

## Field thins in bid for Guv's nod

Wayne's Sheryl Lindau may be the front-runner for the appointment to fill the unexpired term of State Sen. Kurt Hohenstein after the apparent withdrawal of another candidate, Jackie Hartnett, Dakota County Commissioner.

Mrs. Hartnett apparently asked the governor to remove her name from consideration for the appointment, however, supporters were encouraging her to reconsider.

Kim Robak, chief of staff for Gov. Ben Nelson, told the Herald Friday afternoon she did not know whether Mrs. Hartnett was still under consideration or not. She said she knew Nelson had talked with Mrs. Hartnett when he visited Dakota County Thursday.

Mrs. Hartnett was unavailable Friday and Ms. Robak said she had not talked to the governor about his conversation with her. She said the governor had talked to Mrs. Lindau and at least two other potential appointees and that he would be making an announcement very soon to end all the speculation.

Democratic officials said at least two of the candidates the governor is considering are Republican. The only two candidates for the appointment who have made their names public have been Mrs. Hartnett and Mrs. Lindau. Ms. Robak said she could not release the names of the other candidates being considered.

At Friday morning's Chamber of Commerce coffee in Wayne Mrs. Lindau's supporters were encouraged to redouble their efforts by calling the governor's office at 471-2244 to voice their support for her appointment.

The governor has said he will heavily weigh his preference for appointment for the candidate who appears to be the most electable, meaning the one that generates the most support from throughout the district during the appointment process.

Mrs. Lindau, who is serving her second term on the Wayne City Council, owns and operates her own

## Highway work delayed by weather

The construction work on the 7-mile stretch of Highway 35 from Wakefield to Emerson has been behind schedule by as much as five weeks this summer because of weather related delays, said project manager Scott Brummond of Wayne.

Extra effort by the contractor has helped catch up some of the schedule on the project but it is still about three weeks behind, he said.

Plans now call for the center 24-foot of the new roadway to be opened in time for use during the winter months and then have the contractor

return next spring to install the 8-foot paved shoulders.

Constant wet soil conditions mean the crews cannot adequately prepare the subsurface for paving, said Brummond. Paving over wet conditions would mean major maintenance problems down the road he said.

Meanwhile, county officials have expressed concern over the additional traffic that is using county roads rather than the designated detour to avoid the construction, said Brummond. He said officials in Thurston County have even posted

their county road closed to try to halt traffic at the Wayne County line.

It's not safe for that much traffic to be on the county roads, said Brummond, who added even semi-truck traffic is using county roads to avoid taking the detour which takes the traffic north to Highway 20. That's only a total of five miles out of the way," said Brummond. He said traffic will be allowed on the new stretch before winter.

Brummond said the new roadway will be a great improvement with the number of no-passing zones de-

creased for 11 to 3 on that stretch. The \$3 million project is one of the phases that will eventually upgrade the entire route between Norfolk to South Sioux City to federal secondary road standards.

## Building is goal for ESU

The Educational Service Unit #1 board agreed to proceed with interviews to hire an architect to build a new headquarters building for the agency in Wakefield.

The tax funded agency provides joint educational services including school nurses and special education to schools in Northeast Nebraska. The existing building on Main Street in Wakefield is rife with problems including inadequate parking, high maintenance and energy costs and poor handicap accessibility according to Rod Garwood, administrator.

"The question of building a new building is not one of if, it's a question of when," said Garwood. He told the board now was the golden opportunity because of low interest rates and the availability of a piece of land that would be ideal for the location of the facility. The land owner has even proposed purchasing the existing building for a "very good price" said Garwood.

ESU currently has 100 employees and offers training services to school personnel and often the space to fulfill those needs is limited, he said. The current building also has seven separate furnaces and the unit is spending \$25,000 a year to keep it maintained, he said.

Garwood estimated the unit would have to borrow \$250,000 to finance proposed new construction but the specifics of costs, size and design would have to be worked out with the architect.

In other business at Tuesday's ESU meeting in Wakefield, the board members voted to set a budget hearing date of Sept. 7 to take public comment on its proposal to exceed

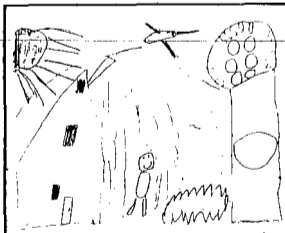
### Tickets on sale

## New group encourages male spirituality

American men have abdicated their responsibilities as spiritual leaders in their families and communities according to a group of Wayne men who, along with thousands of other men from across the country, want to see that trend reversed.

A dozen Waynians recently returned from a nondenominational Christian men's conference in Boul-

der, Colo. that nearly filled the stadium at the University of Colorado and they returned with a message for other men in the community.

"We need to build up the role of men as spiritual leaders," said Bob Zetocha, who attended the "Promise Keepers" conference in Colorado. He said many of the ills the nation faces can be blamed on the idea that is not manly or macho to get on your knees before God and your family and pray.

"For a man to get on his knees

before God is humbling," said Roger Fuoss, who added it is a healthy experience and one that honors wives and families when men kneel and pray with them.

The Boulder "Promise Keepers" meeting is an annual event that was an outgrowth of Colorado football coach Bill McCartney's desire to see men elevate themselves to new roles of spiritual leadership in their families and communities. Societal and cultural influences have convinced men

it is not macho to be spiritual, the organization complains.

"Sometimes you feel like you are alone out there (as a Christian man)," said Kevin Moore. However, he said when he attended the Boulder conference with 50,000 other men in a football stadium singing and holding their hands up and praying aloud "I came back with a different attitude. It was a real benefit to me."

# Rainbow World needs pot of \$

The Rainbow World Day Care Center construction project is in the final stages with projected opening the first of October and already 28 youngsters are registered.

The registration is at about half capacity for the new day care center and Meg Watson said that is where the board wanted to be on opening day. She said she is pleased with the response the center is receiving in both interest from parents who want to send their children there and from the community which is helping with

the fund-raising efforts to furnish and supply the facility.

Mrs. Watson is visiting with local individuals and businesses in the interim with a "wish list" of items the center still needs to acquire for the opening. The construction of the facility is financed through grants and loans but the furnishings and initial start-up supplies will need to be acquired from contributions she said.

Her list of "wishes" totals over \$50,000.

The operating budget to pay the child care workers and overhead on the facility will be covered by the fees charged to parents, she said. The facility is the culmination of a multi-year effort that was an outgrowth of the START project in Wayne. One of the community needs identified in the START effort was for additional quality child care in the community.

the zero percent spending lid and consider budget expenditures. The tentative budget is proposed to jump by a little under 5 percent. It calls for expenditures of over \$4 million—over half of which goes to provide special education services.

The unit expects to collect over \$630,000 in local property taxes based on an anticipated tax levy of 3.12 cents per hundred dollars of property valuation. All of those figures will be finalized after the hearing on the budget and the final property valuation is set for the unit.

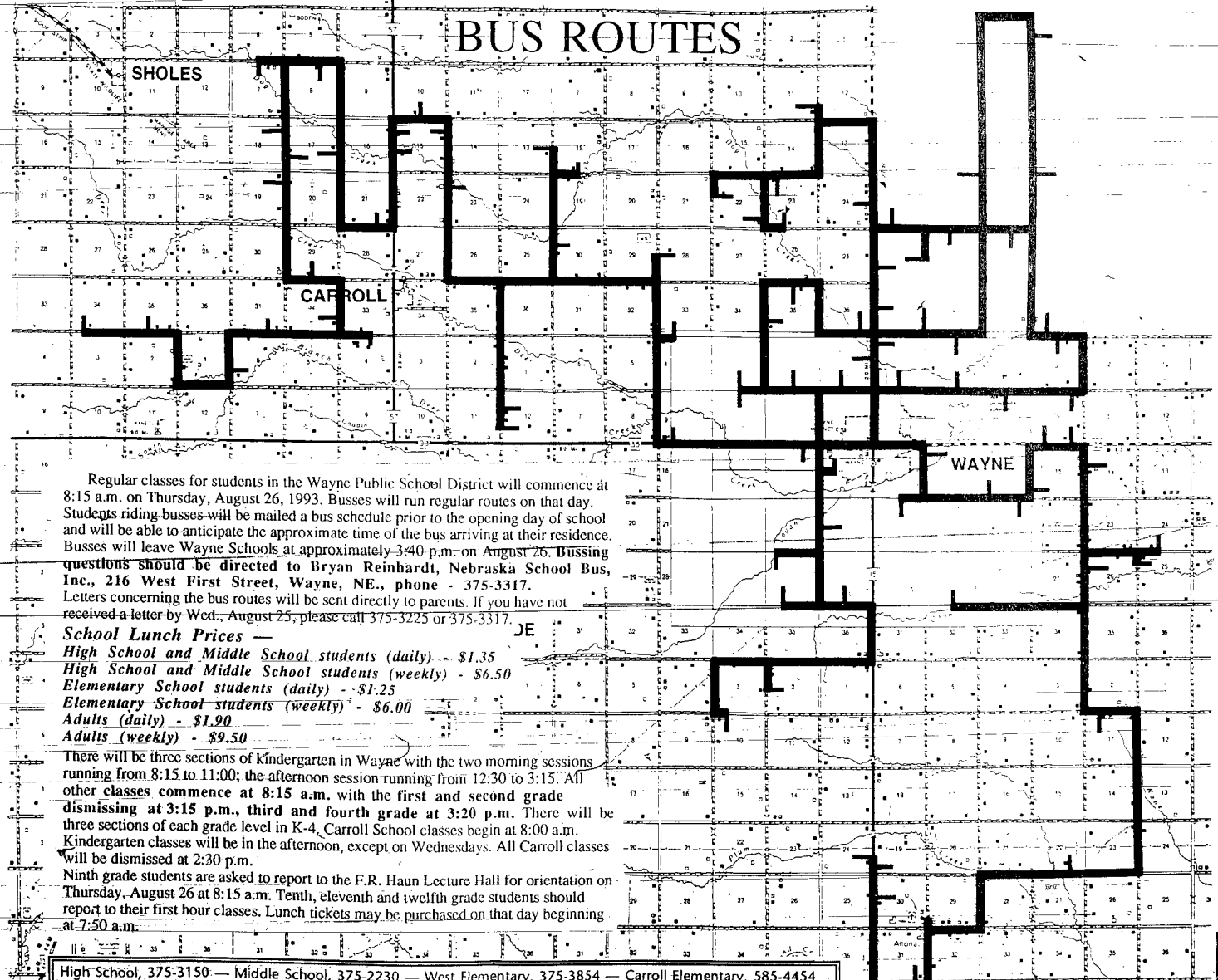

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## Wayne high school runner competes in Australia race

Wayne senior cross country standout Tami Schluns added to her myriad of running highlights, recently, taking part in the world's largest road race in Sydney, Australia.

Schluns travelled to Australia as part of the World Sports Exchange Program—a program which also landed her in England last Christmas. She left Wayne on July 30 and arrived in Sydney on August 1.

"We actually didn't even have a July 31 because we crossed the international time line," Schluns said. "Sydney is 17 hours ahead of our central time zone."

Schluns said she was one of three Nebraskans who made the trip across the seas. Angie Ebeler of Auburn and Eric Stanoscheck of Wahoo also travelled down under.

Schluns said her trip consisted of cross country training and sight-seeing but she had an unusual twist to her trip that no one else on the 52-person World Sports Exchange Program had—a reunion with a

friend.

It was three years ago this fall that Ingrid Donald, a foreign exchange student from Australia competed on the Wayne High cross country team, where she became close friends with Schluns—a relationship that has since seen them correspond by mail, until now.

"Ingrid actually travelled quite a ways to come see me but it was really great to see her again," Schluns said. Donald stayed with the Logan McClelland family during her stay in Wayne, America.

"Ingrid and I did make tentative plans to see each other again in about three or four years when she returns to the United States," Schluns said.

The culmination of Tami's trip to Australia was the infamous "City to Surf" road race, which saw over 43,000 runners compete. "It's a 14 kilometer race or about 8.6 miles," Schluns said. "When the gun sounded to start the race, I didn't get to the starting line for about five minutes because of all the runners."

Still, she managed to cross the finish line in 3,044th place and first on the World Sports Exchange team. In fact, Schluns said the three Nebraskans fared quite well.

"The girl from Auburn finished second behind me and the Wahoo guy finished second," Schluns said.

The biggest difference Schluns had to get used to in Australia compared to the United States was the season. "It was winter over there but their winters never get real cold in Sydney," Schluns said. "I did have to take more jeans and sweatshirts and the temperatures ranged from the 50's to around 70."

Schluns returned to the United States on August 10, which ironically she got to see twice since she made the return trip across the international date line.

Tami says she doesn't have any more immediate plans to travel on the World Sports Exchange as of now but has focused her concentration on this cross country season in Nebraska which started Monday.

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## Board Approves Boundary

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District board voted to establish a district-wide boundary for the proposed groundwater quality management area at the July board meeting in Norfolk.

Designating a boundary for the proposed management area was the next step in establishing a groundwater quality management area within the Lower Elkhorn NRD, according to Rick Wozniak, LENRD water resources manager.

"Establishing a groundwater management area is a very detailed and lengthy process," he said. "We feel that a district-wide groundwater management area is a logical and calculated approach to protect groundwater quality." Wozniak feels that establishing a district-wide boundary will be more efficient than declaring several smaller areas within the NRD over the next few years.

Last November, Lower Elkhorn NRD directors voted unanimously to have the staff begin the process of establishing a groundwater quality management area. After further study, the LENRD staff recommended to have the entire district, which covers approximately 4,000 square miles in all or parts of 15 counties, serve as the boundary for the proposed groundwater quality management area.

"Originally, we were looking at a much smaller area within the district," Wozniak said. "Based on results from the groundwater quality monitoring program, LENRD staff recommended that the board consider declaring the entire district a groundwater quality management area."

Research and well monitoring of the groundwater quality within the Lower Elkhorn District began in 1980 by University of Nebraska-Lincoln Conservation and Survey Division. Over the years, several water quality studies have been conducted including the Osmond and Bazile Triangle studies, according to Wozniak.

Excess nitrate-nitrogen in the groundwater is the primary water quality concern within the district. Water samples taken from irrigation wells have shown nitrate levels in the groundwater which exceed the federal health limit of 10 parts per million (ppm). Several areas within the district have documented nitrate contamination problems; the most concentrated nitrate problems occurring within Pierce county, according to Wozniak.

"A groundwater management area is a tool natural resources districts have to protect groundwater quality," he said.

Nebraska's Natural Resources Districts were granted the authority to develop groundwater management areas by the Unicameral in 1982. Today, NRDs across Nebraska are taking positive steps in protecting groundwater quality with nearly one-third of the state's 23 NRDs considering to establish district-wide groundwater management areas.

"By having the NRD establish a groundwater quality management area, important decisions are being made at the local level," said LENRD general manager, Stan Staab. "Locally-elected NRD directors, with assistance from a citizens advisory committee, will make decisions that will directly affect the quality of a natural resource important to all of us."

According to Wozniak, controls for the proposed groundwater quality management area have not been developed. A citizens advisory committee has been formed to discuss specific water quality issues within the NRD. Public hearings will then be held for open discussion on establishing a groundwater quality management area. Finally, action must be taken by the Lower Elkhorn NRD board before a groundwater management area may be declared. "It is important to understand that our water quality problems were not created overnight," Wozniak said. "With cooperation, reducing the level of nitrates in the groundwater can be achieved, but will take many years to correct."

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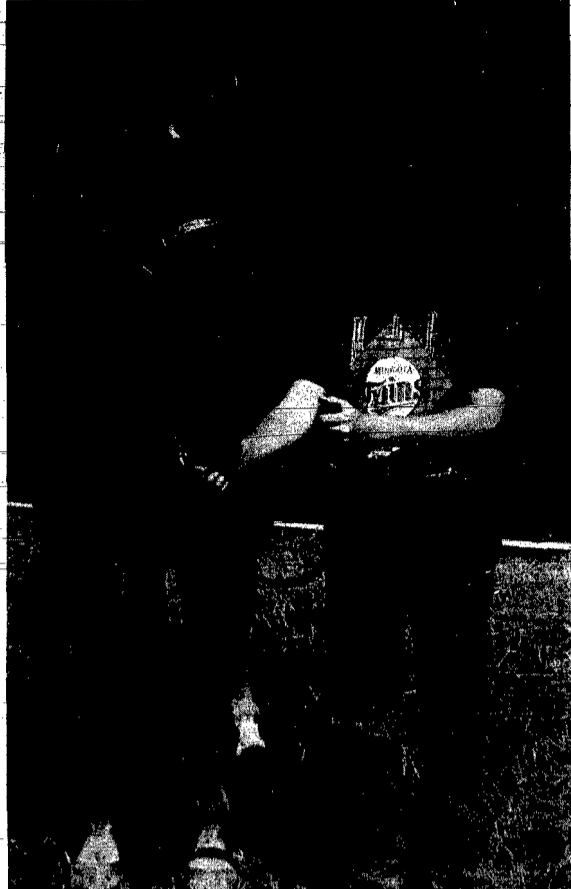

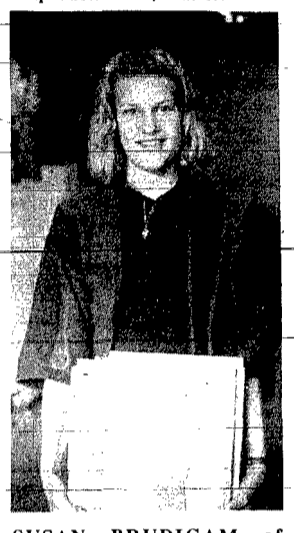
