Tiring day for Allen firefighters

Members of the Allen Volunteer Fire Department may have been quite tired at work, Wednesday after fighting a three-hour blaze which began around 6:30 a.m. at the Burt Ellis shop in Allen. That was in addition to aiding the Dixon Volunteer Fire Department late Tuesday night into early Wednesday on a house fire that destroyed the home of Betty Anderson in Dixon.
The Allen/Martinsburg Volunteer

Fire Department was called to the Ellis shop for a fire that pretty much destroyed the building.

According to Allen volunteer

firefighter Rob Bock, the shop had a lot of stored wood in it which kept firefighters busy for approximately three hours. The cause of the fire is still under investigation. Ellis, incidentally, is a retired construction worker.

The Allen crew then joined forces with Dixon and Concord in fighting the house fire in Dixon. According to Dixon Assistant Fire Chief Mary Nelson, the call came in on the house fire about 11:05

Betty Anderson and her son Darrell were at home at the time of the blaze which was spotted by a neighbor. Both Anderson's escaped injury but the house suffered extensive damage.

"The cause of the blaze was a chimney," Nelson said. "There was a lot of water damage in the house because the fire spread through the roofs and walls."


Anderson is currently staying at the residence of another son in Dixon, Randy. "They pretty much lost everything in the fire," Nelson said. "It was also a very cold night to be out fighting fires. I heard at one point the temperature was around 50 below with the wind


Choir to perform Feb. 15

Fund law may mix arguments

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- Some of the usual urban-rural overtones in the fight over state aid to schools could be reversed under a new fund-

ing law.
It would reduce aid to counties that undervalue property -- some-thing urban lawmakers often have said happens in rural areas.

Cities that don't update tax valuations on residential property could

lose state aid, too.
At a hearing in October, the state
Department of Education offered one hypothetical scenario that showed:

--The Omaha Public School system could lose \$1.8 million in aid under the new law.
--The Lincoln Public Schools

could lose \$4 million. The department stressed that the

cenario assumed no adjustments in agricultural land valuations. It also did not reflect new valuations established in Lancaster

Waynians top list at Chamber

The Wayne contingent at the Ne-braska Chamber of Commerce and Industry meeting in Lincoln Thursday, at 18, was the largest of the groups of representatives from any Nebraska city. The group from Wayne visited

with state senators, attended legislative hearings and seminars on business issues and listened to a speech by Nebraska Gov. Ben Nelson at

The Wayne group heard the gov-ernor speak forcefully against federal mandates that he said are costing Nebraska taxpayers millions of dollars a year in extra state and local government expenditures. He specifically cited the costs for implementing the Clean Drinking Water Act and the Clean Air Act as examples of unfunded mandates that require huge outlays of local funds.

"THEY ARE busting local budgets without spending federal dol-lars,": said Nelson. He said he wants to see a rectaiming of local responsibility for federal and state mandated issues and local control over the decision process to correct those

The governor laid the blame of rising juvenile crime and associated social problems with a general de-cline in family values. He encouraged members of the Nebraska communities gathered at the State Chamber meeting to go back to their towns and work with their churches and community organizations to reestablish family values in our neigh-

"UNTIL PEOPLE take charge and assume the responsibility for their own behavior and the behavior in their neighborhoods we will continue to have problems," he said.

The governor said in the last year 51 percent of the new arrests made in the state were of teens between 13 and 15 years old.

Nelson said he was bullish on the

Dr. O'Leary has been a member of the Sioux City Symphony since 1967 and this was the fourth time he has been asked to be the featured


This selection was made by Thomas Lewis who is serving as music director and conductor of the Symphony. Selection is made two years ahead of time and then the conductor and the soloist work together deciding which piece of music will be performed.

Approximately 80-85 members make up the Symphony which is currently in its 78th year. This is a professional symphony, meaning that the group receives pay for their rehearsal and performance time. Even though we receive pay for our time, it is not a living wage. The only person who makes enough to live on is the conductor," said O'Leary,

The symphony performs six concerts each year, from October through April. Prior to each performance, the group meets on





points while Bussey tossed in 10. Colwell scored five and Pichler two, Miller finished with four points. Mundil also hauled down an






