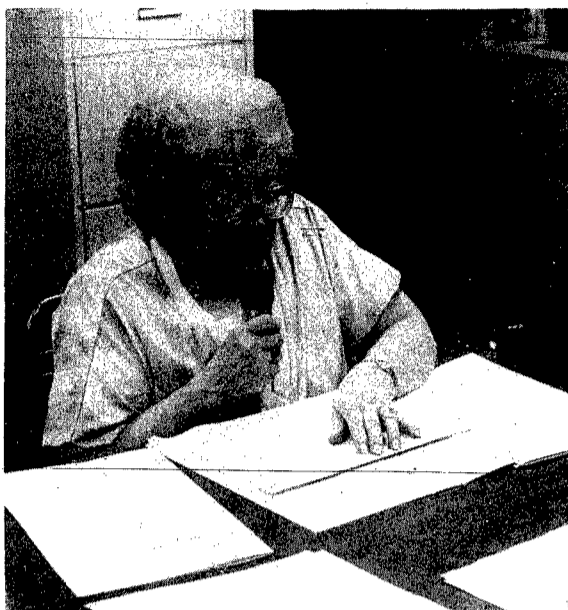

Groundwork is laid for school bond vote

The initial procedural groundwork was laid Tuesday for what could be a \$9 million bond issue vote in Wayne this fall. The Wayne School Board began consideration of the bond issue request to allow construction of a new Middle School and addition to the High School.

Promising more serious discussion at next month's board meeting, President Sid Hillier said there was still much to do before the official call for the bond issue, but the board and audience received a report from the citizen study committee which has spent several months preparing a building plan to propose to the board. They also heard from a school financing specialist with Kirkpatrick Pettis, a firm that helps school districts prepare bond issue proposals and sell them to voters.

THE COMMITTEE recommended that the district construct a three level addition onto the present high school building that would more than triple its size in square footage.

The proposed addition and high school remodeling would include one wing with two levels for Middle School classroom space, four additional classrooms for the high school, a new 700-seat auditorium, a second gym and set of locker rooms, new dining facilities, a renovated and enlarged music education area and new administrative offices.

Curt Frye, who presented the citizen committee's report to the board said the proposed building plan was determined to be "the most realistic in terms of tax saving to the district." He said the district would get more square footage and be able to address more of the building needs for the least cost by building the Middle School connected to the High School with both facilities sharing space.

THE PROPOSAL CALLS for the separate High School and Middle School entrances but the connection of the buildings would allow scheduling of different age levels of students in the same music room throughout the day. Other shared facilities in the proposal would be the dining and kitchen area, gym facilities, art room, auditorium and more.

thrive without me," he said. But he encouraged all the remaining candidates to put themselves on the line on all the issues including the district's building needs, administration and personnel policies.

"I'm not going to run and hide," he said. The low voter turnout and the fact that he did not personally campaign played a role in his defeat, he said. Peterson has been one of the leaders in the Nebraska Association of School Boards, serving several years on the legislative committee for the state group.

HE DREW PRAISE from fellow board member Will Davis, the leading vote getter. Davis said he thought all the incumbents and opposition candidates would be in a group at either the top or the bottom. "I can't understand it," he said, "I figured it was sink or swim."

Davis said he thought both Peterson and fellow incumbent Dr. Ken Liska did more work on the board and were better board members than he was. "People don't know how hard they work for the kids," said Davis, who decried some of the tactics used by the opposition group.

He said he received calls the day before the election from voters in Carroll who were upset by the claim that school board was considering closing Carroll School. He said he tried to assure them that there were no such plans, but he is sure some voters believed what they were told by the opposition candidates.

"I'm afraid for what's going to happen in the future," he said.

younger students in their own units, but the cost savings over building two separate facilities would be substantial, said school superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen.

He showed a set of floor plans for the sprawling complex that would see the new building attached to the south side of the present high school. Because of building limitations at the present Middle School and the district's practice of sharing faculty between the schools, several middle school class and activities are already scheduled in the high school building and students shuttle between the two facilities.

FRYE SAID THE proposed construction plan was the unanimous recommendation of the citizen committee which rejected other options such as remodeling the existing middle school building or building a new high school and remodeling the existing high school as a middle school.

Jensen said it would have cost over \$8 million to remodel the existing middle school building and that would not have addressed the problems at the high school. Construction of a separate building and remodeling of

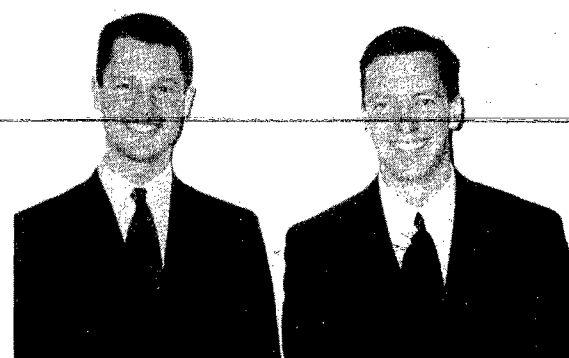
the existing high school would have cost upwards of \$14 million, said Jensen.

The committee also recommended that the school board adopt as phase II of the district building plans upgrading both the Carroll and West Elementary buildings utilizing district sinking fund revenues.

DARWIN REIDER an executive with the school financial advising firm of Kirkpatrick Pettis of Omaha said his firm was the leading school bond issue advisor in the state and was recently successful in helping Pierce win voter approval for a \$6.2 million school bond issue.

He said the Wayne District has no current bonding limitations because it has no debt and its financial condition appears excellent. His firm's fee of 1.5 to 1.9 percent of the bond issue would only be paid if the vote is successful, he said.

Reider said the district only needed from 6 to 8 weeks to campaign for the proposal before the anticipated November election, thus there would be time during the summer to solidify the plans.

At Wayne State, Brohimer will also serve as a resident assistant in the Berry Hall dormitory in the fall.

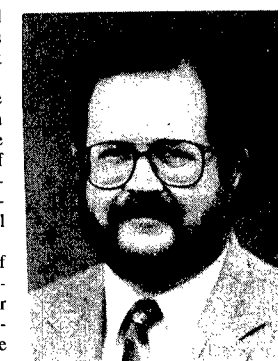
Kucera named director of development center

teaching experience and 20 years of experience as a heavy equipment operator and manager.

The other incumbent commissioner, Merlin Beiermann, serving district one, won the Republican nomination over two challengers,

Dean Boeckenbauer and Kelvin Wurdeman, who is a Highway Department employee in Beiermann's district.

Beiermann has been a commissioner for five terms and faces no Democrat opposition in November.

All other county official races were unopposed.

of the tax revenues.

The sales tax is projected to raise approximately \$400,000 per year in Wayne.

Salitros said the sewer work is scheduled first (in 1995) because it needs to be completed before the widening of Logan Street which needs to be done before the state highway project to widen Highway 35 through Wayne. That work is anticipated to begin in 1997.

SALITROS SAID it was likely the library and senior center bids could be let in the winter of 1995-96 with construction to begin that spring. He said it would be at least a seven-month construction project with a chance for the move-in date still in 1996.

Gross said the two year time frame works well for the private funding campaign as well, since much of the fund raising will be in the form of pledges which will not be fully collected until after construction be-

gins. The site for the new library and senior center has already been designated on the southwest corner of 5th and Logan with the facility and its parking area to replace three houses on Logan.

Gross said the library foundation would be exercising options it had signed earlier on the properties in question.

He said the new facility will be a showcase for the community and something everyone can take pride in.

School's financial health good entering into 1994-95 budget

Entering into the school budget preparation process for the 1994-95 school year, the Wayne School board was told the district's financial health was pretty good Tuesday night.

With 25 percent of the current school year remaining, the district has 35 percent of its budget left to spend.

"We will have a balance left," Superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen said. He said it was important under state budgeting restrictions to finish the year with a positive balance. He said some of the current balance would be used to purchase supplies and equipment this summer for the next school year.

He said because of the district's fiscal constraints the state has set its spending lid ceiling at 4.8 percent of this year's budget for next year. The customary lid is 4 percent.

Jensen said the district's average cost per pupil is well below the average for other schools our size in

the state.

"The sum and substance of that is we're really doing the property taxpayer a favor," said school board member Ken Liska.

Jensen said the district may have to consider adding a middle school teaching position next year because the incoming 6th grade class could be over 80 students when school resumes. With only three teachers now, the class sizes would be very large for that size group, Middle School Principal Dick Metteer reported.

Addition of another teaching position would cost as much as \$34,000 extra next year said Jensen.

The school board will be preparing the budget throughout the summer. The exact level of state aid for the coming year will not be known until midsummer, Jensen said.

In other business, the board approved the offering of a teaching contract for next year to John

Murtaugh, who will be returning to the Wayne district as High School Social Studies and Middle School P.E. teacher after a year of teaching in an Iowa School system. Murtaugh will resume his responsibilities as head wrestling coach and will join the football coaching staff.

"We're happy that he has decided to come back," said Jensen.

The board also approved the application for a grant from the Gardner Foundation to fund a student entrepreneurial program and computer assisted manufacturing equipment. Under the proposal, the students would design, produce, market and manage the business of selling a specific component part to a local manufacturer. The program should involve about 25 students in the high school.

The board also accepted a land transfer of 240 acres from District 57 to the Wayne Community School District. The transfer petition was filed by Florence Meyer.

Athletic banquet slated for Tuesday night at WSC

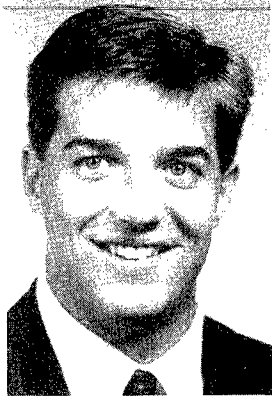

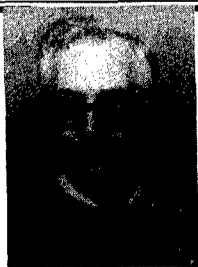

Appreciation for the entire hos-

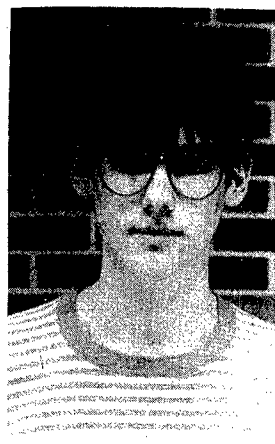
pital staff is shown, as it takes the entire team of dedicated individuals to provide the best care possible for our patients.
