

Time to study sales tax says Wayne official

Citing several capital improvement needs in the city, Joe Salitros, Wayne city administrator, suggested it might be time to consider a local option sales tax as he presented city council with a proposed budget Tuesday night.

Council members have begun reviewing the budget proposals in preparation for revisions and presentation to public at a public hearing.

But as he laid out the city's needs in his budget message, he said specific capital items would be so expensive they would not be able to be financed with the existing property tax base in the community.

THE LIST OF federal and state mandated improvements to the city infrastructure which will need to be completed in the next few years is considerable, said Salitros.

The estimate to bring the Auditorium in compliance with building code and Americans with Disabilities

Act (ADA) will be over \$400,000 alone, he said. Other needs include improvement or replacement of the Library and Senior Citizen Center for ADA and growing use.

The State Fire Marshal's office will be requiring more fire safety features in City Hall in coming years, he said. A new solid waste management plan and potential for new handling equipment and services is required for implementation by 1994, he said.

THE STATE Road's Department Plan to widen Highway 35 through Wayne, now scheduled for 1997, will mean the city needs to do some underground utility improvements prior to the roadwork, he said.

Additionally, a citizen's task force is working on plans for a multipurpose community center.

The generating capacity of the city power plant must also be considered for possible expansion in the near future, said Salitros.

"To realistically develop the fa-

Dress code pondered

Dress codes are touchy issues they know, but the Wayne City School Board is wading into that dangerous territory as it considers revisions of the city schools policy manual.

Dr. Dennis Jensen proposed at the last school board meeting that the policy be rewritten to ban apparel from the schools which displays language "inappropriate to a public school environment." Jensen also asked that the code include a ban on clothing which included alcohol, tobacco and drug products or adver-

tisements. A couple of board members asked to have that portion of the new policy held for consideration and possible public input.

"I question if that's going too far," said board member Cap Peterson. He indicated he would have trouble banning kids from wearing t-shirts with pictures of "Spudz" the beer mascot on them.

The board will consider the policy at its next meeting.

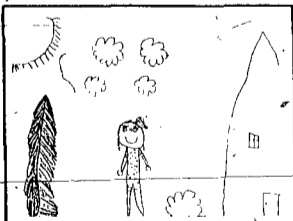

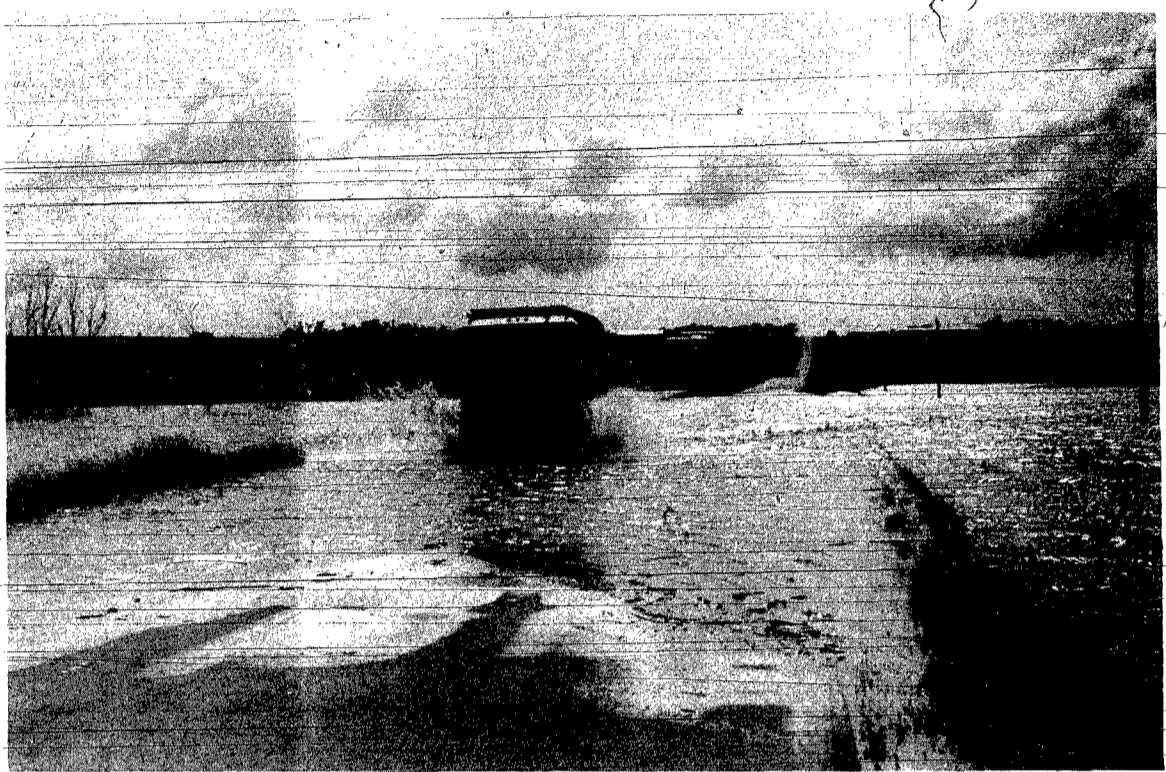

Walk issues settled

Wayne City Council reiterated its long-standing position in support of improved sidewalks for the community, even though councilmembers acknowledged that the sidewalk improvement district it created Tuesday night will probably be nullified by opposition from landowners.

After several procedural delays, the ordinance to create a sidewalk improvement district in the Northeast quadrant of Wayne for the pur-

pose of installing new sidewalks on certain blocks that do not now have them, was approved on third reading by a 6-2 vote. Councilmembers Doug Sturm and Darrel Fuelberth opposed the ordinance.

AN EARLIER ordinance to create a separate improvement district to replace damaged sidewalks that are already in place, passed without opposition but numerous home owners have appeared before council to

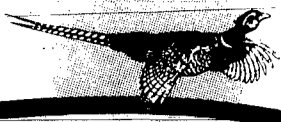

oppose the idea of installing new sidewalks.

The creation of the district now means home owners may petition the city to oppose the improvements, which would be paid for by special assessments on their property taxes. If affected landowners with more than 51 percent of the front footage in the proposed district petition against the project, it would be killed, councilmembers were told.

The petition form could simply be a letter from the property owner of record identifying his or her property and stating formal opposition to the plan, said Joe Salitros, city administrator.

"PROBABLY THIS (ordinance) will be petitioned out, but we have made a commitment to improving

sidewalks and adding new sidewalks where needed," said Councilmember Darrel Heier as he encouraged other councilmembers to vote for the district in spite of the opposition.

Landowners will have approximately 2 weeks to send in letters if they oppose the development of new sidewalks fronting their property.

Council's commitment to sidewalk improvement was also seen in a vote to maintain previous sidewalk improvement agreements entered into when new homes and buildings were constructed.

SINCE 1981, the city has been permitting property owners to defer installation of sidewalks on new developments until a later date in an agreement that says when an improvement district is created in their neighborhood they must install them at that time.

Councilmember Sturm contended those agreements were tantamount to blackmail since the property owners were forced to sign them to get their original building permits and were thereby giving up their right to object to sidewalk improvement proposals at a later date.

Council previously rescinded the agreements written for building permits involving remodeling and additions and maintained the agreement only on those commercial and residential properties that were built new.

Councilmember Jane O'Leary said the property owners were not giving up rights by signing the agreements, they were gaining a postponement—an advantage—in installing their sidewalks at a later date and possibly at a cheaper rate when they could be done in greater quantity.

The vote on maintaining the agreements was 7-1 with Sturm opposing.

ilities that need upgrading or replacement...the city of Wayne must find a major new source of capital," said Salitros. "The cost of these projects in total are outside the reaches of property tax financing."

He pointed out that city property tax levies have remained relatively constant in the last five years at 61 cents per \$100 valuation.

SALITROS SAID A 1/2 cent sales tax in Wayne would have generated over \$200,000 in additional city revenue in 1992. Twenty of the 28 communities in Nebraska with populations greater than 5,000 have implemented the local option sales tax, he said.

He suggested the sales tax could be directed at a specific project and could be cutoff at a predetermined time after the project was paid for. This could be incorporated in the vote on the proposal. Local option

sales taxes are implement only through a vote of the people.

"The May 1994 primary election may be the time to ask the question, and measure the impacts and benefits to the City," he said. Salitros listed on other revenue producing option in his Tuesday presentation. He said the city could reinstitute the keno lottery that voters approved for the city in 1983.

"WAYNE IS in a position to move

strongly ahead based on our economic strength, geographic location and our historic yen for pro-active preparations," he said.

Besides the plea for consideration of new tax and revenue options, the budget proposal councilmembers received Tuesday calls for \$1.7 million in general fund expenditures, up \$21,000 from last year. The initial draft also includes a salary and benefit increase for city employees totalling 5 percent

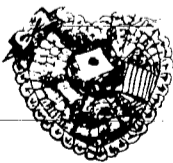

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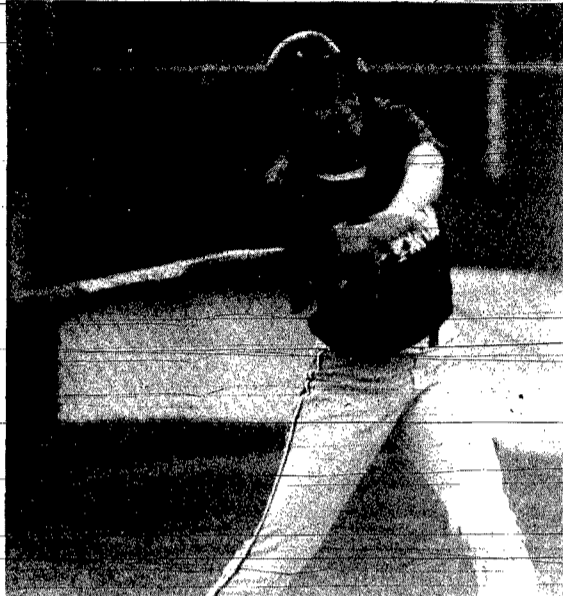

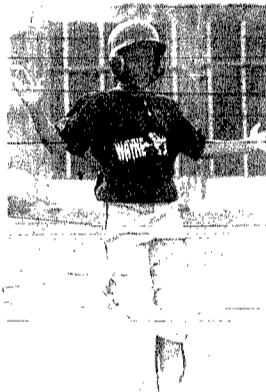

The Farmer's Wife

Where is it coming from?

These days, I shudder as I watch the news reports of all the flooding. We cannot imagine where all the rain is coming from. And Thursday night, as the wind blew and the power failed, I thought, "The Gods must be angry."

Jon and his friend Denny were here overnight and Denny brought along the York paper. Trees are uprooted, roofs torn off, signs are down; the pictures are quite a sight. A lot of power has not been restored and I think of all the meat in our freezer.

We have several elm trees and I've been picking up sticks for weeks. Yesterday, there were whole branches to move. The basement has a permanent musty odor.

I worked the holiday weekend of the Fourth. There are always some home health clients to see; in fact, I made half a dozen visits on the fifth. I often work the Fourth of July because farmers usually do not go very far at that time of year.

But I was reminiscing with my Sis about another time the Fourth was on a weekend, in 1980. We made reservations for both families at Fort Robinson. We reserved a large house that could sleep a dozen and took Grandma along, too.

Sue and Jon were in high school, and really didn't want to go, so I bribed them by saying they could each bring a friend. They chose Brian Bowers and Colleen Miller. We drove our station wagon; Mary and Don had a big Ford. Their David was only two.

We got a late start because, as usual, the Big Farmer was still stacking hay. Eventually, we got across highway 20 and into our quarters. A lot of other families had made the same plans. The tickets for a buffalo stew cookout were all sold out. The swimming pool was full. The four teenagers might as well have stayed home because all they did was play cards and eat, and tease the four little girls.

We did do the jeep ride with Wild Bill, aptly named; and the melodrama by Chadron College drama students, which was fun. It seems to me we even caught a parade in nearby Crawford.

Of course, the scenery in Western Nebraska is beautiful. We did our own cooking in the house we were in: steak, chicken, fresh green beans, pie. We were away from television and telephones. We learned about the imprisonment and assassination of Chief Crazy Horse. It was a good vacation. There certainly was "family togetherness."

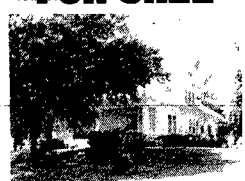
