

Farmers wage catch-up war with weather

Northeast Nebraska farmers are still playing a catchup game with Mother Nature, but Wayne Countians have managed to get 90 percent of the corn crop planted and 30 percent of the soybeans between rainstorms according to the county ASCS office.

Most of the region is reporting rainfall totals for the year of more than 125 percent of normal, but in Wayne itself, weather observer Pat Gross reports rainfall at half an inch below average for May and year to date moisture totals right on the ten year average.

The problem, says Gross, is there hasn't been much opportunity for the ground to dry between rainfalls. Last year the average temperature in May was 74 degrees, said Gross, while this year it was only 69 degrees.

The conditions aren't creating too much anxiety yet among farmers, according to ASCS Director Terri Post. She said, however, the window is closing fast on the corn planting opportunity and those who haven't

planted yet may be looking at shorter term alternatives.

She added the time frame for soybeans is not critical yet.

First cutting of alfalfa has also been delayed by the cool, wet weather.

Statewide, the picture is similar. Drier conditions in the past week allowed farmers to catch up on fieldwork, and as of Tuesday, 95 percent of the state's corn was planted, according to state officials.

Overall in the past week the eastern half of the state has become drier, but temperatures remained cooler than normal. The western half of the state is also drier, although warmer than normal, according to Al Weiss, University of Nebraska-Lincoln climate resource specialist.

This past week of drier conditions allowed farmers to catch up on fieldwork. Corn planting is 95 percent complete, compared to 100 percent complete one year ago, according to the Nebraska Agricultural Statistics Service.

Soybean planting is 36 percent

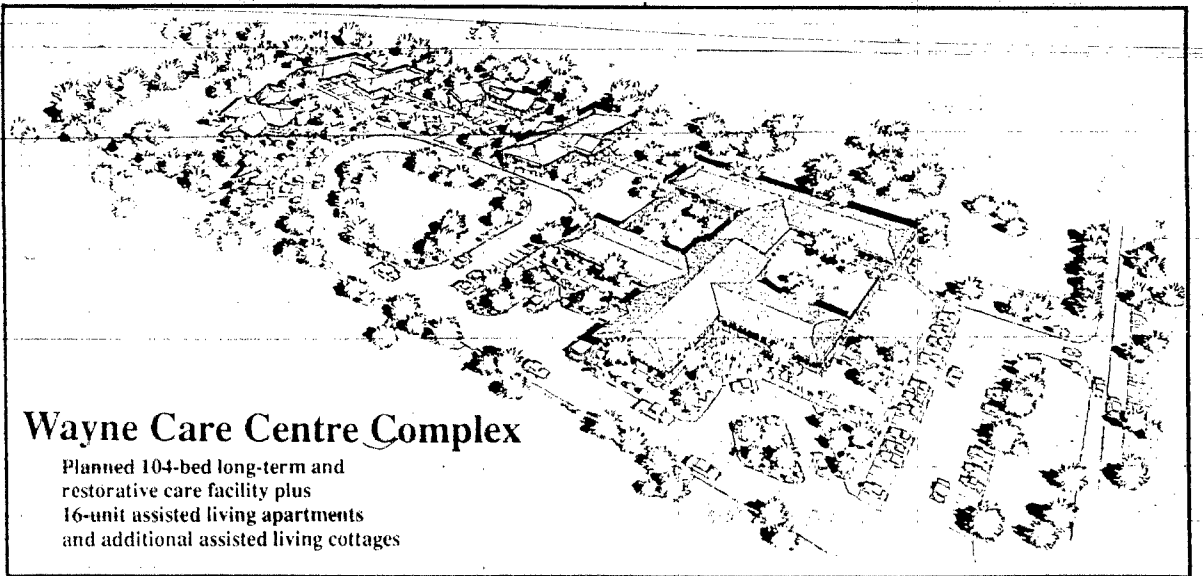

Wayne Care Centre Complex

Planned 104-bed long-term and restorative care facility plus 16-unit assisted living apartments and additional assisted living cottages

Plans added as weather delays center

After years of planning and waiting for financing approval, the new 104-bed Wayne Care Centre is ready for construction. But, now the wait is for the weather.

"It's frustrating," said Pat Lichty, care center administrator. He said the wet weather has already delayed by several months, the projected opening of the center. But the interim time has been used to plan new additions to the facility even before the construction phase begins in earnest, he said.

A 16-UNIT assisted living apartment complex will be built adjacent to the center and plans also have been drawn for assisted living cottages on the site for even more independent living for senior citizens, said Bob Conlon, CEO of Boyle corporation, the parent company for Wayne Care Centre.

Another new addition to the facility even before it is built will be a Restorative Medicare Wing, which will provide "a whole new dimension" to the care center, Lichty told members of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce who gathered at the old facility for coffee Friday.

The center has already added staff and begun upgrading services with an eye toward moving into the new restorative care wing. Lichty described the new service as the interim care between hospital dismissal and return to home.

Under the Medicare crunch, he said, hospitals are being forced to dismiss patients who still need therapy and recovery time before they can be termed independent. That's the niche the new wing will fulfill, he said.

LICHTY SAID the new facility will be regional in scope, attracting people from throughout Northeast

Nebraska for its specialized coordinated therapy and recovery services.

He said once built, the facility will create 15 to 20 new professional level jobs in the community. Those will be in addition to the new therapists who have already been added to the staff in anticipation of the new services, he said.

Construction of the multi-million dollar center is scheduled to take more than a year. Some site preparation work was completed last winter. The facility is scheduled for construction on East 14th between the Wayne America water tower and Providence Medical Center.

Accused seeks dismissal of charges

Bob Sterba and his counsel, David Copple of Norfolk, did not enter a plea at Wednesday's district court in Wayne but they did file a motion to quash (dismiss charges) which will be heard on Wednesday, July 7 at 2 p.m. at the Wayne Court House.

Sterba, facing charges of first-

degree assault and manslaughter in the May 12 death of Robert C. Jones, was given his constitutional rights from judge Robert Ensz.

He was also read his charges and possible penalties if convicted. A guilty verdict of first-degree assault could result in a maximum of 20 years imprisonment and/or a \$25,000 fine. A one-year prison term is the minimum sentence for that crime.

A guilty verdict on the manslaughter charge is also a maximum penalty of 20 years imprisonment and/or a \$25,000 fine. The minimum penalty is one year if found guilty.

If Sterba is convicted on both counts he may be ordered to serve both penalties concurrently. Ensz gave Sterba four possible pleas which included: 1) admit guilt, 2) plead not guilty, 3) stand mute, 4)

plead no contest which means he doesn't wish to contest the charges.

Copple asked for a motion for the bond on Sterba to be dropped so he could move to Omaha to work for the summer as a commercial painter. Wayne County Attorney Michael Pieper objected to the motion saying that the charges against Sterba were very serious.

'Unsung Heroes' committed to task

With hundreds and hundreds of volunteer hours to their credit, members of the Wayne Child Care Board have more than earned the right to the title of "Unsung Heroes."

The Wayne Herald recognizes this dedicated, behind-the-scenes group of 11 individuals during the month of June as they launch a major fund-raising drive to help furnish a new child care facility — Rainbow World — currently under construction in Wayne.

Presently serving on the Wayne Child Care Board are Mary Kranz, president, Janet Dyer, vice president, Carolee Stuber, secretary-treasurer, Nancy Heithold, Leslie Hausmann, Joanie Burleigh, Dennis Lipp, Tim Pickinpaugh, Diane Ehrhardt, Mary Temme and Gary West.

THE BOARD was formed in November of 1990 from a START Day Care Task Force which was organized when the lack of day care centers in Wayne was identified as one of the top five issues facing the community.

Although construction of Rainbow World has been an ongoing and major project of the Wayne Child Care Board, the community has benefited from a variety of other board-sponsored programs designed

to support existing child care providers.

Through the efforts of the board, a resource center was established at Wayne Public Library which provides a variety of information, games and toys for use by day care providers as well as parents.

In addition, the board has published a directory listing the names, addresses and phone numbers of all licensed day care providers and

preschools in Wayne, along with a child care check list.

The brochures are available at Wayne Public Library, the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce office, and at local realtors' offices.

Local providers have also benefited from the Wayne Child Care Board which has helped pay their way to attend seminars and clinics designed to enhance child care in the community.

Future goals of the board include developing a "Before and After" school program and a "Day Camp" during the summer for school age children.

RAINBOW World is by far the most time consuming and costly project undertaken by the Wayne Child Care Board, and the one that

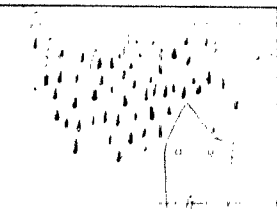
The benefit will take place tonight (Friday) in the Dixon auditorium, beginning at 5:30 p.m. Free will donations will be accepted.

The congressman has also scheduled stops in Walthill at 8:30 a.m., Pender at 10 a.m. and West Point at 5 p.m. that Saturday.

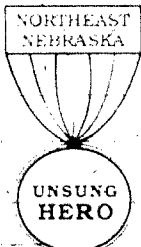

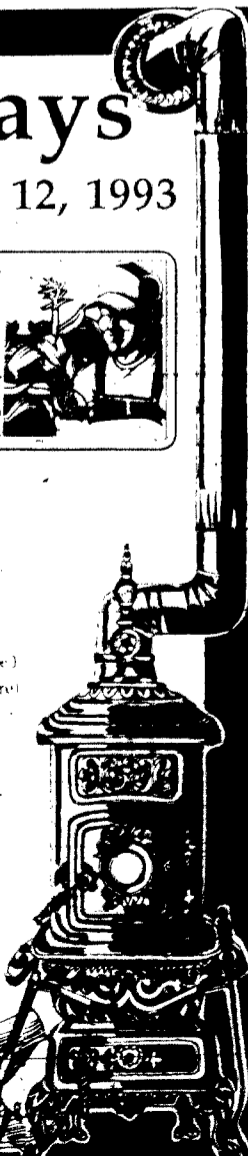

WSC, Chadron students are selected for RHOP

Eleven Wayne State College students and 35 Chadron State College students have been selected this year for the Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) through the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

The program, which is designed to help alleviate the shortage of health professionals in rural communities, was developed by the Medical Center in 1989 in conjunction with Chadron State and expanded one year later to include Wayne State. The total number of students now enrolled in the RHOP program will be 107 from Chadron State and 31 from Wayne State.

The program allows students to

save a spot in one of UNMC's professional schools before they even begin their undergraduate studies.

The 11 Wayne State students all incoming freshmen include three students in pharmacy, five in medicine, one in dentistry and two in dental hygiene.

The Chadron State students include 27 incoming freshmen, six sophomores, one junior and one freshman dental students. Of the 35 students, there will be five in medicine, four in dentistry, one in dental hygiene, three in pharmacy, seven in the physical therapy program, 10 in the physician assistant program and five in the medical technology program.

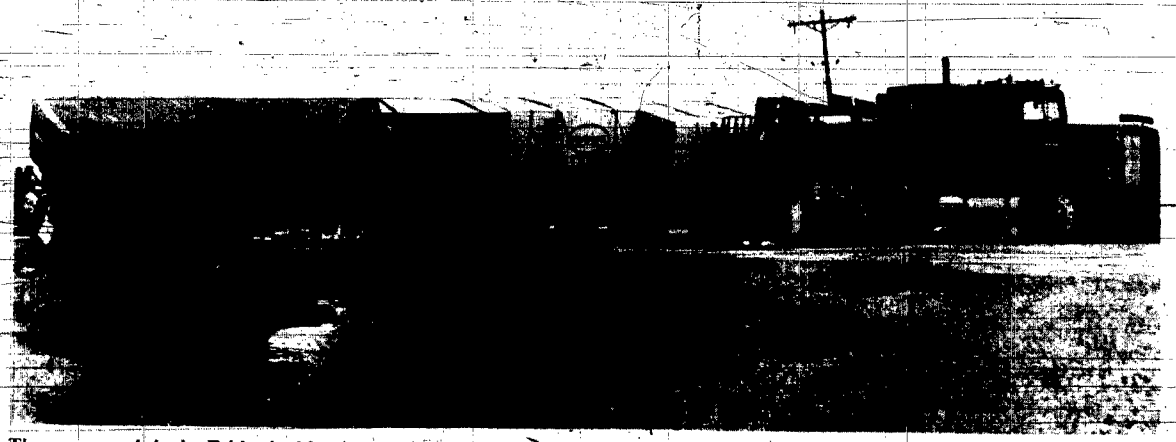

Ensz ruled that Sterba could move back to Omaha—his permanent residence, but the \$75,000 bond would stay in tact. He also gave Sterba additional conditions which included: 1) not to leave Sarpy or Douglas County with the exception to confer with his attorneys in Norfolk, 2) consume no alcohol, 3) report to Wayne County Sheriff's office either directly or by phone through the Douglas County Sheriff's office no later than 9 p.m. each day, 4) continues to report to

court as ordered.

Sterba's counsel filed the motion to quash the complaint for the following reasons: 1) The complaint and information violates the defendant's constitutional rights against double jeopardy set forth in the fifth amendment because the charges and allegations in the two counts were allegedly done at the same time and allegedly as part of the same occurrence.

2) The complaint and information violates the defendant's constitutional rights under the State of

Nebraska Constitutional.

3) The complaint and information fails to allege essential elements of the separate offenses as charged and lacks the requisite certainty and particularity for the preparation of defendant's defense.

4) The State has failed to elect, where alleged, different felonies of the same character and grade are charged in different counts.

5) The State has failed to elect which count of the complaint and information it will rely in an effort

to obtain a conviction against the defendant.

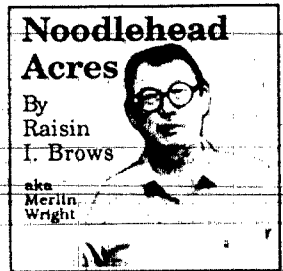
6) The complaint and information alleges two separate and distinct categories of manslaughter, and unlawful killing, without malice, "upon a sudden quarrel", which may be characterized as voluntary manslaughter, and an unlawful but unintentional killing, without malice as the result of defendant's alleged commission of an "unlawful act", which may be characterized as involuntary manslaughter.

LWMS are carried out on the national, circuit and local levels.

The national level carries out the administrative duties of the society, working closely with the circuit and local levels to see that the objectives are met.

The national board produces the annual Topics booklet which brings news of the various mission fields to motivate support of WELS mission work, and the Outreach, a bi-monthly national newsletter of LWMS, and is involved in planning the national convention as well.

Circuits are comprised of groups of WELS congregations in an area and hold semi-annual mission rallies. The Nebraska-Iowa Circuit consists of 11 congregations and the Nebraska Central Plains Circuit consists of 26 congregations.

On the local level, each congregation helps to support LWMS by mission box monies. Local groups may also choose to support special mission projects.

Since its inception in 1964, the LWMS organization has grown to include over 900 congregations world-wide.
