General's friends want to honor him

Retired four-star Air Force Gen. J.B. Davis is reportedly excited about the plans being discussed in Wayne for the permanent display of his accumulated memorabilia.

Tentative plans include the permanent display of an Air Force jet, possibly an F-16 like one the general flew, at the Wayne Municipal Airport. Davis has said he could assist in getting a surplus jet acquired for display at his hometown airport.

Lyle Seymour, former president of Wayne State College and one of Davis' teachers in both high school and college, said he talked to the retired Allied forces commander of Europe this week and Davis had expressed keen interest in the Wayne plans.

A GROUP OF representatives of veterans organizations and friends of Davis in Wayne has formed to begin discussing plans for displaying the hundreds of artifacts of the general's distinguished career.

The committee plans to attend Monday's Airport Authority meeting to begin discussing the potential for creating a mini-museum at the airport. It is likely the discussion may include the possibility of having the airport named after Wayne's most famous flyboy, Seymour said.

When he packed up his offices in Belgium upon his retirement, the general found he had hundreds of awards and gifts (some of no small value from heads of state) that he didn't have room to display anymore.

SO, HE PACKED them up and sent them to his friend Joe Nuss in Wayne. Joe said he had promised the general he would take care of getting the items distributed and displayed at appropriate locations in Davis' old home town.

"I thought he was talking about a

small UPS box," said Nuss. He said he envisioned a small display case at Wayne High School where Davis graduated in 1954. Perhaps another small display in the cramped spaces at the Vets Club and still another at Wayne State College where Davis attended one year before being admitted to the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Nuss said he was floored when a truck and crew from Offutt Air Force Base in Omaha arrived at his home and began carefully unloading crates of photos, plaques, models, jeweled gifts, display cases and more.

"THEY WERE very polite," recalls Nuss of the Air Force delivery people. The material now occupies a big share of Nuss' garage and the veteran's committee agree, with Nuss that a fitting display might be a single location, possibly a room at the Municipal Airport.

It may have to be a large room. Nuss said the general has told him there is more stuff on the way.

There will undoubtedly be expense involved in getting the display area created and in establishing an outdoor display which might include a full sized fighter jet. The pedestal for that kind of thing won't be cheap the committee surmises.

The first hurdle was to see if the general would lend his name to such an effort, and Seymour confirmed in

State Lottery is launched in Wayne tonight

Wayne will be the Northeast Nebraska site for the festive Nebraska Lottery kick-off party tonight beginning at 10:30 p.m. at 7-Eleven. Nebraska State Senators Connie Day of Norfolk, Pat Engel of South Sioux City and Bob Wickersham of Harrison will be in Wayne to buy the first ticket when it is sold at 12:01 a.m. Saturday morning.



The senators are expected to be joined by local dignitaries for the midnight launch of the Nebraska Lottery program. The "Nebraska Match Three" lottery game is being introduced at ten lottery retail locations throughout the state tonight.

The party in Wayne includes prize drawings every 15 minutes and a phone call from the governor at 11:10 p.m. The event will be broadcast live on KTCH radio in Wayne.

Fifty percent of the lottery proceeds will be returned to players in

the form of prize money. The balance will be split between environmental and educational projects, advertising and administration, a program for gambling addicts and commissions for the retailers who sell the tickets.

In the "Nebraska Match Three" game, players will purchase tickets for \$1 and can rub off a coating to see what their ticket is worth. Winning tickets will be in \$1, \$2, \$4, \$10, \$20, \$100, \$500 and \$5,000 values.

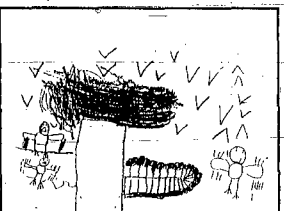

Sentencing date is set for ex-senator

DAKOTA CITY, Neb. (AP) — The former District 17 state senator who resigned and was convicted of felony theft will be sentenced Oct. 1.

Judge Mark Fuhrman set the sentencing date for Kurt Hohenstein of Dakota City.

Hohenstein appeared before Fuhrman on Aug. 10 and pleaded guilty to one count of felony theft under a plea agreement that included Hohenstein's resignation from the Legislature. The plea agreement also listed other alleged thefts for which Hohenstein could be ordered to pay restitution but would face no further state charges.

A special prosecutor and federal authorities continue to investigate Hohenstein.

The state theft charge carries a maximum penalty of 20 years in prison and alleges Hohenstein stole money from a law client.

A hearing will be held Tuesday in Dakota County District Court on a

Family relocates; likes Wayne life

A better quality of life is what attracted to Tamra and Dr. Robert Krugman to relocate to Wayne.

The couple, who are natives of O'Neill, had been living in Reno, Nev. for the past 11 years and the growth of everything, including crime, in that community convinced them that they ought to take their family back to the small town, Midwest quality of life they had known growing up.

The couple established several priorities in their search for a new home. The town had to be in Nebraska, so they could be close to relatives in O'Neill. They town needed to be small in population yet have the advantages of a four year college. Several towns fit the bill, they said.

DAVIS WAS BORN in Wayne Nov. 14, 1935 to Burr Russell and Mary Ellen Vallery Davis. He graduated from the Naval Academy in 1958 and received a master's degree in public administration from Auburn University in 1976.

He has more than 4,500 flying hours including 270 combat hours in Vietnam. His military awards and decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster, Meritorious Service Medal, Air Medal with 10 oak leaf clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Presidential Unit Citation, Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with "V" device and two oak leaf clusters, National Defense Service Medal with two service stars, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Vietnam Service Medal with silver service star, Air Force Overseas Ribbon-Short, Air Force Overseas Ribbon-Long, Air Force Longevity Service Award Ribbon with eight oak leaf clusters, Small Arms Expert Marksmanship Ribbon, Air Force Training Ribbon, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal.

HE ALSO HAS received the Order of National Security Merit, Gouges Medal-South Korea, Grand Cordon of the Order of the Sacred Treasure-Japan and Award of Knight Grand Cross with Sash-Thailand. Additionally, he has been inducted into the Order of the Sword, which is the highest honor noncommissioned officers can bestow.

He was promoted to four-star general in July of 1991.

he said of their decision to locate here.

"It impressed us as a community with the right attitude," said Tamra. A key factor in their decision was the newspaper, she said. The newspaper accurately reflected the positive, progressive, youth-oriented attitudes of the community, she said.

When the Krugmans told friends in Reno they were considering a move to Wayne, the couple said they would always show-off the Police Report printed in the Wayne Herald.

The Krugmans said they came to Wayne, not for the money or materialistic life-style, but for the things that are important. Wholesome environment for raising kids and good educational opportunities were at the top of their list. They have two children, Kallie, 11 and a 5th grader at Wayne Middle School and Trevor, 7, a second grader at West Elementary School.

motion, by Hohenstein's attorney, David Domina, to have Fuhrman step aside from the sentencing.

In his motion, Domina said a misidentification of Fuhrman in a television report and Fuhrman's reaction to it mean the judge should excuse himself from the case.

Domina cites a letter the judge wrote criticizing Lincoln television station KOLN-KGIN, which misidentified special prosecutor Clarence Mock as the judge in a story on the case.

KOLN news director John Denney said that the station had apologized to the judge.

Producers still qualify

"It is our understanding that some producers may not have understood the implications or impacts of destroying crops, reclassifying acreage and qualifying for CU for payments and disaster payments," according to Terri Post, County Executive Director of the Wayne County ASCS.

Farmers who did not understand this option or were prevented from meeting the previously announced deadline because of reasons beyond their control, now have until Sept. 17, to file a request with the county committee to do any of the follow-

ing: opt into 0/92; opt out of 0/92; or modify the acreage previously committed to 0/92.

Actions taken by farm operators regarding 0/92 options as of close of business on Sept. 17 shall be final and no further opportunity to make changes in their options will be permitted.

Wildcats to clash with Morningside

The Wayne State football team will open the 1993 home schedule with Morningside on Saturday in a 5:45 p.m. contest in the fifth annual "Egg Bowl." WSC is coming off a 32-19 thumping of UNO in Omaha while the Chiefs are coming off an impressive home opening 34-7 win over NAIA rated Northwestern.

The Chiefs rushed for 272 yards on 58 carries in that game and passed for 122 yards. The Chiefs defense proved to be stingy by allowing Northwestern a total of 155 yards.

The Cats, meanwhile, ran up some pretty impressive numbers of their own in Omaha. Quarterback Brett Salisbury passed for 487 yards on 28-37. Wide receiver Byron Chamberlin set a Wildcat record for yards receiving in a game with 210 on eight receptions including a 90-yard strike. The Wildcats set a team record with 569 total yards.

Defensively, Brad Otis led the charge with five quarterback sacks and eight total tackles and a fumble recovery. Bill Federson also had a five game with three quarterback sacks in the second half alone.

WSC coach Dennis Wagner is quick to quiet all the hoopla about Morningside's troubles in the off season having an ill affect on the team. "All of Morningside's problems stemmed from the coaching staff area," Wagner said. "They still have a very solid team with some very good players."

The Chiefs will invade Memorial Stadium on Saturday with just 52 players including 25 junior college transfers. They have a split end named Keith Green who possesses 10.2 speed in the 100 so they do not lack overall team speed.

The last time the two teams tangled in Wayne the Wildcats came out on top of a 16-7 score. Wagner says this contest should be a very good one, matching two teams that have a lot of skilled players.

One more interesting note: Last season a reporter for the Sioux City Journal nicknamed Wayne State as "Transfer Tech." That seems quite amusing looking at Morningside's roster with a total of 52 players and 25 of them transfers.

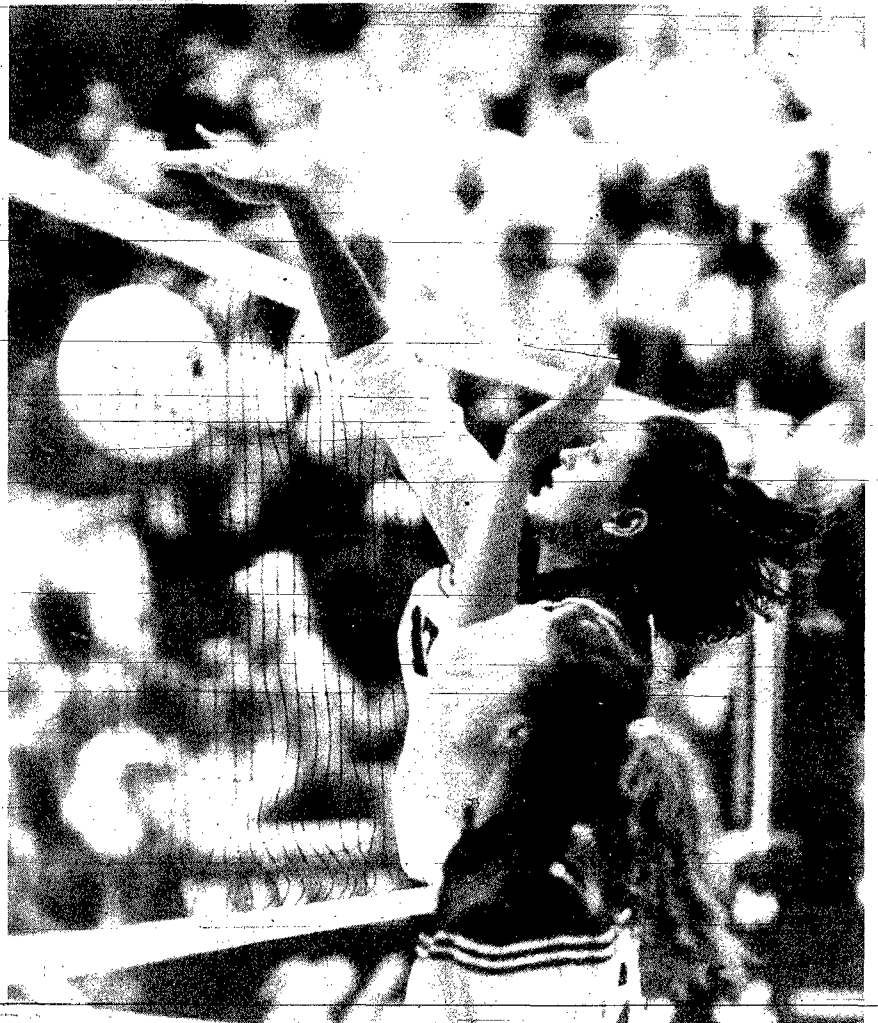
"I was really proud of the girls after the Schuyler match," Hoskins said. "Defensively, they were unstoppable. They were always in position and they worked very well together."

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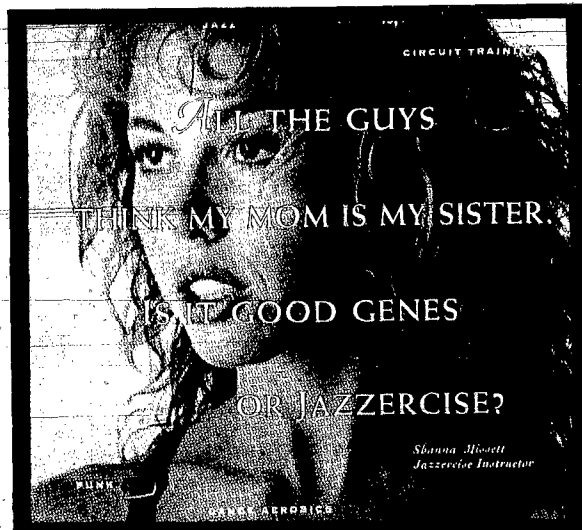

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NRD Budget Requires Property Tax Increase; Levy Smaller

The 1994 Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District fiscal budget will require a slight property tax increase and a smaller property tax levy as adopted by the board on Thursday, August 26 at the NRD headquarters in Norfolk.

The 1994 fiscal budget requires \$1.213 million in property taxes, a less than one percent increase, as compared to \$1.207 million required the previous year.

The property tax levy will be set at 3.17 cents per \$100 of valuation, smaller than fiscal year 1993. The 1993 property tax levy for the Lower Elkhorn NRD, which covers all or portions of 15 counties in northeast Nebraska, was 3.24 cents per \$100 of valuation.

The 1994 Lower Elkhorn NRD budget reflects a strong commitment to conserving soil and maintaining water quality. One of the largest budget items is designated for land treatment cost-share assistance.

Water resources programs are also considered a very important priority for the district. The board designated \$92,000 for water resources programs, which includes the well abandonment, soil sampling, wellhead protection and groundwater management programs.

The board also allotted \$150,000 for intergovernmental cost-share assistance to build five road structures within the district. The LENRD contributes 75 percent to the total construction cost of building a road structure with the county or state paying the remaining construction costs.

The feasibility study for the proposed Butterfly Creek dam and reservoir project near Stanton is expected to be presented to the board for a vote by December. Therefore, money has been budgeted for the feasibility study, design, land appraisals and land rights for the proposed project.

In other business, the board voted to accept the bids from two well drillers to seal 126 abandoned wells at an estimated cost of \$15,766. The board had budgeted \$25,000 for the fiscal year 1994 well sealing program.

The LENRD board voted to continue to accept well sealing applications until the budgeted amount is spent. The approved fiscal year program requires landowners to pay \$85 to seal domestic wells and \$160 for irrigation wells. The Lower Elkhorn NRD contracts with well drillers to properly seal the abandoned wells and pays the remaining cost.

The next board meeting of the Lower Elkhorn NRD will be held on Thursday, Sept. 23.

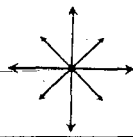
