Wayne plant expansion will add 90 more jobs

Just days after a delegation of Wayne leaders visited Great Dane Corporation headquarters in Savannah, Ga. to promote the community, the corporation has announced a major new plant expansion for Wayne.

The corporation plans to invest an additional \$1.25 million to expand production capacity at its Wayne refrigerated truck trailer manufacturing plant. The move will add 90 new jobs, said Plant Manager Terry Hanson.

Mayor Bob Carhart had led a delegation of Wayne and Nebraska economic developers to Savannah last week to meet face to face with top level Great Dane officials to sell them on the advantages of expansion in

they got there, that the corporate board meeting at which the decisions on plant expansion would be made was scheduled for Monday, said Carhart "Our timing couldn't have been bet-

ter," he said.

Notification of the plant expansion plans was delivered to the Mayor on Wednesday.

This commitment of funds is certainly a strong expression of confidence from our top management and the owners of Great Dane," said

corporate decision.

He said the expansion effort, which will include addition of new foame component equipment, manufacturspace and other equipment, scheduled to go on line in the first quarter of 1994.

GREAT DANE had said it needed to expand plant production since the firm has back orders for trailers late into 1994. In the past two years the Wayne plant has increased production from 40 trailers per week to the current rate of 70 per week and increased jobs from about 200 to over 400 workers. The new addition will peg the plant's employment right at 500 and boost trailer output to 90 per

City wants parade to 'quit horsing around'

Wayne city officials are raising a stink about the Chicken Show parade. It's not the chickens that has the concerned, it's their barnyard buddies the horses

In a letter to Chicken Show parade officials, Vern Schulz, Wayne public works director, said the city would not be cleaning up after horses in this year's parade and that horse owners should be informed that they should make provisions to clean up after themselves or they would not be permitted in the parade.

Members of the chicken show com mittee at their meeting Wednesday were confused by the edict and questioned why city crews would have time to-keep watch and kick offending horses out of the parade, as threatened, when they didn't have time to provide clean-up details

"Horses have been an important part the parade for years," said parade chairperson, Kathy Varley. She said the Chicken Show committee is investigating methods of complying with the new city rule but that it has no intention to ban horses from the parade. She questioned also by what authority the city intends to use in trying to ban horses.

Other members of the committee expressed concern over the attitude with which city crews approach the annual show which attracts thousands of visitors and their dollars to Wayne. While hundreds of volunteers work tirelessly without pay to put on the different Chicken Show activities, city crews are the only ones who receive pay for their efforts that day it

Cole did not give a precise time they are due through Wayne nor whether it would be on Highway 15 or 35.


The vehicles in this year's 14-day race date back to 1910 and range from ancient dirt track Ford racers to Indy-type Packards. The newest vehicle in

continued on Tuesday with an additional 18 holes which was flighted based on Monday's scores.

Scottsbluff native Molly Mullin cruised through the two-day tournament with a 153 after firing rounds of 77-76. Mullen is a sophomore on the University of Nebraska's Women's Golf Team.

Norfolk's Stephanie Hupp placed runner-up with a 156 followed by Omahan Suzy Duff with a 159. Buff-is the reigning Omaha City Champion. Stanton's Joy Dubsky fired a 161 for fourth place honors in the championship flight.

"There were a lot of very good golfers playing our course during this tournament," NWAGA representative Ginny Hansen said. "The NWAGA has four tournament sites a year with the Eastern Regional, Western Regional, State Stroke Play and State Match Play."

The Eastern Regional was the first tour stop for the amateurs with the State Stroke Play to begin Monday at the Pines Country Club in Valley. "The Western Regional and State Match play will take place in July," Hansen said.

The sites of the tournament are different each year and Hansen said the NWAGA Committee asks NWAGA reps from perspective courses if they'd be interested inhosting one of the four stops. She was a major reason why things ran so smoothly."

Hansen said she began working on this tournament back in November. "There's just so many little things that have to be done for something like this," Hansen said. "Everything from letter writing to ordering of trophies."

Hansen did say that the help from people like Larry and Judy Berres along with Lisa and Lana Casey was instrumental in the tournament's success. "The support
