Lessman recalls war flights

Third in a Series--Lessman-Pt. II

By Clara Osten

"On our first attack, my company went into battle with 200 men and came out with 35, just in one day," recalled Willis Lessman as he continued the account of his time in Europe during World War II.

This was during the fall of 1944 and the Germans were staging all out-attempts to-defeat the Allied troops before the Russians could get to this part of the Netherlands.
Those soldiers who were part of

the 82nd Airborne were stationed at least 50 miles behind enemy lines. They were basically cut off from the rest of the army and supply trucks were often shot at when at-

tempting to deliver supplies.
Two weeks later the Americans


Lessman's company made another attack and drove the Germans out of the region. However, they did get cut off from the rest of the soldiers and any supplies. "We had

no food or water for three days. The only thing around for us to eat was apples. We lived on apples was apples. We lived on apples until we were able to get back with the rest of the regiment. After that we withdrew to a better position,"

DURING A battle at Mook in the Netherlands Lessman was wounded. "I was with two other soldiers in an old fox hole. The Germans dropped mortars on us. Both of the others were killed, but fortunately for me, I was just hit with shrapnel and received a concussion. I couldn't move my legs for a while but was not hospitalized," recalls Lessman.

After this incident, the company relaxation. Their rest was short because soon after, on Dec. 16, 1944,

they were loaded on trucks and headed toward the Rhine River. This was the beginning of the Battle of the Bulge which lasted through December and into 1945.

During the Campaign of Ardennes, the soldiers fought lots of battles in the Black Forest which vas covered with two to three feet of snow. "This was a very confusing time because there was snow everywhere. We even slept in it because there was no place else to go," said Lessman.

LESSMAN spent two weeks in the hospital, suffering from battle fatigue. "I don't remember much of what went on during this time or what they did to me, but I do remember feeling like a whole new person," said Lessman.

When I was in the hospital, the Germans were shooting rockets into civilian areas. The V 2 rockets were low flying, slow moving ones with engines. As long as we could here the engines running, everything was O.K. As soon as it was quiet, we knew it was time to take cover. These rockets were not very accu rate but they had blown out all of the windows at the hospital.'

After the Battle of the Bulge, Lessman was sent to Ludwiglust in Germany. This was a town with a concentration camp. Lessman and several others went into the camp. "What we saw was horrible. Most of the people looked as though they should have been dead. basement were bodies piled four or five feet deep.

"We had a funeral for about 200 of those bodies. The German officers who had surrendered were forced to dig the graves for those 200. Then they were forced to walk past each of the graves and look at the bodies in each of them.

IT WAS DURING this time that the German Fifth Army surrendered to Lessman's company. 'At least 50,000 Germans surrendered to us rather than the Russians who were coming in from the other side. We took away guns, knives and sabers," said Lessman.

The war was coming to an end in Europe by this time. General Eisenhower wanted these troops to go to Japan, but instead they were assigned to be occupation troops in Berlin. "We were just there for a few weeks and took care of factorics. I found the people to be pretty much like people everywhere.

In November of 1945 Lessman left Berlin and headed for the United States. He arrived back in Wayne on Dec. 24, 1945. "I came home and started working in a bakery and then ended up working in construction with my brother.

"In 1946 I joined the National Guard and served as Company Commander for 12 years. I then worked my way up and took advanced training and eventually became a Major with the Guard. I was in for a total of 24 years

Lessman concluded by saying that there really were too many details of his military life and he enjoys telling stories of his war days to his children and others in the community.

notice of any violations of the pre treatment permits, but he said in the case of the Great Dane plant the problem was discovered by pant official following self testing and was immediately corrected even before the state officials were notified by the Great Dane officials of the problem.

Federal law requires certain industries to treat wastes in their own plants before piping them to a city ewage treatment plant. Feidler said the companies are required test their vn waste water regularly to determine if there are toxins which might reate problems in the municipal

vastewater system. He said Great Dane reported last une an excessive solvent in its waste water and they traced the problem back to a leaking drum. The plant fixed the drum and subsequently eliminated the solvent chemical from its manufacturing process said

Wayne Plant Manager Terry Hansen said the problem was dis covered during routine testing of the wastewater and was immediately corrected. Feidler said the Wayne operation took all the necessary steps to find and correct the problem immediately

The DEQ identified the five businesses in violation as Douglas Lomason Co., Columbus; Great Dane Trailers Inc., Wayne, Kurt Manufacturing Co., Lyman; Lincoln Plating Co., Lincoln; and Stroms Inc., Scottsbluff.

In Nebraska, 76 companies are required to obtain pretreatment permits and abide by conditions in those permits, said Clark Smith, who supervises the DEQ's permits and compliance section.

The department also is required under the law to identify violators once a year.

Smith said pretreatment is needed because some untreated industrial wastes can foul up biological processes in city sewage treatment plants. That would allow polluted sewage water to flow from the treatment plant into the river that receives the treatment plant's discharges.

Being cited for noncompliance may or may not lead the department to take legal action against a busiess, Smith told the Omaha World-Herald. "In some cases, an enforcement action is appropriate," he said "In others, voluntary compliance is the route.

DEQ officials said Great Dane's voluntary compliance efforts means no further enforcement would be


In the past there have been Co-Players of the Year because of the talent in the area. This year is another first as there are three Co-Players of the Year and two are from the same school.

Nation's all-time assist leader has Wayne ties

When Jerry Meyer graduates with his degree in Political Science it would only seem fitting if his Duluth Bulldogs basketball teammates from this season and his former teammates at David Lipscomb University assist him as he walks across the stage to receive his

That's because Meyer spent his entire collegiate career dishing out assists to his teammates and to put it quite simply, Jerry Meyer is the greatest assist man to ever play the game of college basketball.

The son of legendary NAIA coach Don Meyer of David Lip-scomb University in Nashville, Tenn., and the grandson of Edna and the late Don Meyer of Wayne, Jerry played his first three collegiate sea sons playing for his father at David

While at Lipscomb, Meyer shined. The two-time high school player of the year in the state of Tennessee in Class AA, helped lead the Bison to three straight NAIA National berths with his accurate long range shooting ability as well as dishing off to the open man for

In August of 1992, however, things changed for Jerry and he left school. He stated personal reasons for leaving but talked of family problems combined with school and other disagreements-even burnout.

Meyer said playing for his dad wasn't-the problem he faced at Lipscomb, in fact he said it was probably tougher on his dad than it

as him. All in all, Meyer said he felt like it was time to leave. By Christmas time of 1993 Jerry

basketball because it was just one of those things he'd been around all his life and now all of a sudden it

Enter Minnesota-Duluth head coach Dale Race, a family friend and good friend of Don Meyer. Race had written Jerry a note after he heard of his leaving David Lipscomb which said if he ever had a change of heart about basketball to

Jerry did let him know and the Bulldogs mentor was delighted to say the least. The decision to go north was made because Meyer still wanted to get his degree and after all, we're not talking about your

average dropout here.

Meyer was the GTE-CoSIDA college player of the year as a ju-nior and he won the NAIA's prestigious Frank Hesselroth Award that season-for his outstanding play onthe court and his scholarly work ethic in the classroom

Meyer yielded a 4.0 grade point average at David Lipscomb and he

where the results were much the same. Coach Race got a note from one of Meyer's instructors during the first quarter of the school year that simply said, "Thank you for bringing this young man to our school."—it was a first for Race.

Meyer came into his final season of basketball eligibility needing 97 assists to become college basketball's all-time leader, a distinction held by Oklahoma Christian's Kelly Jobe from 1979-83.

Of course most people refer to Duke University's Bobby Hurley as the ultimate assist man but Meyer's totals exceed the NCAA Division I star's by 238.

Jobe's record of 1259 was broken by Jerry on Saturday, Jan. 22 in a contest held in Marshall, Minn. against Southwest State. Meyer went on to shatter the record, clos-ing out his career with 1314 assists-an average of 328.5 per sea-

During his years at David Lip-scomb, Meyer's job was to feed the ball to players like Phil Hutcheson who went on to become college basketball's all-time leading scorer-a mark that was broken this season by John Pearce of Lipscomb and a teammate of Meyer's during his sophomore and junior seasons.

At Minnesota-Duluth the assists came at a slower clip than before than doubled from his 12.6 average in Tennessee to 26.6. Although Meyer will go down in college basketball history as an assist man, he proved he could put up some impressive scoring numbers as

In early February Meyer etched his name in the Minnesota-Duluth record books for scoring the most points in a single game with 47 against Wisconsin-Superior. He hit 17 of 23 shots from the field in that game including eight, 3-pointers.

A special ceremony was held to honor Jerry for his assist accom-plishment back on Feb. 4. Edna Meyer and daughter Nancy attended the ceremony and Jerry had a surprise for his grandmother-he gave her the basketball enclosed in a glass case that he used to break the assist record. Jerry also received congratulations and best wishes from his former teammates at David

Meyer's athletic accolades will undoubtedly be remembered for a long time but while he spent hours and hours practicing basketball he never lost track of his school work.

He spent many hours working voluntarily at the Mission House in Duluth and now his focus will shift from making assists on the basketball court to assisting mankind.
