One teen back; other escapees still at large

One of four teenagers who escaped last Saturday night from the Juvenile Detention Center in Wayne has been captured and returned to the center while the other three remain at large and are the subjects of a nationwide search.

The 16-year-old Hispanic youth was captured by the South Sioux City Police department Wednesday morning after he was found hiding in a closet at a house he had been known to frequent previously.

South Sioux City Police began checking places the youth had been known to frequent after he fit the description of a teen who fled from the scene of a shoplifting attempt in Sioux City, Iowa the previous

"WE'VE DEALT with him before," said Officer Andy Backman of the Sioux City Police Department who added that the teen offered no resistance to arrest. He will face additional charges in both Iowa and Nebraska, predicted Backman.

Originally, the teen was being held at the JDC for felony assault and other charges.

He was involved in a disturbance between Hispanic and Caucasian teens at the detention center last

Saturday night. Before the near riot was quelled, four teens used a fire extinguisher to break a padlock holding a grate over a window, broke the window and ran. Police suspect the youths stole a car that was reported missing that night from the 100 block of East 4th.

JDC DIRECTOR Greg Eckel said he had unconfirmed reports that the four had been together in the Emerson area, where another car had been stolen and that a farmer had helped them when their vehicle became stuck.

Dixon County officials could not confirm those reports.

Backman said the other individuals involved in the shoplifting situation with the Dakota County teen Tuesday were not escapees from the JDC and he surmised that the teens have split up.

Wayne Police Chief Vern Fairchild said information about the escapees and their descriptions have been sent to every police department throughout the country on the crime computer network.

He declined to say if there were any leads to the whereabouts of the remaining three escapees but officials have said they doubt that they remain in this area.

School building plans still varied

A committee looking at building needs for the Wayne City Schools is working to narrow the number of options and solidify cost estimates before recommending solutions to the Wayne School board.

First architectural estimates for correcting all the district's building needs, including a new school in Carroll, addition to the Wayne El-School and new building for the Middle School and High School ranged upwards of \$19 million, a figure septted at by some members of the committee and school administrators

"WHERE DO YOU think we are, Lincoln?" School Superintendent Dennis Jensen, said he asked the architects when they presented the high cost options which included a new high school building with more than double the space of the existing-high-school.

The architects were instructed to

Early estimates from the architectural firm of Architectural Partner-

ships of Lincoln, which was hired by the district to facilitate the committee's study of building needs, show the costs for renovating the old Middle School building at about the same as building a new one--in the neighborhood of \$8 million dollars. The firm is the leading school building design firm in the state.

JENSEN SAID all the cost figures being talked about seem high and he doubts the committee will recommend, nor would the board accept the high cost building plans. He said to raise \$19 million for

school buildings would increase the school property tax levy in the district by over \$1 per 100 valuation.
Voters, who are ultimately going

to have to approve a bond issue to finance solutions to the building needs of the district would not likely approve that rich a proposal, he said. bond issue election would likely be held in November after options are narrowed and the district has a firmer handle on costs, said Jensen.

Burial was in the Bancroft Cemetery.



·a permit for a new domestic use well north of Wayne. The well is being proposed for land being developed by Gary Pick.

•a special use permit for apart-ments in the upstairs portion of the building at 111 Main (the old Morning Shopper Building).

•rezoning for a proposed mobile home park being developed by Nick Sieler and partners near the Wayne Veterinary Clinic.

setting special assessments for street, sewer and water improve ment districts involved in the first phase of Vintage Hill Addition.

Most pressing among the needs for the district was condition, accessibility and space in the 86-year-old Middle School Building, the same for Carroll Elementary and space problems in the High School.

Governor isn't worried about legislative initiatives

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- Gov. Ben Nelson says he isn't worried about the slow pace his legislative initiatives are taking this session. Not yet.

"I always get concerned when things aren't moving as fast as I'd like them to," Nelson said Wednesday. "But these are highly complicated and somewhat controversial issues, to say the least,

"It's not unexpected that they could have this kind of trouble as we work them through the system

With 22 days left in the legislative session, only two of Nelson's eight initiatives, so highly touted a few months ago, have advanced beyond first-round debate

Of the priorities outlined by Nelson in his State of the State speech in January, only the youth anti-crime package and a bill to use the state's unemployment insurance trust fund to pay for job training are close to reaching Nelson's desk.

Three other Nelson-backed measures, including the health-care reform and adult anti-crime packages still await first-round debate. Two other bills, including a massive welfare reform proposal, remain in com-

What gives?

Tim Becker, Nelson's chief of staff, said nobody in the Legislature is likely to get everything they want But he and Nelson said they not giving up on any of the bills.

enario is if we didn try," Nelson said. "My sense is that, at this point, we're not in dire danger of them not passing.

"It is a very aggressive legislative package, but it is moving forward. Most of the measures are priority bills and are expected to be debated this year, said Nelson aide Trent

Omaha Sen. Ernie Chambers said Nelson, who announced his re-election plans in January, is using the initiatives to gain headlines.

Nowka.

"All he has to do is say, 'I gave the idea to the Legislature and they wouldn't pass it.' That's the way politics works, and I expect that," said Chambers, a 23-year veteran of the Legislature.

Nelson said he wasn't willing to prioritize which of his initiatives he would push, if lawmakers balked at passing all of them, "Right now, we feel that they all get equal support and are of equal importance," he

The dictionary defines spring as "of or belonging to the season of spring." A sub-definition is given as: the lassitude often felt at the approach of warm weather in the spring; humorously, laziness at any

No matter which way you define it, all thoughts are turned to the possibility that spring is on its way. We think we may have some books for your spring reading.

"Building healthy gardens: a safe and natural approach" by Karl W. Stuecklen gives all sorts of ideas about how to prepare your garden, what to plant, and how to feed your soil.

"Tough plants for touch places" by Peter Loewer gives advice on-how to grow easy-care plants for every sort of yard condition. Two books for the less active gardeners should help those who do

their gardening indoors. "Better Homes & Gardens new houseplants book" gives advice on how to choose houseplants and how to care for them. This book has pictures of houseplants from A to Z.

2. "The Sunroom Gardener" by Anne Swithinbank. If you are still

an indoor gardener but have more room, you will find this book a practical guide for growing plants in sunrooms, atriums and conserva-

What else comes to mind with the approach of spring? Golf? Birdwatching? We have three videos by Lee Trevino on learning how to play golf - or one entitled "Nice Shot" which is designed to improve your game. A video to help you teach a child golf is called Teaching Kids Golf."

If you are a birdwatcher we have an interesting nature video by the National Audubon Society on "Crane River," which is filmed on the Platte River during the migration of the Sandhill Cranes. We have a beautiful new book on birds by John James Audubon, "The Watercolors for the Birds of America." This is an oversize book and is not a portable field guide -- but it has reproductions of Audubon's paintings of birds. Very nice, indeed. We do have a "portable" field guide for birdwatchers, however. "A Field Guide to the Birds East of the Rockies" by Roger Tory Peterson has excellent illustrations for easy identification. The "North American Birdfeeder Handbook" by Robert Burton and "The Backyard Bird Watcher" by George H. Harrison are

good reference books for watching birds in your own backyard.

Spring also brings to mind spring cleaning! Not a subject close to our hearts -- but the library is equipped with a few books to lighten

1. "Heloise from A to Z" contains ideas for those day-to-day jobs that plague us all.

"Mary Ellen's Clean House" by Mary Ellen Pinkham claims to

give you everything you need to know about buying smart, cleaning fast, and running a house without running out of steam.

3. Time-Life has a book entitled "Cleaning" which goes into more than just house cleaning. There are tips on changing filters in appliances; tips on how to remove stains in fabrics; tips on small repair jobs, to name a few.

NRD Provides Funds For Shower House Construction At Willow Creek SRA

The Lower Elkhorn Natural Resources District board voted to provide funding for the construction of a shower house at Willow Creek State Recreation Area near Pierce at the February meeting, Thursday evening in

The board voted to cooperate with Nebraska Game and Parks Commission to complete this project, not to exceed \$35,000. The proposed building will be located in the campground at Willow Creek SRA.

Plans and specifications for the shower house should be completed by April and construction will occur early this summer, according to Ken

Berney, assistant mangager of programs.

The board voted to suspend all planning and expenditures on the Indian Creek Road Structure in Stanton County. Based on a pre-feasibility study conducted by Johnson-Erickson-O'Brien & Associates Inc., the proposed road structure has a high cost compared to the projected benefits, according to Richard Seymour, assistant manager of projects.

In other business, the NRD board voted to pursue office space in the proposed "Learning Center" to be located near Northeast Community College rather than constructing offices at the NRD Wayside Area on north Highway 81. The board will continue to investigate legal and architectural aspects of joining in this venture in Norfolk.

The board also approved the recommendation to appoint two new members to the Logan East Rural Water System Advisory Committee. Linda Hansen, Tekamah and Richard Holtman, Fontanelle will join the nine-member advisory committee. These two individuals are representatives from the area that will be included in the next phase of expansion for the system.

Other members of the Logan East Advisory committee are Jeff Troupe, Oakland; Don A. Johnson, Oakland; Homer Uehling, Oakland: John Larson, Lyons, Larry Neuhaus, Lyons, Harvey Bartling, Hooper, and Ron

Dierking, Scribner.

Rural water districts are operated by several NRDs to supply high-quality drinking water to homes and farms that otherwise would not have an adequate source. With an office in Oakland, this system is managed by the Lower Elkhorn NRD. Currently the system serves approximately 500 rural water customers in parts of Burt, Dodge and Washington counties.

Plans are under way for the fourth phase of expansion of the Logan East Rural Water System. Phase IV develoment is expected to serve 500 additional users in eastern Burt and northwestern Washington counties.

The March board meeting for the Lower Elkhorn NRD board will be

held Thursday, March 24 in Norfolk.




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
