Route is targeted to west

A major new north-south transportation route through Northeast Nebraska may be the result of the national transportation network plan released Thursday by Transportation Secretary Frederico Pena.

Rep. Doug Bereuter said he is pleased to see the national roads network identified by Pena will include Nebraska Highway 57 as a route to connect the new Vermillion-

Newcastle Bridge to Highway 81. Highway 57 passes through Laurel and Carroll but misses Wayne by more than 8 miles to the west.

Bereuter told the Omaha World-Herald new highway construction will eventually be needed in western Dixon County east of the route identified in the national highway plan as the route for the connection to the new bridge.

Community leaders in the Wayne area had hoped the heavy traffic expected to use the proposed new bridge route to connect Highway 81 (near Norfolk) with Interstate 29 in South Dakota would pass through Wayne and western Dixon County.

The new National Highway System will include 159,000 miles of roadways which will carry 40 percent of all vehicles and 70 percent of all trucks. The new plan includes 3,075 miles of Nebraska's total 9,000 miles of highways.

Congress must approve the proposed National Highway System proposal by Sept. 30, 1995.

Immunization Clinic is next Thursday



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

Vehicle accidents involving animals on the increase

during the fall to avoid accidents with deer and other animals, said Chuck McCullough, wildlife biologist with the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

Statistics from the Game and Parks Commission and the Nebraska Department of Roads show that more than 3,700 deer were killed on Nebraska's roads last year. Fall is the season in which the highest number of deer were killed. with November recording the highest number of road kills.

Nebraska residents involved in accidents with deer may request a free salvage permit for the animal. Following the accident, the deer can be field dressed and taken to your

nearest Game and Parks Commission office or your local conservation officer within 24 hours of the accident. A commission employee will issue the salvage permit and tag the animal. The permit holder can then process the deer for consumption.

Salvage permits are valid for 90 days, and all meat must be consumed within that period. In addition, a resident may obtain only one salvage permit at a time, and no part of the animal or the salvaged meat may be sold or traded. For more information regarding salvage permits contact the Game and Parks Commission's Law Enforcement Division at 471-5531.

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

Wayne Cattleman leads Nebraska association

In making his acceptance speech as new Nebraska Cattlemen President, Logan McClelland of Wayne, challenged members of the organization to be more willing to look for alternatives that could better improve their bottom lines.

"I believe that with concentration and focus, you can accomplish any goal. I believe in stretching to learn to do different things. I think-there are many areas in which the cattle industry needs to challenge itself," McClelland said in addressing cattlemen attending the organization's annual convention last

The Cattlemen's new president, who operates Logan LTD Feedyard near Allen, said many of his business philosophies decisions are based in his experiences of the cattle market wreck of 1973.

IN OUTLINING his priorities for the coming year, McClelland said, "I want to emphasize educa-tion programs which will provide opportunities to eliminate biases and outdated traditions and learn how to test and widen boundaries. I think too often decisions are made in this business based on what grandpa did. Too often we know only that there is a positive cash flow and stop short of searching for changes that would boost the rate of return on investment and improve our lifestyle.'

McClelland said he will actively promote Total Quality Management (TQM) procedures and will propose seminars coordinated with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln on ba-

sic business principles.

He added, "I hope to encourage packers to communicate to us what we're doing right and wrong so we can incorporate that feedback into our management,"

McCLELLAND SAID he plans to work with specialists at UN-L and the Technical Ag College at Curtis to strengthen ag programs to provide greater opportunities for cattlemen and prospective employces to get together.

Regarding education opportuni-ties for those outside the industry, Logan believes there is work to be done to make sure state and national legislators are aware of what the cattle industry means to the state. "I believe that you cannot legislate appropriately if you don't know how the industry works. And I think we are darn close to that situ-

Born in Illinois, McClelland has a masters degree in beef nutrition and managed feedvards in Texas and Oklahoma before he set up his business in Allen in 1984. After he served three years in the Army as a Vietnamese interpreter, he returned to school and received a bachelors in animal science at Western Illi-nois University. While there, he also became a commercial pilot (a skill he uses to buy cattle and attended association functions). Continuing his education, Logan received a masters degree in ruminant production and nutrition from the University fo Missouri.

HIS FARM AND formal education was first put to use working for Moorman Manufacturing Company in the Texas panhandle. He began his feedyard management career in 1973 by being hired as an assistant manager of 1 0,000-head facility near Guymon, Okla. The yard was able to survive the market wreck of 1973 for two years before losses from unhedged cattle forced it to close. After working at a small yard for six months, Logan was fired as assistant manager of the 25,000-head Pitman Feedyard near Hereford, Texas. That operation in cluded a retail beef outlet, which Logan managed for two years.

In 1981, he began work as a consultant for Moorman's and was based in Yankton, S.D. In 1984, he leased the yard he currently operates near Allen. Logan LTD Feedyard has a one-time capacity of 17,000 head and normally operates with between 14,000 and 15,000 head. He estimates that commercially fed cattle average between 50 and 70 percent of occupancy. Steers are almost exclusively fed because of their predictability, an element Logan relies on for making risk management strategics work.

Elaborating on lessons he learned from the cattle market wreck of 1973, McClelland said, "The industry was extremely bullish, to the point that participants weren't following business principles. I saw operations fall apart because they had no risk management. I sometimes feel it's unfortunate that a negative has been the shaper of the future, but it's a reality in this business and we can use it to avoid

repeating mistakes."

The Nebraska Cattlemen association serves as the spokesman for the state's beef cattle industry and represents nearly 5,000 cattle breeders, producers and feeders, as well as 50 county and local cattlemen's associations.

Annual sales are approaching \$13.5 million with much of the growth coming in the past five ears through the acquisition of related companies, according to Hesse. Some of Automatic's larger corporate customers are Harvester, John Deere, Gehl, Vermeer and Ford-New Holland.
