

## Peace Corps worker from Wayne enjoys experience in Thailand

Although his original preference was Latin America and the Caribbean, Wayne resident Jeff Keidel said he does not regret the nearly two and a half years he lived in Thailand as a volunteer in the United States Peace Corps.

"I hope I made an impact, although I probably gained more from the experience than the people I made friends with and worked with in Thailand."

Jeff, the 26-year-old son of Dick and Becky Keidel, graduated from Wayne High School in 1985 and from Nebraska Wesleyan University, Lincoln, in 1990.

Although Jeff managed apartment houses in Lincoln for a time following his college graduation, it was while he was still in school that he first applied to join the Peace Corps, a U.S. government agency established in 1961 by President John Kennedy to assist foreign countries with skilled manpower.

"There are a lot of steps in the application process," explains Jeff, adding that although he had always been interested in serving with the Peace Corps, he began thinking about it much more seriously as he advanced through each application step.

NEARLY seven months after submitting his application, Jeff was seated on board an airplane with 53 other Peace Corps volunteers enroute to Thailand in February of 1991.

Their trip followed just three days of orientation in San Francisco.

where he and other Peace Corps volunteers received intensive training in the language, history, culture and customs of the country. "They didn't want us to offend anyone," smiles Jeff.

Although originally scheduled to work in Belize, formerly British Honduras, Jeff learned just weeks before his departure date that he would be sent to Thailand instead.

"During the application process I noted the fact that I had taken medication for asthma at age 14. That alone disqualified me going to Belize because they did not have the medical facilities to care for such problems."

JEFF ARRIVED in Thailand in late February 1991 on the same day the ground war began in the Persian Gulf and as a coup was underway in Thailand.

"The government was concerned about all international travelers during that time and we were surrounded by security guards when we landed in Thailand and for the next three months."

Once landing, the group of volunteers received an additional three months of intensive language training and traveled to various locations throughout the country for technical training.

"We had received a job description beforehand," smiles Jeff, "but once we arrived in Thailand that description didn't really mean very much."

Although the first three months of training was very structured, Jeff explains that the volunteers were pretty much on their own when they reached their final sites.

FOR JEFF, his final destination would be the province of Mahasarakham, located in northeast Thailand.

"I never really experienced culture shock," says Jeff, adding that learning the Thai language was initially his biggest problem and was additionally complicated by the fact that he has been trained for three months to speak Thai and was then sent to a province where the main language is Laotian.

In addition to the language difficulties, Jeff said the extreme heat of Thailand also was a source of discomfort for several months after his arrival.

"It was below zero when I boarded the plane and in the middle of the hot season when I arrived in Thailand. During the hot season, Jeff said the thermometer climbs to over 100 degrees every day."

## Wayne to have candidate for senate post

Wayne will have at least one representative for Gov. Ben Nelson to consider for appointment to the open Legislative District 17 seat.

Sheryl Lindau, a member of Wayne City Council and local Democrat leader has turned in her application to the governor and is being supported in that effort by several local leaders.

Mrs. Lindau, owner of Four In Hand women's shop on Main Street and wife of Wayne physician Jim Lindau, said she had not really considered putting her name in until a couple of friends from Lincoln, including a state senator, encouraged her to do so.

her interest in small business and rural health care issues.

DURING THE KERREY administration, she was appointed to a statewide Health Coordinating Council.

The only other announced candidate for the governor's appointment has been Jackie Hartnett of Hubbard, who is serving as a Dakota County Commissioner. However, the governor's office has said several applications have come in for the appointment.

The office became open after State Sen. Kurt Hohenstein was forced to resign as part of a plea agreement on charges he stole \$30,000 from a former client of his law firm. Hohenstein faces a possible jail term after pleading guilty to the felony theft charge on condition the state would not prosecute him on other theft charges.

Nelson said he expected to make the appointment to fill the vacancy within a month.

SHE SAID she also received encouragement from her husband and from fellow business people in Wayne.

She has been active in Democrat politics, having worked on campaigns for Bob Kerrey and having served as county Democrat Chairman. She is in her second term on city council and is active in civic affairs.

A graduate of the University of Nebraska with a degree in political science, Mrs. Lindau said she has always had an interest in politics and participation in the process. The Lindaus have two children, Elizabeth, 14, and Michael, 12.

## Parents seek bus decision reversal

Two dozen parents concerned about the school board's announced intention to discontinue busing of in-town students to school attended the Tuesday night school board meeting to ask the board to reconsider its decision.

The board took no action on the request Tuesday but sent the issue

back to its busing sub-committee for further consideration.

Parents said the safety issues raised in the decision to halt the in-town busing were moot because it would be more of a safety hazard to have the children currently bused walking to school and crossing busy streets.

IN ADDITION, the parents said the issue of fairness could be better

handled by offering busing to other areas of the community outside a certain radius from the school. The elimination of busing for students from the Sunnyview Addition would be unfair because many residents there bought their homes because they knew busing was available.

Mark Kai and Rick Paape spoke for the parents attending the meeting and thanked the board for the

opportunity to have their views heard on the busing decision.

They said continuing to offer busing for students from the Northeast Quadrant of the community would help enhance housing development in that area. The parents presented letters of support for their position from real estate brokers Darrel

## Head 'em up from here

Wayne will be the trail head for a new leg of the annual River City Roundup horseback trail ride being organized by Jack Kavanaugh of Laurel and Mark Sorensen of Wayne.

Up to 100 riders are expected for the five-day Wayne to Omaha ride, said Sorensen.

The group will leave from the Wayne County Agricultural Park Monday morning Sept. 20 and will have lunch in Altona and dinner and overnight in Wisner. Other stops on the trip will be Bancroft, Lyons, Oakland, Craig, Tekamah, Herman, Blair and Ft. Calhoun.

The Wayne to Omaha trail ride will be one of three to this year to the River City Round-Up at Ak-Sar-Ben. The original ride from Ogallala, begun more than 10 years ago, and a ride from Adele, Iowa are the other

two legs that are expected to join up for the ride into Ak-Sar-Ben. The purpose for the rides is to provide a fun outing and help promote the River City Round-up and the communities the riders pass through.

The logistics of scheduling, accommodations and organization for 100 horses, riders and their gear is no small task, said Sorensen. He said volunteers in towns along the route have been very helpful.

The group hopes to average about 20 miles per day and would like to see the event become an annual trail ride.

The riders are scheduled to parade through Wayne along Third Street from the Fairgrounds to Highway 15, then south, beginning at 8:30 a.m. Monday, Sept. 20.

## Haying on CRP okayed

Weather-related disasters throughout the country have forced the Department of Agriculture to further relax restrictions on the use of conservation lands for haying and grazing purposes.

Thursday, USDA announced that farmers in Wayne County with Conservation Reserve Program, CRP, acres will be permitted to hay or graze the grounds under certain conditions. Previously other conserva-

tion program acreages were permitted for haying and grazing but CRP was still restricted.

Fear of feed shortages as a result of the flooding and storms in the Midwest and droughts in the South-east have prompted the change in regulations.

Before doing anything on their CRP grounds, farmers should contact the Wayne County ASCS office for the new details and limits, said Terri Post, county director.

The immunization clinic is open to the public and there are no income guidelines. A \$5 donation is requested to help defray the cost of the clinic, however, it is not mandatory.

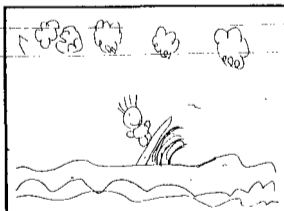

## New lunch system used

Wayne High School is using a computerized lunch system called Accu-Scan. This program works much like a checking account, keeping track of the credits and debits to each student's lunch account.

Please note the following:

1. Students need to bring their Accu-Scan card with them to school the first day. If you have lost it or it has become damaged, a new one will be issued at the replacement cost of \$2. This will be deducted from your account balance (this cost applies to free or reduced students also).

2. Student lunch money will be accepted only between 7:50 and 8:15 a.m. Teacher's lunch money will be accepted between 7:50 and 10 a.m. You will need to have your card with you at this time.

3. We encourage parents to send a check for several weeks worth of meals. This new lunch program eliminates the fear of losing 3-4 weeks worth of lunch tickets. Cash is acceptable, but no change will be given. If you need money for other activities, book orders, fines, etc. this must be kept separate. A receipt will be given each time your account has been credited.

4. There will be no more borrowing of punches! The computer system does not allow for this. When your account balance gets down to two days worth of meals, it will print out a reminder that you need to bring lunch money.

5. All students with negative balances or without their card will eat last. (No exceptions).

THE PARENTS asked to be a part of the board's busing committee deliberations on the issue and they were told they would be kept informed. Since the decision is basically a final one by the board, at this time, the only board involvement will be to consider rescinding its earlier decision; the group was told. Otherwise no action would mean the earlier decision stands.

Where to draw the line on permitted student clothing was another item of discussion as the school board continued its review of the comprehensive school policy.

Board members favored including bans on obscene material and language on t-shirts as well as alcohol, tobacco and drug advertising in the new policy manual.

IN OTHER business, the board accepted the resignation of John

Murtaugh as social studies teacher and wrestling coach even though his contract had already been signed for the coming school year. The board approved the contract of Todd Vireck, who will replace Murtaugh. He will be assigned as Social Studies, wrestling coach and junior high football coach. He is a Wayne State graduate who has been working in Logan, Iowa. Also approved was the contract of Robin Sobansky of Wayne as Spanish teacher.

The board also increased adult lunch prices from \$1.85 to \$1.90 and accepted the milk bid from Gillette Dairy for the school milk supplies for the coming year.

Shared extracurricular programs with Laurel and Wakefield students also were approved. Wakefield may be sending a cross country runner to Wayne to participate with the team here and Laurel is expected to have students who will participate on the Wayne High wrestling team again this year.

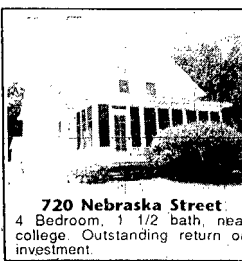

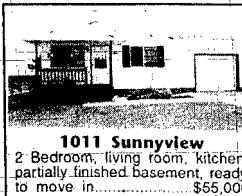

"The Thai people would tell me they were hot," laughs Jeff, but I never saw them sweat, while I was sweating from head to toe."

ONCE IN Mahasarkham, Jeff worked in the Accelerated Rural Development Office which was established in the early 1970's during the Vietnam War.

Although once covered with jungle, Jeff explains that many of the trees were cut down during the time of the Vietnam War so that roads and electricity could be installed to make the residents feel more in touch with the government.

"No one had any idea what I was supposed to do when I arrived," smiles Jeff, adding that one of his first projects was to teach village groups how to make natural shampoo which they could use themselves and sell.

"A lot of the volunteers just go out and determine the needs in a village," explains Jeff, adding that their proposals are either sent to the Peace Corps office or submitted to an embassy for possible funding.

Jeff said he did receive financing

through the Peace Corps for a small pig project. "I received \$180-half the cost of the project, with the villagers putting up the other half."

Because the area of northeast Thailand is heavily deforested, Jeff also helped establish a tree nursery to distribute seedlings to area farmers and villagers.

"There were just lots of small

projects according to village needs," explains Jeff, adding that he also taught English for three semesters at a local university and assisted other Peace Corps volunteers in teaching English at several secondary schools, along with environmental education and assisting with AIDS awareness workshops.

JEFF SAID while the resi-

dents of Thailand were extremely friendly and welcoming, his main source of frustration involved the country's bureaucracy.

"There is a lot of corruption going on the government is not exactly cooperative. They enjoyed showing me off, but that was about the extent of it. There is no long or short-term planning."

Jeff said he eventually learned to go off and do his own projects and to work basically with government officials within his own province.

"I made a lot of Thai friends and I hope I made an impact on them," smiles Jeff, adding that he also learned a lot, including the importance of patience and acceptance. "There are a lot of demands made on you that you wouldn't have in America."

Jeff came home on June 29 and plans to return to Lincoln at the end of this month to seek employment and attend school part-time.

"I thought there would be more of an adjustment to make when I came home," smiles Jeff, "but I don't really feel like I missed too much."

"Nothing has really changed here. It's all the same."

**Public hearing held**

**Zoning process nears end**

Wayne city government is on the home stretch of a two year process to revise and modernize the city's planning and zoning codes.

A public hearing was held before City Council Tuesday on the zoning regulation revisions proposed by the City Planning Commission.

Only a few questions were raised in the Tuesday process, one dealt with the inclusion of duplexes in low density housing zones, and those issues are expected to be resolved at a council work session on August 24. It is anticipated the new regulations could be passed at the next regular council meeting.

ONE OF THE goals of the zoning code revision has been to make it easier for developers to build affordable housing in the community.

In other business at the Tuesday council meeting, council approved the application for a \$170,000 loan from the city's revolving loan fund for economic development to D.V. Industries, Inc. The manufacturer

which employs about ten in Wayne, requested the loan to purchase the leased building it currently occupies and permit possible expansion.

Council also ruled there were insufficient objections (two) from property owners to halt the sidewalk repair/replacement program being conducted in the Northeast quadrant of the city. Thus the projects will proceed. Objections are still being accepted from property owners who wish to protest plans to install new sidewalks on several blocks in that area of the city.

RENTAL FEE increases for the use of the City Auditorium were also approved at the meeting. Beginning Sept. 1, it will cost \$100 to rent the building. Previously the rent had been \$75. Additionally, council approved a policy of charging all state-registered nonprofit organizations half the normal rent fee for their use of the building. Youth groups, under 18, may still use the facility free for non-fund-raising programs after paying a refundable deposit.

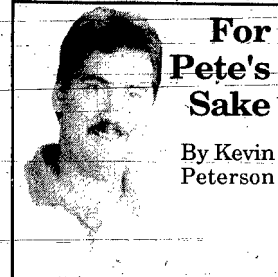
