Dust to fly in summer of construction

Stand back and watch the dust fly. This summer may well be the busiest construction season the town of Wayne has seen since the county seat moved here from LaPorte over a 100 years ago.

A long list of development projects, most of them to address the community's severe housing shortage, were cited at this week's annual meetings of the Wayne Industries

organization.

"Lots of things will be going on this summer," said Bill Dickey, president of the historic Wayne Industries group which is the chief economic development arm of the community. "It will be an exciting time for our community." time for our community."

DICKEY AND Wayne City Administrator Joe Salitros outlined many projects which could total in the hundreds of new housing units being built in the city this year and in coming years.

A community housing develop-ment organization has been formed to assist with development of new housing units and rehabilitation of existing units. The Wayne City Council has carmarked \$200,000 in the city's revolving economic de velopment loan fund to assist with housing development projects.

The fact that over 65 percent of the workers in local manufacturing plants living outside the Wayne zip code area, Dickey said, points to the need for housing developments in

Investigator's report slams school boss

The personnel dispute at Wayne High School involving the reassignment of the athletic director's duties has taken an unsavory turn.
A group of supporters of Athletic

Director Ron Carnes is circulating a private investigator's report which paints a very unfavorable picture of Wayne Superintendent Dennis Jensen's personal and professional

Jenson said he is personally hurt by what he called falsehoods in the report which was apparently pre-pared by a private investigating firm from Hastings, Nebraska following interviews conducted in South Dakota. He said his attorney will be sending a letter to the people he believes are circulating the report.

The letter will demand that they retract the report and apologize for the falsehoods or face potential defamation and invasion of privacy suits

"I HAVE AN idea who did it (hired the investigators) and I know who is distributing it around town, said Jensen. He said he doesn't think professional teachers in the community are involved.

"I am hurt and surprised at the unprofessionalism and lack of ethits displayed by the people distrib-uting such material," said Jensen in a prepared statement. "Whoever is distributing it should be cautious since the act of distributing it could be considered illegal under the pri-

The Wayne Herald has seen a copy of the investigator's report and been told by a principal in the Hallett Agency in Hastings that the firm did conduct interviews with people in Elk Point and elsewhere as a background investigation of Jensen. The spokesperson for the agency, who identified herself only as "Candy", said she could not identify the people who hired her firm to conduct the interviews.

THEINVESTIGATOR'S report alleges, among other things, that Jensen was asked to resign from his job in Elk Point, S.D. before being hired at Wayne, was disliked by most people in Elk Point, that he tried to cover up unfavorable records that would have cost his district government aid, that his personal character was finsavory, that he used poor judgement in personnel and management decisions and that he was arrogant and unable to get along with others.

Members of the Wayne School Board search committee who con-ducted personal interviews of school leaders in Elk Point before hiring Jensen two years ago said they found no indications of the problems outlined by the seven individuals interviewed in the private investigator's

ONE OF THE individuals quoted in the investigator's report, Ron Hoffman (identified in the report as Hauffman) is currently the president of the Elk Point School Board.

Carroll man gets glimpse of Navy life

"It was a great experience, but I wouldn't care to do it again," said John Williams of rural Carroll concerning his recent glimpse of

Williams was one of 330 dads brothers and sons of servicemen who were chosen to spend time aboard the aircraft carrier, U.S.S. America on its return to the United tes after spending six the Mediterranean Sea.

Relatives of Navy personnel are routinely invited to accompany the ship home after it has completed duty. However, there usually is not the demand that there was on this cruise. "Over 500 people applied to take the cruise so a lottery and the list was narrowed to 330," said Williams.

Williams was a guest of his son Jerry, who has been in the Navy for nearly three years. Jerry is an aviation electrician on the ship and his duties include inspection of the EA-6B Prowler, a four-seat, all weather aircraft.

Williams said the selection process for going on this trip began in November and he found out that he was definitely going at

On Feb. 2 Williams flew from Sioux City, Iowa to Norfolk, Virginia and from there to Bermuda A helicopter then took the guests to the ship which was located off the

helicopter before. It was neat to be able to look down at the water as we skimmed over it," said Williams.

The two days he spent on the ship consisted of touring the ship.
"The ship is nearly 1100 feet long and 11 stories high and houses 5,300 men. That's about as many people as live in Wayne in a spac about as long as three football You have to get used to being in cramped quarters," said Williams.

The crew of the U.S.S. American left, from Norfolk, Virginia on Aug. 9 and has spent the last six months protecting the No Fly Zone over Bosnia.

During that six month period the crew was in port only five times, going up to 53 days without being

Williams was impressed with the workings of the ship. "It takes only 250 feet to catapult the plane off the ship. I can't explain the feeling you get when you feel the force of the plane as it is leaving the ship. You have to be there to understand."

With 5,300 people in that small of an area, there are people moving constantly. meeting sideways in hallways. Everything is very crowded. They sleep in bunks three high. It is not something I would enjoy doing," said Williams

small area. For example, while they are at sea, the ship is capable of distilling 280,000 gallons of sea water for drinking and other uses on the ship. The ship itself uses 10,000 gallons of fuel every day.

After the crew and their guests docked at Norfolk, Virginia, they returned to their home bases. For Jerry Williams that is Whidbey Island, Washington. This was Jerry's first cruise also but before his six year enlistment is up he will likely serve two or three more six month tours.

Billy Patterson tossed in 19 points and Omar Clark poured in 16 to follow White's performance. Dan Anderson also scored in double figures with 10.



Over the final three quarters, Wayne out-scored the host team, 44-36. "I am proud of the girls for the way they played against a very good team." Reikofski said. "We


showed a lot of heart and character for not giving up after being down 14 after the first quarter."



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Lower Elkhorn NRD Board Elects Anderson As Chairman

Gary Anderson of rural Dixon was elected to serve as chairman for the Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District. Anderson, the previous vice-chairman, has served on the board since 1991.

Other directors elected to serve on the 1994 executive committee include: Alvin Sundell, Wakefield, as Vice-Chairman; Douglas Pinkley, Leigh as Secretary; Timothy Tighe, Humphrey, as Treasurer; Lloyd Nellor, Beemer as NARD Board Representative; and Gary Loftis, Craig as NARD Board Alternate.

Currently, 17 individuals serve on the Lower Elkhorn NRD board. NRD directors are elected by voters from their respective subdistricts, with one at-large representative. After the 1994-election, the Lower Elkhorn board will have 15 members as a result of the reorganized subdistrict plan adopted in 1991. This plan provides for substantially equal population between the seven subdistricts.

In other business, the board approved the recommendation to hire Nickel Engineering to design a sediment retention structure above Maskenthine Reservoir near Stanton. The sediment storage structure will be built as a result of a recommendation outlined in the Clean Lakes Study. The Clean Lakes program grant will pay nearly half of the costs for the sediment retention structure.

The board also voted to have Conservation and Survey Division conduct a geophysical survey of the Logan East Rural Water System for further wellhead protection area delineation and to optimize the placement of vadose zone monitoring borings.

The protection of the groundwater near the rural water system by Oakland is important for the NRD. Currently Logan East Rural Water System serves approximately 500 users in Burt, Dodge and Washington counties. nhace of evnancion will add approximately 450 rural water and the city of Herman. Construction is expected to begin this spring on Phase IV.

The board also voted to modify option one of the Lands for Conservatin Program adopted November. The NRD will pay \$75 per acre for the smallest area that contains the terrace system. Terraces may be constructed anytime between May 1 and July 15.

"It is very important this year to spread the terracing work load, so producers who are counting on terraces for Food Security Act (FSAO compliance are not forced from participating in the farm program," Ken Berney, assistant manager said. "The most logical ways to achieve this goal is to keep land available for constuction constantly from spring through fall with the Lands for Conservation Program."

The February board meeting for the Lower Elkhorn NRD will be held Thursday, Feb. 24.



Elk Point newspaper publisher Lester Emerson, who is also quoted in the investigator's report, said there were some bad feelings between people in the community and Jensen over athletics. Emerson said Jensen fired a long-standing teacher and coach and that the athletic program suffered under his direction. Emerson said Jensen's interests ran more to academics than athletics.

Emerson also said, according to the report, that people in the community disliked the fact that Jensen studied for and obtained his doctorate while a superintendent at Elk

ONE LEADER NOT quoted in the investigator's report was Wayne Heckethorn, who was chairman of the school board during Jensen's tenure in Elk Point. Heckethorn told the Wayne Herald he was shocked to hear the contents of the investigator's report.

"They didn't try to contact me at all." said Heckethorn of the investigators. He said there was never a vote on the board to ask for Jensen's resignation and that he was sorry to see Jensen leave for higher paying job with a bigger school district in

Heckethorn said be was appalled when he was told of the references to poor moral conduct contained in the report.

"I ALWAYS KNEW him to be a highly moral man...very much a Christian," said Heckethorn

"I'll be the first to admit that he made enemies," said Heckethorn. He said the board in Elk Point hired Jensen specifically because of his assertiveness. He said the district was hampered by long-standing employees who "were unwilling to conform to changes the board

He said Jensen was directed to make changes "and he went ahead and got the job done."

The Wayne Herald was given access to various copies of the investigator's report by individuals who declined to say where they received them or said they did not know where they came from nor who hired the investigators.

A new 19 lot subdivision off-of-Highway 35 west of Oak Street being developed by Gary Donner. The first phase will include ten lots this summer.
