'Four terrific days'

"Four of the most terrific days we have ever had," was the way Wayne County Ag Society President Mick Topp described the 1993 County Fair.

"We've never had a fair run so smoothly since I've been president," said Topp who was thankful for all the volunteer help and near perfect weather.

Topp said crowds were up at every event, and exhibit numbers increased this year over previous years. When the Ag Society met Monday night there was nothing but compliments to report, said Topp.

OVER 3,200 free meals were served at the annual barbecue Friday night, which Topp said is close to a record for the 32-year-old fair attraction. A popular addition to the meal this year was barbecued lamb, he said. Area producers have indicated interest in making lamb a routine part of the barbecue menu along with beef and pork in succeeding years, said Topp. The annual barbecue is sponsored by scores of Wayne County businesses who contribute cash, goods and services to put on the free feed.

New events such as barnyard golf, the pitch tournament, and an ugly pickup contest helped add to the

Ex-Senator is guilty on theft charge

Calling the actions of State Sen. Kurt Hohenstein "more than reprehensible," the special prosecutor urged a tough sentence Tuesday after Hohenstein plead guilty to felony theft charges in the Dakota County District Court.

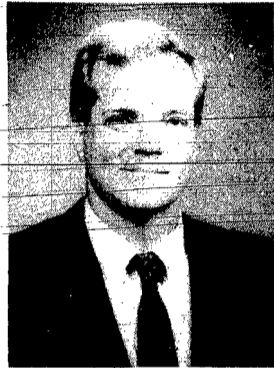
Prosecutor Clarence Mock of Oakland, Neb. used strong terms to condemn Hohenstein's actions following the court proceeding during which Hohenstein agreed to plead guilty to the theft charge in exchange for the state dropping other charges against him.

The case snuffs out a bright political career that even as late as Monday was drawing praise from fellow state senators. State Sen. Ernie Chambers was even in the courtroom Tuesday to offer moral support to Hohenstein.

LEGISLATIVE District 17 will be getting a governor-appointed replacement for Hohenstein, who turned in his letter of resignation to Gov. Ben Nelson's office Monday. Hohenstein defeated two-term incumbent Gerald Conway of Wayne last November and received widespread praise for his legislative leadership as a freshman senator.

Hohenstein appearing as a defendant in the same courtroom where he developed the reputation as a tough minded prosecutor and strong law and order advocate during his years as Dakota County Attorney, faces possible jail sentence of 1 to 20 years and/or a \$25,000 fine on the charge.

Mock told the better than 20 media representatives after Tuesday's hearing that "there are basically two Kurt Hohenstein's." He said the public Hohenstein is "Mr. Law and Order" but the real Kurt Hohenstein developed a pattern of theft for over two years, hasn't shown any remorse and displayed a pattern of cover-up after claims of misconduct became public.

long term. "Since he's been exposed, he's undermined the sense of confidence in law enforcement agencies," said Mock, who has spent four months investigating the charges.

Hohenstein was released on \$20,000 bond following the court proceedings Tuesday and the Fremont probation office was assigned to conduct a pre-sentence investigation.

THE CHARGE he plead guilty to stems from theft of over \$1,500 from Tina L. Oelrichs, a legal client of Hohenstein's. Other specific instances of theft from client funds Hohenstein was responsible for as well as theft from the Dakota County Victim's Assistance Fund, the Northeast Nebraska Drug Enforcement Fund and the Dakota County General Fund were also alleged by Mock but those charges will be dropped as part of the plea agreement.

Hohenstein kept his eyes focused on the judge Tuesday as he answered a long series of questions about his understanding of his rights. He waived his rights to a preliminary hearing and jury trial.

To his credit, Mock said, Hohenstein's decision not to contest the charge and agree to the plea will save Dakota County \$50,000 to \$100,000 in court costs and potential change of venue for a trial.

Dixon Fair starts Sunday

With the Wayne County Fair just completed, area residents can dust off their boots in preparation for the annual Dixon County Fair which gets underway Sunday, Aug. 15 at the Dixon County Fairgrounds in Concord.

This year's event runs through

Wednesday, Aug. 18 and will feature a variety of activities, including numerous 4-H judging events.

Also highlighting the fair will be a free barbecue, entertainment two nights, a display of exotic birds and animals, a square dance, teen dance, ice cream social and demolition derby, as well as water testing for nitrates.

Rainbow Amusements will be

on the midway on Aug. 16, 17 and 18, and youngsters are invited to purchase an arm band on Tuesday for \$7 and enjoy as many rides as they wish from 6 to 10 p.m.

General admission to the fair is \$3, with season passes available at a cost of \$5. Youngsters under age 10 will be admitted free.

ACTIVITIES will begin Sunday, Aug. 15 with 4-H and open class rabbit and sheep judging at 2 p.m. The annual vesper service will get underway at 8 p.m.

Sunday evening's program will also include the presentation of Pioneer Farm Family and Good Neighbor Awards, followed with free refreshments.

Kicking off events on Monday, Aug. 16 will be the 4-H horse show at 9 a.m., followed with the judging of 4-H foods, home environment, garden, engineering, crops and miscellaneous at 10:30 a.m.

At 1 p.m. will be 4-H and open class dairy and goat judging and 4-H dogs, cats and household pet judging, followed with 4-H and open class poultry judging at 3 p.m.

Rain or shine, the annual free barbecue is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m. on Monday. Evening activities will include the open class horse playday at 7 p.m., entertainment by The Dutton Family at 8 p.m., and a free square dance with

Health Care Crisis point to agree on

Everyone who attended Saturday evening's National Issues Forum on the Health Care Crisis in America could agree on one main point—the issue is tough and emotional—after that the agreement breaks down.

But the important thing about an issues forum is not reaching agreement, say organizers Jan Dinsmore and Pat Arneson. The important thing is the discussion itself.

Over 75 attended the session at Wayne State College, which is part of a series of grass roots discussion forums being held across the country this year on the health care crisis. The forums are sponsored by the Kettering Foundation which seeks to foster public discussion on key issues facing the nation.

MOST OF THOSE in attendance at the Wayne forum were enrollees in the Public Policy Institute which was in session Friday through Sun-

day. The institute helps teach forum leaders and encourages them to conduct other forums in their communities.

The forum discussion opened with a Kettering Foundation video which outlined three potential policy choices on the health care crisis—1) make minor changes to the existing system to make it better—2) implement a national health care system administered by the government or 3) establish 'mangled' insurance coverage for all employees.

Most members of the audience who attended the two-hour discussion stood to address positive or negative opinions about each of those choices.

WHEN IT WAS over, there was no effort to reach a consensus or to persuade anyone to one view or another. "But, everyone there was encouraged to take the discussion out of the forum onto the street and into

Secretary chosen

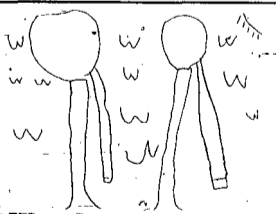

Wakefield Midgets earn championship berth at State with 3-2 win over Wisner

The Wakefield Midget Legion baseball team advanced to the finals of the Class C State Tournament after a hard fought 3-2 victory over Wisner-Pilger-Beemer in the finals of the winner's bracket, Monday night.

It was the fourth meeting between the two teams this season and battle now stands even at two wins for each team but Monday's victory is the biggest to date.

Wisner-Pilger-Beemer took a 1-0 lead after the first inning and they increased that margin to 2-0 after two innings of play. Wakefield, however, came back to tie the game

in the third inning after a two-run triple by Wes Blecke.

The game remained even at two until the bottom of the sixth inning. Wakefield pitcher Travis Birkley and Wisner hurler Mark Roland were locked in a dual until the sixth when Birkley was relieved with two out by Shane Schuster.

Schuster struck out Matt Paulson which stranded Nick Kumm on third base. Wisner also made a pitching change by putting Nick Kumm on the mound in relief of Roland.

Kumm had some control problems and ended up loading the bases on three walks. The winning run was scored by Tory Nixon who stole home plate after a wild pitch by Kumm. Nixon was pinch run-

ning for Lucas Tappe.

Schuster took the mound in the top of the seventh inning and retired the Wisner line-up in order with a ground out to Justin Dutcher at third, a ground out to Cory Coble at second and a strikeout to end the game.

Wakefield finished with three runs on five hits and four errors while Wisner had two runs on four hits and one error. Schuster officially got the win in relief of Birkley who went 5 2/3 innings, allowing just four hits and three walks while striking out six.

Kumm took the loss in relief of Roland who went five complete innings, allowing two runs on five hits and five walks while striking out eight.

Cory Brown and Schuster each

had two singles and Blecke ripped a triple for Wakefield's five hits while Matt Paulson doubled to lead Wisner. Nathan Eichelberger, John Martin and Kumm each had one base hit.

IN OTHER action Monday, Tecumseh eliminated Ber-Mis from tournament play with a 7-3 victory. Lindsey Searcey got the pitching victory, scattering six hits and allowing three runs while striking out a dozen batters.

Andrew Gottula, Jeremy Rine and Chad Lade belted two hits each to propel Tecumseh's eight-hit attack while Mike Edwards led Ber-Mis with three hits and three rbi.

Mitchell ended Battle Creek's run at a fourth straight state tournament championship bid by eliminating them, 14-8. Derrick Hessler was the winning pitcher and was also the offensive catalyst with three hits. Isaac Converse had two hits. Tyrone Uhlir led Battle Creek with a three-run home run.

Three of the four teams remaining in the state tournament have one loss with Wakefield the only unbeaten. Wakefield is automatically in the championship game even if they should lose to Tecumseh on Tuesday afternoon.

A Wakefield win over Tecumseh forces the winner of Mitchell and Wisner to beat Wakefield twice on Wednesday. A Tecumseh win over Wakefield on Tuesday would mean a Tecumseh showdown with the winner of Mitchell and Wisner with the winner of that game playing Wakefield at 5 p.m. on Wednesday.

Regardless, the first game on Wednesday is slated for 2:30 p.m. If Wakefield enters the game undefeated and wins the 2:30 contest, the tournament is completed.

State Midget baseball play continues

The 1993 State Class C Midget Baseball Tournament continues through Wednesday at Wakefield's Eaton Field. First round games on Friday had Wisner defeating three-time defending state champions Battle Creek by a 9-3 margin while Mitchell defeated Tecumseh, 10-7.

Bertrand/Loomis, known as Ber-Mis, downed Superior, 8-1 and in the nightcap Wakefield blasted Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley, 17-8.

Rain on Friday night in Wakefield limited action on Saturday to just the two loser's bracket games in which Battle Creek eliminated Superior by a 9-1 margin and Tecumseh defeated Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley, 6-1.

On Sunday the winner's bracket continued with Wisner edging Ber-Mis, 2-0 and Wakefield defeated Mitchell, 6-1.

In Wakefield's first round game with Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley, the locals jumped out to a six run lead after the first half inning on just two hits with five walks and an error.

Wakefield added three more runs in the second inning and were virtually never threatened. Shane

Schuster was on the mound for Wakefield and pitched the first four innings, earning the victory. Travis Birkley came in for relief in the fifth and sixth innings and Justin Dutcher pitched the final inning.

Palmer-Wolbach-Greeley pitchers gave up a total of 12 walks to Wakefield along with five errors. Both teams pounded out a total of 10 hits and Wakefield did suffer six errors despite winning by nine runs, 17-8.

Cory Brown was the offensive catalyst for Wakefield with three base hits and two rbi while Tory Nixon laced a pair of singles. Cory Coble blasted a two-run double and scored three runs. Coble came to bat five times in the game and reached base all five times on three walks, a double and after being hit by a pitch.

Lucas Tappe belted an rbi double and Shane Schuster had an rbi double while Matt Peterson and Justin Dutcher rounded out the hitting with a base hit each.

In Sunday's game with Mitchell it seemed like it was the Shane Schuster show as the left handed pitcher tossed a three-hitter, then switched to the right hand when he came to the plate and notched five

rbi on a two-run single in the third inning and a three-run double in the seventh.

Schuster struck out eight Mitchell batters and had a one-hit shutout heading to the bottom of the seventh inning when Mitchell had two hits and scored its only run.

Mitchell finished with three errors while Wakefield had six runs on six hits and one error. Cory Brown had two singles while Matt Peterson and Wes Blecke each had rbi singles.

The following is a recap of all first and second round games with the exception of the Wakefield games:

Wisner, 9—Battle Creek, 3—Battle Creek took a 3-0 lead after two innings of play but Wisner pitcher Nick Kumm shut them down the rest of the way, allowing only two hits for the entire game. Wisner pounded out seven hits led by Wellman with two doubles and a single. Paulson had a triple and a single.

Mitchell, 10—Tecumseh, 7—Mitchell scored four runs in the third inning to erase a 2-0 deficit and they never looked back. Con-

verse got the pitching victory, striking out 10 Tecumseh batters in the process. Despite the win, Mitchell was out-hit by Tecumseh, 8-3. Dickinson led Mitchell with a home run and a double. Rine and Van Winkle led Tecumseh with three hits each.

Ber-Mis, 8—Superior, 1—Ber-Mis blew open a close game in the fourth inning with five runs and eventually led 7-0 before Superior scored. McCracken got the pitching victory, tossing a three-hitter with 13 strikeouts in the process. McCracken and Stone led Ber-Mis's offense with two hits each.

Battle Creek, 9—Superior, 1—Superior became the first team to be eliminated from the state tournament as Battle Creek belted them with 12 hits including three each from Lester Maertins and Ty Uhlir. Maertins homered, doubled and singled while Uhlir tripled and added a pair of singles. Uhlir picked up the pitching win with relief help from Hughes.

Researcher looks at farm/cancer links

The cancer-causing potential of commonly used herbicides has many people concerned.

One step in the search for safer herbicides is to find out how and why these chemicals can cause cancer.

An agricultural toxicologist who joined the University of Nebraska earlier this year brings leadership and expertise in this area of research to the state.

Michael Corbett came to the

Eppley Institute for Cancer Research at the NU Medical Center here in January. A native Kansan and University of Kansas graduate, Corbett spent the last 16 years at the University of Florida conducting research on pesticides.

Corbett's research team is working on several projects to investigate the effects and interrelationships of agricultural chemicals on human and animal health.

His research emphasizes the arylamine group, a subgroup of organic chemicals. The vast majority of commonly used herbicides, in-

cluding atrazine and alachlor (Lasso), is based on arylamines. Such herbicides are the mainstay of no-till agriculture in the Midwest. Two other common herbicides, 2,4-D and Roundup, are not based on arylamines.

Arylamines have complex interactions with living cells and also make up one of the largest groups of human-made chemicals that find their way into the environment. Even the cooking of high-protein foods leads to the formation of arylamines, some of which have been shown to be cause mutations and possibly cause cancer in humans.

"A lot of people are very concerned about the toxic effects of these chemicals, particularly their potential to cause cancer," Corbett said.

Corbett and his research team examine how chemical changes in the structure of the arylamines affect their potential to cause cancer and form tumors. He looks at toxicology, the science that deals with

poisons and problems associated with their use, from a chemical perspective rather than a health-oriented perspective.

"I'm more interested in trying to explain a toxic effect by looking at the chemistry," he said.

Search for Safer Herbicides

Corbett's lab stresses the study of biochemical processes that cause damage to DNA, the chain of nucleic acids that is the molecular basis of heredity in humans and other organisms.

Corbett examines the potential for any chemical of this class to behave as a carcinogen, or cancer-causing agent. He seeks to determine the biochemical processes of cell damage so that the chemical's structure could later be changed based on that knowledge.

Ultimately, his research will point to the safest herbicides to use. Perhaps one day, researchers will be

On Thursday, the 22nd, the thunder rolled all night: absolutely all night. And rain! We had 3.5 inches, Murdock had 6 inches. I've never heard thunder like that. Gene Bey tells me it sounded like that in the 30's, but it never rained then.

In the morning, two of our home health aides called to say they were not working that day. One was stranded at her home; the other had evacuated her home.

On that Thursday afternoon, a van load of ladies from Winside had stopped here on their way home. I directed them north to South Bend

for gas; and then west to Mahoney State Park.

The aide whose home was flooded was directly across the street from the filling station in South Bend. In fact, I had visited with her while Veryl Jackson pumped gas that afternoon.

put a child under each arm and headed for the pickup. The water was chest high as she struggled across the yard. Amazingly, the pickup started and they went across the street to higher ground. That's pretty scary!

A freezer full of meat floated and the electricity stayed on. But many other things were lost. I shuddered as I heard her describe soaked wedding pictures, mud over everything, the new car stranded in the drive. And this is just one family.

Jon and Kristi have been without running water all week in St. Joe. She works in another town, so showers there before work.

A friend with a pool has apparently become the community bath house.

I played for a wedding at the church nearby on Saturday. The skies cleared during the ceremony. The reception was in Ashland. At 8 p.m., the rain started, tornadoes

were sighted, sirens alarmed and the guests all went home. I have nightmares about left-over food, stranded dance band and a broken-hearted bride.

"Into each life a little rain must fall," but this is ridiculous!

I used to tell the kids that thunder was only the angels bowing; they must have had a tournament!

We can only wonder what Mother Nature has in store for us next. I believe I just heard some hail.

Fish Extract Helps Prevent Fractures

Osteoporosis is a common cause of serious fractures, especially in women after menopause. As one ages, bone calcium levels fall, leaving bones weak and subject to breaks. Preventives shown to be effective in women include a combination of estrogen hormone, calcium supplements, and exercise. Also, calcitonin, a hormone extracted from salmon and made synthetically, is given by injection to maintain calcium bone levels.

Researchers report in British Medical Journal of their two-year study of an intranasal form of calcitonin in women aged 68 to 72 years. Giving calcitonin by way of the nose avoided pain associated with injections and seemed to reduce systemic reactions. The women also received 500 mg of calcium daily. The researchers concluded that women who received intranasal calcitonin had significantly fewer fractures than women who did not receive the hormone.
