# 10,000 will be in motion for 14th Chicken Show

At a ratio of more than 100 humans for every chicken in attendance, the 14th annual Wayne Chicken Show activities kick off today, which is Henoween (All Hen's

More than 10,000 people and fewer than 100 live chickens (not counting the 2,000 that will be barbecued) will be partici-pating in the festivities predicts Jane O'Leary; known unofficially as chairhen of the show

Sponsored by the Wayne Regional Arts Council, the show started in 1980 as a regional arts show centered around a chicken or folk art theme. The first year it attracted a few hundred participants. However, the show, quickly evolved into a major attraction when it attracted national pub-licity and zany events were added like the National Cluck-Off, the Chicken Song Contest and Most Beautiful Beak Contest.

The highlight of the Saturday festivities will be the annual parade which begins at 11 a.m. Most of the Chicken Show activities center

while quiet neighborhood bounded by Tenth and Douglas Streets.

Kathy Varley, parade chairhen and member of the Chicken Show committee, reports that more entries than ever before have preregistered for this year's parade. Alleged members of the famed "Chickendales" male dance team have indicated that this may be the last year the group will appear in the parade. Age and the press of fans (or fats) were cited as reasons for retirement of the popular group.

Meanwhile, in the days leading

up to the Chicken Show, Sasquawk, the big foot chicken of local legend, whose statue stands at the corner of Second and Main during the Chicken Show season, has been living up to the 1994 theme, Poultry in Motion. One morning last week a family on Providence Road awoke to find the big bird staring at them through their living room window.

Police are still searching for the possible chicken thieves but some point to the chicken tracks along Main Street as evidence that the

legendary big bird comes to life at night, breaks his fetters and wanders

Mrs. O'Leary and others associated with the show have been interviewed on radio talk shows all over the country and the events have been covered many times over the years by national media outlets.

The activities are funded predominantly through the sale of special commemorative t-shirts which depict the theme each year. Valuable is the collection of all 14 of the tshirts, said Mrs. O'Leary. In the first year only about 300 were sold. This year the number is likely to top

Mrs. O'Leary said one reason the Chicken Show is so popular is because, "the idea is so preposterous." She said the committee members and participants have so much fun the show is self-perpetuating. New events and activities are added each year she added.

Chicken arts and crafts will be on display at Bressler Park as will the few chickens that show up for the



Longtime Wayne State College housemother, Roberta "Mom" Welte, 75, of Wayne died Thursday afternoon (July 7) in her Wayne apartment following a 13-month hout with cancer.

Mrs. Welte, known as "Mom" to thousands of Wayne State College alumni, spent 23 years in WSC dormitories, primarily in Morey Hall.

When she retired in 1989, Mrs. Welte estimated that over the years she was a mother to 3,700 students who resided in residence halls that she supervised as a housemother.

Countless graduates have continued to remark on the profound influence Mom Welte had on their lives," said Dr. Donald J. Mash, president of Wayne State College. "She was a very special

person who will be missed by the entire Wayne State College community. Our sympathy goes out to her family, the students who have remained close to her, and Mom's many friends in the

community Mrs. Welte was scheduled to receive the WSC "Distinguished Service Award", the highest award that can be bestowed by the college,

during summer commencement ceremonics in August. The Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges is scheduled to give its approval of the recognition during board meeting tomorrow morning.

College officials say Mrs. Welte will be recognized posthumously

mile stretch on Highway 35 east of Hoskins will be done which includes grading, reconstruction of culverts and bridges/viaducts, resurfacing of the highway and hard surfacing of the shoulders. The cost of this projected is estimated at 7.9 million dollars.

All of the plans for the next five years involve Highway 35. An 8.5 mile stretch west of Wayne on 35 will include grading, resurfacing, hard surfacing of the shoulders and restructuring of culverts, bridges/viaducts at an estimated cost of 3.3 million dollars.

A 7.6 mile stretch east of Wayne on 35 will be graded, resurfaced with restructuring of culverts, bridges/viaducts and hard surfacing of shoulders for an estimated cost of 4.5 million dollars and a 4.2 mile stretch north of Winside on Highway 35 is expected to be done with the same improvements with a cost involvement near the two million dollar mark.

The fifth improvement will take lace in Wayne on Highway 35 The 4.6 million dollar project willbegin on the west side of Wayne by the fairgrounds and proceed to the Logan Street Bridge on the east side of town.

The work proposed for this improvement includes: construction of a new three-lane roadway with the center line providing for two-way

left turns; curb and gutter along with this new three-lane roadway; a new drainage system; minor grading at the intersections; retaining walls and sidewalks to be built where needed; utilities to be relocated as necessary; some driveways may be closed or rebuilt; realignment of

some city streets may be necessary.

Wayne Superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen, said many programs and curriculum requirements have been added to the schools, mostly through government mandates, since the high school was built in 1968 and that those requirements made additional space necessary.

The plans call for a total of 161,000 square feet of total space for the high school and middle school. The two buildings currently cover 123,000 square feet. The bulk of the 41,000 additional square footage would be in the proposed 700-seat auditorium.

The high school currently has

69,000 square feet.
Architect Jim Dyck told the audience the district could build a cheaper building, but it would end up cost-

ing more in the long run.
"If you build a cheap building for

kids you're going to pay forever," he said. He gave an example with doors. He said inexpensive doors and frames on a school building could save thousands in initial construction costs.

"But," he said, "kids don't walk through doors, they explode through them." He said it is not cost effective to cheapen the first cost of the build-

The first priorities that went into formulating the plans presented by the committee were established to address safety code and Americans With Disabilities Act violations, said Dyck. Other priorities were curriculum needs he said.

The concerns and comments made at Tuesday's public hearing were taken to the Thursday school board meeting where the board members began the discussion of plans and a possible bond issue vote
