

At Wayne State College Public Policy Institute is important milestone

Next month will mark an important milestone on the Wayne State College campus when the college hosts its first annual Public Policy Institute (PPI) in partnership with the National Issues Forums (NIF) Institute.

Dates for the institute at Wayne State College are Friday through Sunday, Aug. 6-8.

Local regional coordinators of the project are Pat Arneson and Jan Dinsmore, who have attended similar public policy institutes in Ohio and California.

"We are both excited about having this institute in Wayne," said Arneson and Dinsmore, adding that the institute and the sponsorship of an open public forum are unique opportunities for the community of Wayne and Northeast Nebraska.

Arneson and Dinsmore said that after two years of careful planning and preparation, during which NIF materials and activities have been used extensively by teachers and student organizations on campus, the college will now share the NIF concept with the general public.

AT THIS year's Public Policy Institute, participants will learn to convene and moderate forums and study circles on contemporary issues of widespread public concern.

Health care will be a special focus of the 1993 institute, reflecting

the actual political dialogue in America today.

However, participants will also learn a new way of conducting political dialogue which emphasizes issues and choices rather than special interests, and assumes that the political process is incomplete if the citizens are left out of the conversation.

THE NATIONAL Issues Forums Institute promotes nonpartisan, nonadversarial political dialogue among citizens at the local level.

Every year, it chooses three issues of contemporary national concern and provides materials for local groups to use in setting up their own forums and study circles.

Arneson and Dinsmore said the main purpose of a PPI is to teach participants how to use NIF methods and techniques in their own communities and organizations.

The two added that another purpose of this particular PPI is to carefully examine the health care issue and try to come to grips with it much as our Congress is now doing, but without the partisanship and posturing that often characterize parliamentary negotiation and political debate.

Having acquired the skills and insights associated with NIF, the local coordinators said participants will be prepared to become better informed and more active citizens, both nationally and locally.

CURRENT NIF issues include crime, the economy, and citizen involvement. Next year's issues will include poverty, the national debt, and the cost of health care reform.

Past issues have included drugs, youth at risk, abortion, AIDS, energy, the environment, freedom of speech, and America's role in the world after the Cold War.

Arneson and Dinsmore said persons wishing to learn a more rational deliberative approach toward issues of this sort should consider attending this Public Policy Institute and learning to use NIF.

Both undergraduate and graduate course credit options are available to students and teachers at a modest additional charge.

Coordination of the institute is provided by the Extended Campus office at Wayne State College. National faculty supplied by NIF will share the teaching duties with local faculty recruited by Wayne State from their own faculty and the community at large.

Wayne High grad says drum corps experience incredible

When the Cadets of Bergen County and Phantom Regiment strut their stuff in Sioux City, Iowa on Aug. 5, during the annual Drums Across America event, Wayne High School graduate Jason Pentico will be in the midst of the renowned drum and bugle corps.

Pentico, a 1992 graduate of Wayne High and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Val Pentico of Randolph, is a student at Augustana College in Sioux Falls and is spending his summer competing with The Cadets of Bergen County.

Based in Bergenfield, N.J., the drum and bugle corps is the oldest established corp in the United States and is known for its long standing commitment to innovation both in repertoire and visual effect.

The Cadets of Bergen County have won Drum Corps International (DCI) world championships five times in the last nine years, and is one of the corps in the history of DCI to win back-to-back championships in 1983, 1984 and 1985.

Last year, the group finished second in world championship competition.

PENTICO, who plays soprano bugle with the drum and bugle corps, was recently featured in a Sioux Falls newspaper, along with Augustana roommate Kevin Carlson who is also a member of The Cadets of Bergen County.

Pentico said that while the work is grueling, he believes the drum and bugle corps provides an incredibly productive experience.

The drum and bugle units, which are professional organizations, consist of approximately 120 performers and 30 staff and are made up of only percussion and brass instruments.

The 15 to 21-year-old musicians compete on a national level against over 100 other corps in the nation, completing over 40 presentations in a single summer.

The presentations involve intricate marching and detailed choreography, with displays usually lasting 11 to 13 minutes.

THE CORPS begin their seasons in mid-May and climax in late August with the Drum Corps International Championships where the best unit will be crowned.

Members wake early in the morning and practice anywhere from 11 to 14 hours before beginning preparations for the evening's competition.

Pentico said the show requires total concentration and exact movement, and even the way the perform-

ers walk is mandated. When the competition and awards ceremony is over, drum and bugle corps members board the bus for the next stop on their schedule.

In the Sioux Falls newspaper article, Pentico said that while the atmosphere of the drum and bugle corps is intense and competitive, he believes the best part is the work itself.

"I enjoy it because it makes me push myself further. It's like a game — I set my limits and then I try to break them."

WAYNE High band director Brad Weber said several residents of Wayne, as well as Randolph, are planning to be in Sioux City on Aug. 5 to watch Pentico perform with The Cadets of Bergen County.

This year's repertoire is "In the Springtime, At the Time When Kings Go Off to War" by David Holsinger.

"If you haven't ever seen a drum and bugle corp perform, you don't know what you're missing," said Weber. "It's an incredible experience just to watch the precision displayed by these young musicians."

Sterba trial date set

Former Wayne State student/athlete Robert Sterba, pleaded not guilty on a manslaughter charge, during Thursday's arraignment at the Wayne County Court-house.

Sterba appeared with his counsel David Ptak and David Copple. Sterba was advised of his constitutional rights and possible penalties before his plea was accepted.

The matter will now go to a jury

trial which is slated for Monday, November 8 at 9 a.m. There will be a pre-trial conference set for Wednesday, November 3 at which time all further motions are to be heard.

Sterba currently resides in Omaha, but his bond of \$75,000 remains in tact with the same terms and conditions that were set earlier. The charge stems from a fight outside a Wayne bar on May 7 which caused the death of Robert Jones.

Book sale

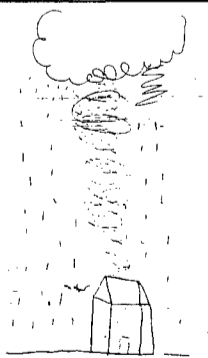
WAYNE — Wayne Public Library is conducting a book sale from now through July 31.

Restoration work attracts visitors to LaPorte Cemetery

A steady stream of visitors have walked through the historic LaPorte Cemetery southeast of Wayne since volunteers reclaimed the graveyard from an overgrowth of trees and tall weeds.

Previously, the isolated cemetery three miles south and two east of Wayne, had been all but forgotten and seldom noticed in its overgrown condition.

Now, it is visited frequently by genealogy researchers, descendants of the pioneers who are buried there and folks who have heard about the restoration work and want to see it, according to Merlin Beiermann, who lives across the road from the

graveyard.

A veteran of the War of 1812 is buried there, one of only three in Nebraska. The father of the county's pioneer judge, Cyrus Hunter, is buried in the cemetery, which dates back to 1876.

It was the Hunter connection which drew a large group of descendants to the cemetery recently. The group had been attending an Anderson/Hunter family reunion in Coleridge when they heard about the restoration work and decided to visit the grave of their ancestor.

The group was there for quite some time telling stories and learning of the background of the old

During attempted abduction

Wayne citizen cited for public heroism

Wayne resident Ranae Fuoss said she didn't have much time to think about the consequences of her actions on the night of Nov. 20, 1992 when she helped save a teenage girl who was in the process of being abducted.

Ranae, who graduated this past May from Northland Bible College in Dunbar, Wisc., was presented with the Citizens Valor Award on

June 28 by the Michigan Chiefs of Police Association during their annual awards banquet.

Also receiving the award for their heroic acts in coming to the aid of the young woman were Mark Manahan and Jason LaFlamme, who along with Ranae were students at Northland Bible College when the incident occurred last November in a Shopko parking lot in the Kingsford, Mich. area.

Northeast Community College will host the course "Confined Spaces: Training the Team" from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Tuesday, Aug. 17 in the Maclay Building, room 120.

This course meets the new OSHA standard for training and compliance. It stresses teamwork and clearly covers the responsibilities of every team member: entrant, attendant, rescue personnel and administrator — the person responsible for issuing entry permits and for monitoring hazards in and around confined spaces.

Team members will be trained on all key aspects of working in a permit-required confined space including the No. 1 reason for fatalities — rescue procedures.

Subjects to be covered in the course are entry principles, recognizing atmospheric hazards, types of hazards, rescue operations.

Cost of the course is \$65 per person.

It allows 4-H youth to demonstrate and test what they have learned in their 4-H Bicycle Safety projects throughout the year."

Events at the annual rodeo, according to Rethwisch, included: a Newspaper Toss, which taught eye-hand coordination and gave participants an idea of what it is like to be a newspaper delivery person, and a Ride Between The Lines, from which youth learned control of their bicycles and determination to keep the tires between two narrowly spaced lines for a distance of 50 feet. Other events included a safety and skills quiz, a figure eight challenge ride, a bicycle safety inspection conducted by the Sheriff's office and a slalom course. A five mile bike race planned for senior age 4-Hers and a safety ride through town planned for the junior age participants were canceled, due to unsafe conditions caused by rain.

Reception for Wayne State artist July 31 in Sioux City

A reception for Wayne State College artist Wayne Anderson will be held from 6 pm to 8 pm Saturday, July 31 at the Sioux City Art Center. The public is invited.

This monotype exhibit will run through Aug. 17. A monotype is an image that is painted or drawn with oil or paint or printer's ink directly on a clean, unworked plate and then transferred to paper. The resulting image is unique and cannot be replicated.

"A very important element of my work involves chance and the relinquishment of control, especially in the initial stages," says Anderson. "While the technical facility exists to take absolute control and produce a predictable product, I am much more interested in a dynamic process fed by randomness and accident and conditioned by metaphorical resonances and my formalist tendencies."

Anderson, professor of art and art history at Wayne State, has been a Wayne State faculty member since 1979. He earned his bachelor of fine arts degree from the University of South Dakota, and his master of fine arts degree from Southern Illinois University.

His work has received awards in the areas of painting, printmaking, drawing, watercolor, and sculpture. He has also exhibited photographs and delivered public lectures on a wide range of subjects in such venues as the John G. Neihardt Conference and Wayne State College's Sunday Series.

community of LaPorte. The cemetery holds more than 300 life stories, some of them very brief. Murder victims, victims of disease and the victims of other dangers of the hard life in the early days of settlement all are contained in the cemetery.

Besides cleaning up the overgrown condition, the cemetery sports several new trees and plans call for rebuilding the fence, raising new monuments and establishing an official state historical marker there.

Several donations have been received to help with the further restoration work and a board has been formed to administer the funds

and coordinate the volunteer efforts. A driving force in the restoration work has been Steve Gross, a history and genealogy buff from Wayne.

The cemetery is near where the first county seat was located. Most of the pioneer settlement of LaPorte, including the courthouse functions, were moved to Wayne in the 1880s. Family stories relate how Cyrus Hunter, who started the first county newspaper, was LaPorte's only postmaster and ran the grocery store, opposed the move.

He was a member of the Nebraska State Constitutional Convention in 1875, representing Cedar, Stanton and Wayne Counties.

Ranae was sitting in a car waiting for her friends to finish shopping when she noticed a young man walk in front of her. A few seconds later, at approximately 9:30 p.m., she heard a girl screaming for help.

"I THOUGHT she was being raped," said Ranae, the 22-year-old daughter of Bob and Jan Fuoss of rural Wayne.

Ranae added that although she was at first scared to do anything, fearing that the man would turn on

her, the screams became more desperate and intense. "I just couldn't wait any longer and I ran into the store and told Jason of the situation."

Jason called for Mark and they both ran out of the store and located the car where the incident was happening. Jason struggled with the assailant, freed the girl, and told her to run into the store.

The assailant wielded a knife at the young men and told them to back off. After the two had retreated to a place of safety, they ran after the assailant's vehicle to get a de-

scription for the police.

"ALL THREE of these young people were instrumental in saving this girl from a very serious fate," said Kingsford Public Safety Director Alan Anderson.

Anderson said the three were also instrumental in assisting the police with information which later led to the assailant's arrest and prosecution.

Ranae said she was able to meet the young girl who was the victim of the assailant's attack when they were all asked to identify him in a police line-up.

"Her family was with her and they just kept thanking us. They were so grateful because they don't know what the man would have done and they're afraid he would have raped and killed her since he was carrying a knife."

Ranae added that she and her friends certainly didn't expect to receive any award for their actions on that November night.

"We only did what we knew was right. If I were ever in that situation, I would hope someone would do the same thing for me."

Winside phone exchange customers gain 911 line

Winside phone exchange customers have an easier way to summon emergency help now that 911 service is available in the 286 exchange.

The service went into effect this week. Meanwhile, residents of Wakefield should be able to use the easy to remember 911 emergency number by the end of the year, according to Lowell Johnson, Wakefield city administrator.

Wayne County Commissioners approved a request for the Wayne County residents in the Wakefield (287) exchange to be billed an additional 50 cents per month on their phone bill to pay for the equipment and administration of the 911 service.

Johnson said Dixon County Com-

missioners still must approve the fee for residents there, but that he anticipates the service will be ready to implement by November.

Wakefield emergency services are dispatched out of the Wayne dispatching center currently and that will not change, said Johnson. He said when someone makes an emergency call now in Wakefield the dispatcher in Wayne answers because the line is call forwarded.

Residents in Carroll recently began using the 911 service through their local phone company, Huntel, but the county commissioners have yet to be approached about approving the permitted 50 cent bill charge for the service they said.

Improvements made to Wayne Agriculture Park

Improvements to the Wayne County Agricultural Park will greet fairgoers in two short weeks when the 71st annual fair gets underway.

Thanks in part to a grant from the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben, a new portable stage and sidewalks are being constructed at the Little Theatre.

Hundreds of hours of volunteer labor are going into preparation and improvement of the Agricultural Park, said Leland Herman, long-time fair board member.

A new perimeter fence is going up around the park and a new horse show arena has been cut into the hillside on land acquired by the fair board last year. The rush is on with workers battling wet weather delays to get the new arena ready in time for the fair, said Herman.

Additional changes at the ag park anticipated soon will be the relocation of the old District 15 School Building. The school, which closed this spring will be moved to the Agricultural Park as a historic one-room school display.

The Ak-Sar-Ben grant this year was for \$650 and joins sizeable other Ak-Sar-Ben funds which have gone into the building of Agricultural Park over the years, said Herman.

Ak-Sar-Ben has distributed over \$4 million to county fairgrounds in Nebraska in the last 40 years said Herman. "That is in keeping with our mission 'Making the Area a Better Place to Live,'" said Sherman Berg, vice president of Ak-Sar-Ben in announcing the Wayne grant.

The Wayne Fair will be August 5-8.

For Nebraska women Health department offering cancer screening

The Nebraska Department of Health has plans to provide cancer screening to 16,000 Nebraska women of low and moderate income.

A five-year, \$10 million grant from the federal Centers for Disease Control will enable the department to provide breast and cervical cancer screening exams statewide to women who cannot afford them, said Nebraska Director of Health Dr. Mark Horton.

Nebraska ranked 44th out of 48 states for the number of women who have had mammograms in a study conducted by the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"This grant could make a big difference," said Dr. Horton, "because breast cancer is the leading cause of cancer deaths among Nebraska women (275 in 1991).

"The number of deaths from cer-

vical cancer is relatively low (19 in 1991), however both of these causes of death can be prevented."

HORTON said detection in the early stages, when there are no signs of symptoms, is vitally important. Cervical cancer is 100 percent curable and breast cancer is 95 percent curable if detected early.

The goal of the program is to find breast and cervical cancers early by removing the barriers that keep women from obtaining screening exams. Cost is one of the major barriers; access to physicians is another.

The program is designed for women without insurance or who have high deductibles on their insurance policies; low and middle income women who meet income eligibility requirements; minority women; and women age 50 and over who have not received regular

screening services.

In addition to initial screening, funding is available to pay for follow-up screening and education. Screening services offered include pelvic exams, Pap smears, clinical breast exams, mammograms, and colposcopy (examination of the cervix).

The examinations are free or at reduced cost to women age 18 years and above. Dr. Horton pointed out that income eligibility guidelines are generous in that a woman in a family of four can have income of up to \$32,288 and still qualify for assistance.

INFORMATION about the program is available across the state from the American Cancer Society, local family planning clinics, community action agencies, local health departments, and Nebraska Department of Health Regional Offices.

Over 770 women have enrolled in the program since screening began in September. Approximately 550 women have been screened so far. Out of that number, two women with breast cancer and three women with cervical cancer were identified and treated.

The department has developed a computer program to track women who were screened and remind them when it is time for a re-examination.

Eighty-two physicians and other providers, such as family planning clinics, hospitals, mammography units and laboratories, have contracted with the program, and Dr. Horton said more providers are being sought.

The Lundahl's and Brehmer's tied for first in the second flight at 86 with the Gisselman's placing third with an 89. The Luecht team was fourth with a 90.

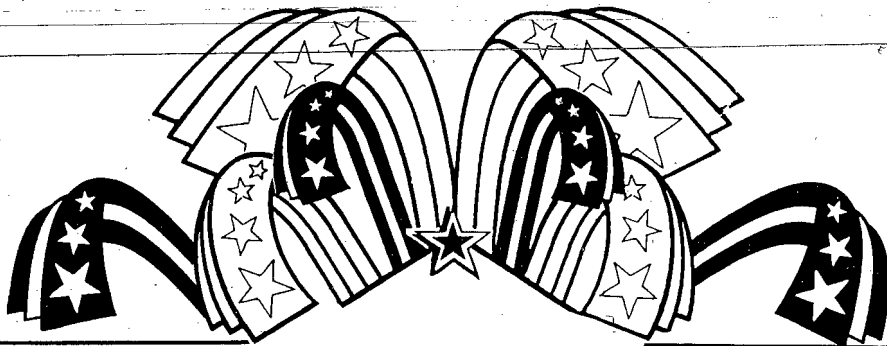

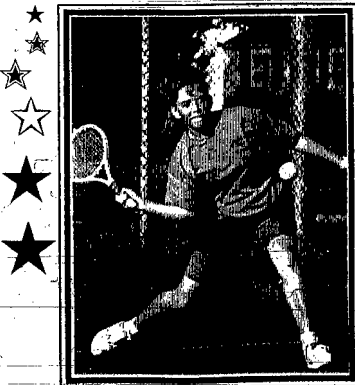

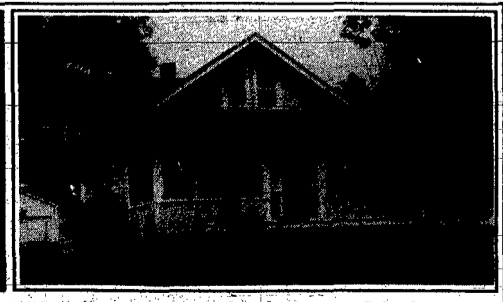
