Wayne area churches will be celebrating the most sacred week of the year for people of faith next week as the area prepares for Easter on Sunday, April 3.

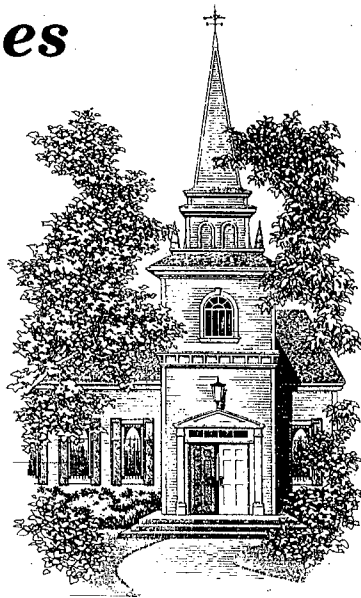

A new executive director of the Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce and Wayne Industries has been hired and will be on the job in early April.

John Farnan of Omaha has been hired to fill the post vacated by Curt Wilwerding. Farnan was the choice of the joint boards of Wayne Industries and the Chamber following a meeting Wednesday at which they discussed the two finalists recommended by the search committee.

The search committee had narrowed the list of more than 35 applicants down to two for the full boards to consider. The other finalist for the post was the present Chamber administrative assistant, Nancy Schulz.

FARNAN, a native of Cameron, Mo. is completing his masters degree in business administration from Creighton University this spring. With college training in communications and marketing, Farnan said he had steered his job search in the direction of small city government or civic administration.

He and his wife Annette, who will be receiving her law degree from Creighton this spring, were in Wayne Thursday to meet people and begin to search for housing. The couple has been married five months.

While in college, Farnan was involved in student government and

## Accident injures Wayne girl

Nine-year-old Katie Nelson, daughter of Julie Cull of Wayne, was hit by a car, Tuesday at the intersection of Third & Sherman

about 6 p.m. The car was driven by Marilyn Wallin of Wayne but according to Sargent Bob McLean of the Wayne Police Department, no citation was issued.

Wallin was driving south on Sherman and stopped at the inter-

section, obeying the traffic sign. Nelson, meanwhile, was skating on her roller blades on the west side of the street heading south.

As the Wallin vehicle turned west on Third Street, Nelson could not come to a stop on her roller blades and began skating towards the curb of the street.

"She was a very lucky little girl," McLean said. "The good thing is, when she knew she wasn't going to be able to stop she fell on purpose in an attempt to avoid hitting the car. That probably saved her from any more serious injuries."

The right front tire of the Wallin vehicle hit Nelson's left leg, pinning it between the concrete and the tire. The ambulance was called and Nelson was transported to Providence Medical Center where she was treated for deep and severe bruising of the left calf. Nelson was released and sent home later Tuesday evening.

## Woman's body found near Homer

HOMER, Neb. (AP) -- Authorities searched for clues today in the beating death of a woman whose body was found on a gravel road.

"It was definitely homicide," Dakota County Sheriff James Wagner told the Sioux City (Iowa) Journal on Tuesday. "Due to the extensive injuries that she had, I'm sure it was a homicide."

An autopsy found that the woman died from multiple blows to the head and chest areas, Dr. Gene Herbek, Iowa's deputy state medical examiner, told the Journal. Investigators were searching for a murder weapon, probably some type of blunt instrument, Herbek said.

Lab tests were being conducted to determine if the woman had been sexually assaulted, authorities said.

The woman's body was found without identification and authorities were trying to determine her identity.

An area resident found the body while checking livestock Tuesday morning and notified authorities, the Nebraska State Patrol told Sioux City, Iowa, television station KCAU.

The body was found near the intersection of 225th Street and G Avenue just north of Homer, a community of about 560 located 13 miles south of Sioux City, Iowa, KCAU reported.

## Lessman recalls war flights

Third in a Series--  
Lessman-Pt. II

"On our first attack, my company went into battle with 200 men and came out with 35, just in one day," recalled Willis Lessman as he continued the account of his time in Europe during World War II.

This was during the fall of 1944 and the Germans were staging all out attempts to defeat the Allied troops before the Russians could get to this part of the Netherlands.

Those soldiers who were part of the 82nd Airborne were stationed at least 50 miles behind enemy lines. They were basically cut off from the rest of the army and supply trucks were often shot at when attempting to deliver supplies.

Two weeks later the Americans

no food or water for three days. The only thing around for us to eat was apples. We lived on apples until we were able to get back with the rest of the regiment. After that we withdrew to a better position," said Lessman.

DURING A battle at Mook in the Netherlands Lessman was wounded. "I was with two other soldiers in an old fox hole. The Germans dropped mortars on us. Both of the others were killed, but fortunately for me, I was just hit with shrapnel and received a concussion. I couldn't move my legs for a while but was not hospitalized," recalls Lessman.

After this incident, the company was sent back to France for rest and relaxation. Their rest was short because soon after, on Dec. 16, 1944,

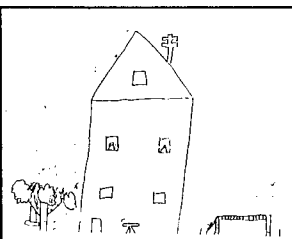

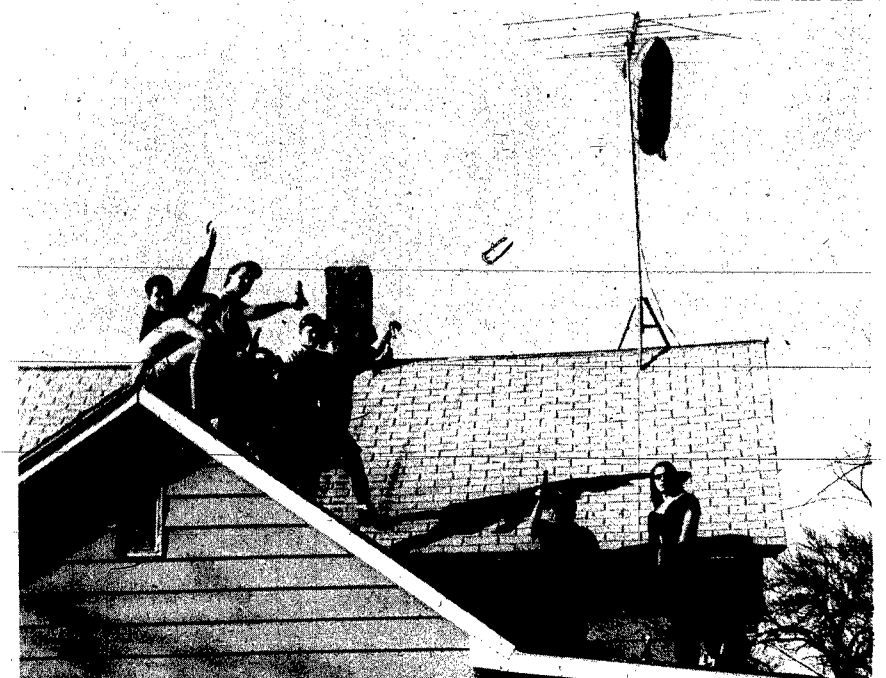

awareness and community spirit.

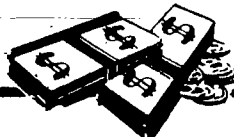
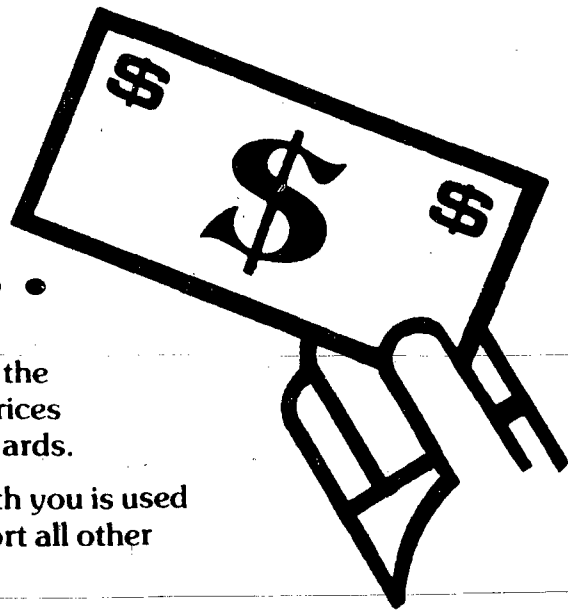

## Wayne Herald releases annual Boys All-Area basketball team

The Wayne Herald Boys All-Area Basketball Team was released today with 10 of the area's finest players earning special recognition for their play during the 1993-94 season.

The Wayne Blue Devils had three selected to the annual list as did the Laurel Bears. Wakefield landed two on the team while Winside and Allen each had one representative.

Matt Blomenkamp, Robert Bell and Ryan Pick finished the season first, second and third respectively in the scoring column for the Blue Devils and in doing so, led Wayne to its first state tournament berth in eight years after a 19-4 regular season record.

Of the three, the only underclassman is Pick who will return next year for his senior season. Blomenkamp and Bell closed out quality careers with the Blue Devils. Blomenkamp was a three-year starter and Bell started every game his senior year and several games his junior season.

Blomenkamp's basketball abilities have been well documented throughout his starred tenure with Wayne with his ability to shoot from the outside as well as driving to the hole and drawing the foul.

Bell, however, enlightened Wayne High fans to a new portion of his game this season. In the past he was the kind of player that crashed the boards hard and came up with points off offensive rebounds while shooting extremely well from the free throw line.

This season Bell took his game to new heights—literally. He

showed his long range shooting ability by knocking down a number of 3-pointers and the unique thing about Bell's 3-point shooting ability was the amount of arch he had on the ball.

In fact, one comment that was heard coming from some of the Wayne players was that when ever Wayne wanted to go into a delay game the plan was to let Bell take his 3-point shots because it took so long for the ball to come down when he shot it.

At any rate, Bell enjoyed a quality year of basketball in his final stint as a Blue Devil. Pick will be the player called upon next year to provide the needed leadership for Wayne and odds are, he'll deliver.

Pick's ability to change the momentum of the game in just two trips down the floor with his 3-point accuracy and aggressive defense that led the team in steals, makes him very difficult to guard against. He also had a fine season crashing the boards and he was among the team leaders in assists.

One of the finest C-1 teams in the entire state of Nebraska last season was the Laurel-Bears. In fact, they were probably the best team in C-1 that didn't qualify for state after losing a heart-breaker in overtime to Hartington Cedar Catholic in the district finals.

Coach Clayton Steele has to be all smiles when he looks at the players coming back next season because the top seven or eight are all underclassmen.

Jared Reinoehl and Jeremy Reinoehl, junior twins, supplied Bears fans with plenty to cheer about all season with their athletic ability which allowed them to play inside and outside.

Although the dynamic duo made it difficult for this sports writer to tell them apart by just looking at them, I've decided next year to just call them both J.R. The third member of the Laurel team to earn first team status is Cody Carstensen.

Carstensen is the consummate team player. He's one of those players that will never do anything that hurts the team. His quick, aggressive defense often found him along with other backcourt specialist Tyler Erwin on the front end or receiving end of a fast break.

Wakefield enjoyed another quality winning season and they did it this year with underclassmen. Junior Cory Brown is simply one of the best athletes in all of northeast Nebraska.

There are very few players that desire the ball and deliver when the game is on the line. In fact, this writer saw two all season and one was Cory Brown. (The other was Cedar Catholic's Jaime Jones.)

Brown's deceptive quickness and aggressive play made him a defensive specialist and on offense, there really wasn't a limit to what he could and could not do. He did a great job of penetrating opposing defenses and drawing fouls or dishing off the ball for an assist if he was picked up and double-teamed.

Wes Blecke is the other first teamer from Wakefield. This sophomore worked hard all season and developed into one of the finest forwards around.

The final two spots on the all-area team go to Allen's Curtis Oswald and Winside's Ryan Brogren. Oswald led the Eagles in scoring for the second straight season and Bro-

gren was among the leading scorers for Winside while leading the Wildcats on the boards.

The honorable mention list includes Kirk Carmichael of Wayne, Ryan Ekberg and Miah Johnson of Wakefield, Casey Schroeder of Allen, Marty Jorgensen of Winside and Tyler Erwin of Laurel.

Coach of the Year honors go to Wayne's Rocky Ruhl for the job he did in his first year directing the Blue Devils to the state tournament. Laurel's Clayton Steele deserves mention for the job he did with the Bears program this season as well.

In the past there have been Co-Players of the Year because of the talent in the area. This year is another first as there are three Co-Players of the Year and two are from the same school.

Matt Blomenkamp and Robert Bell provided a one-two punch for Wayne all season and both are well deserving of the honor while Wakefield's Cory Brown also gets the nod for his outstanding, consistent play.

The Reinoehl duo in Laurel deserve an outstanding mention for the award. As far as top newcomers to the area this season there are two that come to mind that had the most impact.

Winside's freshman Jaimey Holdorf and Wakefield's sophomore Tory Nixon provided major lifts to their respective teams this year and both will be heard from in the years to come.

The Wayne State women's softball competed in the Dakota Dome Tournament on Friday and Saturday in Vermillion, S.D. and Joan Scherbring's squad went 1-3.

The 'Cats were blasted, 11-1 by Southwest State of Minnesota at the first contest as Jenny Nieland went the distance from the mound and took the loss. Southwest State pounded out 11 hits while WSC was limited to three singles by Michele Reinhardt, Jeni Umbach and Kim Stigge.

In the second game WSC jumped out to an 8-1 lead over South Dakota and hung on for an 8-6 victory. Alex Ross earned the pitching victory and pitched a complete game.

WSC had nine hits in the game and three errors while USD had seven hits and no errors. Lori Foster doubled and singled to lead WSC

while Michele Reinhardt laced a pair of singles.

Jeni Umbach blasted a two-run home run while Stacey Topf, Meg Neuberger, Kim Stigge and Tiff Butterbaugh each singled.

The 'Cats were edged by a 5-4 margin in the third contest by Winona State of Minnesota. Maryellen Livingston was tagged with the loss in a game that saw both teams pound out eight hits.

# Nation's all-time assist leader has Wayne ties

When Jerry Meyer graduates with his degree in Political Science it would only seem fitting if his Duluth Bulldogs basketball teammates from this season and his former teammates at David Lipscomb University assist him as he walks across the stage to receive his degree.

That's because Meyer spent his entire collegiate career dishing out assists to his teammates and to put it quite simply, Jerry Meyer is the greatest assist man to ever play the game of college basketball.

The son of legendary NAIA coach Don Meyer of David Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tenn., and the grandson of Edna and the late Don Meyer of Wayne, Jerry played his first three collegiate seasons playing for his father at David Lipscomb.

While at Lipscomb, Meyer shined. The two-time high school player of the year in the state of Tennessee in Class AA, helped lead the Bison to three straight NAIA National berths with his accurate long range shooting ability as well as dishing off to the open man for two points.

In August of 1992, however, things changed for Jerry and he left school. He stated personal reasons for leaving but talked of family problems combined with school and other disagreements—even burnout.

Meyer said playing for his dad wasn't the problem he faced at Lipscomb, in fact he said it was probably tougher on his dad than it

was him. All in all, Meyer said he felt like it was time to leave.

By Christmas time of 1993 Jerry was really missing the game of

basketball because it was just one of those things he'd been around all his life and now all of a sudden it wasn't.

Enter Minnesota-Duluth head coach Dale Race, a family friend and good friend of Don Meyer. Race had written Jerry a note after he heard of his leaving David Lipscomb which said if he ever had a change of heart about basketball to let him know.

Jerry did let him know and the Bulldogs mentor was delighted to say the least. The decision to go north was made because Meyer still wanted to get his degree and after all, we're not talking about your average dropout here.

Meyer was the GTE-CoSIDA college player of the year as a junior and he won the NAIA's prestigious Frank Hesselroth Award that season for his outstanding play on the court and his scholarly work ethic in the classroom.

Meyer yielded a 4.0 grade point average at David Lipscomb and he took his classroom skills to Duluth

where the results were much the same. Coach Race got a note from one of Meyer's instructors during the first quarter of the school year that simply said, "Thank you for bringing this young man to our school."—it was a first for Race.

Meyer came into his final season of basketball eligibility needing 97 assists to become college basketball's all-time leader, a distinction held by Oklahoma Christian's Kelly Jobe from 1979-83.

Of course most people refer to Duke University's Bobby Hurley as the ultimate assist man but Meyer's totals exceed the NCAA Division I star's by 238.

Jobe's record of 1259 was broken by Jerry on Saturday, Jan. 22 in a contest held in Marshall, Minn. against Southwest State. Meyer went on to shatter the record, closing out his career with 1314 assists—an average of 328.5 per season.

During his years at David Lipscomb, Meyer's job was to feed the ball to players like Phil Hutcheson who went on to become college basketball's all-time leading scorer—a mark that was broken this season by John Pearce of Lipscomb and a teammate of Meyer's during his sophomore and junior seasons.

At Minnesota-Duluth the assists came at a slower clip than before

but Meyer's scoring average more than doubled from his 12.6 average in Tennessee to 26.6. Although Meyer will go down in college basketball history as an assist man, he proved he could put up some impressive scoring numbers as well.

In early February Meyer etched his name in the Minnesota-Duluth record books for scoring the most points in a single game with 47 against Wisconsin-Superior. He hit 17 of 23 shots from the field in that game including eight, 3-pointers.

A special ceremony was held to honor Jerry for his assist accomplishment back on Feb. 4. Edna Meyer and daughter Nancy attended the ceremony and Jerry had a surprise for his grandmother—he gave her the basketball enclosed in a glass case that he used to break the assist record. Jerry also received congratulations and best wishes from his former teammates at David Lipscomb.

Meyer's athletic accolades will undoubtedly be remembered for a long time but while he spent hours and hours practicing basketball he never lost track of his school work.

He spent many hours working voluntarily at the Mission House in Duluth and now his focus will shift from making assists on the basketball court to assisting mankind.

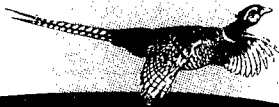

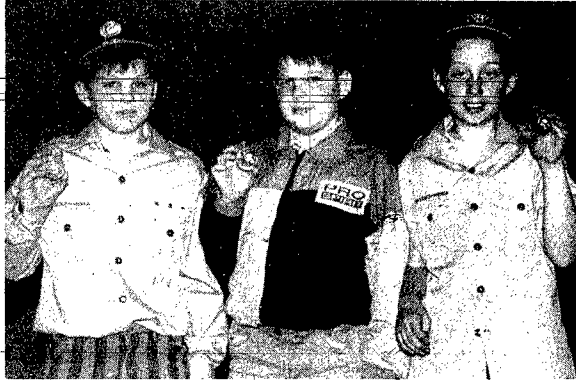
