Horses welcome in Wayne as always

Horses have always been welcome in the Chicken Show parade and this year is no different.

Members of the Chicken Show committee and the city public works office have resolved differences over the methods of post-parade clean-up that some horse owners interpreted as an effort to exclude them from Chicken Show activities.

Citing shortage of staff to handle the many tasks necessary to keep the Chicken Show running smoothly, this year, Public Works Director Vern Schulz said an earlier letter of his which started the "road apple" controversy was intended more as a plea for help rather than an ultimatum against horses.

Members of the chicken show committee had interpreted the city letter as a potential ban on horses in the parade if horse owners were not

made personally responsible for their animals' excrement. Committee members became upset about the letter.

Since the letter was made public, at least one horse group had threatened to boycott the Chicken Show and encourage others to follow, the committee was told.

"We just don't have the people this year to do it," Schulz told the chicken show committee in an amicable meeting Thursday night. Committee members agreed to recruit other parade entrants who will perform the necessary function and to put the word out that horses truly are welcome and desirable in the Chicken Show parade.

"If it weren't for horses all the chickens would still be stuck on the east coast," said Chicken Show committee member Katherine Williams.

City manager Joe Salitros, who also met with the committee Thursday, volunteered the city's assis-

tance in overcoming the problems by shifting of personnel and equipment if need be, but members of the committee said volunteers are already coming forward to act as scoop monitors.

Committee members were also informed that a group of business

leaders who are concerned about the potential black eye the city might have gotten with horse owners, is planning a new event Saturday morning to run concurrent with the annual omelette feed and barbecued chicken feed for humans.

The group is planning a free "alfalfa feed" for horses.

Motel has new owners

Rollie and Lavonne Slagle are among Wayne's newest business owners and say they are excited to be in the community.

Slagles purchased the KD Inn in Wayne last month and say they have no plans to change the business which was formerly owned and operated for 14 years by Dennis and Kerri Otte.

"The KD Inn will definitely remain a motel," say Rollie and Lavonne, adding that the 25-room motel was just recently remodeled and continues to be in excellent condition.

Slagles come to Wayne from Laurel where they have owned and operated The Big Red Motel for the

past six and a half years. Since purchasing the KD Inn, they have hired former Wakefield residents Gene and Nancy Nettleton to manage the Laurel motel.

PRIOR TO purchasing the Laurel motel, Rollie, a native of West Point, and Lavonne, a native of Wisner, owned The Lounge in Wakefield for approximately two and a half years.

The couple farmed near West Point until 1975, when Rollie went to work at Super Sweet Feeds in West Point and later for Beemer Implement, until purchasing The Lounge.

Slagles, who celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary on June 17, have five grown children and 14 grandchildren. Their children are Gale of Fremont, Danny of West Point, Jim of Emerson, Cindy Paulson of Wakefield, and Mike of Wayne.

Council faces another week on sidewalks

Sidewalks will be on the agenda again when Wayne City Council meets Tuesday night. Consideration of a resolution on outstanding sidewalk agreements and the third reading of an ordinance creating a sidewalk improvement district for the installation of new sidewalks in the northeast quadrant of the city are key items on Tuesday's agenda.

While the agenda was not firm as of press time, the council also may be asked to consider the final plat for the Vintage Hill subdivision the first major housing addition for Wayne in over 20 years.

A public hearing on the revolving loan fund application for operating capital for Riley's Convention Center is also scheduled for the upcoming meeting.

Council may also be asked to set a public hearing on a proposed housing reuse plan which would establish a revolving loan fund which could be used to foster housing development in the city. The mayor's housing development task force has its next meeting scheduled for Monday from 4 to 6 p.m.

A report from power plant superintendent Gene Hanson on the electric load management program status is also scheduled for the meeting.

Bridge effort gains federal, state support

Additional funding for a bridge over the Missouri River connecting Newcastle, Neb. and Vermillion, S.D. was included in a House Appropriations Committee's 1994 transportation bill sent to the floor this week.

Reps. Doug Bereuter, (R-Neb.) and Tim Johnson, (D-S.D.) were successful in winning committee recommendation for \$2.4 million in funding next year. That sum will be added to the \$3.6 and \$3.3 million in federal funds approved for the major project in the last two years.

THE PROJECT calls for construction of the bridge with 80 percent of the funds to come from the federal government and 20 percent to be shared equally by the states of Nebraska and South Dakota.

The new five year road plan for the state of Nebraska is expected to contain provisions for funding and scheduling the state share of the bridge project when it is released July 6.

Monty Fredrickson, with the State Highway Department in Lincoln said Nebraska would be prepared to match the federal portion on the project and has designated the bridge approach road connecting to Highway 12 in the new Five Year plan.

The Nebraska approach is expected to cost \$1.2 million, Fredrickson said. "We're serious about it," he added.

NOT YET ON the drawing board with the state however, is the Bereuter plan for a connector route between the bridge and Wayne.

"I am convinced that this bridge, when completed, will serve as a connector for one of two major north-south routes across Nebraska," Bereuter told the Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation. "In addition, to act as a connector, it will first require a new highway connection between Wayne and the bridge, and second, it will require an upgrading of the highway between Wayne and Norfolk to connect to U.S. 81 which is currently being upgraded."

STATE HIGHWAY officials said the current plans only call for connection of the bridge to Highway 12 near Newcastle, but they didn't rule out the possible future project connecting the bridge to Wayne and Norfolk. That proposal would provide an easier and quicker connection to I-29.

"An impressive coalition of community organizations, local governments, businesses and individuals from both Nebraska and South Dakota has pushed for support of this bridge," said Bereuter.

The bridge will result in \$32.7 million worth of increased output by industries according to estimates released by Bereuter's office. It will create energy and transportation cost savings of over \$3 million a year according to the estimates.

"Dr. Burrows is looking forward to taking his place in the community and serving the residents in the best manner possible," said Dr. Wessel.

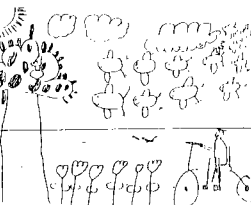

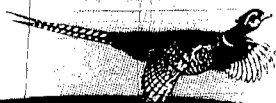

Loan fund application from a competing business opposed

The city's economic development revolving loan fund should not be used to promote businesses which compete with other existing businesses in the community, a Wayne Restaurant owner says.

That is why Gary Costilow plans to protest the application of Riley's Convention Center for a \$36,000 low interest loan from the city revolving loan fund.

A public hearing will be held before city council Tuesday night on the loan application from Riley's. Owner Rod Tompkins has asked for the funds for use as operating capital for the

new convention center which Costilow says competes directly with 24 other establishments in Wayne "providing the same services."

Costilow owns and operates El Toro lounge and restaurant.

"The city would be showing favoritism if the loan were approved," he said.

Costilow contends that Riley's does not qualify for the loan funds as a "primary" business under the lending guidelines because 75 percent of its business cannot come from outside a 50-mile radius of Wayne, which is the criteria called for in the loan fund

guidelines. Under the guidelines for a secondary business, (one which generates 75 percent of its business from within a 50 mile radius) written approval must be gained from competitors before a loan is granted.

Costilow said Riley's fits the secondary category because "there is no way he can get 75 percent of his business from outside a 50 mile radius of Wayne."

He said he opposes the loan application because it would mean the city was becoming a party to unfair competition.

WHS continues accreditation

Principal Dr. Donald Zeiss announced that Wayne High School has been continued as an accredited school by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

The school was first admitted to membership in 1916-17, and has been continuously accredited since that time.

Accreditation by the NCA

means that the school has met the standards set for membership," said Zeiss. "These standards signify that the school has the resources, personnel and leadership necessary for effective education."

Accreditation must be renewed each year. In commenting upon this, superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen noted that "Continuation

within the NCA requires a joint effort by the community and the staff to make certain that the potentiality for quality education remains unimpaired. The advantage of the NCA membership is that it assures, the public at large that the school has met those standards which good schools in the NCA region consider to be imperative for effective education to take place."

Belden man given treatment

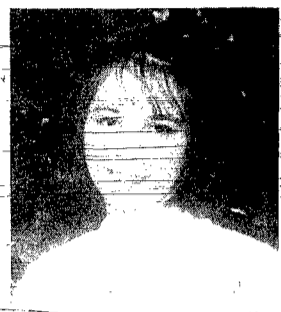

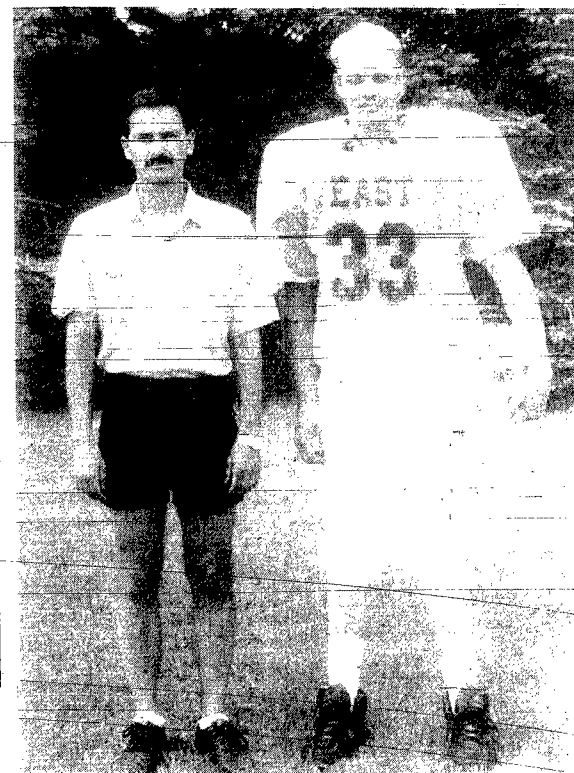
Wayne never trailed in this game either, as they scored two in the second, two in the third, four in the fourth and two in the seventh.

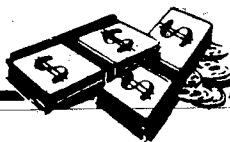

The objective of the program is to train food service professionals to protect the health and well being of the children of Nebraska.

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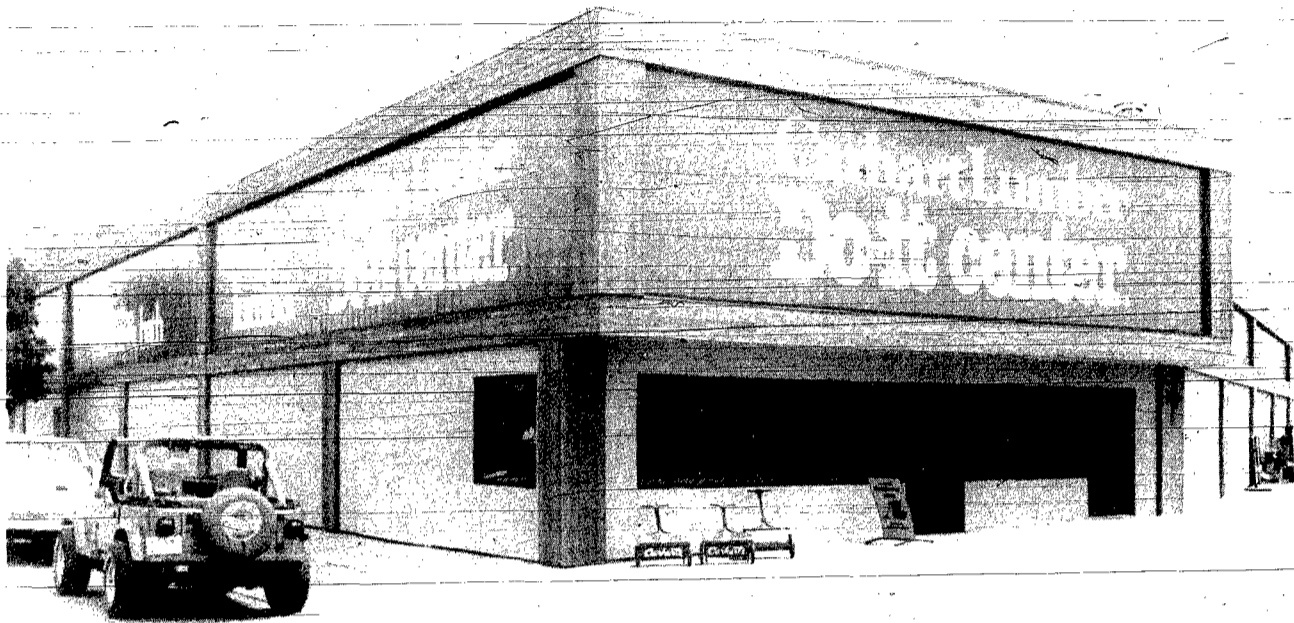
