Developer cries 'ambush' over council actions

Wayne City Council approved all but one of numerous public hearing issues which were on the agenda Tuesday, but council's delay approving one of the issues, a rezoning request, brought a bitter response from developer Nick Sieler.

Sieler and partners are trying to develop a mobile home park near the Wayne Veterinary Clinic off of East Highway 35 and Seiler called Tuesday's delay by council a costly "ambush."

There was no opposition expressed at the hearing by the public or coun-cil members and Sieler said he had talked to council members previously about the project to determine if there were any concerns and none were expressed.

THE REZONING request for the mobile home park was recom-mended by the Planning Commission and low cost housing was designated as a drastic need in the community in the comprehensive plans passed last year in Wayne.

That's why Sieler said he was surprised when council member Patty Weiland raised objections to his projects and other council member agreed to a delay of the approval for the rezoning until additional questions can be answered.

Mrs. Weiland said the zoning guidelines had taken too long to repare without giving careful conideration to proposals to change

SHE ADDED SHE had concerns about lack of a storm shelter in the plan and she wanted to see covenants on the residents of the proposed park which would establish regulations on the upkeep and appearance of the park. She said it should have a certain standard and a certain look because it will be on an ntrance to the community.

Council approved the rezoning on a 6-2 vote on first reading with Weiland and Council member Ralph Barclay voting against it. The council was split 4-4, however, on the issue of approving the rezoning fully

in one meeting.

The failure to approve it Tuesday means the scheduled closing on the property and hiring of contractors to begin construction work will have to be put off, said Sieler. With the busy construction season gearing up, he said this delay could add considerable cost to the project.

Sieler said he already has com-mitments from people who want to locate mobile homes in the development. He said it will be restricted to owner occupied mobile homes and

Farmer recalls European campaign

Fourth in a Series

People who thought the U.S. should stay out of the war, cleaning up mine fields, the rugged terrain of Italy and Dachau Concentration Camp are a few of the memories Les Youngmeyer of Wayne gained while serving in World War II

Youngmeyer, who grew up on a drafted in June 1942 and after induction at Ft. Crook in Omaha and Ft. Leavenworth, Kan, was sent to Camp Roberts, Calif. for three

months of infantry training.
"There were 33 of us who went to Omaha. Only 16 passed the physical," said Youngmeyer.

From California, he and 30 others were sent to a newly formed unit at Camp Grubber, Okla. - the 48th Combat Engineers.

"WE HAD specialized training here and for several months we had one officer for each enlisted man while we waited for new recruits to arrive," said Youngmeyer.

"Four hundred men came from the Bronx and Brooklyn. This was quite an experience. During the Vietnam Conflict much of the nation was opposed to the war, but these fellows from New York were 20 years ahead of them. They believed, as Charles Lindbergh did, that we had no business helping Great Britain against Hitler."



In August 1943 Youngmeyer left from New York and headed for North Africa. They passed through the Straight of Gibraltar. "The Germans hadn't given up completely. They still tried to bomb the ports and ships every night," Youngmeyer recalled.

"IN AFRICA, we had no contact with the German army. We spent our time picking up German mine fields because many civilians were being killed by them."

The next stop for the 48th

Combat Engineers was Salerno, Italy. There they served as infantry and engineers. During the four months they spent working their way up to Cassino, they suffered many deaths and casualties.

Even the weather was against us. During the coldest part of the winter, it rained every day and snowed every night. We were wet



for about two months without ever getting our clothes or blankets dry. Many of the men got trench foot." Youngmeyer's company then

orked their way up the west coast of Italy, "We worked our way up to above Rome before we were pulled back to invade southern France. I don't think too many of the men regretted leaving here," said

DURING THE time he was in Italy, Youngmeyer met his brother twice. His brother Howard was serving with the 34 Infantry Division Company and Les's company was picking up a mine field for them. Later, in Naples, Italy, the brothers met while Howard was in the hospital,

"Mt. Vesvuius erupted while we were in Italy but it didn't bother us.

However, Alvin Willers of Wayne was with the Air Force at a base near the volcano and his company lost all their planes when molten rock burned holes through the wings and fuselages of the planes,' Youngmeyer remembers.


The company landed at Fregos, France without many casualties because the paratroopers and glider troops had landed ahead and secured the area. It was here that the pilot of Youngmeyer's Landing Craft Infantry drove in front of a cruiser and the cruiser hit the craft, cutting it open to just about the water line.

"FRANCE WAS a different place than Italy. While Italy was a rough country with mountains and valleys, southern France was open

"ON THE WAY through Germany we came upon the Dachau Concentration Camp near Munich. It was here that we really came to realize why we had spent over three years in the service. There was a Jewish man with us who had been brought to the U.S. in 1939. It was tragic to walk through the camp with him as he searched the records for some trace of his family, but he found none."

Youngmeyer learned some lessons in loyalty to country also. While putting up a pontoon bridge in southern France, three men came to the middle of the bridge with three other men who had their hands tied behind their backs.

They got to the middle of the bridge, shot the men and rolled them into the river. Our battalion commander told me 'Youngmeyer, get up there and find out what that's all about. I didn't want to, but an order is an order. When I questioned them, they replied that these men were Free French Insurgents who had been sabotaging war efforts. Justice to these traitors was swift.'

ANOTHER incident that Youngmeyer recalled had little to do with the fighting. "On the edge of Lyon, France we came upon a large group of women carrying rakes,

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hoes and canes. They were driving about 20 naked women with their hair shaved off in front of them. After we realized that the naked women were prostitutes, a woman came up to us and said, 'you wouldn't want to sleep with them. They have been living with German

soldiers for four years getting nice clothes, sausage, bacon and coffee while we had nothing.' We came upon this type of thing several more times while in France."
Youngmeyer was "wounded"

twice. The first time two other men were on the other side of a jeep when a shell hit right behind them. The men were both killed but Youngmeyer received only

"THE NEXT time, a soldier about 10 feet away had his leg cut half off from shrapnel but I only got a scratch. It didn't seem right for me to apply for a purple heart when I had lost about as much blood by cutting myself shaving," said Youngmeyer.

Youngmeyer was released from the Army in November 1945 and returned to farming. He now serves as Post Ouartermaster for the local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post and is also a member of the American Legion Post.

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



McDermott new basketball coach

Greg McDermott, Wayne State's newest coach met the press Tuesday afternoon and the former North Dakota assistant told the room full of journalists and interested onlookers that being named head men's basketball coach at WSC presents a great opportunity to him.
"I look forward to the challenge

ahead and I'm very excited to be here and to be a part of the Wayne State program," the former fouryear starter at the University of Northern Iowa said.

McDermott said one of his goals here is to pump up the enthusiasm of the program and bring in some quality players who will mesh with those who are already here.

'I don't think there will be a harder working staff in this region when it comes to accomplishing our recruiting goals," McDermott "I want to bring in players that can fit into what we will be trying to do. Guys that will be happy here. If my players are not happy, we will not win. And If we do not win, I will not be happy."

The 29-year-old McDermott will attend college basketball's Division I Final Four on Saturday in Charlotte, North Carolina and talk to some of his Division I buddies and possibly look into some transfers.

Wayne State Athletic Director Pete Chapman said there were 106 applicants for the head coaching position vacated by Mike Brewen last month and it came down to three candidates and then two.

'It was a photo finish between McDermott and Minnesota-Morris head coach Perry Ford," Chapman said. "We felt we had a true winner with either man. We were looking for someone who would not only be successful as a coach, but fit into the Wayne State athletic de-

partment and the community of Wayne. "With Greg we feel we have accomplished that feat," Chapman added.

McDermott said next year's team will work hard on the defensive game. "I want to play aggressive, pressure defense yet still push it up the floor on offense," McDermott said. "We are not going to lose 20 games next year, I'll tell you that but we may not win 20 games either. We are looking to build a

program with stability."

McDermott also said he felt Chapman did an outstanding job bringing in a coach on this time-With an April 13 signing date, I still have time to look into recruiting some talented players," McDermott said.

As far as the assistant coach is concerned, Chapman said Greg will have the opportunity to bring in candidates of his choice. "At this time the assistant coach position is still up in the air," Chapman said.
"I will sit down and spend some time with Greg over the next couple of weeks and discuss the op-

Although this is officially Mc-Dermott's first head coaching job he feels he is ready. "At North Dakota I was given the opportunity to pick up quite a bit of coaching experience," McDermott said. "The only part of being a head coach that I re ally haven't experienced is the abil-ity to sit at the end of the bench and make the final decisions. I have worked hard to prepare myself for a job like this and I feel I am ready," McDermott added.



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
