau, Belgium on June 18.
