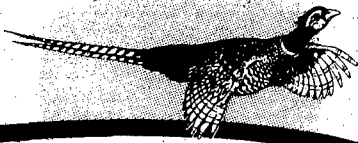

10,000 will be in motion for 14th Chicken Show

At a ratio of more than 100 humans for every chicken in attendance, the 14th annual Wayne Chicken Show activities kick off today, which is Henoween (All Hen's Eve).

More than 10,000 people and fewer than 100 live chickens (not counting the 2,000 that will be barbecued) will be participating in the festivities predicts Jane O'Leary, known unofficially as chairhen of the show.

Sponsored by the Wayne Regional Arts Council, the show started in 1980 as a regional arts show centered around a chicken or folk art theme. The first year it attracted a few hundred participants. However, the show, quickly evolved into a major attraction when it attracted national publicity and many events were added like the National Cluck-Off, the Chicken Song Contest and Most Beautiful Beak Contest.

The highlight of the Saturday festivities will be the annual parade which begins at 11 a.m. Most of the Chicken Show activities center

around Bressler Park in the erstwhile quiet neighborhood bounded by Tenth and Douglas Streets.

Kathy Varley, parade chairhen and member of the Chicken Show committee, reports that more entries than ever before have preregistered for this year's parade. Alleged members of the famed "Chickendales" male dance team have indicated that this may be the last year the group will appear in the parade. Age and the press of fans (or fads) were cited as reasons for retirement of the popular group.

Meanwhile, in the days leading up to the Chicken Show, Sasquawk, the big foot chicken of local legend, whose statue stands at the corner of Second and Main during the Chicken Show season, has been living up to the 1994 theme, Poultry in Motion. One morning last week a family on Providence Road awoke to find the big bird staring at them through their living room window.

Police are still searching for the possible chicken thieves but some point to the chicken tracks along Main Street as evidence that the

legendary big bird comes to life at night, breaks his fetters and wanders around.

Mrs. O'Leary and others associated with the show have been interviewed on radio talk shows all over the country and the events have been covered many times over the years by national media outlets.

The activities are funded predominantly through the sale of special commemorative t-shirts which depict the theme each year. Valuable is the collection of all 14 of the t-shirts, said Mrs. O'Leary. In the first year only about 300 were sold. This year the number is likely to top 2,000.

Mrs. O'Leary said one reason the Chicken Show is so popular is because, "the idea is so preposterous." She said the committee members and participants have so much fun the show is self-perpetuating. New events and activities are added each year she added.

Chicken arts and crafts will be on display at Bressler Park as will the few chickens that show up for the

Board discusses building options

The Wayne School District would save over \$100,000 per year in operating costs if the Carroll Elementary School were closed and its 50 students were bused to Wayne and absorbed into the Wayne Elementary School.

The school board is not close to making such a controversial decision, but the subject was discussed as part of the building and bond issue plans for the schools at the special board meeting Thursday night.

THE SAVINGS in annual operating costs would come from the elimination of four teachers as well as operating costs. The board was told school administrators believe the Carroll students could fit into the Wayne school without the need for additional staffing or space and

there would be no class with more than 25 students.

Closure of the Carroll School would also eliminate the repair or replacement costs on the building, which are estimated to be from \$250,000 to bring it up to Americans with Disabilities Act Standards

to \$1.2 million for a new masonry building and multipurpose room.

It was clear the school board members Thursday were hesitant to even suggest the move as part of the effort to address all the building needs of the district and the Carroll closure option was only one of the options discussed.

ONE OF THE arguments mentioned at the school board meeting against such a move was the growth potential of both Wayne and Carroll communities and the need for additional classroom space if that should happen.

The school board will be meeting again Tuesday night and hopes to see drawings and additional cost estimates of plans for repair or re-

Carroll Elementary and Wayne Elementary Schools and encouraged the board to include them in the package.

The needs of those structures should be taken care of in coming years out of the district's regular sinking fund monies, the citizen committee recommended.

Public provides school input

Concerns about the cost of the proposed \$9.2 million school building project, fears about the failure of the plans to include elementary schools in Carroll and Wayne and encouragement to keep the academic spaces and eliminate the auditorium and nonessential facilities were expressed as part of a public hearing on the school building needs Tuesday night in Wayne.

More than 160 people sweltered in the heat of the high school lecture hall to hear the citizen committee recommendations on the school building needs and express their own opinions for the board to consider before possibly sending a bond issue election to the voters.

Several residents expressed concern that the bond issue proposal did not include funding for work at the

'Mom' Welte loses bout with cancer

Longtime Wayne State College housemother, Roberta "Mom" Welte, 75, of Wayne died Thursday afternoon (July 7) in her Wayne apartment following a 13-month bout with cancer.

Mrs. Welte, known as "Mom" to thousands of Wayne State College alumni, spent 23 years in WSC dormitories, primarily in Morey Hall.

When she retired in 1989, Mrs. Welte estimated that over the years she was a mother to 3,700 students who resided in residence halls that she supervised as a housemother.

"Countless graduates have continued to remark on the profound influence Mom Welte had on their lives," said Dr. Donald J. Mash, president of Wayne State College. "She was a very special

person who will be missed by the entire Wayne State College community. Our sympathy goes out to her family, the students who have remained close to her, and Mom's many friends in the community."

Mrs. Welte was scheduled to receive the WSC "Distinguished Service Award", the highest award that can be bestowed by the college,

during summer commencement ceremonies in August. The Board of Trustees of the Nebraska State Colleges is scheduled to give its approval of the recognition during its board meeting tomorrow morning.

College officials say Mrs. Welte will be recognized posthumously

Weather delays road... again

The recent wet weather has altered the expected completion date of the highway project on highway 35 between the outskirts of Wakefield and the Emerson turn-off.

The planned completion date for traffic goes was supposed to be July 4 but it looks now like it could be late this month or the first of August, barring any further delays.

Meanwhile, the Nebraska Highway Program recently released its

plans for highway and road improvements for the fiscal year which started July 1, and for the next five years and Wayne County has nearly 23 million dollars worth of road improvements listed in those plans.

Projects that will be contracted this year but not necessarily completed in this fiscal year include a 5.9 mile stretch on Highway 15 south of Wayne. The improvements being made include hard surfacing

of the shoulder and drainage work under and around the bridge at a cost of nearly 700,000 dollars.

A 15.8 mile stretch on Highway 16 between Wakefield and Pender will be resurfaced with a bridge repairment and the cost of that project is expected to be near the two-million dollar mark.

Turning to the plans that go through the fiscal year 2000, an 11-

Roberta Welte, 75 of Wayne, died Thursday, July 8 at her home. Services will be held Monday, July 11 at 10 a.m. at the First United Methodist Church in Wayne. Rev. Gary Main and Father Gary Rush will officiate.

Roberta Mae Welte, daughter of Frank and Mae (Zerfing) Siefert was born June 15, 1919 in Oto, Iowa. She graduated from Oto High School in 1937. Roberta worked as a child nurse for the movie stars in Hollywood until World War II, when she went to work at the defense plant. She then returned to Oto, Iowa in 1945 where she owned and operated a restaurant and was the Mayor of Oto, Iowa. Roberta moved to Wayne, Nebraska in 1967 where she was housemother at Wayne State College until her retirement in 1992. Roberta was a Charter Member of American Legion Auxiliary Post #651 in Oto, Iowa, V.F.W. mile stretch on Highway 35 east of Hoskins will be done which includes grading, reconstruction of culverts and bridges/viaducts, resurfacing of the highway and hard surfacing of the shoulders. The cost of this project is estimated at 7.9 million dollars.

All of the plans for the next five years involve Highway 35. An 8.5-mile stretch west of Wayne on 35 will include grading, resurfacing, hard surfacing of the shoulders and restructuring of culverts, bridges/viaducts at an estimated cost of 3.3 million dollars.

A 7.6 mile stretch east of Wayne on 35 will be graded, resurfaced with restructuring of culverts, bridges/viaducts and hard surfacing of shoulders for an estimated cost of 4.5 million dollars and a 4.2 mile stretch north of Winside on Highway 35 is expected to be done with the same improvements with a cost involvement near the two million dollar mark.

The fifth improvement will take place in Wayne on Highway 35. The 4.6 million dollar project will begin on the west side of Wayne by the fairgrounds and proceed to the Logan Street Bridge on the east side of town.

The work proposed for this improvement includes: construction of a new three-lane roadway with the center line providing for two-way

left turns; curb and gutter along with this new three-lane roadway; a new drainage system; minor grading at the intersections; retaining walls and sidewalks to be built where needed; utilities to be relocated as necessary; some driveways may be closed or rebuilt; realignment of some city streets may be necessary.

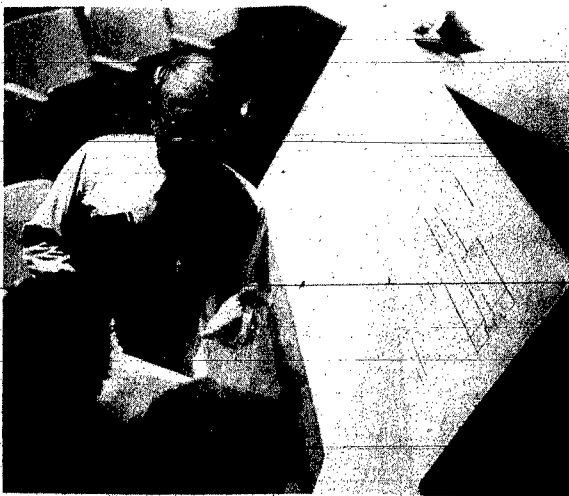

placement of the Carroll School.

Fifty Carroll area students in kindergarten through 4th grade attend the Carroll Elementary. Thirty-three students from Carroll are bused the 10 miles to the Wayne Middle School each day and 24 high school students come to Wayne.

"To bring them into town would not place stress on the system," said Dr. Dennis Jensen, superintendent, who added he was not pushing that option.

"I JUST DON'T honestly see how we can do it," said board member Will Davis.

The possible school closure has been discussed in Carroll for weeks before it was a matter of open discussion by the school board and residents there are mobilized to oppose the potential move.

Jensen said the school architect estimated the district could build a 10,000 square foot building with four classrooms and multipurpose room in Carroll for about \$500,000.

Carroll residents attended the public hearing on school building needs Tuesday night to encourage the district to include construction funds for the Carroll school in the proposed bond issue the district is considering for construction of a new Middle School and additions to the High School.

BESIDES THE Carroll issue, board members discussed possible cuts to the building plans proposed for the potential bond issue. On the block may be the 700-seat auditorium with its \$1.5 million price tag, elimination of greenhouse additions

in the science labs and shifting rooms such as music, wrestling and industrial technology to economize and save space.

Davis argued against cutting space out of the plan. He pointed out that the district economized when it built the high school in the sixties by eliminating space in the lecture hall and science classrooms, both of which are sorely needed and will cost millions to build now.

"I'M SORRY that's pretty false economy," he said. "I really hate to start whacking on this plan."

As presented to the board by the citizen committee which studied the building needs of the district, the plan calls for construction of a two story wing on the south side of the existing high school with the wing to house the Middle School. Where it connects to the high school would also be extensive shared facilities such as the 700-seat auditorium, a gymnasium, dining and kitchen facilities and administrative offices.

The plans without the cuts being discussed, are estimated to cost \$9.2 million. The bond issue to fund the construction would increase the taxes on a \$50,000 piece of assessed property by \$220 per year for 20 years.

Wayne Superintendent Dr. Dennis Jensen, said many programs and curriculum requirements have been added to the schools, mostly through government mandates, since the high school was built in 1968 and that those requirements made additional space necessary.

The plans call for a total of 161,000 square feet of total space for the high school and middle school. The two buildings currently cover 123,000 square feet. The bulk of the 41,000 additional square footage would be in the proposed 700-seat auditorium.

The high school currently has 69,000 square feet.

Architect Jim Dyck told the audience the district could build a cheaper building, but it would end up costing more in the long run.

"If you build a cheap building for

kids you're going to pay forever," he said. He gave an example with doors. He said inexpensive doors and frames on a school building could save thousands in initial construction costs.

"But," he said, "kids don't walk through doors, they explode through them." He said it is not cost effective to cheapen the first cost of the building.

The first priorities that went into formulating the plans presented by the committee were established to address safety code and Americans With Disabilities Act violations, said Dyck. Other priorities were curriculum needs he said.

The concerns and comments made at Tuesday's public hearing were taken to the Thursday school board meeting where the board members began the discussion of plans and a possible bond issue vote.

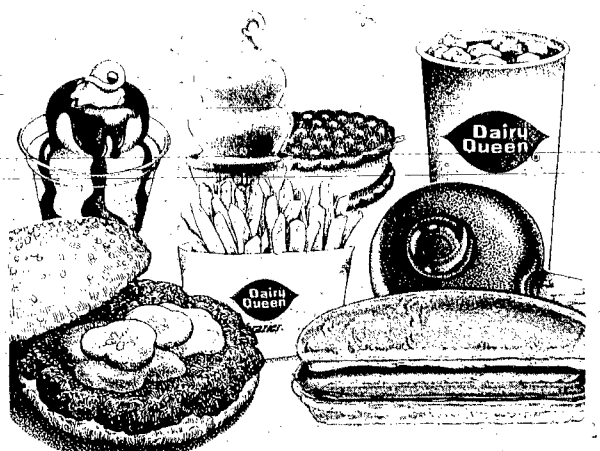
Mrs. Welte was born June 15, 1919 in Oto, Iowa. She graduated from Oto High School in 1937. She is survived by one son and a

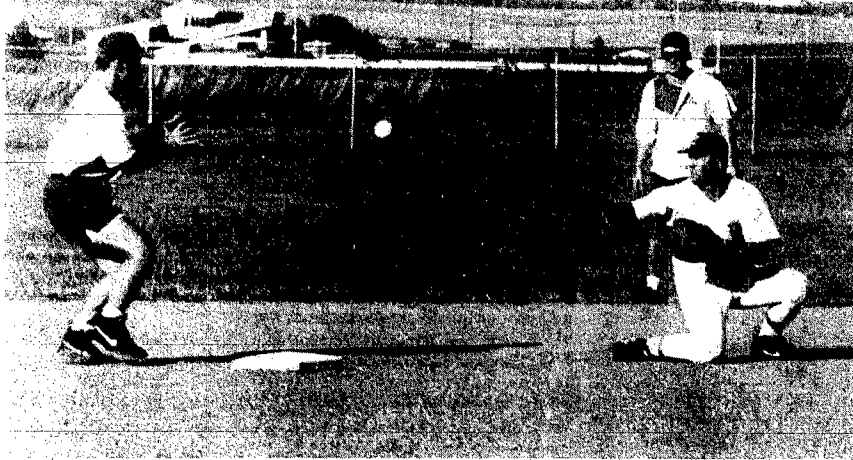

•Weatherization — providing weatherization materials and practices in their homes, which helps in lowering heating and cooling costs for the income eligible and elderly.

•Head Start — emphasizes the importance of health education, parent involvement and the development of individual strengths of families.

•Drug Free Head Start — providing prevention activities through training and support for

staff, children, parents and caregivers.

•Joint Housing Authority — providing rental assistance enabling income eligible families to live in decent, affordable housing.

•Family Services — providing assistance to area residents through immunization clinics, well child clinics, food pantries, gardening, tax counseling for the elderly and low income (TCE), federal emergency management agency (FEMA), car seats, homeless and Toys for Tots.

4-H judges play a vital role to youth

4-H judges are might busy this time of year. County and state fairs find judges hard at work tasting foods, examining designs, eyeing photos and evaluating exhibits.

4-H judges, who give feedback to young people about their project exhibits, play a crucial role in a young person's learning experience at the fair.

Participants chose to attend workshops on evaluating exhibits in meal planning, photography, educational exhibits, and clothing and home environment projects. They also explored professional behavior and how to meet special challenges in judging.

Barn tour draws hundreds

Almost 650 people attended the swine research barn tour and dedication June 30 at the Northeast Research and Extension Center near Concord.

"It ranged from people with no pigs who were curious about our research, to established producers, packers, and extension livestock specialists from other states," Mike Brumm, NU extension swine specialist and designer of the barn said, "the visitors regardless of prior swine experience, found all of the evening's tour stops interesting."

The open house featured a tour of ongoing wine research efforts with Brumm giving background information on the new growing-finishing research barn, and Jim Dahlquist, NU current research technologist explaining the research in the new facility. Phil Miller, assistant professor of animal science and graduate assistants, Paul Ermer and Scott Tilden presented information on swine nutrition questions currently being researched by UNL scientists. The tour then went to the anaerobic waste storage

lagoon, where Dennis Schulte, professor of biological systems engineering explained how an anaerobic lagoon operates, and answered questions on odor concerns.

The tour finished at the lagoon effluent irrigation plots where Charles Shapiro, NU extension soils specialist, Bill Kranz, NU extension irrigation specialist, and Jeff Mueller, graduate student explained the use of lagoon effluent on growing crops.

"We had a lot of people come to

look specifically at the lagoon and irrigation because of the concerns on odors and groundwater contamination," Brumm said.

Brumm added the visitors' response to the tour was good.

"People I talked to said, 'We're glad to see our tax dollars spent here'," Brumm said. "We accomplished a lot of good will for the university with this event, in addition to improving the public awareness of what the Northeast Research and Extension Center is."

Tenn.

Kearney announces Deans' List students
