Harrassment alleged

Former Wayne Area Chamber of Commerce Administrative Assistant Nancy Schulz has filed a civil law suit against the Wayne Chamber of Commerce, Wayne Industries, Inc. and Kenneth A. Berglund of Wayne alleging sexual harrassment.

Her suit, filed by attorney Mark Johnson of Norfolk alleges that Berglund committed sexual assault, intentional infliction of emotional distress and invasion of privacy. She also claims her employers, Wayne Chamber of Commerce and Wayne Industries, Inc. failed to

protect her from the harrassment.

Schulz filed the suit on Tuesday in district court in Wayne.

Schulz cited seven different occasions dating back to February of 1993 where she was allegedly harassed or assaulted.

In May Schulz resigned her position as administrative assistant to accept another position in Wayne. She was a finalist for the job of executive vice president of the Wayne Chamber but a selection committee which included Berglund awarded the post to John Farnan in March.

County zoning still several months off

It is still several months down the road before Wayne County will be ready to adopt land use planning and zoning regulations throughout the county.

At its first meeting since March, the County Joint Planning Commission reorganized Thursday night under its new structure which includes a joint agreement between the county and the three villages Carroll, Winside and Hoskins to

share the function of implementing zoning regulations for all.

The new board, made up of most of the same members who have been working nearly four years to develop land use guidelines for the county, reviewed a draft of the comprehensive plan Thursday. The plan, which should be scheduled for a public hearing in August, is the precursor to the zoning and subdivision regulations which would not be drafted until after the plan is approved by the County Commissioners and the separate village boards.

The commission is planning more extensive review of the planning document when it meets next month on July 20 at 8 p.m. at the County Courthouse.

Main issues facing the county and its villages now involve uncontrolled spread of residential and sometimes commercial development into agricultural areas.

Tim Keelan, with the consulting firm of Hanna-Keelan Associates of Lincoln, has helped the commission draw up the draft of the comprehensive plan and he told the commissioners Thursday the county is made up of "good towns with a good, solid community sense." He said now is a good time for the county and its towns to take advantage of the available housing opportunities.

He said regulations should be drafted to maintain agricultural land use in the rural areas of the county. He said the zoning regulations and the plan for the county should be to discourage commercial and industrial development outside the planning jurisdiction of the city and villages.

Additionally, he said residential

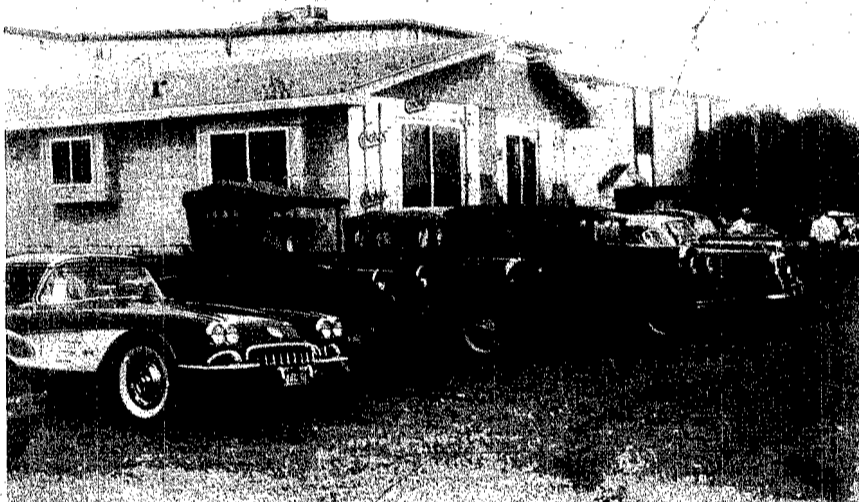

Rise in abuse reports attributed to O.J.

Vicki Meyer is surprised by the number of people she has under her care at Haven House, a crisis intervention center in Wayne that offers counseling and other services to abuse victims.

Meyer has a full house. "The last five days have been crazy. It's rare that this happens," she said Wednesday.

Meyer isn't sure why there are so many people seeking help. But around Nebraska, women claiming they have been battered by their spouses, ex-spouses and boyfriends are making more calls for help to crisis intervention centers following the violent death of Nicole Brown Simpson.

Nationally, hot lines for abused

women have been swamped since the June 12 slayings of Mrs. Simpson and Ronald Goldman. Former football great O.J. Simpson has pleaded innocent to double murder charges and remains held without bond.

"I don't know if it's because of Simpson. We always see a bigger caseload in the summer, because it's easier to flee, I guess, but I don't know if it's all Simpson," Meyer said.

The house offers counseling, shelter and other services to six northeast Nebraska counties. Support groups at the house have been packed over the last 10 days, Meyer said.

Marcee Metzger, coordinator of the Rape/Spouse Abuse Crisis Center in Lincoln, said hot line calls have increased since Mrs. Simpson's death. She did not have specific

numbers.

Rosella Orosco, director of the Domestic Violence Hot Line in Gordon, said the number of calls on domestic violence and sexual assault issues is up for June. Is it because of the Simpson case?

"It's hard to say. We do have a large number this month, but that might not be the reason," Orosco said.

The 24-hour line, which serves Sheridan and Dawes counties in northwest Nebraska, has had 70 calls so far this month compared with about 40 in a light month, she said.

Officials at the Omaha YWCA, which sponsors a 24-hour domestic violence and sexual assault crisis hot line, did not immediately have information on the number of telephone calls to the line since Simpson

case began.

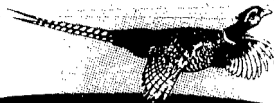
Karen Eckery, community educator at the Lincoln center, said she hopes the Simpson tragedy will help people confront domestic violence.

"There are a lot of people dealing with the same issues, they just don't reach headline proportions," Eckery said.

Metzger said many women believe police do not take their complaints seriously, so they don't report abuse. Parents, clergy or neighbors tell them to work things out or that they are overreacting, she said.

Kit Boesch, director of Lancaster County Human Services and a member of the county's Domestic Violence Coalition Committee, said the area must make adjustments to bet-

Women's health forum discuss breast cancer

"Breast cancer is the number two killer of women. One of nine women will get it during her lifetime." This is the message women who attended the Women's Health Forum Tues. were given.

Sponsored by Providence Medical Center, the forum dealt with the issues of breast self examination, mammograms and options open to women who discover they have cancer.

Speakers for the event were Dr. Stephanie Miske, radiologist at Radiology and Nuclear Medicine in Omaha and Kathy Schultz, Physician's Assistant at Midwest OBGYN Clinic in Norfolk.

APPROXIMATELY 70 women learned of proper procedures involved with getting a mammogram, what radiologists look for when reading the mammograms and what can be done if cancer is found.

Miske stressed the fact that no one is immune to getting cancer. "By far, the greatest risk of your

getting cancer is the fact that you are women. It is important you be aware of what is happening with your body and report any changes to your physician."

"More than 75 percent of all breast cancers are found by women during breast self-exams. The five-year survival rate for these women is 60 percent. A mammogram can detect the cancer two to four years before it can be felt," Miske said.

TO PROTECT themselves, Miske recommended women follow three steps: monthly self-examination, yearly physicals and mammograms at regularly scheduled intervals depending upon her age.

To ensure a quality mammogram, Miske urges women to be sure the mamogram is done on a certified machine that used only for this purpose, have the procedure done by a registered technologist and have the results interpreted by a board certified doctor.

"As important as any of these recommendations is knowing when and where your last mammogram

was done. We need to compare results of past tests with recent ones to determine what is 'normal' for

you," Miske said. Schultz spoke on the importance of breast self-examination. "We

hear all the time, 'I do self exams, but I don't know if I'm doing it right'. There is no 'right' or 'wrong'.

The important thing is to note any changes in your breast," she said.

"MOST OF THE lumps women detect are non-cancerous but need to be checked out through a mammogram and various other tests available. Even if cancer is found, it is important to take time to find out what options are available. Do not make any snap decisions."

Schultz concluded by saying that a breast self-exam "takes approximately 10 minutes a month and could save a your life".

Staff at Providence Medical Center who were in charge of the event hope to see it become an annual event. "We were very pleased with the turnout at this year's forum," said Ann Lempka, a radiologist at PMC.

ter hold those suspected of domestic violence.

"Compared with other jurisdictions in the country our fines and incarceration times are minimal," she said. "We don't have a holding period, like other jurisdictions either."

A holding period would allow victims to make arrangements to find safety while the abuser is in jail, Boesch said.

The Omaha Chapter of the National Organization for Women held a candlelight vigil Thursday at Omaha police headquarters for Nebraska's victims of domestic violence.

NOW members want Omaha police to begin enforcing laws that say an arrest will be made if an officer finds evidence of domestic abuse.

The group says that too often, no arrest is made in spite of clear evidence that a woman has been beaten. In addition, NOW says battered women are not encouraged to press charges.

Jail and Bail raises funds for March of Dimes

subdivisions should be discouraged outside the established communities.

"I believe in the preservation of agricultural land," he said adding that other issues such as water supply, traffic and sewage handling make it more practical to keep residential, commercial and industrial developments in the communities which are established to handle them

and not out in a remote part of the county.

"Sooner or later you are going to have to settle the issue of minimum lot size in the county," he said. This regulation could help stop the spread of non-agricultural residential developments, he added. He said that would be an issue in the zoning regulations, which he hoped could be adopted this fall.

Keelan also issued a plea to the commissioners to forward some of

the pay on his \$11,100 contract with the county. When negotiated 2 years ago, the agreement was that his firm would get 25 percent of the contract up front and the balance when the process was finished. At that time the completion was expected to be from 1 year to 15 months.

Keelan said because of the delays, much of them prompted by the decision to change from a county planning commission to at Joint Planning Commission to include repre-

Preaching on horseback

PLEASANT DALE, Neb. (AP) -- Ken Downey is a man on a mission ... and on horseback.

Since March 21, the evangelist from Bemidji, Minn., has been atop Jeremiah, a 7-year-old quarterhorse. He started near Philadelphia and hopes to reach Seattle, Wash., about Oct. 20.

With a saddlebag of Bible literature, a few clothes and little else, he is living the life of a 19th Century circuit-rider preacher.

On Tuesday, Downey spent the night with Ron and Carol Koch near Pleasant Dale, a Seward County community west of Lincoln.

He's crossing the state 20 to 25 miles at a time, spending the night with people like the Kochs. That's just like circuit riders of yore.

He expects to be in Scottsbluff on July 9. He'll take a week off to spend time with his wife Carolyn and give Jeremiah a rest.

The horse is named after the biblical prophet, Jeremiah. "He was the weeping prophet who carried a genuine concern for his country," Downey said.

"Our country has experienced a moral slide for some time now," he said. "I talk about our need to return to the Christian ways of our forefathers."

Downey said the idea for his journey didn't just come from his desire to commemorate the circuit-rider

preachers. Instead, he said, it came out of his desire to persuade people -- especially youth -- to return to the morality of the nation's founding years.

"I look at my five children, and seven grandchildren and wonder what kind of a world I'll leave for them," he said.

Downey cites quotations from presidents, philosophers and the Bible. He quotes presidents from George Washington to Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln to Teddy Roosevelt.

After riding through snow storms in Pennsylvania, thunderstorms in Indiana and Iowa and hot afternoons across the Plains, he said he misses time to visit.

"I'm kinda in the sling all the time, looking for opportunities to visit with anyone," he said.

He recalls that he rode past a bar a few states ago and a man out in front hollered something at him.

"I don't know what he said, but I rode my horse back on the sidewalk and talked to the whole crowd that poured outta the place. I gave them some tracts and they took them inside the bar, just where they needed to be seen and read," Downey said.

After riding at least 12 hours a day, he usually stays with families, who volunteer a bed, dinner and breakfast.



LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) -- A group appointed by the governor says residential property should be valued at 90 percent to 100 percent of market price for tax purposes.

The state should adjust counties outside that range to 95 percent, members of the Real Estate Assessment Review task force recommended.

State Revenue Department statistics show that 12 counties had aggregate assessments-to-market-value ratios of 95 percent or greater, and another 19 fell between 90 and 95 percent.

But 61, including Wayne, counties came up shy of 90 percent, including 17 below 80 percent, with six of those at 75 percent or less.

The only member to dissent was Assessor Frank Bemis of Douglas County, where the state says residential property is valued at 79 percent of market value.

Bemis suggested a 90 percent value target, with a range of 10 percent either way. That would make

Douglas County's rate 1 percent outside the range.

Bemis also complained that the state gave counties short notice about raising property valuations.

One month before tax notices were to be mailed, the Department of Revenue said it wanted residential valuations raised to 95 percent of market value. Bemis said 1993 -- with its quickly escalating home prices -- was a bad time to switch to a one-year base for computing ratios.

Assessor Lila Gottula of Nemaha County said the order to raise valuations was just "dropped" on the counties.

Some task force members concurred with Bemis' concerns, but Scotts Bluff County Commissioner Clinton Morrison indicated he wanted to be sure Douglas County is not exempted from raising valuations.

Taxpayers in his county are saying, "You'd better make sure that Douglas County doesn't get away with it again," Morrison said.
