

He said the Midwest area and the people the team has met during its four-week stay in eastern Nebraska and western Iowa have been much different that the image most people in Japan have of Americans.

HE SAID IT was not difficult to find applicants for the fully funded study tour from among young Japa-nese professionals because they knew they would be coming to the friendly Midwest "where there is low crime and good people."

Designed to build international understanding and good will, the Rotary-funded exchange trips of professionals were patterned after the popular student exchange pro-grams pioneered by Rotary Interna-

The young Japanese members of the team are also using the information gained on their Nebraska tour to improve themselves professionally, said Okuda. He said he has been surprised at the similarities in his profession practiced in the United States and in Japan. "Everything it computerized to keep up with the increased government regulations," he said of CPA work on both sides of

TAKASHI KAWAIKE, a 27year-old meat import trader with the leading beef importing company in Japan, said he is developing important business contacts in this area. He said he has purchased thousands of metric tons of beef from right here in Nebraska and he was enjoying the opportunity to see the pro-

duction processes.

Besides Kawaike and Okuda, other team members are, Naomi Harada, a 28 year old personnel administrator in Yao City Hall in Osaka; Hiroe Nakanishi, a 30-year-old professional secretary for the director of a private international high school, and Hikaru Oda, a 30-year-old surgical nurse form Unilife-Kitano Hospital in Osaka.

Northeast Nebraska fire fighters have battled several field fires in recent days and have asked for the public's help in minimizing the danger by controlling combustion activities.

Thursday's windswept

flames burned over 130 acres in three separate fires in Wayne County alone.

the apparent cause of the blaze was tree stumps that had rekindled after

being burned on Wednesday.

The last call came a little past

to a blaze three miles West, two miles South and another threefourths of a mile West.

This was the worst of the three fires as fire departments from Wayne, Carroll, Winside and a truck from Hoskins were on the scene for nearly three hours.

"The cause of the fire is still under investigation," Triggs said. "When the fire was put out, nearly 125 acres had been burned."

The Wayne firefighters expressed their gratitude for assistance from Winside, Carroll and Hoskins firefighters and to the farmers that assisted with tractors and disks.

Terra Chemical of Wayne was thanked for their assistance hauling water as was the Red Cross with Miron Jenness in particular for sup-plying sandwiches and drinks for

those fighting the blazes.

A fire near Beemer caused extensive damage, Thursday as close to 70 firefighters from several departments remained on the scene until the blaze was extinguished.

The fire took its toll, however as a house and some farm buildings were destroyed along with 150 acres

That was the graduation address delivered by retired entrepreneur Dan Gardner to the members of the first Fast Trac class in Wayne Thursday night.

Fast Trac is a business development and training program offered through Wayne State College and the USWest Corporation to entrepreneurs to help them develop their

ideas into a business plan. Twelve members of the first class in Wayne received their certificates of graduation during a special dinner and ceremony at the Wayne Country Club Thursday. Certificates vere presented by Wayne State College President Dr. Donald Mash.

BUT BEFORE the graduates received their certificates they got some valuable advice from one of Nebraska's most successful entrepreneurs, the retired chief executive officer of the M.G. Waldbaum Co. of Wakefield--Dan Gardner.

"I caution you as entrepreneurs, don't plan to work less or plan for your work to be easier," he said. He told the graduates who wanted to start their own businesses to expect to work 80-hour weeks and enter the effort only with the full support of

spouse and family.
"If it isn't a family thing it is not going to work," he said.


Hernie Wriedt was born Nov. 28, 1906 on the family farm northwest of



Dakota placed second in this competition.







How to do God's will with your mind

After you read through this Bible study, go back and look up the Scriptures and highlight them in your Bible.

The word of God says, "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice" and enjoy it. Now, if you're going to have a good day and enjoy it, you must stop complaining about the weather. The weather is God's business and none of yours

Some other ingredients for having a good day include: Go to work to cheer up people. Help people. Console people. Be friendly and understand people. That's serving your brother and sister and that's being like Jesus Christ.

Practice being positive. Unrestrained human nature practices being negative. It's counterproductive and degenerative. When your life is lived positively, then positive things begin to happen to you. If you are living negatively which is normal, but evil-sometimes you won't even recognize good things happening to you. Negativism, inwardness, selfishness, indifference, hate and murder are all brothers of destruction. This is why Christ said if you hate your brother, you are the same as a murderer (1 John 3:15).

By practicing attitudes that are destructive, you cannot expect to live a constructive life. But when you're practicing attitudes that are constructive-such as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness faithfulness, gentleness and self control—you are, in fact, practicing godfiness, or imitating God (Gal. 5:24-25; Col. 1:10; Eph. 5:1).

If we practice thirlgs that are not good in our daily lives, we will become increasingly evil, by nature. By continually practicing evil

behavior, we become more like Satan, our earthly father (John 8:41, 44). But if we practice daily what is right, good, honorable, uplifting and pleasing in the sight of our heavenly Father, we will become more like our Father in heaven (1 John 3: 7-10). We will be living holy lives instead of unholy lives. We become what we are practicing to become perfect (Matt. 5:48; 1 Peter 5:10).

We are, by nature, sinners. God wants us to allow Him to change our nature to one of a saint. In order to do that, we must practice living saintly lives by changing our thoughts to godly thoughts.

How many of us would want to see violence done to our children? Yet, we watch violence being done to other people's children on television and vicariously enjoy it. If we didn't enjoy it, we wouldn't continue to watch it day after day. Don't be fooled. What you see with your eyes and hear with your ears affects how you think with your mind (Prov. 24:12, 29; 12:14). We are not to look at what is evil-violence murder, rape, etc. (Psalm 34:13-14; 1 Peter 3:10-11). That includes any sport that is violent or anticipates violence. Anyone who loves violence is hated by God (Psalm 11:5).

So let's clean up what goes into our minds and guard those doors carefully, for what is in our minds has a lot to do with the condition of our hearts and what comes out of our mouths. "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good repute, think on these things" (Phil. 4:8).



"The conditions were absolutely horrible." Munson said the scores were poor overall, and that it was a little disappointing to start the season on a down note."



Fifth graders study water

fifth graders at the Wayne Middle School have become more familiar with one of the earth's most precious resources: water.

They have been involved in the "What's in Our Water" unit developed by the National Geographic Kids Network. The unit has not only been educational and fun but has given the students opportunities to be "scientists" using the many hand's on activities and the built in telecommunications program.

The unit began with activities which allowed the students to realize an appreciation for water and how much they use it throughout awareness with hands-on activities which included a watershed demonstration followed by an experiment which explored the definition of "pollutant." They set up an experiment which allowed them to explore the trade-offs between beneficial effects of a substance and the potentially harmful effects of that substance on water quality.

This particular experiment concluded later in the unit when the student scientists used nitrate test

trates in runoff from containers holding previously planted grass seed. They then tested the school's tap water and water from private wells. They were happy to find the water they were drinking is free of any nitrate contamination!

Throughout the unit, the Wayne fifth grade scientists communicated with other student scientists from

across the nation and Canada. The program allowed them to send and pick up letters and data from students who were part of the team called Brazos 3. They sent their global location, testing data and letters concerning their water situa-tion and usage. Other teammates in turn sent the same information about them. The Wayne students also communicated with the network to receive information about the entire network. All of these was accomplished through the use of the computer and modem.

The study was supplemented with speakers, the "Water Riches"

Jeff Brady, an employee of the City of Wayne, answered questions during a class period to help students learn more about Wayne's water situation. Dan Zulkosky, a

hydrologist for Northeast Nebraska. gave a presentation on some of specifics of water testing and treat-ment. The "Water Riches" unit gave students a great deal of infor-mation through the use of individual teaching newspapers and video programs which related specifically to Nebraska. Mindy Lutt brought the unit to the scho

The "What's in Our Water" unit concluded with a letter from the school's unit scientist relaying data on the entire network. Students made comparisons of these results with our team's data. Finally, students wrote individual letters to teammates and hope to develop

some lasting pen pals.

Teachers issued a "thank you" to the parents for their help and interest throughout the unit and to Fauncil Bennett for sharing her computer expertise and time teaching how to effective use the program. They also thanked Principal Dick Metteer for bringing this unit to their attention initially and for running after materials needed for





More and more businesses are beginning to see that their competitive edge and profitability is based on their treatment of customers. Study after-study has confirmed that repeat business is profitable business. People go back repeatedly where they are treated well.
