

## No waiting for weight addition

Wayne High School will have a new weight training facility before the end of the current school year based on an agreement reached between the school board and the Wayne Athletic Boosters Club, which is financing the new structure.

The new building will be constructed primarily by industrial arts students at the high school with materials and any outside labor costs provided by the Athletic Boosters. Estimates are the structure will cost \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The weight facility will replace temporary quarters for the high school weight room which were carved out of the shop area at the school.

The frame building planned for the weight facility will be behind the high school and will be unattached. It will have no plumbing but will be heated and insulated.

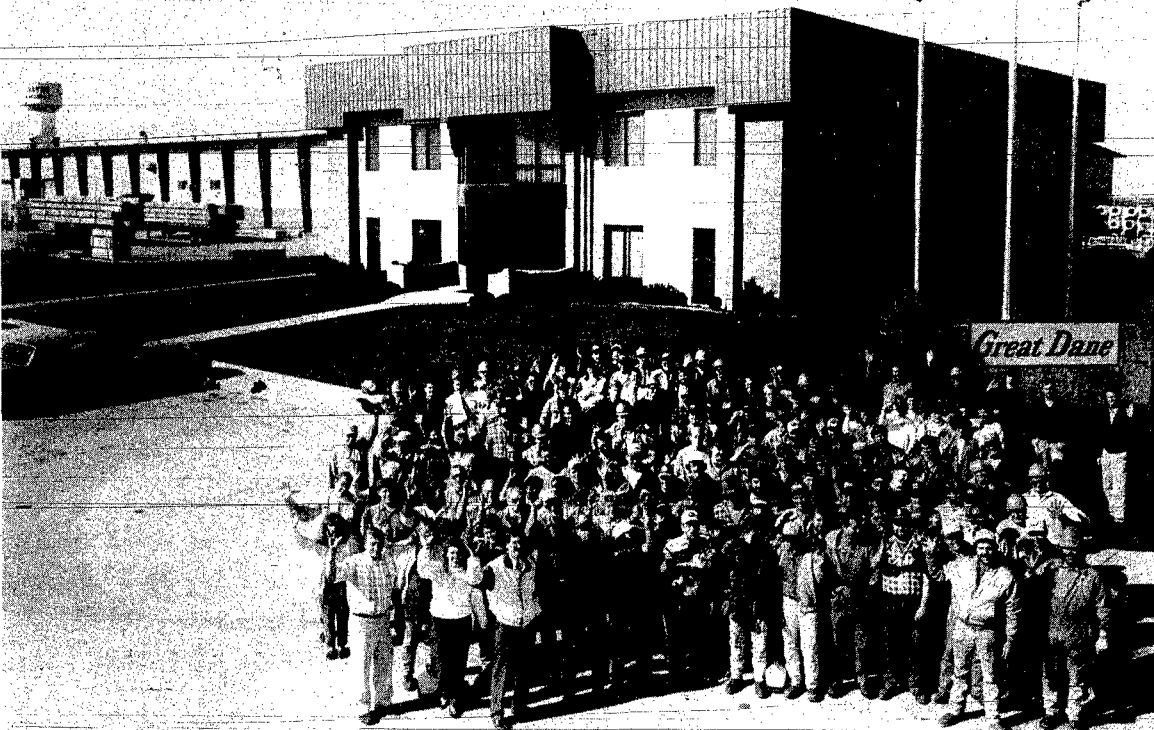
The school board indicated it hopes that the new building will be temporary quarters for the high school weight room and that a more permanent solution inside the High School may be found for the school's weight and fitness programs.

Once a more permanent solution is found for the weight room, the building will be ideal for storage said Dr. Dennis Jensen, superintendent. He said the school system needs more storage area now.

Jensen praised the efforts of the Booster Club in helping solve the immediate need for adequate weight training facilities for the school.

## Five years have been great at Dane

Five years ago this week a big noble-looking dog arrived in Wayne. Great Dane Trailers, with its big dog logo, purchased the Timpte Trailer plant in Wayne on Oct. 19, 1988 and set in motion growth and

expansion plans which have increased the workforce from 250 to 410 since 1989 and will add another 90 jobs in January.

The Wayne Great Dane operation celebrated its fifth anniversary this week with dinners for employees and plant visitors, presentation of 5-year service pins and a photo opportunity with 142 employees who were part of the original crew when Dane came to town in 1988. Those 142 still remain the backbone of the successful operation, said plant manager Terry Hanson.

In those five years the success of the Super Seal refrigerated trailer built exclusively in Wayne has caused it to become one of the most popular truck trailers on the road

today. The Wayne plant currently accounts for one of every seven refrigerated trailers sold in the United States and the percentage is expected to increase as new production capacity comes on line here.

In 1989 the Wayne share of the market was less than 10 percent.

Plant expansion in Wayne which will create the 90 new jobs in January, will increase production capacity from the current level of 70 trailers per week to 90 next year, said Hanson.

The Wayne success story runs counter to the experience of many truck trailer manufacturing plants in the country in the last five years.

"Unlike a number of trailer plants that were unable to survive the last

five years, we have been fortunate in not only meeting the challenges laid before us, but in continuing to grow," said Hanson.

In the industry Great Dane, which is based in Savannah, Ga. has grown to the number one truck trailer manufacturing company in the world. While the firm makes other refrigerated trailers, the Super Seal model is only made in Wayne.

He especially praised the plant workers in Wayne as the prime reason for the company's success. He said their dedication to quality and productivity relate directly to the competitiveness of the Super Seal in

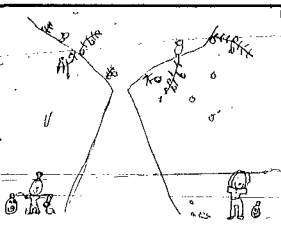

## Corn reports down

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The state's corn crop has been deteriorating as weather delays harvest, the state Agricultural Statistics Service reported.

Corn condition moved lower to 7 percent poor, 33 percent fair, 56 percent good and 4 percent excellent in the service's weekly report issued Monday. Dryland fields rated 66 percent good or excellent. Irrigated fields were rated at 57 percent good or excellent.

Harvest was rated at 15 percent

complete on Sunday, compared to 16 percent last year and a five-year average of 52 percent. Farmers who have harvested found their yields cut by stalk rot, poorly filed ears, lower test weight and stalk breakage, the crop reporting service said.

Soybean condition rated 24 percent fair, 68 percent good and 8 percent excellent. The crop is 87 percent harvested, ahead of the average harvest completion rate of 82 percent.

## Med Center earns mammography certification

For the past two years, Sister Kevin Hermesen of Providence Medical Center has been working on applications to become accredited by the American College of Radiology (ACR) Mammography Accreditation Program.

This week the notice was received that as of Oct. 11 the facility has met the standards set forth by the ACR.

A panel of experts evaluated the staff, equipment, quality of the image and the amount of radiation present. The hospital will now be accredited for three years and must then renew their accreditation.

"This is an important step for our hospital. People have told us that the American Cancer Society did not have Providence Medical

Center on their list of approved mammography sites. Now that has changed," said Sr. Kevin.

In addition to the ACR accreditation, PMC is also accredited as a Breast Cancer Screening Center by Medicare. "This allows

Medicare patients the opportunity to have one mammogram every two years which will be paid for by Medicare," said Sr. Kevin.

Sr. Kevin and Ann Lempka, who are in charge of the radiology department at PMC, have both passed the Advanced Level Mammography Boards given by the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists.

"While this is not a requirement necessary to perform the mammograms, we felt that by completing the required continuing education, we would be able to do a better job," said Sr. Kevin.

The notice of the hospital's accreditation by the ACR comes during the national observance of Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

In conjunction with this observance, the hospital is offering mammograms at a reduced rate dur-

ing the month of October. A \$10 discount allows a woman to receive a mammogram for \$45 plus the radiologist's fee of \$30.

Sr. Kevin recommends that patients first call their physicians to set up an appointment for the mammogram.

"On the average, we perform 40-50 mammograms per month. During the month of October, we will perform nearly 120 mammograms," said Sr. Kevin.

Providence Medical Center is one of only 6,000 facilities to have received this accreditation in the six years the program has been in effect. The program was started to ensure women receive the best mammographic examination with the least possible risk.

One of every nine women will

Her most recent exploit was to win 5 races in a 3 day time span. 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## Halloween precautions can prevent disasters

Halloween can be a fun, exciting time for children. Unfortunately, the fun can turn to disaster if certain safety precautions are not followed. Every year, children suffer serious injuries from auto accidents, fire, falls, cuts and poisoned "treats."

The Safety and Health Council of Greater Omaha recommends the following Halloween-safety tips to help make this a fun and safe Halloween for everyone.

•Costumes should be made out of flame-retardant material. They should fit loosely enough to allow warm clothing underneath and freedom of movement. However, they should not be so baggy or long as to trip a child or catch on fire.

•Use makeup instead of a plastic mask to avoid impairing a child's vision or breathing. The makeup should be nontoxic and FDA approved.

•Outfits should be made with lightly colored materials and should be covered with strips of retroreflective tape to make the child visible to motorists. Children should also carry a flashlight.

•For youngsters under the age of 12, attach their name, address and telephone number (including the area code) inside their clothes, but not in an easily visible place.

•Youngsters should be accompanied by an adult. Establish a return time for older children and instruct them to travel only familiar areas along established routes. Tell them never to enter a stranger's home.

•Children should be fed before trick or treating, and told not to eat their goodies until they have been thoroughly inspected by an adult.

•If you have to drive on Halloween, be on the look-out at all times. Slow down in residential areas and obey all traffic signals. Be prepared for children to dart into the street from anywhere, especially from between parked cars.

•With a little thought and planning, you can make sure your children have a safe and enjoyable outing this year.

develop breast cancer in her lifetime. Ninety percent of all lumps are detected by women through breast self-examination. But it can take 10-12 years for a lump to grow large enough to be felt.

If a mammogram is done well, the cancer should be found two to four years before it can be felt. Often, this is minimal breast cancer and the survival rate for this is 95 percent.

Recent media attention has focused on the negative aspects of mammograms, including the pain involved and the inaccuracy of the tests.

"While there is pressure involved and some women are more sensitive to pain, overall the procedure is not painful. The entire test takes less than 30 minutes, including the paperwork," said Sr. Kevin.

"Women under age 35 have more dense and active fibroglandular tissue because of hormones associated with the menstrual cycle. For this reason, breast tumors could be more difficult to locate."

"After age 35, the tissue begins to decrease and become more fatty. This makes it easier to visualize a tumor," said Sr. Kevin.

The three most important things a woman can do to increase her chances of surviving breast cancer are: 1) monthly self-examination, 2) annual physical exams and 3) regular mammograms.

The ACR, American Cancer Society and the American Medical Association have developed the following guidelines for women: an annual examination with a screening mammography at one to two year intervals beginning at age 40 and annual mammographies performed after age 40.

"Women can survive breast cancer if it is detected early and it can be detected early through monthly self-exams and periodic mammograms," said Sr. Kevin.

The high-tech modular design of the Super Seal helps keep the cost and weight of the trailers down. That combined with the workmanship quality make it a unit in demand. The plant currently has orders through May of 1994.

Another "partner" in the success of the Wayne plant said Hanson has been the Wayne community itself. He said Wayne and the state of Nebraska have been tremendous

supporters of business growth and expansion.

The Wayne plant's payroll was \$4 million in 1989 and is currently over \$7 million with that figure expected to increase by 20 percent after the expansion is completed in January.

Wayne Mayor Robert Carhart Thursday praised the work of the Great Dane management and employees in helping Wayne as well. Hanson took Carhart and other dignitaries on a tour of the Wayne plant expansion efforts Thursday.

## Kiwanians hear senator

Newly-appointed State Sen. Pat Engel (D-South Sioux City) attended Monday's Wayne Kiwanis meeting as part of the lawmaker's continuing effort to become acquainted with constituents of Northeast Nebraska's 17th Legislative District.

"Last session over 800 bills were introduced," Engel said. "Do we need that many? I'd like to find out."

Regarding the growing number of violent crimes being committed by juveniles, Engel suggested one way to reduce the problem would be to impose a fine on the parents of youth caught illegally possession firearms or other dangerous weapons.

The Appropriations Committee develops the state budget through requests made by state agencies, the Governor, state senators, constituents and entities from the state. The budget, as submitted by the Appropriations Committee, is then subject to approval or amendment by the full Legislature and veto by the Governor.

"I thought we played a little better in the Morningside match," Vanis said. "Our gals are doing the best they can but we just don't have that killer instinct."

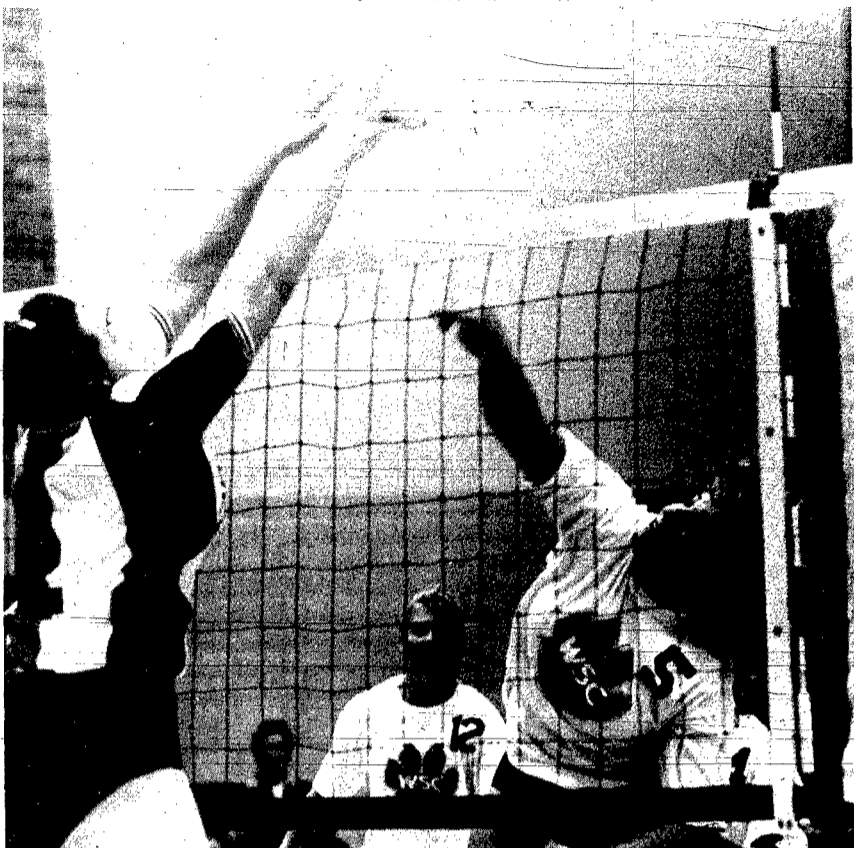
Vanis said one of the problems her team is facing right now is the lack of a dominant hitter. "We're a little weak in the middle hitter area," she said.

## Wayne State gridgers seek seventh win

The Wayne State football team will put their 6-0 record and number 14 ranking on the line Saturday, when they travel to play the Mustangs of Southwest State in Marshall, Minn.

Game time is slated for 1:30 p.m. WSC is still trying to regain its top four ranking in the region because only the top four teams will qualify for the post-season NCAA-II playoffs.

Southwest State will enter Saturday's game with a 2-4 record and coming off a 31-28 loss to Minnesota-Duluth while the 'Cats have had two weeks to prepare for the game after a bye week.

Two weeks ago, the 'Cats snapped a 21-game losing streak to the University of Nebraska at Kearney with a 28-9 victory on the Lopers home field.

WSC leads the series with Southwest State, 4-1 including last year's 49-29 triumph at Memorial Field when Lamont Rainey and Jason Williams each surpassed the 100-yard rushing mark.

Southwest State was dealt a blow earlier this week when head coach Brent Jeffers announced that five players, including four starters had been suspended indefinitely for violating team rules.

Split end Alvin Ashley, reserve receiver Arnold Bell, tight end Herschel Jackson, cornerback Erich Johnson and safety John Morman will not be on the playing field Saturday against WSC.

The most notable loss is Ashley, a senior split end who is moving closer to college football's all-time mark for career touchdown receptions. Earlier this month Ashley set the NAIA and NCAA-II record with his 53rd touchdown catch—just two short of the all-time college football record set by Chris Baisillon of Illinois Wesleyan, a division III school from 1989-1992.

WSC has the nation's most prolific scoring team in NCAA-II with 49.2 points per game and they rank first in total offense with 583.8 yards per game. They are second in passing offense at 388.2 yards per game and fourth in total defense, giving up just 202.2 yards per game.

Top gun quarterback Brett Salisbury ranks first in passing efficiency at 190.7 percent and he's second in total offense per game at 385.2. Jerry Garrett ranks second in the country in punt returns with a 19.6 yard per return average and Byron Chamberlain ranks second in receiving yards per game at 138.0, fourth in the receptions per game at 8.4 and 21st in all-purpose running at 156.4 yards per game.

Damon Thomas is third in the country in receiving yards per game at 137.3, ninth in scoring with a 10.0 per game average and 10th in receptions per game at 7.8. He's also tied with Chamberlain for all-purpose running at 156.4 yards per game.

## Wayne defeats South Sioux

The Wayne volleyball team evened their season record at 10-10, Thursday night in South Sioux with a 15-0, 15-8 victory over the Lady Cardinals.
