County zoning still several months off

It is still several months down the road before Wayne County will be ready to adopt land use planning and zoning regulations throughout the

county.

At its first meeting since March, the County Joint Planning Commission reorganized Thursday night under its new structure which includes a joint agreement between the county and the three villages Carroll, Winside and Hoskins to share the function of implementing zoning regulations for all.

The new board, made up of most of the same members who have been working nearly four years to develop land use guidelines for the county, reviewed a draft of the comprehensive plan Thursday. The plan, which should be scheduled for a public hearing in August, is the pre-cursor to the zoning and subdivision regulations which would not be drafted until after the plan is approved by the County Commissioners and the separate village boards. extensive review of the planning document when it meets next month on July 20 at 8 p.m. at the County Courthouse.

Main issues facing the county and its villages now involve uncontrolled spread of residential and sometimes commercial development into agricultural areas.

Tim Keelan, with the consulting firm of Hanna-Keelan Associates of Lincoln, has helped the commission draw up the draft of the comprehensive plan and he told the commis-sioners Thursday the county is made up of "good towns with a good, solid community sense." He said now is a good time for the county and its towns to take advantage of the available housing opportunities.

He said regulations should be drafted to maintain agricultural land use in the rural areas of the county. He said the zoning regulations and the plan for the county should be to discourage commercial and industrial development outside the planning jurisdiction of the city and vil-

Additionally, he said residential

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
protect her from the harrassment.

Rise in abuse reports attributed to O.J.

Vicki Meyer is surprised by the number of people she has under her care at Haven House, a crisis intervention center in Wayne that offers counseling and other services to

abuse victims.
Meyer has a full house. "The last five days have been crazy. It's rare that this happens,"

she said Wednesday.

Meyer isn't sure why there are so. people seeking help. But many around Nebraska, women claiming they have been battered by their spouses, ex-spouses and boyfriends are making more calls for help to crisis intervention centers follow ing the violent death of Nicole Brown

Nationally, hot lines for abused

women have been swamped since the June 12 slayings of Mrs. Simpson and Ronald Goldman. Former football great O.J. Simpson has pleaded innocent to double murder charges and remains held without bond.

"I don't know if it's because of Simpson. We always see a bigger caseload in the summer, because it's easier to flee, I guess, but I don't know if it's all Simpson," Meyer

The house offers counseling, shelter and other services to six northeast Nebraska counties. Support groups at the house have been packed over the last 10 days, Meyer said.

Marcee Metzger, coordinator of the Rape/Spouse Abuse Crisis Ce ter in Lincoln, said hot line calls have increased since Mrs. Simpson's death. She did not have specific

Rosella Orosco, director of the Domestic Violence Hot Line in Gordon, said the number of calls on domestic violence and sexual assault issues is up for June. Is it because of the Simpson case?

"It's hard to say. We do have a large number this month, but that might not be the reason," Orosco

The 24-hour line, which serves Sheridan and Dawes counties in northwest Nebraska, has had 70 calls so far this month compared with about 40 in a light month, she said.

Officials at the Omaha YWCA, which sponsors a 24-hour domestic violence and sexual assault crisis hot line, did not immediately have information on the number of telephone calls to the line since Simpson

Karen Eckery, community educator at the Lincoln center, said she hopes the Simpson tragedy will help

people confront domestic violence.

"There are a lot of people dealing with the same issues, they just don't reach headline proportions," Eckery

Metzger said many women believe police do not take their com-plaints seriously, so they don't report abuse. Parents, clergy or neighbors tell them to work things out or

that they are overreacting, she said. Kit Boesch, director of Lancaster County Human Services and a memher of the county's Domestic Violence Coalition Committee, said the area must make adjustments to bet-



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

Women's health forum discuss breast cancer

Breast cancer is the number two killer of women. One of nine women will get it during her life-time." This is the message women who attended the Women's Health-Forum Tues, were given.

Sponsored by Providence Medical Center, the forum dealt with the issues of breast self examination. mammograms and options open to women who discover they have

Speakers for the event were Dr. Stephanie Miske, radiologist at Radiology and Nuclear Medicine in Omaha and Kathy Schultz, Physician's Assistant at Midwest OBGYN Clinic in Norfolk.

APPROXIMATELY 70 women learned of proper procedures involved with getting a mammogram, what radiologists look for when reading the mammograms and what can be done if cancer is found

Miske stressed the fact that no one is immune to getting cancer. By far, the greatest risk of your

are women. It is important you be aware of what is happening with your body and report any changes to

your physician."
"More than 75 percent of all breast-cancers are found by women during breast self-exams. The fiveear survival rate for these women is 60 percent. A mammogram can detect the cancer two to four years before it can be felt," Miske said.

To ensure a quality mammogram, Miske urges women to be sure the mamogram is done on a certified machine that used only for this purpose, have the procedure done by a registered technologist and have the results interpreted by a board certified doctor.

PLEASANT DALE, Neb. (AP) --Ken Downey is a man on a mission and on horseback.

Since March 21, the evangelist from Bemidji, Minn., has been atop. Jeremiah, a 7-year-old quarterhorse He started near Philadelphia and hopes to reach Seattle, Wash, about

With a saddlebag of Bible literature, a few clothes and little else, he is living the life of a 19th Century circuit-rider preacher.

On Tuesday, Downey spent the night with Ron and Carol Koch near Pleasant Dale, a Seward County community west of Lincoln.

He's crossing the state 20 to 25 miles at a time, spending the night with people like the Kochs. That's just like circuit riders of yore.

He expects to be in Scottsbluff on July 9. He'll take a week off to spend time with his wife Carolyn and give Jeremiah a rest.

The horse is named after the bib-lical prophet, Jeremiah. "He was the weeping prophet who carried a genuine concern for his country, Downey said.

"Our country has experienced a moral slide for some time now," he said. "I talk about our need to return to the Christian ways of our forefathers."

Downey said the idea for his journey didn't just come from his desire to commemorate the circuit-rider

preachers. Instead, he said, it came out of his desire to persuade people - especially youth -- to return to the morality of the nation's founding

"I look at my five children, and seven grandchildren and wonder what kind of a world I'll leave for hem," he said.

Downey cites quotations from presidents, philosophers and the Bible. He quotes presidents from George Washington to Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln to Teddy Roosevelt.

After riding through snow storms in Pennsylvania, thunderstorms in Indiana and Iowa and hot afternoons across the Plains, he said he misses time to visit.
"I'm kinda in the sling all the

time, looking for opportunities to visit with anyone," he said:

He recalls that he rode past a bar a few states ago and a man out in front hollered something at him.

"I don't know what he said, but I rode my horse back on the sidewalk and talked to the whole crowd that poured outta the place. I gave them some tracts and they took them inside the bar, just where they needed to be seen and read," Downey said.

After riding at least 12 hours a day, he usually stays with families. who volunteer a bed, dinner and breakfast.
