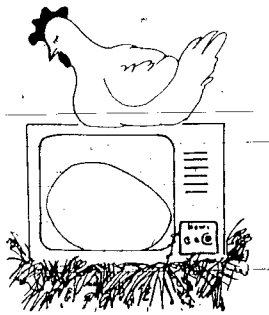
'Cackle Days' just a short, busy week off

Antique racers chug through Wayne

More than 25 antique vehicles rolled through Wayne Friday morning as part of the Interstate Batteries Greatrace from California to Virginia.

The first car rolled into Wayne on Highway 15 and checked in at the Zach Propane checkpoint at approximately 10:45. The last car in the string did not roll through until after noon.

In between there was a 1941 Harley Davidson Motorcycle and sidecar and a 1938 Peterbilt Semi-Truck, a 1910 Knox Raceabout and many other valuable old automobiles. Vehicles participating in the Greatrace must be at least 50 years old.

Scores of people lined the rainy streets to wave on the racers Friday. They also passed through Wakefield and Allen on their way to a lunch stop in Sioux City. The group left the Columbus pit stop after 9 a.m. Friday and their exact route to Sioux City was not announced until 30 minutes before their departure.

Race officials had confirmed to the Wayne Herald two weeks ago that the racers would pass through Wayne but they would not release the exact route until Friday morning.

There's 250,000 reasons for the secrecy, said race sponsors. That's the amount of prize money at stake in the race. The cars aren't competing against each other to see who can go the fastest. The race is against a clock and

each second the cars report in at a checkpoint ahead of or behind the clock, they are given a point. In the end, the car with the lowest score wins. Average race speed is 40 to 45 miles per hour.

Having five days completed in the Great Antique Race, Tom Kleptz of Englewood, Ohio says the biggest hindrance to date has been the heat. "It's been very hot for the most part," Kleptz said. "At the Nevada, California border the temperature read 118 degrees."

That hasn't deterred, however, the fun of the race. "We love it," Kleptz said. "This is our fourth year in the race and the third year with the car—a 1917 Marmon owned by Tom's father Chic. Tom, incidentally is the driver while Chic is the navigator. Ralph Steinberg, navigator of a

1938 Jaguar which is being driven by David Milling, owner of the car, says things have been going pretty well since they started the race last Sunday.

"It's a lot of fun," Steinberg, a native of Glen Riddle, Pennsylvania said. "This is our fifth year in the race." The jaguar, incidentally, was purchased by Milling in London in 1988.

The vehicles are generally manned by a driver and navigator, who keeps track of the speed and time and makes calculations on a scratch pad.

At a stoplight in Wayne, one navigator said the rainy weather affects the close calculations of the race because it changes the tire pressures and vehicle performance.

Usually the daily winners finish each leg less than 15 seconds either side of a "perfect" score.

Car wash

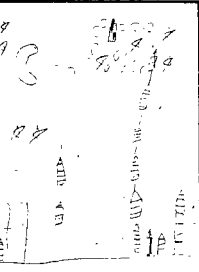

Northeast Nebraska is not as far off from normal weather as some might think.

According to figures released by official weather observer Pat Gross, rainfall at Wayne so far this year is not even an inch greater than the ten year average.

The 4.81 inches of rainfall in June compared with 4.18 average over the last ten years.

But what may be different, according to Gross is the lack of any "dry-

ing" days in the weather this year.

He said the longest period the area has gone without rain during June was only 4 days. "We had rain at very regular intervals, he said.

Last year the average June high temperature was 78 degrees. This year June posted only a 77 degree average high.

The highest temperature in the month was 92 on the 17th and the low was 39 on the 4th. The greatest daily rainfall for the month was 1.14 inches on June 24.

Neighbors nominate Kugler as 'hero'

"All my life, my parents, ministers, and everyone else I was associated with taught and trained me in what I

was supposed to do. I thank God I was born into that type of environment."

Wayne resident Bill Kugler doesn't believe people should have to stop and think about what they can do to assist others. "Just do it. If you see something that needs done or someone who needs help — just do it."

It's partly because of that attitude that Bill was nominated by neighbors Diane and Paul Peterson to receive this month's "Unsung Hero of the Month" award.

"BILL'S OUR neighborhood watch dog," says Diane. "He keeps an eye on irregularities and makes many neighbors feel safer."

Diane also points out that not many neighbors would start up their snowblowers after a 10-inch snowfall, clear their own sidewalks and driveway, and then just continue on down the block — house after house, sidewalk after sidewalk.

"I don't know how many sidewalks I cleared," Bill smiles modestly. "I just started and kept on going."

Diane adds that through her work at the hospital, she has also watched Bill drive many of his friends to and from their appointments when they were unable to, or when doing so was not recommended.

She also points out that he is actively involved in his church and community, including the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department.

"I GUESS I probably dedicate the biggest share of my life to the fire department," admits Bill, who had served as a volunteer firefighter in Wayne for the past 46 years and has held a number of offices, including assistant chief, vice president and president.

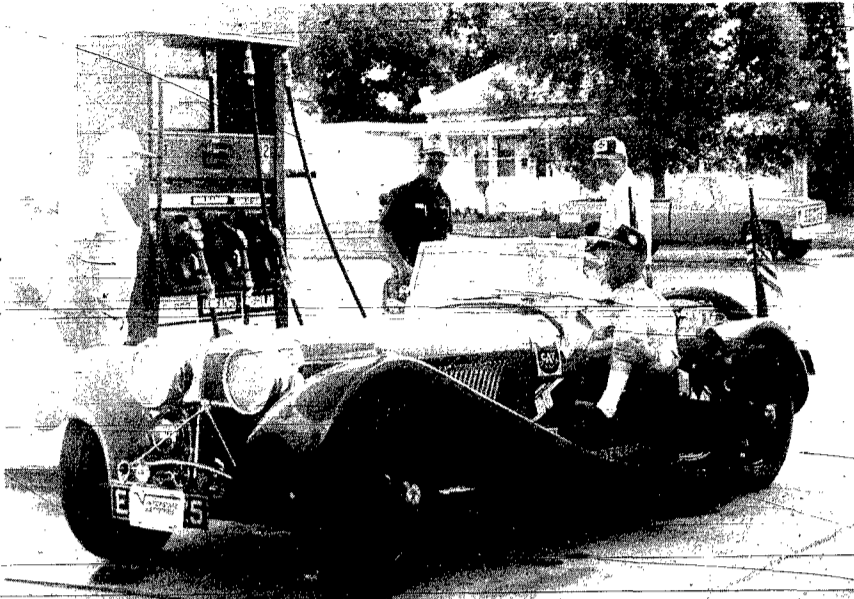

derstanding wife."

As far as Bill's concerned, Wayne's volunteer firefighters are the greatest group of people that walk the earth. "At the drop of a phone call or sound of a siren, we've got a goodly group of people who are willing to give the shirts off their backs."

Bill's untiring dedication to the Wayne Volunteer Fire Department was acknowledged this past spring when he was the recipient of a ring denoting 45 years of service to the department. "You could have knocked me over with a feather."

He is also proud, and understandably so, of the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben Award he received in September of 1970 for outstanding firemanship. "I was and still am proud of that award," says Bill, "but I think I am even more appreciative of the letters of nomination that were written on my behalf."

AT AGE 64, nearly four years after retiring as a Wayne mail carrier, Bill says he maintains a schedule book to remind him where and what he should be doing.

"I remember one night when I came in quite late through the back door," laughs Bill. "My wife made the remark that she wished I was still carrying mail because at least then she knew what my schedule was."

Bill and his wife, the former Rae Wightman of Mapleton, Iowa, met while she was a student at Wayne State College and were married in October of 1955. In the years following they raised two daughters.

Daughter Kim, 36, lives and works in Tulsa, Okla. with her husband, Wayne native Scott Kraemaer, and their seven-year-old daughter, Lauren Rae.

Kara, 29, resides in Lincoln where she works full-time for TWA and is also a co-owner of The Albino Rhino, a toy and gift menagerie.

THIS MONTH'S "Unsung Hero" was born and raised in Wayne, graduating from Wayne High School and later attending Wayne State College and Norfolk Business College before going to work in his father's business, Kugler Electric of Wayne.

"Uncle Sam saw fit to use my services from 1950 to 1952," smiles Bill, adding that he returned to Wayne and continued working with his father until 1966 when he became a regular mail carrier after joining the postal service on a part-time basis in 1960.

"I still helped dad whenever I could until May of 1973 when he sold the business to Russ Tiedtke," says Bill, pointing out that his father was in the appliance business in Wayne for 48 years.

Bill remained with the Wayne Post Office until September of 1989 when eye problems forced him to retire. "I had a sudden awakening that made me change a few things in my life."

After waking up one Thursday morning with double vision in his left eye, Bill began doctoring at the local level and eventually traveled to the Mayo Clinic. "They told me to go home and it would straighten itself out in about six months," re-

calls Bill. "And thanks to God, it did."

BILL ADMITS that although he entered into retirement with a bit of apprehension, he has since found that his time is his own, for the most part, and he is usually available to help others out when the need arises.

"To me, this is all God's work," smiles Bill. "After my eye situation I more or less just said 'I owe you one,' and I guess that's why I do some of the things I do."

Although he is officially retired, Bill continues to be employed on a part-time basis for Schumacher-McBride-Wiltse Funeral Home and for Heritage Homes of Wayne.

"Will Rogers once said he never met a man he didn't like," says Bill. "Well, I can honestly tell you that I've never met a person I didn't like."

"I've made mistakes in my life, but I've tried to rectify some of those mistakes and I hope God sees fit to realize that I've done what I could to resolve them."

Bill is a lifelong member of Re-

deemer Lutheran Church in Wayne and credits the late Rev. S. K. de-Freese for playing a major role in his life. "He influenced my life clear up through the day he resigned from the church."

Bill remains active in church work and says the church has always been important in the life of he and his family. In 1981, both he and Rae were awarded special plaques from the church — Bill for his dedicated service and Rae for sharing her musical talents as church organist.

"YOU KNOW," says Bill, "as far as I'm concerned there are about 50 million people I could think of in my lifetime who are more deserving of the "Unsung Hero" title than this old German boy."

Garbage disposal costs increase dramatically

Garbage is getting more expensive.

It is going to cost the City of Wayne \$15,000 more next year to dispose of trash than it did this year, members of City Council were told Tuesday night.

Landfill costs for depositing materials into the Gill Company facility which the city contracts for will go up from \$10.40 to \$15.50 beginning in August, said City Administrator Joe Salitros.

He said the exact cost increase to the consumers should be less than the city's 49 percent increase since the city would be passing only a 18 percent raise on to the private haulers who collect the garbage and pay the city to transfer it to the landfill.

The city will begin charging \$8.90 per cubic yard for material brought to the transfer station compared to \$7.60 now.

Part of the substantial increase in charges was a \$1.25 per ton surcharge tax from the state for landfill management.

Salitros said the new rate is not unfair when the tax and landfill costs

other cities are paying is taken into account.

"It's just frustrating that we don't have any options," said Councilmember Ralph Barclay.

"Negotiation is only effective if you have someplace else to go with your waste," said Salitros. He indicated the city is fortunate it is not a part of a coalition of communities developing a landfill because those towns are paying well more than the new Wayne charges.

He added the city can help finance its transfer station equipment by continuing to accept refuse from outside individuals and communities. Wakefield and some Wayne County trash is delivered to the Wayne trans-

fer station now. The City of Pierce has shown interest in bringing their trash to Wayne as well.

Extra charges for non-resident trash would be difficult to implement said Salitros since some of the Wayne city

haulers also pickup trash outside the city limits and deliver it all in the same truckload to the transfer station.

Citing all the new regulations and added costs of trash disposal, Salitros said "it is ultimately the consumer or waste generator that is going to cover the increased costs."

The city will also hike charges for the disposal of refrigerators from \$6.50 to \$9, since the new rule has taken effect that says freon must be removed from them by a licensed handler before disposal.

Individuals taking trash directly to the transfer station will see their charges go from \$1.25 per bag to \$1.50.

In other business at the Tuesday Council meeting:

The city leaders approved a resolution supporting the call for a corridor study for Highway 35 to be upgraded to an Expressway.

Council voted to table sidewalk improvement district creation and changing sidewalk installation policies until more of the councilmembers were present. Only five of the eight councilmembers were in attendance at the time of the vote, although one additional one joined the group later. Councilmember Doug Sturm voted against tabling the issues.

City electric generation director Gene Hansen reported on the progress of the load control management program whereby the city can automatically cycle central air conditioners on participating homes. The city will use new radio and computer equipment to activate switches on participating air conditioners. This keeps the peak electrical demand from climbing too high at one moment. That peak demand is how the city's rate is determined when it purchases electricity from suppliers.

If the city can reduce the peak it saves everyone in electrical costs.

Approximately 150 home owners have signed up for the switches. Hansen said 50 more are available this year and another 200 will be ordered next year.

The Pony's improved to 10-1 while the Little League teams each slipped to 5-1. The next regular season action for the locals is slated

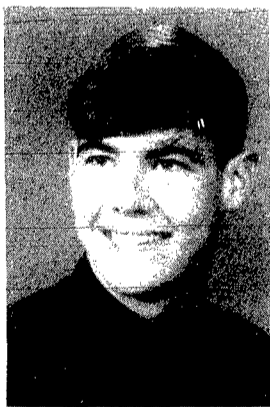

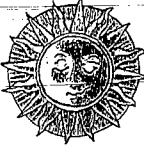
