Hospital to be site for new doctor's clinic

Construction is being scheduled this summer on a new medical clinic for the Wayne area. The doctors' clinic will be built next to Providence Medical Center it was announced Friday by Marci Thomas, hospital administrator.

Plans for the new center, including the precise spot on the hospital property where it is to be built, have yet to be determined, she said, but those details should be worked out shortly between the doctors at Northeast Nebraska Medical Group, P.C. and architects.

MRS. THOMAS said she expected construction to begin this spring.

She said as the plans stand now,

the facility will be a separate building on the hospital grounds and will have its own lab and x-ray facility.

The convenience of having multiple medical services at one location has been discussed for several months for the Wayne area. Two doctors clinics in Wayne merged into one professional corporation in June of 1992 and have been operating out of the former Benthack Clinic at 215 West Second.

IT HAS BEEN said the new clinic facility will provide more space, be more accessible and could assist in physician recruitment for the area.

Providence Medical Center, a 35-bed hospital with 80 employees, is run by a local governing board and the Missionary Benedictine Sisters. Approval for the new facility to be built came all the way from Rome.

Youth at high risk

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- Many Nebraska high school students are risking their lives with weapons, sex and tobacco, a state Department of Education survey found.

The department released a preliminary draft of its Youth Risk Behavior Survey for 1993 on Wednesday. The survey included questions on the use of tobacco,

alcohol and drugs, violent behavior, sexual practices and use of seat belts. "Some of these are things that can take kids out right before our eyes," said JoAnne Owens-Nauslar of the Department of Education.

"They can die of a sexually transmitted disease. They can be killed in

Study calls for outreach

The three institutions of higher education serving Northeast Nebraska have strong images and are well liked by the people of the region according to the preliminary findings of a joint study to determine the educational needs of the region.

The study was commissioned by Wayne State College, Northeast Community College and the University of Nebraska Research and Extension Center in Concord. The study was conducted last fall by Clarus Corporation of Alliance, Neb.

The firm conducted interviews with business and industry leaders in the 20-county area about the education and training needs of their employees and their employment plans for the future. The firm also interviewed students who are attempting to meet educational goals by attending off-campus classes.

Depending on which part of the

region a person is located, access to needed programs is limited and additional outreach programs may be indicated according to the report.

The employers surveyed anticipate that 2,171 jobs that will need to be filled over the next five years. The educational institutions will need to assist the employers in training for these new positions. The employers indicated that the jobs would be both higher skilled and lower skilled positions.

In addition, the employers cite a need for a more extensive professional development program for business in the region. Overall, the employers surveyed are optimistic about job growth and believe the educational institutions can continue to play a vital role in that economic growth for Northeast Nebraska.

Non-traditional students who are attending classes off-campus cite a

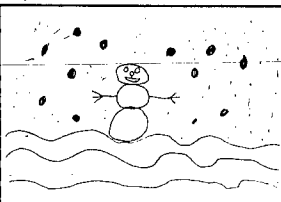

Housing search widens into area communities

Housing is in short supply in Northeast Nebraska and Wayne is not the only community implementing energetic programs to try to upgrade the existing housing stock.

Members of the Wayne Industries development arm are organizing a coalition of interested developers from surrounding communities who are working on providing new homes.

The town of Allen, 22 miles northeast of Wayne has already taken steps to take advantage of the housing shortage there and in other com-

munities.

The development organization in Allen is offering developed house lots complete with sewer, water and on paved street for \$1,750.

Allen also has one spec house already built. The new home, a 1,050 square-foot model with a full walk-out basement will be ready for an open house next month. Priced at \$65,000, the new home should be well below the cost of comparable houses in other towns, said Banker Rob Bock, who is serving on the development board in Allen.

Bock said the development orga-

Education panel to change

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- The chairman of a commission set up to help coordinate Nebraska's public higher education system says the panel is changing some of the ways it does business.

Sen. Jerome Warner of Waverly, one of the coauthors of the bill that created the voter-approved Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education, says a bill (LB1063) he is sponsoring would ensure those changes are made and understood.

In recent months, the commission and higher education officials have been at odds over the boundaries that mark their decision-making turf.

"This bill would address some real or perceived problems or frustrations in the hopes of facilitating the changes necessary," Warner told the Legislature's Education Committee on Tuesday.

The thrust of the bill would be the separation of governance and coordination, Warner said. The commission is to coordinate while the individual colleges and universities are to govern.

Commission Chairman Eric Seacrest of North Platte spoke in a neutral position on the bill and said the commission is already making some of the changes Warner recommends in the bill.

"We'd like to get this behind us so we can better represent the people," he said.

Warner said parts of the bill would change words such as policy to guidelines. Budget revision powers would be changed to budget review powers, he said.

Seacrest outlined the commission's progress in a variety of areas, noting that some are being fine tuned while "the commission recognizes that there are several areas where we need to do less."

John Moore of the Nebraska Council of Public Higher Education said opponents of the commission "are

not trying to circumvent the commission or its position... it's clearly a matter of coordination versus governance."

University of Nebraska Board of Regents Chairman Charles Wilson of Lincoln said the Warner bill would "bring the commission into an appropriate focus."

He said there have been many complaints about the degree to which the commission has involved itself in capital construction projects, such as requesting that they receive tape measurements of a room to be leased or questioning what kind of ballast to be used in a fluorescent light fixture.

A former senator who now heads the state community college association said "he's sensed a certain frustration with the commission, but attributed them to growing pains."

"We're not bashing or abolishing the commission which has been slowly evolving over the years," said Dennis Baack.

a car collision where alcohol was present," she said.

The survey was given last spring to a random sample of 3,176 ninth-through 12th-graders in 38 public schools across the state.

Among the findings:

-- Forty-five percent of the boys and 19 percent of the girls reported being in a physical fight in the last 12 months. Thirty-six percent of the boys said they had carried a weapon such as a gun, knife or club in the last month, compared with 5 percent of the girls.

-- Sixteen percent of the boys and 19 percent of the girls said they had sexual intercourse during the past three months and they or their partner used birth control. The study also revealed that 52 percent of boys and 42 percent of girls have had sexual intercourse at least once.

-- Of those who said they had intercourse in the last three months, 60 percent said a condom was used the last time they had sex.

-- Twenty-eight percent in the survey said they rarely or never used seatbelts.

-- Of those surveyed, 34 percent said they had smoked in the past 30 days, and 87 percent said they had tried cigarettes. Based on the 1993 survey and others, officials estimate that 50 percent of Nebraska males in grades nine through 12 use tobacco

in some form.

-- Twenty-four percent said they had thought seriously about suicide in the 12 months before the survey.

-- The study indicates that between 1991 and 1993, students' use of alcohol dropped slightly. Seventy-nine percent of the students reported having had at least one drink of alcohol. More than half had at least one or more drinks on one or more of the last 30 days, and 33 percent had their first drink before age 13.

-- Eleven percent said someone had offered them an illegal drug on school property during the past year. Eleven percent of Nebraska's total public school enrollment is 8,737 students.

-- Nineteen percent said they had used marijuana, and 4 percent said they had used cocaine.

He said the federal government is a "big pig sloppy machine" which fosters waste and abuse. States should be given more autonomy, he said.


He is in favor of the presidential line item veto and the balanced budget amendment. Though he is a Catholic, he said he is pro-choice because he thinks the decision should be between the woman and her God, "but I hope the choice is no."

He favored the Brady bill and control of assault type weapons though he said he is a hunter.

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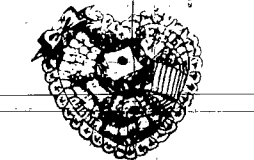

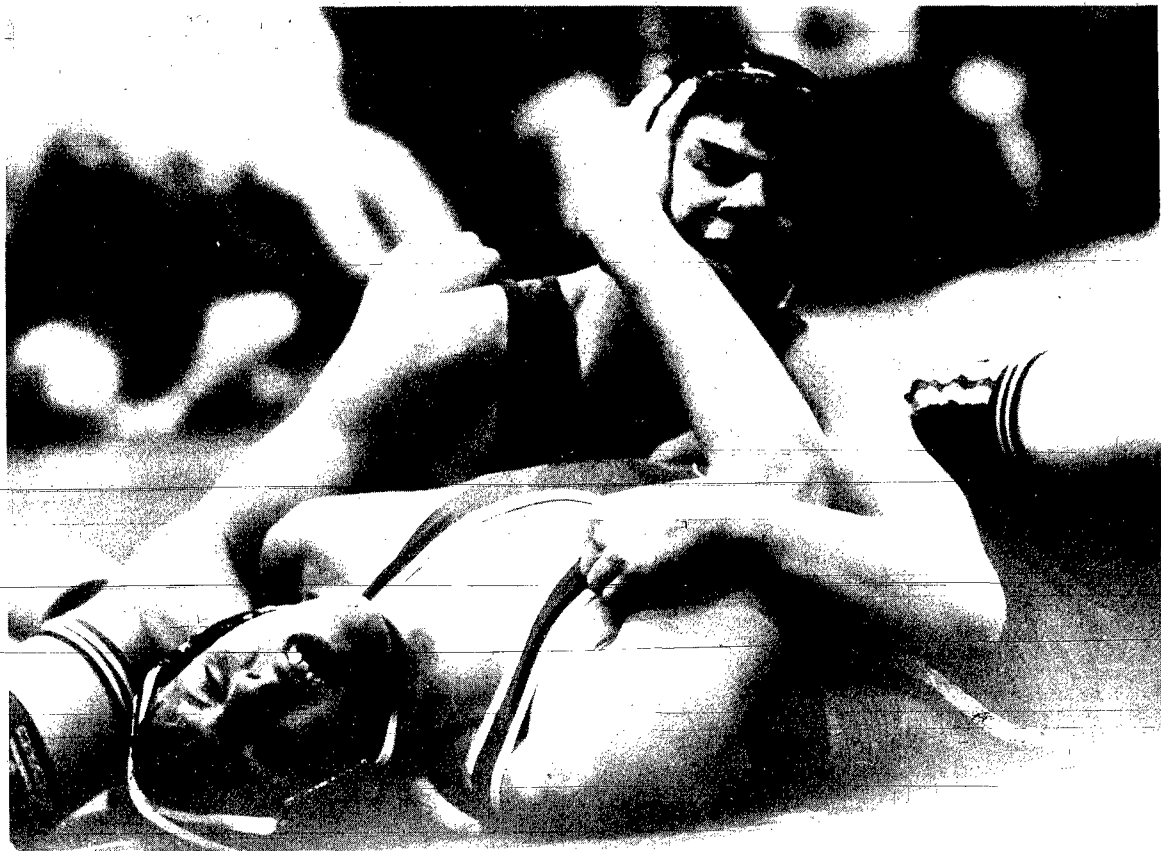

Turnabout is fair play may be an old adage, but Brad Hoskins' Wakefield boys team lived up to that,

Thursday night at home in the semifinals of the Clark Division. Back on Dec. 21 the Trojans hosted Osmond and appeared to be on their way to a win until Brian Hoffman sank a 30-foot, 3-pointer

at the buzzer to beat Wakefield by one point.

Thursday in the same gym, Wakefield's Cory Brown nailed an eight-foot jumper with three-tenths of a second left to give Wakefield a 48-46 win and a berth in the finals of the Clark Division Tournament on Friday night in Wakefield against Coleridge.

To say 1994 has been good to the Trojans so far would be an understatement. Hoskins has seen his troops go 6-0 in the new year and Wakefield is currently riding a 7-game win streak dating back to the final round of the Wayne State Holiday Tournament and they have cracked the Omaha World Herald's top 10 in C-1.

The Trojans got down early to Osmond but managed to tie the game at eight. Then the visiting Tigers went on an 8-0 run to close out the first quarter with a 16-8 lead.

Wakefield, however, opened the second period with an 8-0 run of its own to knot the game at 16. In fact, Osmond's first points in the second stanza came at the 4:27 mark with a one-and-one. The first Tiger bucket of the quarter didn't come until under the two minute mark.

Wakefield still trailed Osmond at the intermission by six, 26-20. "Our kids were a little dejected at halftime," Hoskins said. "We told them just to go back out there and play our game and not worry about Osmond and we did."

The Trojans defense turned up their intensity in the third quarter, holding Osmond to just four points while the Trojans scored 11—thanks to a seven-point quarter by Wes Blecke, to take a one point lead into the fourth period.

Early on in the fourth quarter it look as though Osmond was getting ready to take control. The Tigers had a 40-35 lead with 4:28 left in regulation but less than a minute later the game was tied after a bucket by Cory Brown and a three-point play the old fashioned way by Ryan Ekberg.

The Trojans went ahead 43-42 after Justin Dutcher knocked down a 3-pointer and Blecke then hit one of

two free throws at the 1:55 mark of the fourth quarter for a 44-42 advantage but Wakefield lost the services of Blecke when he fouled out with 1:43 left.

The Trojans went ahead 46-42 when Brown converted both ends of a one-and-one with 1:30 remaining but Osmond came back with the aid of a Pat Gansbom running jumper and two free throws from Jeff Luhr.

Luhr's free throws came with 9.1 seconds remaining. "The game plan was if Luhr tied the game, and if we got the ball to half court and still had at least five seconds left we were going to call a timeout to set up a play," Hoskins said. "Well, Brown got the ball to half court with just over five seconds left but we didn't call a timeout. Instead, he dribbled to the corner got double-teamed and then he tried to drive around the double team.

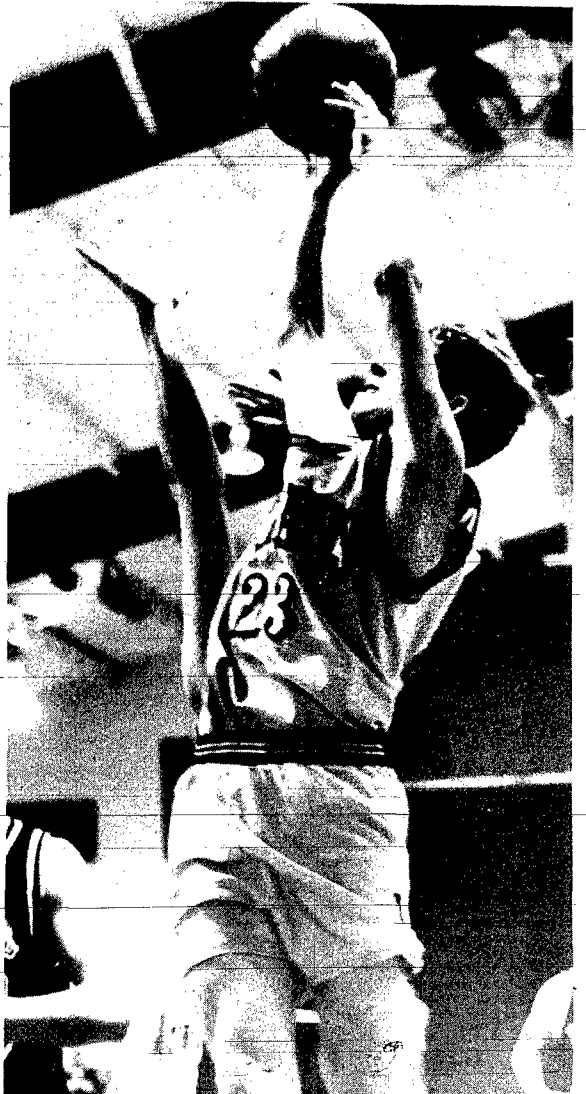
"As he did that one of the Osmond players that were double-teaming Brown, backed off to guard against him dishing the ball off," Hoskins added. Brown took advantage of the single coverage and burned the Tigers right before the buzzer.

Brown led Wakefield with 15 points while Blecke notched 10. Ryan Ekberg and Dutcher had seven apiece with all seven of Dutcher's coming in the final quarter.

Wakefield won the boards battle, 47-36 as Brown hauled down a dozen to lead the way while Ekberg had nine and Blecke, seven. Wakefield finished with 14 turnovers and was a dismal 8-17 from the foul line while Osmond had 17 turnovers but connected on 12 of 19 free throw attempts.

nization in Allen has five such lots to develop there, on land donated by the heirs of a historic Allen family.

He said since the development organization is a non-profit arm and the lot development costs there are only about 10 percent of what they are in towns like Wayne, his group can keep the price of the homes there very competitive. "We're not trying to make a lot of money," he said explaining that the community

wants to grow modestly.

"It's kind of vital that we grow now to maintain some of the services that we have," said Bock who mentioned the school and other community services which could easily absorb many more than the five new households being planned in the housing development project there.

He said the Allen community could not rival the big housing projects being introduced this summer in Wayne, but he added Allen and other Northeast Nebraska towns

working in unison can make a big difference in the current housing shortage which is hampering growth in the whole region.

Allen is basically a bedroom community, Bock said. He explained many people in the town of approximately 300 work in Sioux City, Wakefield or Wayne.

He said the industrial development organization in Wayne is encouraging neighboring towns to develop their housing stock as a means of improving the situation there too.

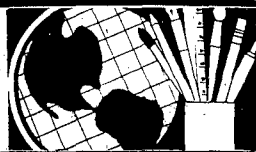
